No. 18 – Keeping Our Conduct Honorable as God's People, pt. 8

1 Peter 3:13-17

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Review

The apostle Peter, writing to Christians who are both *elect* and *exiles*, encourages them to live faithfully...

- Praising God for Our Salvation (1:3-12)
- Setting Our Hope on God (1:13-21)
- Growing in God's Word (1:22-2:3)
- Being Built Up as a Spiritual House (2:4-8, 9-10)
- Keeping Our Conduct Honorable as God's People (2:9-10, 11-12)
 - -- Being Subject as Citizens to Human Authorities (2:13-17)
 - -- Being Subject as Servants to Our Masters (2:18-25)
 - -- Being Subject as Wives to Their Husbands (3:1-6)
 - -- Being Considerate as Husbands to Their Wives (3:7)
 - -- Being Considerate as Believers to Each Other (3:8-12)

No. 18 - Keeping Our Conduct Honorable, pt. 8

1 Peter 3:13-17

ESV 1 Peter 3: ¹³ Now who is there to harm you if you are zealous for what is good? ¹⁴ But even if you should suffer for righteousness' sake, you will be blessed. Have no fear of them, nor be troubled, ¹⁵ but in your hearts regard Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; ¹⁶ yet do it with gentleness and respect, having a good conscience, so that, when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame. ¹⁷ For it is better to suffer for doing good, if that should be God's will, than for doing evil.

How to Live Like an Alien ("sojourners" and "exiles," 2:11)...

> ...means knowing who we are ("God's people," 2:9-10) and living our lives among unbelievers accordingly ("abstaining" from fleshly passions and "keeping" honorable conduct, 2:11-12)...

- > ...which includes being subject to human authorities...
 - > ...like government ("kings" and "governors," 2:13-17)...
 - > ...and masters (household despots, 2:18-25)...
 - > ...and **husbands** (3:1-7)

Keeping our conduct honorable as God's people...

We must be committed to doing good no matter what (3:13-17)

doing good...

What is 'good'?

'good' (See 2:18; 3:10, 11, 13, 16, 21; also, 2:14, 15, 20; 3:6, 17; 4:19)

'conduct' (See 1:15, 18; 2:12; 3:1, 2, 16; also, 1:17)

- It's a progressive, intentional pursuit (v. 13)
- It's thoroughly consistent with righteousness (v. 14)
- It's an attitude and actions that supports the wellbeing of one's conscience (vv. 15-16)
- It's the observable quality of the way one lives their life (vv. 16-17)

no matter what...

'Now who is there to harm you if you are zealous for what is good... But even if you should suffer for righteousness' sake, you will be blessed' (vv. 13-14)

In other words, we must be committed to doing good no matter what...

Why?

because, in general, no one's going to harm you if you do good...

How should we understand Peter's question (v. 13)?

I won't ever be harmed?

I can't be ultimately harmed?

As a general rule, I won't be harmed?

How do you define 'harm'?

because, even if you suffer, it'll be better if you do good...

What does Peter mean by 'better'?

'better' (v. 17)

- It's better because this is, in part, the means by which others will be shamed (v. 16)
- It's better because this is, in part, the path to a good conscience (v. 16)
- It's better because this is, in part, the evidence of the Lordship of Christ in your life (v. 15)
- It's better because this is, in part, the way of blessing (v. 14)

'blessed' (v. 14)

How?

by being zealous for the good

by not fearing those who are fearful by sanctifying Christ in our hearts by submitting to God's will
