Concerning the Wauwatosa School Board's Approval of the New HGD Curriculum:

As a Christian, I want to say that I am so proud of what the Wauwatosa School Board did last night in passing the new HGD curriculum. In the Christian tradition. I know there are a variety of views on this issue, but the Gospel has always been paramount. In the Gospel, welcome is a central theme. Jesus says greatness comes through making sure children feel welcome. Jesus says that showing welcome to others is akin to welcoming Jesus himself. Jesus even commands Christians to use dishonest means if necessary to create relationships of love and welcoming. Yet the judgment laid upon LGBTQ youth and families has been and remains unwelcoming, both in the Church and in our schools. The violence done by the Church to discredit their voices and devalue their existence is offensive and shameful. And this is to say nothing of the ways we have failed to love other people who do not meet the Church's standard of a "model Christian" when it comes to sex.

When the Wauwatosa School District was putting together the External Advisory Committee as required by State statute, I jumped at the chance to be a clergy person (a position required by State statute) on that committee so that all youth would understand the real Gospel of Jesus Christ: You are created in God's image, you are worthy of life and love, and even though there are parts of our community and parts of the Church where you are not welcome, you are welcome here. You are welcome in God's kingdom. And I will do everything I can to make sure you are welcome in our school and in our community.



Science Tidbits

Energy Crunch: Where Will It Come From?



The energy landscape is ever-changing these days. A full-court press is on to shift to alternative green energies, but until they can be major contributors to our electricity needs, it will be necessary to continue with more traditional methods. So, how are we currently meeting our electricity demands?

Wind turbines. The first wind farm in the U.S. was put online in 1975. They now are found everywhere throughout the country, and some are mind-blowingly huge, many stretching as far as the eye can see. In 2021, wind power produced 9.2% of all electrical energy in the U.S.

Solar panels. Photovoltaic technology was born in the U.S. in 1954. Since then, although interest in converting solar energy into electricity has skyrocketed, solar energy's share of total electricity generation in the U.S. in 2021 was still only 2.8%.

<u>Nuclear power (fission)</u>. Nuclear power's percent contribution to the U.S. total electricity generation in 2021 was 18.9%. Discussion concerning increasing the role of nuclear energy has recently intensified; however, environmental opposition, health risks and 5X higher costs than wind have dampened enthusiasm.

<u>Hydroelectric power</u>. In 2021, the U.S. was the third largest generator of hydroelectric power in the world behind Brazil and China. It provided 6.3% of the U.S. electricity supply. Notably, drought conditions out west are leading to lower river water levels and greatly threaten future hydroelectric production.

Natural gas. Of the nonrenewable energy sources, natural gas is the "greenest." It has been the largest source of electrical generation in the U.S. since 2015 and supplied 38.6% of 2021 use.

Coal. This has been a critical source of electrical power in the U.S. and in 2021 was the second highest producer at 22%. However, it is enemy no. 1 to environmentalists, being the single largest emitter of carbon dioxide gas. Nevertheless, in many areas of the country, burning coal is the primary electricity source and can't be so easily replaced. Of particular note is the dilemma facing the Jim Bridger power plant in Wyoming, one of the largest in the nation, that supplies electricity to over one million households. In order to operate, it consumes over 16 million gallons of water daily from a rapidly dwindling tributary of the Colorado River. No water à no power. Water is getting scarcer by the day in the west. How do you choose who gets it?

<u>Biomass</u> (burned to produce steam that powers turbines) + <u>geothermal</u> + <u>petroleum</u>. 2.5% of total electricity.

<u>Fusion</u>. This is a developing technology that offers the potential of virtually unlimited supplies of low-carbon, low-radiation energy. Instead of fission, which splits atoms, fusion combines two different hydrogen forms (deuterium and tritium, see pic) to produce helium plus a proton and a lot of energy. But there is a serious catch—there may not be enough tritium to jump start the fusion reactors.

Get Ready to VOTE

Midterms are November 8, 2022!

The first step: REGISTER!

You are eligible to vote if you will be at least 18 years old on November 8, 2022, a US citizen, a resident of Wisconsin for 28 days prior to the election, and not serving a felony sentence.

Now is the time to register if you have not registered before, or to check to see that you are still registered. If you've moved, changed your name, or haven't voted in a while, you will need to re-register. You can register on election day, but if you want to save time on that day, register now!

How to Register to Vote

ONLINE - You can <u>check</u> your registration, <u>update</u> your name and address, or <u>register</u> here, <u>https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Register-To-Vote</u>.

To register, you will need a valid Wisconsin drivers license or a State of Wisconsin ID card with your current address, which you can get free from an office of the Wisconsin Department of Motor Vehicles.

Must be completed by

October 19.

BY MAIL - Fill out form (from https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Register-To-Vote) and mail with a copy of your proof of residence to your municipal clerk. **Must be postmarked by October 19, 2022.**

IN PERSON - Go to your municipal clerk's office and bring proof of residence. Find your clerk at https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/My-Municipal-Clerk. **Must be done before November 4.**

AT YOUR POLLING PLACE ON ELECTION DAY NOVEMBER 8, 2022 - If you are **not registered by October 19**, you can bring your proof of residence and your photo ID to register and vote at your polling place.


