Deeply rooted, joyfully revived, faithfully bearing fruit.

I thought we'd lost a tree last year, the result of the "unprecedented"

February 2021 freeze. It was a large Japanese Blueberry tree in our front yard which was not only beautiful but was home to an astonishing number of happily singing birds who found shelter and food and one another in its branches. After several days below freezing, its leaves withered; it seemed to have died. We had it cut back after a full year of barrenness, but its roots and its stump remained. This past spring, it sprang to life anew and, as I write this, it has already reached four feet in height. The happy birds are back.

This story is, at least to me, a parable. A parable of what is happening - thanks be to God - at Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church. We too experienced an "unprecedented" disaster; several, as a matter of fact. For the better part of two years, we were forced to cut back. Life together felt a bit tenuous for a while, but - thanks be to God! - we're back. Our nave is mostly full. Our singing is joyful and lively. Our youth programs, Godly Play and confirmation classes are strong. Our staff, choir members, and youth group members are vibrant. Our leadership robust and looking forward to a future filled with love and care, learning, and growing, worship and service ahead. Our congregation has sprung forth to new and abundant life. Like the happy birds in the revived tree at our home, those who see our church as their sanctuary and home have also returned. All because, we are *deeply rooted* in the promises of God, joyfully revived through our unity with our crucified, dead, and risen Lord Jesus Christ, and faithfully bearing fruit through the nourishing gift of the Holy Spirit.

Deeply rooted, joyfully revived, faithfully bearing fruit. This is the truth about our life together as the faithful people of Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church, Houston, Texas. Since this is the truth, it is also theme of our rather ambitious stewardship program for the year 2023 ahead.

We will all receive stewardship materials, inviting us to offer our "time, talent and treasure" later this month. With this article, however, I am inviting each of us to reflect deeply and prayerfully about how we, like our congregation, have experienced these last two years. How have we experienced <u>rootedness</u> – stability, firm grounding – over these past two years? How have we been <u>revived</u> – in the last six months (since Easter!) and become able to thrive again? How has God enabled these to happen?

Think and pray next about "the fruit;" how the Holy Spirit enables you to thankfully show the activity of God in your life. What are the ways each of us – you – are faithfully bearing fruit"?

I commend this prayerful exercise to you over these next few weeks. In the name of Christ, we will soon be asking us all to "be fruitful" in the way we use our rooted and revived life in 2023. In all that is to come, I look forward to

blossoming with you and sharing with the world the fruits of the Spirit, Christ's life, and God's love for all.

CAR Pastors Conference

Our Companions in Ministry: Lutherans in the Central African Republic

We rejoice with our companion synod in the Central African Republic (CAR) as times become safer and there is renewed energy in the ELC-CAR. In September, Lutheran pastors were able to gather at the School of Theology in Baboua, their first conference in four years. 99% of the pastors were able to attend. The church's president (bishop), Pastor Joseph NGOE, has worked hard in negotiations with the church's international partners, who, besides the three U.S. synods, include Lutherans in Denmark, Germany and France, and the Lutheran World Federation, to develop new procedures. The ELC-CAR has set as priorities for support (in no particular order): health, education, theological education, food security/humanitarian assistance, and management. The church's health program with its two clinics, including the Emmanuel Health Center at Gallo which we have

long supported, the village school program, and the Food Security/ Humanitarian Assistance programs all serve the community at large—not only Lutherans. Funds recently received enabled distribution of food and supplies.

We look forward to the 2023 Centennial of the founding of the mission which gave birth to the Lutheran Churches in Cameroon and the Central African Republic. It was called the Sudan Mission because in the 1920s, the whole region of central and west Africa was called The Sudan. Celebrations are being planned on both sides of the Atlantic, with a main event in July 2023. The bishops of the three U.S. partner synods will jointly invite President NGOE and another visitor, who will be a woman chosen by the ELC-CAR, to visit our synods and attend the ceremonies. Let us pray for our companion synod as that church carries out ministry in a country still harassed by rebel movements, having little electricity, Internet, running water, and other necessities for a safe and comfortable life that we take for granted. Let us continue to support them with our offerings, especially this month for our October Mission Offering.

This regular column by **Elmer Ledesma** suggests a book each month that may interest "lay readers" in learning more about science and its importance for us people of faith.

This month:

Padilla, A. "Fantastic Numbers and Where to Find Them: A Cosmic Quest from Zero to Infinity", Farrar, Straus and Giroux, New York, NY, 2022.

In *Fantastic Numbers and Where to Find Them*, the leading theoretical physicist and YouTube star Antonio Padilla takes us on an irreverent cosmic tour of nine of the most extraordinary numbers in

physics, offering a startling picture of how the universe works. These strange numbers include Graham's number, which is so large that if you thought about it in the wrong way, your head would collapse into a singularity; TREE(3), whose finite nature can never be definitively proved, because to do so would take so much time that the universe would experience a Poincaré Recurrence-resetting to precisely the state it currently holds, down to the arrangement of individual atoms; and 10^{{-120}}, measuring the desperately unlikely balance of energy needed to allow the universe to exist for more than just a moment, to extend beyond the size of a single atom-in other words, the mystery of our unexpected universe.

Afghan Family Resettlement

The initial Afghan family group that our Church welcomed to Houston and decided to help support alongside RST in December of 2021, also now includes more extended family members, who are living in two other separate households. The entire family recently celebrated their one-year anniversaries of their respective differing arrival dates into the United States refugee camps. These camps were set up for all Afghanistan evacuees at military bases across the US, and our family was initially divided into two separate refugee camps when first arriving to the US, before they all ultimately arrived here in Houston. These US arrival date milestones were also the deadline for our entire family group to apply for Asylum, and ultimately towards actual US citizenship. Thanks to the help of the Houston Legal Aid Center lawyers on a pro bono basis, these Asylum applications were submitted, for each family member, on a timely basis, and the three sub-family households will each have their first round of US Immigration office interviews next month. Each of the three family households are now doing very well! The entire family is learning the nuances of our American culture, and they are all becoming independent productive members of our Houston Community. The two male heads of households obtained their Texas driver's licenses, along with their own fully-owned used reliable vehicles. Each of the three of these heads of household extended family units are now each gainfully employed. All of the school-age children are enrolled in HISD schools. All family members are enjoying making new friends and learning about their new homeland. The family patriarch welcomed his first grandchild, a healthy daughter, in early July, which was a joyous celebration, and included even more extended family members, who had also arrived into Texas this summer. Yes. the family keeps growing! Our original Church and AMMPARO Team goal, to nurture this family, both spiritually and practically, to help them to become self-sufficient, and happily integrated independently here in the US, is, so far, a very happy success! The entire Afghan family would like to express that they are very grateful for all of the support, both emotional and financial, that the Church has provided to them. So thank you ALL for the wonderful congregational support of "our" Afghan family!

Churchwide Assembly Justice Look-Back Land Back

At churchwide assembly in August, a memorial was passed calling for all ELCA members, congregations, synods, etc. to explore including land acknowledgements as part of their public gatherings, to become educated about the Indigenous peoples who thrived, prior to European contact, on the land they currently inhabit, and to learn about, learn from, and be in deepening relationship with Indigenous people and tribal nations. The memorial also urged all ELCA members, congregations, synods, etc. to support creative programs of restorative justice in partnership with Indigenous people. The memorial called on the churchwide organization to work collaboratively with synods and their Indigenous partners to provide needed funding for the more than 30 ELCA Indigenous congregations and service ministries and to engage with them whenever planning or considering work related to Indigenous people or ministries.
