During Lent, we talk a lot about what we'll give up. Fasting and sacrifice play an important part in our spiritual lives, but there is the story of a boy who was willing to give up something of infinite value.

This five year old's sister was suffering from a rare and serious disease. Her only hope of recovery appeared to be a blood transfusion from her brother,

who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibodies needed to combat the illness. The doctor explained the situation to the boy, and asked if he would be willing to donate blood to his sister.

The little boy hesitated for a moment before taking a deep breath and saying, "yes, I'll do it if it will save her."

As the transfusion progressed, the boy lay in bed next to his sister and smiled, as everyone did, seeing the color return to her cheeks. Then the boy's face grew pale and his smile faded. He looked up at the doctor and asked with a trembling voice, "Will I start to die right away?"

The little fellow had misunderstood the procedure. He thought he was going to have to give his sister all of his blood in order to save her.

Five-year olds are like that. They don't always get all the facts right. But they often get the meaning right, and have something to teach the rest of us about giving up what truly counts.

Surely God smiles on all of our sacrifices when they are made out of spiritual devotion or human concern. But beyond the chocolate and the caffeine, what is there in our lives that, if we were to give it up, might make a positive difference in the life of another person? What might we do sacrificially that would benefit the world?

From the Pastor continued

Sacrifice is not a popular concept these days. Judged by the bulging size of our waistlines and the increasing square footage of our homes, we are not a culture that likes to say "no." We want the good life and all it offers. Living with less tends to make us feel deprived, resentful, even inadequate.

But, as that little boy showed, the path to the *best* life lies not in the content of our homes but in the quality of our relationships. To gain this satisfaction means that, at some point, we must say "no" to ourselves in order to say "yes" to an even greater good.

In his covenant renewal service, John Wesley put it well: *In some ways we may please Christ and please ourselves. In other ways we cannot please Christ except by denying ourselves.*

In our culture of more and more, our Lenten journey is guided by a cross. We sacrifice so that others may benefit from our resources and we may find a little more freedom from material things. We give some of our time to God to grow spiritually and to re-order our priorities. We deny ourselves in hopes of offering ourselves with the sort of love that allowed Jesus to give himself for us.

It's a lesson simple enough for a five-year old to comprehend.







PARISH HEALTH AND WELLNESS

TO BEt OR NOT TO BEt?

March is nationally designated "Problem Gambling Awareness Month" by the National Council on Problem Gambling which is near and dear to my heart as a compulsive gambler in recovery for more than thirty years. Personally, I am not opposed to legal gambling activities. However, I am a staunch and vocal advocate for those who are suffering with a compulsion to gamble and for those who are adversely affected by a gamblers behavior (family, friends, employers, et al). Given the demographics of those most prone to problem gambling (single; persons of color; unemployed; veterans; those with existing mental health issues or addiction history), it is my personal opinion that the current forms of, and ease of accessibility for, gambling is a form of systemic injustice in our state of Connecticut.

Gaming vs. Gambling

The lines between gambling and video or online "gaming" have become blurred. Current research has evidence that the types of video games available today stimulate the brain and nervous system in the same way as traditional forms of gambling. While the research is ongoing, the effects of gaming can contribute to unhealthy physiological development in adolescents and become a contributor to mental health related issues. The FTC warned in 2019 that gaming could be a gateway to gambling². The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated the popularity of online gaming and possibly the progression of this type of activity for people of all ages, genders and socioeconomic status.

Methodism

What did John Wesley think about gambling? John Wesley in his sermon, Use of Money³, mentions in passing the taking of money from another via gambling as harming your neighbor and therefore a violation of Christ's great commandment. A recount of John Wesley's itinerant preaching and pastoral care includes caring for those individuals and families in communities where the income earner (usually a man) would squander a days' or weeks' wages in the saloon on alcohol and gambling leaving the family with little sustenance.

Social Principles of The United Methodist Church 2009-2012, Section 163. IV. THE ECONOMIC COMMUNITY, Item (G) GAMBLING states,

"The Church's prophetic call is to promote standards of justice and advocacy that would make it unnecessary and undesirable to resort to commercial gambling— including public lotteries, casinos, raffles, Internet gambling, gambling with an emerging wireless technology and other games of chance—as a recreation, as an escape, or as a means of producing public revenue or funds for support of charities or government.⁴"

Is gambling biblical? Casting lots is cited multiple times throughout the Hebrews scriptures and was a common cultural practice for making decisions as well as a game of chance. The last reference to casting lots is the selection of Matthias, Judas Iscariot's replacement as one of the twelve apostles (Acts 1:26). Shortly after, with the advent of Pentecost (indwelling of the Holy Spirit), there are no further references to casting lots or other forms of "chance" in the New Testament. (Coincidence? - I think not!)

Regardless of your (or my) personal stance on gambling, as Christians and a community of faith it is my hope we can all agree to offer a word of help and hope to anyone who finds themselves "over their heads" as a consequence of irresponsible gambling. There is a plethora of information and resources (some listed below). 

- You must be 60 years or older regardless of income.
- You must register with them in advance of booking a ride. The sooner you call the better you chance for success.
- The volunteers are covered by insurance.
- No wheelchairs as only volunteer vehicles are used.
- Ride bookings accepted Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
- You will be called with a reminder 24 hours before your scheduled pickup.


