Romans 8

Life in the Spirit

8 There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. 2 For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death. 3 For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do. By sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, 4 in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. 5 For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit.6 For to set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. 7 For the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot. 8 Those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

9 You, however, are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if in fact the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. **10** But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. **11** If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit who dwells in you.

Heirs with Christ

12 So then, brothers, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh. 13 For if you live according to the flesh you will die, but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. 14 For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. 15 For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, "Abba! Father!" 16 The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, 17 and if children, then heirs—heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ, provided we suffer with him in order that we may also be glorified with him.

Future Glory

18 For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. 19 For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. 20 For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope 21 that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to corruption and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. 22 For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. 23 And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the

redemption of our bodies. **24** For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? **25** But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

26 Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words. 27 And he who searches hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. 28 And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose. 29 For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn among many brothers. 30 And those whom he predestined he also called, and those whom he called he also justified, and those whom he justified he also glorified.

God's Everlasting Love

31 What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be gagainst us? 32 He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? 33 Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. 34 Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. 35 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? 36 As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all the day long; we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered."

37 No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. **38** For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, **39** nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Romans 8 is one of the most famous chapters in the Bible. There are so many verses worth memorizing and soaking in. There is much to say for a short devo, but for today I'd like to focus primarily on verses 12-17 b/c I think it captures a couple of the themes of the whole chapter.

The first theme from the chapter is how the Spirit helps us to oppose the desires of the flesh. Verse 13 says, "For if you live according to the flesh you will die, but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live." We see the direct opposition of the ways of the flesh and the Spirit. The ways of the flesh is basically the way of sin - when people live as if God doesn't exist and they just live to make themselves happy. The first eleven verses are also all about this opposition. Paul writes that we are no longer slaves to the flesh and the death that the flesh brings, but we have been set free by Jesus, who took on our likeness by taking on flesh himself, and he condemned sin in the flesh. And in light of what Jesus has done, verse 13 says that by the Spirit we can also put to death the ways of the flesh, and instead

experience life. Thinking about Paul's life, I'm sure his flesh did not want to suffer at all or experience the persecutions that he endured; however, he was so filled w/ the Spirit, that he knew this was actually the way of life since it was all for Jesus. Likewise, the Spirit helps us to oppose our flesh and to live for Jesus.

The other theme that I wanted to highlight today is how the Spirit reminds us that we are children of God. This is of course related to the Spirit helping us to oppose the desires of the flesh. The Spirit reminding us that we are children of God is big part of how He helps us to oppose our fleshly desires. Verses 14 and 15 read, "For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. **15** For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, "Abba! Father!" Looking again at Paul's life, from a worldly or fleshly perspective, he had lots of reasons to fear since there were powerful people who opposed him, along w/ the fierce spiritual battle he constantly faced. Yet Paul knew his position as a child of God. No matter what he did before or the dangers that lied ahead, Paul had no fear b/c he was so secure in knowing he has a heavenly father who is completely in control. He can say in the last few verses of this chapter, "we are more than conquerors through him who loved us" and nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. This Spirit of adoption helps us to cry "Abba! Father!" It helps us to know we have a heavenly father who is totally in control.

The good news is that as much as Paul experienced the power of Spirit, to fight his flesh and to remember his place as a son of God, we likewise can experience the power of the Spirit. Every person who has put their faith in Jesus has received the Holy Spirit, this Spirit of adoption. If you're listening to this devotional, you likely know this fact, that the Holy Spirit is dwelling in us. The problem is that we sometimes do not listen to what the Spirit is saying or obey how he is leading. Today, let's intentionally pause and listen and obey, especially in any areas where we find it tough to do that. For every struggle that we face, we simply have to ask for the Spirit's help. Verse 17 says that we are "heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ, provided we suffer with him in order that we may also be glorified with him." It's a given that there will be suffering in our faith. After all, we are still in the flesh and our fleshly, worldly desires are counter to the Spirit. Even if we never experience physical persecution like many brothers and sisters do around the world, we will encounter various suffering and trials when we strive to follow Jesus. Not to mention that there is an enemy who opposes us and lies and tempts us to give into the ways of the flesh. Once again though, we have the Spirit to lead us through it all. Let's rely on the Spirit to help us. Let's pray.
