Dear faithful people of Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church:

On the First Sunday in Advent, December 2, 1973, The First Sunday in Advent,

Lutherans, Roman Catholics, Episcopalians, Moravians, Presbyterians, Reformed, United Church of Christ and United Methodists in the United States all began using a common three-year Lectionary. That means that the First Sunday in Advent this year (November 27, 2022) is the beginning of the fiftieth year of our use of that lectionary.

Why is this important to note?

A quick look at the list of the communions that adopted that lectionary provides the first and most important answer. With the exception of Roman Catholics, all the other church bodies who use the (now) Revised Common Lectionary are in full communion with our congregations in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. That alone is worthy of note.

But even further, the wide use of this lectionary was the first step in the liturgical renewal that so defines worship at Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church today. The next big 50-year anniversary will be on the First Sunday in Advent 2078 (November 27 that year too!) when the green Lutheran Book of Worship came into general use. So, this Advent inaugurates a five-year celebration of virtually everything that God has used to unite more fully Christ's Church and to reconnect our worship, not only with each other, but with those who have gone before us. You see, the Lutheran Book of Worship and our current Evangelical Lutheran Worship materials are all based on the liturgy from the time "the church was one," in the Fourth Century of the Common Era. The point of this paragraph deserves a Banner article all its own!

Some might be asking, what is a lectionary?

A lectionary is a list of the scriptural readings – a first reading usually (but not always) from the Hebrew Scriptures, a psalm, a reading from the New Testament and from one of the four Gospels.

Prior to 1973, each of the communions listed above had their own lectionaries and those lectionaries were not for three, but for one year. These readings 'bounced around' from one Gospel to another. These readings also divided the psalm into several separate parts sung as Introits (before the kyrie) and Graduals (between the first and second readings). Often the denominational choice of Sunday and holy day readings fortified each denomination's ongoing liturgical critique of all the other denominations.

But beginning in 1973, the church bodies above began to appreciate the work of over a century of biblical scholarship and recognize that each Gospel had a unique way to express God's activity in Jesus Christ, and that that uniqueness ought to be emphasized. And so this year we are reading Matthew's Gospel nearly every Sunday (series A); next year we will read Mark, and a good deal of John, (Series B) and the following year Luke (series C). Furthermore, because the first reading from the Hebrew Scriptures and the psalm are chosen to go with the Gospel, we also hear more of those scriptures than we did before. In a time when biblical literacy is waning, this is an important development to celebrate.

Many of us, of course, have only known worship to be shaped in this way; few remember the previous lectionary. Please take my word for it, what we do now is significantly better, but if you'd like to see how things were in the past, just pick up one of our old hymnbooks and see.

Because we read and hear scripture together, the vast majority of Christians have drawn closer together and have come to appreciate, not only the different 'takes' on Jesus' life in the four Gospels, but the different 'takes' on Christian living among us. Our eyes have been opened a bit wider. We see, increasingly, how Christ's Church can be one.

Join me in celebrating this 50th year of that commonality, rooted in Scripture. And listen carefully this year, as through the work of Matthew the Evangelist we are treated to a unique understanding of who Jesus is and how God works for and with us.

CELEBRATING AND GIVING THANKS FOR DEACON AND CANTOR RICK ERICKSON

When Rick Erickson started piano lessons at age 10 he told his teacher that he wanted to learn to play the organ, and he wanted her to prepare him. Apparently, she did—and very well at that. His mother and paternal grandmother were church organists, and his family included many other musicians as well as pastors. He knew early on that he wanted to follow their paths.


And, in fact, Rick's whole career has been spent as a church organist. While teaching at Eastman School of Music, he was organist at Lutheran Church of Incarnate Word in Rochester, New York, for 14 years; then he spent 20 years at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Manhattan; and for the last eight and a half years he's been at Christ the King Church.

So how did a longtime New Yorker make it down to the Texas Gulf Coast? Rick says that as he approached 60, he was looking for a change in his life, a new adventure. He had become familiar with CTK and the Bach Society through several channels. He'd been a guest conductor for the Bach Society in 2006. He'd continued a friendship and a working relationship with our former pastor, Robert Moore, through activities both were engaged in at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, Germany, as well as their involvement in Bach conferences in New York. He'd also met our former music director, Albert LeDoux, at a New York conference and had spent time with him creating plans for their respective church music programs. Our congregation originally called Rick as a Deacon in the ELCA to serve as choir director at the same time he was asked to serve as Director of the Bach Society Houston. Over the years his position at CTK grew and expanded to that of Church Cantor.

Rick will resign his position as Cantor on December 4, though he will remain a member of the congregation as well as Director of the Bach Society. When asked about his most memorable moments during his tenure here, Rick immediately related the story of saving church music before Hurricane Harvey hit. As someone unfamiliar with potential ravages of a hurricane, but keenly aware of damages that might be caused by a flooded basement, Rick was anxious about the security of the choir room. Long time Houston church members, who were familiar with hurricanes but not so much with basement liabilities, assured him that the basement would be safe and dry, no windows to crash from falling branches that would in turn allow wind and rain damage. Fortunately, Rick persevered and was able to convince others that precautions needed to be taken to protect the sheet music and the harpsichord that are kept in the basement. (It was too late to arrange to move the piano, but it was on steel risers and thus not harmed by rising water.) The harpsichord was small enough to load on the elevator. And 30-40 members showed up to form the equivalent of a bucket brigade, transferring reams of sheet music to the third floor, preserving years of church music with a value of countless thousands of dollars. Rick said he was moved by the quick response of helpers, their efficient enthusiasm, and their sense of common purpose. It was, for him, a touching demonstration of the community we share.

Rick also reflected on the sense of community he saw at work during the pandemic when the congregation and the staff struggled to stay close while keeping a safe physical distance. He noted that following scientific, medical guidelines were paramount as the staff made responsible decisions regarding worship. Singing posed some particularly sticky issues. Zoom singing exercises and the use of technology to edit motets sung by multiple voices helped the choir to stay together. When the choir finally began to sing outdoors for online services, masked and well-spaced, he said the hope and determination he could sense among them was tangible. This was another of those memories he will cherish.

As for future plans, in addition to continuing as adjunct professor at Rice, Rick hopes to expand the reach of the Bach Society. The recent performance of Bach on Four Keyboards (turned out to be five) was a definite twist on the typical performance and was great success with all ages. Appearing in new venues—the Christmas oratorio will be performed



in the new Brockman Hall for Opera at Rice and two concerts will be held at the Museum of Fine Arts in the spring—offer a means of reaching larger audiences. He also has plans for several residencies, including one in New York City and one in Berlin where he will be the organist for a modern dance troupe performing to Bach's Art of the Fugue. In addition, he's looking forward to

spending time writing, especially about improvisation in liturgical settings, and becoming part of his Galveston community through volunteer work and participation in the historical society. And, very importantly, he plans to spend an entire two months at his family's summer home in northern Wisconsin with his sisters; three nieces, who are collectively the undisputed apple of his eye; and the various friends and relatives who always drop in. As a member of the congregation Rick, like all of us, has expectations and concerns for the challenges ahead. He shared a personal principle that he thought was pertinent to decisions CTK makes going forward: Don't change who you are to make a friend. He acknowledged we will walk the sometimes difficult path of grounding young people and new members in tradition while at the same time listening to what they are asking for and being open to new ideas. As a musician he sees music, and particularly hymn singing, which he noted our congregation does very well, as a great building block for community.

As this interview concluded Rick wanted to add a word about how he felt his time at CTK had blessed his life. He particularly felt fortunate for two gifts: the opportunity to rediscover his love of the piano and the chance to spend time with the church choir, which he described as the happiest hour and half of his week.

Rick Erickson has given many gifts and blessings to CTK. We wish him well in all his new ventures.

Freewheels provides bikes to Ukrainian refugees

Fleeing their home in Kyiv after the Russian invasion, Tetiana Nykyforuk, Yan Pomerantsev and their daughter arrived in Houston about four months ago after they were admitted to the United States through the Biden administration's Uniting for Ukraine program. As they settled into an apartment chosen for its proximity to West University Elementary School, Tetiana (who goes by Tanya) searched for bikes that would enable them to accompany their daughter to school and explore the city. Tanya reached out to Freewheels after learning about the bike program for refugees—established at CTK in 2015—from a Facebook friend. On Nov. 12, they took a Metro bus to pick up used bikes that had been cleaned and repaired by Freewheels volunteers. After final adjustments by Freewheels volunteer and CTK member David West, they pedaled off to explore.

Although they are meeting people in Houston and learning more about the city, Yan said they are eager to receive their work authorizations. "It's strange not to work," he said. Freewheels bikes enable refugees to get to work and school, support their families and discover the many opportunities available in Houston.

Although Tanya and Yan are the first Ukrainian refugees to receive bikes from Freewheels, the community bike program provided bikes to 275 refugees in the first 10 months of 2022, almost all people who fled the Taliban takeover in Afghanistan. Freewheels also provided bikes to 42 veterans emerging from homelessness, 44 fifth and sixth graders who attend Klentzman Intermediate School in Alief ISD and 22 other people referred by their case managers at other nonprofits and social service agencies. Freewheels has already doubled its 2021 distributions.

Freewheels Houston's ability to continue to grow in its mission and provide more people with bikes will depend on our ability to attract more volunteers who share our commitment and enjoy participating in our workdays, bike donations and continued financial support from CTK members and others that help pay for tubes, tires and other bike parts and ensure that we can continue to work in our well-equipped shop in the Gulfton area.

Tanya and Yan said they plan to tell other Ukrainians in Houston about Freewheels. Our volunteers are working on bikes every weekend to fulfill requests received every week.

Its intentional focus on African-descent pedagogies and developing African-descent leaders and communities makes the LTCA an exciting approach to preparing for ministry, especially in this evolving church. Justice Advocacy Opportunity **Smorgasbord**

There are a number of active justice advocacy requests from a variety of organizations. Speak up for justice today!

Creation Care – As part of the effort to pass the Inflation Reduction Act, legislators announced there was a side deal negotiated that would gut bedrock environmental protections, put many frontline communities in harm's way, endanger public health, and fast-track approvals for polluting projects. Stand with communities impacted by pollution and the climate crisis. Tell your legislators to oppose this deal: https://interfaithpowerandlight. salsalabs.org/stopthedealnovdec/index.html.

Immigration – Much work remains to ensure a safe, humane, and orderly asylum process that protects the dignity of asylum seekers & their legal rights. Improvements, such as increasing staff/facilities at the border & access to legal services and ending the Remain in Mexico policy & use of private prisons for detention, are needed. Ask the Administration to restore & rebuild our asylum system at this link: https://lutheranimmigrationrefugeeservice. quorum.us/campaign/42321/.

Religious Freedom – The San Carlos Apache Tribe is struggling to save their sacred land, Oak Flat. Currently protected within Tonto National Forest, this oasis is threatened with destruction. Only Congress can save Oak Flat, and the bipartisan Save Oak Flat Act can protect this sacred land. Join with other Christians to ask your members of Congress to protect sacred Indigenous land by passing the Save Oak Flat Act: https://secure.everyaction.com/ jU0pEqdwOUa59JT35OvJMQ2.

Human Rights – There is at least one death of, or major injury to, a Palestinian child each month. Join other Lutherans in urging Congress to pass legislation prohibiting use of U.S. military aid for detention, interrogation, abuse, or ill treatment of Palestinian children: https://support.elca.org/site/Advocacy?cmd=display&p age=UserAction&id=1560.

Democracy – The Electoral Count Reform and Presidential Transition Improvement Act provides clarifications to the processes of counting electoral votes, electing a president and facilitating the orderly transition of power. Presently, the 135-year-old Electoral Count Act of 1887 outlines procedures for casting and counting Electoral College votes. Experts across the political spectrum have urged that this act be updated. With nearly equal support from both sides of the aisle, it is clear that this is imperative for our country ahead of the next presidential election. Churchwide Assembly Justice Look-Back: Human Sexuality

At churchwide assembly in August, a memorial was passed calling for revision to the social statement *Human Sexuality*, originally issued in 2009. The revisions to the social statement's wording would reflect current church understanding, church policy, civil law, and public acceptance of marriage of same-gender and gender nonconforming couples. Some specific suggestions include changes to descriptions of marriage and family. The revised social statement could be considered as early as the 2025 churchwide assembly. Justice Advocacy Success Stories!!

As part of negotiations to pass the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), a side deal was made to place new limits on environmental review & curtail public input on major projects. This permitting side deal would have weakened bedrock environmental law, thereby putting frontline communities in harm's way & endangering public health. We opposed inclusion of this deal in the IRA at our September Justice Advocacy Event. The language was removed from the bill that was ultimately passed.

Also at the September Justice Advocacy Event, we petitioned the federal government to increase funding for disaster relief and prevention. At that time, there was no specific bill before Congress on this topic. But, by our October Justice Advocacy Event, the Reforming Disaster Recovery Act had been introduced and we advocated in support of this bill.

Weekly justice advocacy opportunities are presented to the congregation on CTK's FB, as well as via a sign with a QR code in the narthex each weekend. One week in June, July, and August, our weekly justice opportunity featured advocacy for passage of the Global Malnutrition Prevention Act. It was passed and signed into law on October 19. Persistence pays off!



Sustainable Celebrations

The natural world is an uninvited, often unrecognized and certainly underappreciated guest at all our celebrations. Celebrations are a time of joy. How do we make them joyful for all creation, people and planet? First, treat nature as your guest. Consider nature's preferences, then nature's needs, and finally, how to avoid harm to the natural world. How might you do this in planning a celebration? Start by adding something to the event that is intended to directly benefit the natural world. Next, consider how the celebration uses natural resources and creates waste/pollution, or other harms to nature (such as noise, nighttime light, etc...). Once you've understood the negative impacts to nature from your celebration plans, work to eliminate them as a priority. For those that cannot be eliminated, reduce the level of harm, and offset it with additional benefits to nature. And, finally, if offsets are not possible, then minimize the harm to the fullest extent possible. Planning your celebration this way will make it a time of joy for all the earth!


