PREFACE TO THE ORDINATION RITES

The Holy Scriptures and ancient Christian writers make it clear that from the apostles' time, there have been different ministries within the Church. In particular, since the time of the New Testament, three distinct orders of ordained ministers have been characteristic of Christ's holy catholic Church. First, there is the order of bishops who carry on the apostolic work of leading, supervising, and uniting the Church. Secondly, associated with them are the presbyters, or ordained elders, in subsequent times generally known as priests. Together with the bishops, they take part in the governance of the Church, in the carrying out of its missionary and pastoral work, and in the preaching of the Word of God and administering his holy Sacraments. Thirdly, there are deacons who assist bishops and priests in all of this work. It is also a special responsibility of deacons to minister in Christ's name to the poor, the sick, the suffering, and the helpless.

The persons who are chosen and recognized by the Church as being called by God to the ordained ministry are admitted to these sacred orders by solemn prayer and the laying on of episcopal hands. It has been, and is, the intention and purpose of this Church to maintain and continue these three orders; and for this purpose, these services of ordination and consecration are appointed. No persons are allowed to exercise the offices of bishop, priest, or deacon in this Church unless they are so ordained or have already received such ordination with the laying on of hands by bishops who are themselves duly qualified to confer Holy Orders.

It is also recognized and affirmed that the threefold ministry is not the exclusive property of this portion of Christ's catholic Church but is a gift from God for the nurture of his people and the proclamation of his Gospel everywhere. Accordingly, the manner of ordaining in this Church is to be such as has been, and is, most generally recognized by Christian people as suitable for the conferring of the sacred orders of bishop, priest, and deacon.

THE NICENE CREED

The people stand, as able.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE EXAMINATION

Bishop	My brother, the Church is the family of God, the body of Christ, and the temple of the Holy Spirit. All baptized people are called to make Christ known as Savior and Lord, and to share in the renewing of his world. Now you are called to work as pastor, priest, and teacher, together with your bishop and fellow presbyters, and to take your share in the councils of the Church. As a priest, it will be your task to proclaim by word and deed the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to fashion your life in accordance with its precepts. You are to love and serve the people among whom you work, caring alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. You are to preach, to declare God's forgiveness to penitent sinners, to pronounce God's blessing, to share in the administration of Holy Baptism and in the celebration of the mysteries of Christ's Body and Blood, and to perform the other ministrations entrusted to you.
	In all that you do, you are to nourish Christ's people from the riches of his grace and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come.
Ordinand	My brother, do you believe that you are truly called by God and his Church to this priesthood? I believe I am so called.
Bishop Ordinand	Do you now in the presence of the Church commit yourself to this trust and responsibility? I do.
Bishop Ordinand	Will you be guided by the pastoral direction and leadership of your bishop? I will.
Bishop Ordinand	Will you be diligent in the reading and study of the Holy Scriptures, and in seeking the knowledge of such things as may make you a stronger and more able minister of Christ? I will.
Bishop Ordinand	Will you endeavor so to minister the Word of God and the sacraments of the New Covenant, that the reconciling love of Christ may be known and received? I will.
Bishop Ordinand	Will you undertake to be a faithful pastor to all whom you are called to serve, laboring together with them and with your fellow ministers to build up the family of God? I will.
Bishop Ordinand	Will you do your best to pattern your life and that of your family in accordance with the teachings of Christ, so that you may be a wholesome example to your people? I will.

Bishop Ordinand	Will you persevere in prayer, both in public and in private, asking God's grace, both for yourself and for others, offering all your labors to God, through the mediation of Jesus Christ, and in the sanctification of the Holy Spirit? I will.

A period of silent prayer follows, the people still standing.

The bishop then says this Prayer of Consecration.

God and Father of all, we praise you for your infinite love in calling us to be a holy people in the kingdom of your Son Jesus our Lord, who is the image of your eternal and invisible glory, the firstborn among many brethren, and the head of the Church. We thank you that by his death he has overcome death, and, having ascended into heaven, has poured his gifts abundantly upon your people, making some apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry and the building up of his body.

Here the bishop lays hands upon the head of the ordinand, and prays:

Therefore, Father, through Jesus Christ your Son, give your Holy Spirit to Adam; fill him with grace and power, and make him a priest in your Church.

The bishop then continues:

May he exalt you, O Lord, in the midst of your people; offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to you; boldly proclaim the gospel of salvation; and rightly administer the sacraments of the New Covenant. Make him a faithful pastor, a patient teacher, and a wise councilor. Grant that in all things he may serve without reproach, so that your people may be strengthened, and your Name glorified in all the world. All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever.

The people in a loud voice respond: **AMEN**.

The new priest is now vested according to the order of priests.

The bishop gives a Bible to the newly ordained, saying:

Bishop Receive this Bible as a sign of the authority given you to preach the Word of God and to administer his holy Sacraments. Do not forget the trust committed to you as a priest of the Church of God.

THE PEACE

The new priest then says to the congregation:

Fountain of life and source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your radiance.

Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we sing:

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again, you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose, he gave himself up to death; and rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he

had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, and with all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

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Music Notes

Ordination Prelude by Ian Hudson (b. 1982) was commissioned for the glory of God and in honor of the presbyteral ordination of the Rev. Adam Dawkins. Adam expresses his heartfelt gratitude to his dear friend Mary for this generous honor, to Ian Hudson for this superb musical offering, and to Philip Jones for his masterful performance.

O God Beyond all Praising to the tune *Thaxted*, by Gustav Holst (1874-1934). Words by Michael Perry (1942-1996). Perry was born in Beckenham, Kent, England, where he served as Vicar of Tonbridge and a canon of Rochester Cathedral. In 1982, Perry wrote "O God beyond all praising" specifically for the melody *Thaxted*. This tune is normally associated in the U.K. with a patriotic text. Perry said that he composed the text "in response to a call for alternative words that would be more appropriate for Christian worship." Rarely is a symphonic theme used for a hymn tune. The melody *Thaxted*, named for a small town in the Uttlesford district of Essex, comes from the middle section of the "Jupiter" movement in Holst's orchestral suite, *The Planets* (1914-1916). Perry wrote a majestic hymn of praise that is biblically rooted. The final line of the second stanza, "our sacrifice of praise," comes directly from Psalm 116:17 and Hebrews 13:15. In stanza one, the phrase, "wait upon your word," echoes Psalm 130:5. Another phrase from stanza one, "for we can only wonder at every gift you send," resounds in the spirit of James 1:17.

O Master, let me walk with Thee to the tune *de Tar* by Calvin Hampton (1938-1984). Words by Washington Gladden (1836-1918). Gladden was educated at Williams College and later entered ministry in the Congregational Church. He was editor of the *New York Independent* and of the *Sunday Afternoon*. In the *Sunday Afternoon*, his hymn, *O Master, let me walk with Thee,* appeared in 3 stanzas of 8 lines in March 1879. Originally set to the tune *Maryton*, this hymn was also the gradual hymn at the Rev. Dawkins' ordination to the diaconate on April 25, 2022, at All Saints' Chapel in Sewanee, Tennessee.

Rejoice in the Lord Alway by Henry Purcell (1659-1695). The words of this anthem are based on Philippians 4: 4-7. Purcell was among the Children of the Chapel Royal and became Organist of the Chapel in 1682. He was also Organist of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter, Westminster until 1693. He died in 1695, aged 37, and was buried in St. Peter's, Westminster.

Kontakion by Rupert Lang (b. 1948). The words of the *Kontakion* were written during the 9th century to bring comfort to those attending a burial service. It is sung faithfully at funeral services, on All Souls' Day (November 2nd), and on Remembrance Day. Rupert Lang has served as Director of Music at Christ Church Cathedral in Vancouver, British Columbia, where Adam serves as Curate. Adam is delighted to include music that is part of the fabric of the Cathedral parish community that he now serves. This selection of the *Kontakion* is offered in memory of Adam's father, Ernie Dawkins, and in memory of the Very Rev. Samuel T. Lloyd, the Rev. Adam W. Nygren, Micki Walls, John R. Cole, and Marianne Niemic.

King of Glory, King of Peace to the tune *General Seminary* by David Charles Walker (1938-2018), a priest of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles. Words by George Herbert (1593-1633), published posthumously in *The Temple* in 1633. Herbert was a gifted Welch poet, orator, and priest. Through the succeeding centuries, scores of composers have created numerous musical settings of his poems. The hymn tune *General Seminary* takes its name from General Theological Seminary of the Episcopal Church in New York City. This hymn was sung at communion at Adam's ordination to the diaconate earlier this year and at the wedding of Adam and Adam at St. Mark's-in-the-Valley Episcopal Church in Los Olivos, California.

Lord whose love through Humble Service to the Welsh melody *Blaenhafren*. Words by Albert F. Bayly (1901-1984). The text begins with recognition of Christ's ultimate sacrifice on the cross and then points to the continuing needs of the homeless, the hungry, prisoners, and mourners. Today, Bayly's words remind us of refugees, victims of addiction, and those who suffer from food insecurity who are often as close as our doorstep. The final two stanzas encourage us to move from worship to service. Such integrity in the Christian life is a liturgy of sacrifice that is pleasing to God.

Processional Toccata from Six Pieces *Op. 57* by George Elbridge Whiting (1840-1923). Whiting was born in Holliston, Massachusetts on September 14, 1840. He founded the Beethoven Society in Hartford, Connecticut when he was fifteen years old. He moved to Boston in 1862 and later to New York City. He went to Liverpool, England, and studied with William Thomas Best. He later studied in Berlin with Carl August Haupt (harmony), Robert Radecke (orchestration), and others. Whiting worked in various positions in Albany and Boston. He succeeded John Henry Willcox as organist and choir master at the Church of the Immaculate Conception on the south side of Boston, where he composed his masses in C minor, F minor, and Eb major. In 1874, Whiting became organist of the Music Hall in Boston. In 1878 he went to the

Music Hall in Cincinnati. During the 1870s, he also taught organ to his nephew, composer Arthur Whiting. Whiting was also for a time head of the organ department in the New England Conservatory.
