

It was Sunday, February 23rd, 1964, just a few months after President Kennedy had been shot. I was in my freshman year at Connecticut College for Women. I was attending a college and career group at a church in downtown New London when a group of guys I didn't recognize showed up. I was painfully shy, but for some reason I decided to go up and shake hands with each of them. I was instantly drawn to Bob, who had become a Christian in his last year at the Naval Academy. He, impressed by my initiative, asked if he could drive me home and then invited me to a hymn sing later that night at a Plymouth Brethren church. So, later that evening, Bob and I had our first date. At the time, I was still not a believer. I had grown up in church, always being open to the Lord and reading the Bible, but I had not accepted Jesus as my Savior.

Bob drove a couple of friends and me to the hymn sing that night. It was a very cold winter evening. In fact, when I got out of the car, I slipped on the ice and slid completely underneath Bob's car! Thankfully, I was wearing a long, wool coat, so I was unharmed, and we continued into the church. I only knew one song during the entire hymn sing. Afterwards, Bob was driving us all home. When we got to the top of the Gold Star Memorial Bridge across the Thames River, the rear axle broke. Bob managed to coast all the way down and around the base of the bridge, finally stopping at a gas station. He was going to call a taxi, but I wanted to spend more time with him. I suggested that we walk up the steep, snowy hill to my dorm together.

Very early in our relationship Bob told me about his commitment to Christ. I said to myself, "I know this guy is serious about this, and if I don't accept Jesus, then he will drop me." There was something in Bob that I had never seen before, so I accepted the Lord, motivated by not wanting to lose this wonderful man who had walked into my life.

Despite my shallow reasons for making the decision to follow Christ, God gave me a sincere hunger for the Word and a small group of Christian friends. However, it wasn't until after we married a few years later and Bob went out to sea for months at a time that I came to the Lord in dependency. That's when I realized how I really needed God. I began memorizing scripture and deepened my relationships with Christian friends. Later, when I was depressed and dealing with the tension of wanting to be a good Navy wife and mother to our children, the Lord taught me about the root of bitterness. He showed me the necessity for forgiveness. He changed something in me that I could not have done on my own.

Life is hard. Marriage can be difficult. This is the verse that has carried me through some times that were hard to bear: Psalm 119:68 "You are good and do good." I know God is good and what he does and allows for me is good. I can trust him no matter what.
