FROM THE PASTOR

I subscribe to a newsletter written by Christian author and theologian Diana Butler Bass. She writes each week on a variety of topics, but the one that gave me pause to reflect was on friendship. She quotes an article she read that stated that COVID has taught us how to be lonely. That resonated with me so deeply. COVID changed so many things and one of the things that we did well has hunker down and isolate. Unfortunately, the repercussions of that is that we have forgotten how to be with people; we socialize less, we've had fewer gatherings and we've stopped going to parties. Some people had legitimate concerns about the disease, but most people rarely go out anymore because we are just out of the habit. As Ms. Bass writes, "the problem is that COVID weakened our habit of participating in [events] leaving many millions of us much lonelier... In effect, COVID broke many of our habits, including habits of relationships and friendship."

But here's an interesting thing: we were made for friendship, with God, the creation and each other. In the Wisdom of Solomon 7:27 it is written "In every generation [wisdom] passes into holy souls and makes them friends of God, and prophets" In Bass' book <u>Freeing Jesus</u>, she writes:

"Two of Israel's greatest heroes, Abraham, the father of faith, and Moses, the liberating prophet, are specifically called friends of God. In Isaiah 41:8, God refers to Abraham as "my friend," a tradition that carries into the New Testament (James 2:23). Of Moses, Exodus says: "The Lord used to speak to Moses face to face, as one speaks to a friend" (33:11), a very rare intimacy, for such close proximity to the divine usually meant death (33:20). . .

The point is that friendship with God establishes the covenant — and that Israel is freed from bondage into a new family forged by friendship through the law given by Moses. Friendship with God is not a biblical side story; rather, it is central to the promises and faithfulness of being a called people, in which all are friends, companions, intimates, siblings, and beloved."

So, as Christians, as people still committed to meeting together as children of God, how can we be a "friendly" church? How can we re-learn what it's like to be together, practicing things like empathy and service? How can we re-establish the habits of ritual that give our lives deeper meaning? What habits that have been lost in recent years would we like to pick up once again?

This is the moment when we can, and should be, supporting one another to regain, remake and reestablish friendships. As a congregation committed to others, this is the moment when we can reach out to those who are lonely and say - "you are a friend."
