

Dear Resurrection People,

Two years ago I was reading through the ministry site profile for a Resurrection Lutheran Church in Ankeny. For the unfamiliar, that's the self-study document a congregation produces when searching for a pastor. It lists some nitty-gritty details, like the size and budget of a congregation, along with more subjective questions about a congregation's character and values.

What I read interested me. You see, one of the things that came through the description was a congregation that was engaged and active with one another, offering support inwardly while looking out to those in the community and around the world who needed good news. Particularly, I saw a congregation that loved being together. Perhaps at that point, the love of being together stood out because so much of the world was separated—by the ideas and strategies of the 2020 election, by the pandemic, by reactions to the

pandemic, by support and opposition to the Black Lives Matter movement after George Floyd's murder, by the haves and have-nots revealed through financial crisis and natural disaster (remember the derecho?).

But being together? Loving one another and the time spent in fellowship, in service, in worship? Oh, that sure sounded like what I needed.

But togetherness is a strength that needs, well, strengthening if it's going to stay vibrant in the face of division. That's part of why I picked out our stewardship theme this year: Together for Joy. We are not alone, not divided when God acts to bring us together for joy. And that's a quality worth working for! It's worth spending time together, listening to one another, seeing deeply to the gifts that each person brings.

I'm looking forward to exploring this theme of "Together for Joy" over the next several weeks with you.

Summary September Council Meeting

Call to Order: by President Carly Montgomery at 6:31 pm (Note: Motions are shown in the meeting minutes in bold italics.)

Opening Devotions: were postponed until next month

August Meeting Minutes: approved by Council

August Financial Reports: Although we are about \$25,000 in the red, one positive is that \$2000/month comes in for bell tower. There are still funds coming into the Capital Campaign as well. Lee is going to talk to Stewardship and Finance investing \$45,000 of the \$50,000 capital campaign funds and \$50,000 of the \$65,000 bell tower funds in short-term FDIC insured CD's from TD Ameritrade

Bell Tower Requests: No formal requests were made this month

Pastor's and Joint Ministries report: Fall is filling up with Synod and Congregation Events. All members are encouraged to sign up for Cottage Meetings. Groups are encouraged to sign up to help prepare and serve monthly community meals (every 3rd Wednesday of the month). Council will help to plan and serve the November Community Meal on 11/16.

Southeastern Iowa Synod Council Presidents report: Upcoming synod events include the Fall Theological Conference, Spring Synod Assembly, and a synod-wide revival in May. The majority of the meeting focused on how congregations are keeping members involved, how to move beyond our walls, and how to make intergenerational connections.

Board Highlights:

Worship and Music: The Advent Music Program is scheduled for 12/04. The Walnut Strings group have been invited to play for a few upcoming Saturday

services. A discussion relating to the placement of flags in the sanctuary will be discussed next month.

Congregational Life: Members are encouraged to sign up to serve and donate snacks. October 23 is scheduled to have a chili cook-off. They are looking to do a movie night in January and an art show in the spring.

Social Ministry – E Team: Social Ministry is working on community meals. E-Team has made it a goal to reestablish its purpose.

Stewardship & Finance: Stewardship and Finance is organizing a campaign for the month of October from 10/01 – 10/25 and focuses on our joy and strength together as a congregation.

Property Board: Property approved pollinator habitat but a formal proposal has not been submitted from Bayer so council will hold a short meeting to approve that at a later time when the proposal has been submitted.

Youth Happenings

A note from the Director of Youth & Family Ministry

As I have prepared for my departure from RLC, I cannot help but reflect on my time at RLC. Throughout these six years, the youth, adult leaders and I traveled 10,964 miles for service trips, conferences, camp, and the 2018 ELCA Youth Gathering. These trips are an incredible opportunity for our young people to deepen their faith, grow in relationships, and to serve alongside organizations helping the marginalized.

Together, we learned about the difficulties and the complexities of hunger insecurity through three different hunger simulations. During the simulations, we found ourselves waiting for the “bus”, not being able to understand the directions of applications, and inconvenient hours at the “Food Pantry” and the “DHS” office.

When we weren’t intently learning or lending a hand, we were having fun setting up the haunted house, conquering the corn maze, ice skating, snow tubing, jumping on trampolines, swimming in the ocean, and participating in nerf gun wars.

I will cherish the memories and the relationships that have been created throughout my time at Resurrection Lutheran Church. As you step into yet another transition, I want to share with you a conversation I had early on in my ministry at RLC.

Shortly into this role, a colleague and I were talking, and they had shared some wisdom with me that I will never forget. “You may be the Director of Youth & Family Ministry, but your volunteers are the real

MVPs”. By golly, this colleague was right. Without the countless volunteers who serve or have served as Sunday School teachers, confirmation mentors, board members, chefs, decorators, guitarists, actors, actress, crew leaders, mission trip leaders, Gathering leaders, drivers, game station attendants, seamstress, auctioneer, or donator of goods, the children, and youth ministry programs here at RLC wouldn’t happen. Together, we have done amazing work that has impacted the lives of our young people in ways we will never know. Thank you for partnering in ministry with me and for serving alongside me.

As I prepare to depart, I leave knowing that the same great work will continue because of the wonderful members and staff. Will it look different? Absolutely, but that is a good thing. Will it be difficult? Yes! Change is always difficult, but we can hold on to the love and peace of Jesus, because he never changes. Jesus Christ is the same as yesterday, today, and tomorrow (Hebrews 13:8).

Thank you again for allowing me the opportunity to be a part of this community and for all the support and love over the years.






God intended humans to be God's friends and partners in caring for the world, but it's gone wrong ever since humans decided that being a Big Deal would be better than doing things God's way. So what does God do? Work to mend the whole creation, of course!

Seminars on How Community Land Trusts (CLTs)
Create Permanent Affordable Housing. This is something exciting for AMOS church members/institutions. On these days, AMOS and the city of Des Moines will bring Grounded Solutions, the experts in Community Land Trusts (CLT's), to Des Moines for a series of meetings to inform attendees of the benefits of CLTs.

CLT'S are a way to create affordable housing that stays affordable forever and looks like other properties in the neighborhood so it's welcomed by the neighbors!

How is this possible? With the purchase of a CLT home, the buyer purchases only the structure on the property and a trust holds the land. If the owner later wishes to sell, the owner agrees to accept only a portion of the increase in value in order to preserve affordability for the next buyer. The owner may also choose to pass the property along to his or her heirs.

While this is a new idea for the Des Moines Metro, it is in use in 225 other communities in the U.S. and is now an integral part of how other communities are dealing with skyrocketing real estate prices. CLTs have a proven track record of:

- offering affordability in perpetuity
- providing for successive lower-income buyers with every property
- preserving the diversity and quality of life in our city
- slowing gentrification
- saving tax dollars for the city and county

Whether you are hearing about CLT's for the first time and want to learn more or are a seasoned advocate for affordable housing, plan to attend one or more of these informative trainings on November 16 and 17. There will be more details soon, but you'll want to get this on your calendar. Feel free to email me should you have questions!
