

Rev. Anne Anderson

In addition to serving as community pastor; leading the Third Space alternative worshipping community; and guest lecturing in various courses; Rev. Anderson is a candidate in Luther's PhD in Human Relationships program in the field of Pastoral Leadership.

Anne received my BA in International Development Studies from Wilfrid Laurier University in 2001 and my MDiv from Waterloo Lutheran Seminary (Martin Luther University College) in 2006. Before joining Luther, Anne served as co-pastor at Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in New Hamburg, ON (2006-2014).

Dr. Mary (Joy) Philip

Dr. Phiip is Full Professor of Lutheran Global Theology and Mission and director of the Master of Divinity Program at the Martin Luther University. She is the founder of **Centre for Earth Consciousness and Gender Justice** whose goal is planetary well-being and justice that works towards the common good, not just for the present but for all future living beings on the planet.

She states, "I am an Indian (from India) and was a professor of Zoology in Bangalore, India, before I took my doctorate in Systematic Theology from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. I am trained to be a zoology teacher and theologian but my journey has taken me to places that I had not planned to go, and to vocations that I had not envisioned engaging in. But to the places I go, I try to represent the place that is in me. And to the vocations I find myself called to, I try to invocate the passion that is in me, and convoke the resources that are available to me."

Dr. Debbie Lou Ludolph

Dr. Ludolph is Dean of Chapel; Director, Kanata Centre for Worship and Global Song; Instructor, Practical Theology. She states: "I successfully defended my doctoral dissertation — as part of Martin Luther University College's PhD in Human Relationships program, field of Pastoral Leadership — in January 2021. I received my Master of Arts in Theology degree from Luther in 2009, when the school was known as Waterloo Lutheran Seminary, and my bachelor's degree in Vocal Performance from Wilfrid Laurier University in 1982. Prior to working full-time at Luther, I performed in the musical theatre industry; taught vocal pedagogy, musical skills and voice at Laurier and in the community; and led music and worship at conferences and retreats. In addition to teaching, I co-ordinate worship in Luther's Keffer Memorial Chapel.
