## Colossians 3:1-4

Pastor Don gave a brief overview of Roman rank and status; take a few minutes to describe that and answer the following questions.

1. What differences/ similarities did you notice between the Roman world and our world today?

In Roman society, they valued power, self-sufficiency, not showing emotion, personal stability, moderation, self-control and status.

- 2. Are those similar values to Canadian society?
- 3. Ch 1:11 contains two components that could have seemed like an oxymoron for a Roman citizen. What are they?
- 4. Why would 'power for endurance' have been a strange concept for the Colossian church?
- 5. Discuss how this may have affected their understanding of the suffering and crucifixion of Christ.
- 6. The phrase "life hidden" would also have been unappealing for a culture that strongly emphasizes status. Could that also make it hard for Canadians to embrace Christ? How do Canadians value status?
- 7. Ch. 3 essentially calls to live out the power of our death, burial and resurrection with Christ; why is it tempting to try to get power from other places?
- 8. How does the church guard itself against relying on alternative strategies rather than keeping our gaze on Christ for his power for ministry and life?
- 9. Ch. 3:1, "seated at the right hand of God," is a quote from Psalm 110:1. Read Psalm 110:1 and think through what Paul had in mind when he quoted the Psalm.
- 10. What does it mean that our life has been hidden with Christ in God?
- 11. The city of Colossae was in decline. It wasn't a significant city anymore. What would that have meant for the Colossian church to hear they have been hidden with Christ in God?
- 12. To seek the things above involved the heart/ affections. To set your mind on things above is meant to engage your head/ intellect. What are the differences between these two? Why are both necessary?
- 13. Share with the group how you intentionally seek the things above and set your mind on the things above.
- 14. Note the three tenses used in verses 3 and 4. (Past, present, future). Which of these three is easiest/ hardest to wrap your mind around?
