
# Living Waters April 2023

# **INTERIM PRIEST IN CHARGE MESSAGE**

This issue of *Living Waters* appears on Palm Sunday, the start of Holy Week. As we begin Holy Week, I invite you to reflect upon a question: What does it feel like to have less than a week to live?

That's the situation in which Jesus finds himself when he

makes his triumphal entry into Jerusalem.

The crowds don't know what's coming. The disciples have been given hints and even outright declarations from Jesus that the Son of Man will be betrayed into the hands of sinners and killed, but like all of us who know our loved ones will die someday, we shy away from actually imagining what it

will be like or admitting that it could happen at any moment. To the disciples and the crowds, this is a moment of incredible potential and excitement. They have seen the miracles Jesus is capable of, who knows what that power might do if they could convince him to turn it against Rome? And his making such a bold entry into the heart of the Romans' stolen power surely bodes well for that project.

What a lonely moment this must be for Jesus, to be surrounded by screaming fans but burdened by the knowledge of how brief their acclaim will be. This is the point of no return for Jesus. By entering Jerusalem on a colt with the crowds laying down their cloaks before him and shouting "Hosanna to the Son of David!" he has triggered one prophetic tripwire too many. The Roman rulers and the Jewish religious authorities can no longer pretend that he is insignificant, that he is a fad, that he is not dangerous. Jesus is deliberately provoking the crisis that will end with him nailed to a cross.

And our immersion in the scriptures for today, moving from Jesus triumphal entry into Jerusalem to the Passion, deliberately provokes a crisis within ourselves. The crowd abruptly transitions in less than a week from adulation and joyful allegiance to Jesus to rage-filled demands for him to be crucified. The disciples move from proudly marching at his side through the streets of Jerusalem to slinking away in stomach-clenching fear, insisting they don't know who he is. While taking our place among the crowds on Good Friday shouting for Jesus to be crucified feels awkward and painful, the disciples' experience of simply not affirming that we know him, of

finding that our fear prevents us from being present with another's pain, feels all too familiar.

Holy Week, is our opportunity to immerse ourselves in this move from the false joy of Palm Sunday, a joy that is centered around expectations of power and reward, through the

pain of finding that our faith is often so weak when Jesus needs us the most, finally to the deep and profound joy of the day of Resurrection, the day of forgiveness and new life. We have the opportunity to walk with Jesus in real time as the hourglass runs out, as he struggles with the knowledge that he has less than a week to live.

And it is a struggle. In the gospel for Monday in Holy Week, Jesus has his last meal at the home of his dear friends Mary, Martha and Lazarus. Jesus and Lazarus never got to say goodbye to each other when Lazarus was dying. Jesus heard that he was sick, but stayed away. They're back in the same situation again. One of them is about to die, but this time Jesus doesn't stay away. Maybe he wanted to do more than say goodbye. Maybe Jesus needed to see Lazarus alive, talking and eating and laughing. Maybe his human side needed to reaffirm the evidence of his own eyes that someone can die and come back to life.

At their dinner together, Mary anoints his feet with costly ointment, and Judas berates her for not using her money to help the poor. Jesus' defense of her reveals how heavily his approaching death is on his mind. "Leave her alone. She bought [the ointment] so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

On Tuesday of Holy Week, Jesus' struggle with his approaching death continues. John's gospel tells us that Jesus says, "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say — 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour." We can feel the conflict in Jesus' soul, his divine conviction of what he has to do, warring with his human fear.

The gospel for Wednesday in Holy Week takes the spiritual crisis to the next level. For the first time, Jesus addresses not just death but betrayal. The gospel tells us, "At supper with

his friends, Jesus was troubled in spirit, and declared, 'Very truly, I tell you, one of you will betray me." The reason betrayal hurts so much is because it has to come from someone you know and love. A stranger cannot betray you. Someone who hates you and always has, cannot betray you. And the only thing worse than being betrayed is being the betrayer ourselves, finding out that we are not the people we thought we were.

By Friday morning we have lost complete control of the situation. Having slid into the role of betrayer in a haze of confusion and fear, we suddenly find ourselves stumbling along with the crowds toward Golgotha hoping we are not recognized by anyone as one of Jesus' followers. There is a numb sense of disbelief as we watch him being nailed to the cross. As eve-

ry minute passes, we are certain that this is the moment Jesus will unleash the power within him, the power we have seen again and again heal people from illnesses, allow him to walk on water, feed 5,000 with a few loaves and fish. Each second we're sure now, now is when he will stop this cruel drama, come down from the cross and save himself.

But nothing happens. Jesus simply lets his life bleed away, one agonizing moment at a time, growing weaker and weaker until he seems to prove that he's given up on himself and on God the Father. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" he cries. This is the moment that we think the other disciples who hid away during the crucifixion absolutely had the right idea. Staring up at him on the cross, we realize that Jesus is actually going to die right in front of us. He cries out, takes his last breath, and the unthinkable moment comes to pass.

The gospel says, "At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom." At that moment our souls are torn in two. At the moment the living love between God the Father and the incarnate Jesus Christ is torn in two. At that moment the disciples' hope for the defeat of Rome and the rule of Jesus on earth is torn in two.

This is the terrible risk that we take, by committing to walk

with Jesus through Holy Week, that our hearts will be torn in two by this experience.

But Jesus' life and our emotional equilibrium are not the only things destroyed on Good Friday. The barrier between God and humanity is torn in two. The record of our sin is torn in two. The reign of death is torn in two. And finally the shroud of our grief and fear is torn in two

by the joy of the resurrection. If we are willing not to skip from Palm Sunday to Easter Day, not to avoid the darkness that stains these upcoming days, but to enter into it with Jesus and stand in solidarity with him, the healing that we experience with his resurrection is twice as deep.

Today we make a choice. We can choose to be present with Jesus as his disciples throughout this week, confronting the ways in which we betray him, loving him as we see him struggle for the courage to endure his death, or we can hide away, unwilling to let our composure be torn in two with the temple curtain.

The only tools we need are the scriptures and open hearts to make this journey with Jesus.

Like Jesus, our fear, our sin, our grief and our illusions about ourselves have less than a week to live. Let's spend that week with Jesus.

# **Easter Story Cookies**

### What Are Easter Story Cookies?

Making Easter Story cookies is a wonderful way to share the Easter story. Each step and ingredient of in the recipe represents a part of the story and the final product. The cookie, is a representation of the empty tomb that was found on Easter morning and the meringues cook so that the middle of the cookie is hallow.

### To be made the evening before Easter.

You need:

1 cup whole pecans1 tsp. vinegar3 egg whitespinch of salt1 cup sugarzipper baggie

wooden spoon tape

Bible

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F.



- \*Place pecans in zipper baggie and let the children beat them with the wooden spoon to break into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested He was beaten by Roman soldiers. Read John 19:1-3.
- \*Let the children smell the vinegar. Put 1 tsp. vinegar into mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross he was given vinegar to drink. Read John 19:28-30.
- \*Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life. Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life. Read John 10:10-11.
- \*Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand.
- \*Let them taste it and brush the rest into the bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers, and the bitterness of our own sin. Read Luke 23:27.
- \*So far the ingredients are not very appetizing.
- \*Add 1 cup sugar. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. Read Psalm 34:8 and John 3:16.
- \*Beat with a mixer on high speed for 12 to 15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed. Explain that the colour white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. Read Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3.
- \*Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto wax paper covered cookie sheet. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid.

  Read Matthew 27:57-60.
- \*Put the cookie sheet in the oven, close the door and turn the oven OFF.
- \*Give each child a piece of tape and seal oven door. Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed. Read Matthew 27:65-66.
- \*GO TO BED! Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight. Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed. Read John 16:20 and 22.
- \* On Easter morning, open the oven and give everyone a cookie. Notice the cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow! On the first Easter Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty. Read Matthew 28:1-9.

## SPRING CLEANING

We used to live in a townhouse, one of those inventions designed to minimize housekeeping chores, mortgage payments and a tendency to accumulate more things than one needs to cross the Sahara in summer. We moved there because I liked the idea of no yard work, and we would be unburdened by conversations of "It's-Saturday-so-mow-the-lawn." I hate housework (it hates me too!), and we wanted a less complex life.

Smaller places do have a certain appeal...especially during the "It's Spring and that means let's-get-organized-around -here-and-throw-out-all-YOUR-stuff" mood that tends to permeate the months of March and April.

When you only have one closet, cleaning it takes a minimum of time. Opening the door starts the process, and if you are clever, you will stand with an open trash bag as you pry open the door. Always do this at 2:00 a.m. when the other nearby occupants in your townhome are asleep, or during those few quiet moments of solitude you get after announcing that Dairy Queen is having a twenty-minute-only-special, and you have (thoughtfully) placed the keys in the car.

Designed by some psychologist in an effort to help patients rid their psyches of old memories, useless information and general "clutter," spring cleaning has become an American phrase most often associated with grief. It is a painful process, this sifting and sorting of all the things that tell us (and the rest of the world) who we are or were.

There are as many ways to spring clean as there are homes and hearts and minds and spirits that need "adjusting" (a real psychological term thrown in just to remind you that I am a professional too!)

How many times have you been told "It's time to move on," or, "It's time to get back to normal," or, "You mean you haven't gotten rid of that yet?" (That can refer to a multitude of things such as his favorite pipe, her bathrobe that the dog attacked during one his "spells," or an odd assortment of baseball cards, used gum wrappers and dirty socks that were secreted under the bed, left behind for you to find and cry over.

How come everybody else knows when it is time for me to spring clean! How come everybody else knows when it is time for me to open that closet and sort through all those memories, trying to decide which ones to keep and which ones to pass on to the Salvation Army? How come everybody else knows when it is time for me to get back to living?

I am spring cleaning. I am sifting through the "stuff" that made up my loved one's life and I am learning to let go of a few things...slowly.

When we moved to a townhouse, we thought life wouldn't be so complicated. I wouldn't have to go out into

the yard and remember how wonderful it was to enjoy the first spring flowers...with him. I don't want to cut the grass, because we loved playing in it, tickling our bare toes and laughing our way through spring into summer. We moved to a townhouse so we couldn't keep everything forever. It doesn't stay around anyway, so why have storage space? Why have cupboards that no longer need to hold cereal that turns the milk blue, or closets that no longer need to hold baseball shoes, bats and crumpled homework pages? Why have room for memories?

WHY? Because, I can't live without them! Spring is a time for spring cleaning, for sifting and sorting and re-reading and remembering. Spring is a time for things to go and things to stay. We just have to decide which ones do what. Spring is a time for renewal, when the earth begins to defrost after a harsh and bitter winter. It doesn't matter when your loved one died; it does matter when you begin to let spring back into your life. It does matter when you open that closet and let the memories come out, along with the hurts and the hopes that you buried one day not so very long ago.

You never know what you are going to find when you start spring cleaning. You might discover treasures you had long forgotten, or the tax papers you needed, or the Easter egg no one found last year. You might find a few bits of joy lurking under the bed (we found dust bunnies). What fun to remember how that stuff got there or who might have been hiding under the bed when you were looking for volunteers for trash patrol!

Spring cleaning is a tradition that follows the footprints across your freshly waxed floor. I wish there were still footprints to clean up, but since there aren't, I'll just have to spend a few extra moments with this box of treasures I found. No time like the present to inspect the "stuff" in search of few "bits of joy."

When we lived in a townhouse, we thought that maybe, in a few years, we could stretch out into something a bit larger (and have a maid, too!). Maybe we would just start a little patch of grass out front, plant a seed or two in a clay pot on the patio, and live with what we have. Eventually, my house got larger, and my heart has grown, too!

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# **MARK THE EVANGELIST**

Feast Day: April 25


Canonized: Pre-Congregation

Mark was an Evangelist—one of the four men who wrote the Gospels found in the New Testament. Mark's Gospel was written first, and it is the shortest description of Jesus' life, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension. Mark's writings helped both Matthew and Luke to write their Gospels.

Mark was not one of the original Apostles, and he probably never knew Jesus. Instead, we believe that he was a member of the first Christian community. In his writings, St. Peter refers to Mark as his "son." Peter may have used this term to show his love for Mark, or he may have used it because he was the one who baptized Mark. It is believed that Peter was the primary source for Mark's Gospel.

Mark traveled with Sts. Paul and Barnabas to spread the Good News about Jesus. During his imprisonment in Rome,

Paul mentions Mark's concern for him and writes about how helpful Mark is in the ministry of helping others to believe in Jesus (Colossians. 4:10; 2 Timothy 4:11).




Mark's Gospel is a lasting treasure for all believers. He wrote his Gospel to help people know that Jesus was the Son of God who suffered and died to save us from sin and death. When we read Mark's Gospel, we learn that to be a follower of Jesus, we, too, must be willing to make sacrifices, to "take up our cross and follow" (Mark 8:34) Jesus as he asks us to do.

The symbol for Mark is a lion with wings. That is because his Gospel begins with the story of John the Baptist, a "voice crying in the wilderness" (Mark 1:3), like the roaring of a lion. Lions are called the kings of the jungle. Mark's Gospel tells us about Jesus' royalty as God's Son, a kingship we share through our Baptism.

We celebrate Saint Mark's feast day on April 25. His life and Gospel remind us to share the Good News about Jesus with others.

# Do Not Be Afraid An Easter Reflection

At both ends of the Resurrection story as Matthew presents it for Easter Day, the words "Do not be afraid," are said. First, by the angel who meets Mary Magdalene and Mary at the tomb, and then by Jesus himself to the same women when he sends them off to tell the others that he has risen. The words are at the same time soothing and encouraging. At the tomb do not be afraid soothes people seeing something terrifying and unexpected. And then, at the sending-forth, do not be afraid to speak the truth, to go out into a hostile city.



In fact, the words "do not be afraid," or "do not fear" appear 365 times in the Bible, from Genesis through Revelations. Why do we need to hear this so often? Over the many times these encouraging words are written and read to us, the two most common reasons are the ones that appear in Matthew's Gospel on Easter Morning.

In the course of following Jesus, you will see many unexpected things. Lives transformed by prayer; communities changed by service; members reconciled by love. We will share our gifts with the church and see them translated into ministry that will impact our neighbors, heal the sick, lift up the needy, be companions to the lonely.

As we walk with Jesus we will encounter hostility where speaking truth will go against our culture. We will discover times in which we will be the only voice advocating, seeking justice, upholding our values.

And in these moments, we hear Jesus whisper behind us, "Do not be afraid." We who dare to believe that life can overcome death, and that light can outshine darkness, bring our Easter truth and joy into a world that needs to hear "be not afraid."

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# OUR GIFTS ARE EXPRESSIONS OF GRATITUDE TOWARD GOD THE CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP OF TIME Time...don't let it slip away!

No gift is greater than time, and yet, nothing is so easy to waste. Contrary to our cultural norms, good stewardship of time doesn't mean being busy all the time. Time spent in prayer, nurturing relationships with our family and friends or just enjoying the beauty of the world around us is time well spent. In fact, taking "time out" to nourish ourselves spiritually can be the best thing we can do to deepen our relationship with God.

\*\*\*Questions to Ponder\*\*\*

Take some time to reflect on these questions and perhaps take them to prayer, asking for God's guidance, with gratitude for this marvelous gift.

- 1. How do I "kill time"?
- 2. When have I most appreciated time?
- 3. What do I think God wants me to do with my time?
- 4. What obstacles keep me from being a good steward of my time?

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God has gifted each of us with certain amount of time and each day with a new supply of time. When the Church asks us to return a portion of our time to the Lord it means that we must be accountable for how we responsibly use and divide it each day for work, for rest, and for love.

Stewardship of Time IS quality time with GOD, With others and Ourselves.

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The following are some examples of how a good steward can accomplish this goal: In our family: We can spend non-distracted time with one member of the family each day, create time for prayers as a family, and give time to those taking care of a family member who is aging or disable for example.

Individually: Having personal prayer time; listening to religious music, reading religious articles and books; reading and studying the Bible; resting; and living healthy.

In our parish: Time by regular attendance at Sunday Mass and weekly time to grow in faith is essential for Christian living. Examples of time well invested are attendance to daily Mass; participation in Eucharistic Adoration; recitation of the Rosary and participation in parish ministries.

Through a life lived in God-centered Stewardship and prayer we may hope to pay attention to God's word: "USE YOUR TIME WELL" (Sirach 4:20)

# **Missional Minute**

I've been reading a book called Failure by Emma Ineson. You can find it here: Failure Book

It is the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book for this year and was recommended to me by a dear friend.

At first I looked at the title and thought, "Well, that's depressing." But I was curious enough to pick it up and start reading and I am so glad I did.

How often do we think about mistakes, sin and just generally messing stuff up? If you are like me, the answer is Often. Many times we beat ourselves up for making a mistake or messing up. We feel we've let others down or worse, let God down. It's pretty easy to feel like we are not enough. Not educated enough, not clever enough, not patient enough, not thin enough.... Fill in the blank. And this seems to happen more often in Lent.

This book challenges us to look at so-called failure through the lens of our Christian Faith rather than through the lens of the world and our culture.

You and I mess up. But as we acknowledge the ways we may fall short – let's keep in mind that the only metric that matters is how

God feels about that. The God who is love. The God who beckons us to come back as the one sheep separated from the 99 others. The God who does not condemn (John 3:17) but is always inviting, always calling us toward his love.

So, if you are like me and whatever it is you gave up or started this Lent has been picked up and dropped and renegotiated already...(aka failure), spend some time with the Lover of your soul in the next week or so, (before we meet again) and ask, "What are you inviting me into?" or "How would you have me draw closer to you?"



Large Print Order Of Service: We have large print copies of the service hymn book available.


