Easter Tradition

When I was a kid there were two overwhelmingly important holidays for me, Christmas and Easter. Christmas was the more important one for me as it brought TOYS, and, unlike Easter, I didn't have to wake up early, don a new Easter outfit, and go to sunrise service. Still, the candy in the Easter basket made up for it.

But oh, how things have changed, especially the tradition of new clothes and an Easter bonnet for the ladies. While some regions hang on to these traditions, the Easter bonnet has mostly gone the way of the horse and carriage. It probably reached its zenith with the release of the 1948 movie classic with Fred Astaire and Judy Garland, Easter Parade. Many of us remember the lyrics from about Easter bonnets written in 1933 by Irving Berlin, "In your Easter bonnet, with all the frills upon it, you'll be the grandest lady in the Easter Parade."

The tradition of the Easter parade began in the mid 1800s in New York City where high society would wander around Fifth Avenue in their Easter finery at the conclusion of Easter church services.

The tradition continues with an annual Easter parade down Fifth Avenue, though the Easter bonnets have evolved (or devolved as taste would dictate). Still, there is something about the tradition that is appealing.

Easter traditions are many and varied. We all know about Easter eggs, baskets, hot-cross buns, the Easter rabbit, Easter lilies, and Sunrise Services; but how did these traditions come about, and what about lesser known traditions like Good Friday Kiting, eggjarping, or Osterbrunnen?

I decided to research some

of the Easter traditions. I found that there are various debates about the origin of some of the traditions. Even the origin of the name EASTER itself has a bit of a foggy background. One interesting theory is that it was named after the pagan goddess of fertility, Easter. Supposedly, Easter found a bird dying from the cold and turned it into a rabbit so its fur would keep it warm. However, this rabbit retained the ability to lay eggs.

German immigrants brought this tradition of the egglaying hare, named Osterhase, to American in the 1700s. Of course, American ingenuity and the knack for commercialization soon had the bunny grow to giant proportions and give out, in addition to eggs, chocolate rabbits, marshmallow Peeps, and Easter baskets. The baskets themselves started out with children making nests of grass to attract the bunny.

The tradition of eggs associated with the resurrection of Christ began in the first century when Christians translated the original pagan beliefs into a new Christian tradition. The analogy is, like Christ when he was buried and came to life again, an egg lies dormant and then "awakes".

Also, during medieval times, eggs were prohibited by the Catholic Church from being eaten during Lent. Eating eggs marked the end of Lent.

Coloring eggs has several possible origins. One is that Osterhase (remember him) was so grateful to Eostre that he decorated some of his eggs and gave them as a gift. Another is that when Mary attended Christ's crucifixion, some of Christ's blood fell on some eggs she happened to have with her, turning them red.

As for dressing up for Easter with new clothes, this tradition goes back to at least AD 300 when the Christian Emperor Constantine decreed that all of his men were to wear their newest and nicest clothes on Easter and to eliminate clothing that had been worn during Lent. Also, there was a superstition that failing to wear your newest and best on Easter would result in gettin an "anointment" from a bird. While I don't know the veracity of this superstition as it applies to Easter, I do know that one Christmas Eve service we attended years ago, just as were stepping into the sanctuary, a bird left a decal on the shoulder of my wife Carol's not-sonew coat.

Easter lilies as decorations on Easter Sunday derive both from the color white signifying the purity of Christ, their growth from dormant bulbs to flowers symbolizing



rebirth, and the trumpet shape announcing that christ has risen.

Sunrise services recreating the time of Christ's resurrection began in Germany in 1732 and spread to America in 1773, first being held in Winston-Salem North Carolina.

The first written record of Hot-Cross Buns was from an issue of *Poor Robin's Almanac* in the 1730s that says, "Good Friday comes this month, the old woman runs, With one or two a Penny, hot cross buns".

As for the lesser-known traditions of Good Friday Kiting, egg-jarping, and Osterbrunnen, I will leave that up to the reader to discover the origins themselves.

Lutheran Disaster Response Aids Türkiye & Syria

On Feb. 6 two powerful earthquakes hit Türkiye and significantly impacted neighboring Syria. The first was a magnitude 7.8 earthquake in south central Türkiye, followed hours later by a magnitude 7.5 quake in the southeastern part of the country. The two quakes

as well as numerous aftershocks devastated Türkiye and Syria, killing thousands, collapsing buildings and

damaging infrastructure.

The epicenter of one earthquake was near Turkish provinces that host hundreds of thousands of Syrian refugees, which only exacerbated the refugee crisis in the region.

Greenery is placed in the interim as it is symbolic of the growth of Christian Faith. Many churches in opting not to have flowers on the altar during the Lenten season do so as a reminder that Lent is a season of austerity and simple reflection. Likewise, the absence of flowers during Lent helps to amplify the resurrection message of the Easter flowers when they arrive.

Anyone wanting to donate flowers during the Lenten season is encouraged to add their name to the flower book(we will add a special page for Easter donations). Please include your name and commemoration so that it can be listed in the Easter bulletin.



From Our History Books:

Zion's Diamond Jubilee Featured Year-Long Celebration

(This is the eighth in a series recounting the life of Zion's Lutheran, which has looked at _____ church history through our diamond jubilee in 1963.)



In May 1961 the Rev. Albert Shandrick became pastor at Zion's, replacing Pastor Kugler, who left in September 1960. For the next 24 years, Pastor Shandrick served the congregation until his untimely death from cancer in March 1985. His almost quarter century of service to Zion's, is the longest pastorate in Zion's history.

One of the high points of his tenure was celebration of Zion's 75th anniversary in 1963. Five special events were part of the year-long celebration. In March, Mrs. Shandrick wrote and narrated a pageant about Zion's women's organizations, specifically Frauen Verein. The pageant also included a traditional German dinner. In July, the church's annual picnic was patterned after Zion's first picnic in July 1888. In September, another pageant focused on Zion's overall history. A Reformation rally was next as part of October activities.

The 75th year celebration culminated in November with a Diamond Jubilee Tea with Rocky Mountain Synod president Leeland Soker serving as the guest of honor.

Now we prepare for our 135th Anniversary Celebration, so watch the bulletins, E-formation, newsletter and website for more information.
