Tiny Bible Practices

Last month I invited folks to try building a little more joy and playfulness into their lives. I encouraged all of you to try adding in small little habits of celebration into your routines. This month we're going to take our little faith practices one step further, and give ourselves something worth celebrating as we together connect our lives with Scripture in three tiny but powerful ways.

All throughout October, our theme will be "The Bible". Sola scriptura - "scripture alone" was one of the Lutheran reformation's rallying cries. It was a cry that spoke to the power of the Bible, which is really the power of the God whom we meet through its pages. And yet, for all of our historic love for scripture, I find that many of the Lutherans I meet (including in our congregation!) have a tenuous personal relationship with the Bible.

There's something intimidating about the Bible, intimidating enough that many of us don't spend a lot of time there in our personal lives. We hear Bible verses in church or get little snippits in an email devotional, but true devotional reading of scripture is a rare practice.

These three little practices will help you begin to build a relationship, or rekindle an old one, with the Bible in a more personal way. Try them out. Each one really does only take a teeny tiny bit of your time each day, but out of that small seed something profound can grow. And don't forget to celebrate every time you accomplish one of these tiny practices! That emotional stinger of joy is the water that will help these practices grow.

- 1. Place a Bible on your desk at work or next to your computer with a bookmark in any part of the Bible you choose. Immediately after you sit down at your desk or while your computer is booting up, open the Bible and read one paragraph. Then pause for 5 seconds and think about what God might be saying to you today.
- 2. Pick an uplifting Bible verse and write it on a sticky note. Place the note next to your bathroom mirror and read the verse to yourself each time you look in the mirror, then smile at your reflection.
- 3. When you get home from worship, look up one of the passages that was read and put a bookmark in your Bible on that page, and leave it there until the next time you go to worship.



Reconciliation is a fundamental value; it is what the Apostle Paul says we are all called to do. Through our Reconciling in Christ Program, ministries, resources, events and alliances, ReconcilingWorks builds community for worship, education and support; fosters welcome and acceptance in all Lutheran settings; and advocates for the ecclesial changes necessary to ensure full participation in all sacraments, inclusive liturgical resources, and ministries of the Church, inviting all people into Gospel lives of authenticity, integrity, and wholeness.

CTK Reads News from the Library

Henry J.M. Nouwen was one of the great spiritual writers of our time. His book, *Life of the Beloved*, was written in response to a good friend, a young Jewish man. This friend loved Nouwen's writing and asked him to write something that would speak to him and his secular friends about the spiritual life, without using theology and technical language.

This book was Nouwen's response to his friend's request. It is written with simplicity and honesty and is easy to read. It is also very meaningful to believers.

Nouwen writes, "From the moment that we claim the truth of being the Beloved, we are faced with the call to become who we are." He then attempts to identify the movement of the Spirit in our lives. He uses four words which he says have become very important to him and which summarize his life as a Christian. The words are "taken, blessed, broken and given."

This writer goes on to expand on the meaning to him of each of these words. Each word, he says, must be claimed as true in his life in order for him (and for us) to become the Beloved. To be taken is to be chosen. To be blessed is to be spoken well of, to be affirmed as a special person, deeply loved by God. To be broken is to suffer. We must face our pain and suffering. To be given is to live for others. Nouwen writes "In the giving, it becomes clear that we are taken (chosen), blessed and broken not simply for our own sakes, but so that all we live finds its final significance in its being lived for others."

Nouwen learned that his words in this book did not speak to his friend and his secular friends. But it did speak to some of Nouwen's colleagues who encouraged him to publish it. He realized that his writing was most helpful to searching Christians rather than the secular world.

You may find this book on the shelf in our CTK library among many of Henri Nouwen's books. You will be blessed by reading his words.
