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2022 STRATEGIC PLANNING: SURVEY AND SUMMIT



The strategic planning process for Christ the King Church began with two two-hour back-to-back sessions, first with our church staff and then with our congregation council, on Tuesday, November 9, 2021. It continues through early January with a data gathering process which mostly involves the gathering of information from our Rice Village and Bunker Hill

Village ministry sites, from congregational membership records and trends and demographics from the 2020 U.S. Census. Christ the King Church has always kept meticulous records with up-to-the-minute statistical reports provided to the council each month and so much of this phase only involves staff input and work by our planning consultant.

Every member's involvement will be crucial.

Everyone in our congregation from both ministry sites, plus other "stake-holders" in our congregation will be asked to respond to a brief emailed survey about their hopes, dreams, and concerns about the future of our congregation. These, along with the information gathered above, will be presented to the gathered congregation at a **Congregation Summit on Saturday morning, January 29.**

There is an old legend,

occasionally verifiable, that each year in the northern hemisphere on Epiphany, January 6, — and only on January 6 — two constellations appear at opposite points in the night sky. In the south, the Southern Cross appears. In the north, the constellation called Praecipio, the Cradle, appears.

Thus the expanse of the night sky, the entire world, and each of our lives is lived bordered by the manger and the cross.

"Lived between the manger and the cross." That refers to our whole lives as Christians, but it also accurately describes this year's first three months of our church life. It's my intent to use this as our overarching theme for these next three months as we begin to focus on four major tasks and prepare for the forming of a Call Committee and for the calling of a new senior pastor. Those tasks are:

Stewardship:

How does the way we manage our time, talent, and treasure gifts God has given us – reflect that we live our lives between the manger and the cross? I want to talk with you about that.

The Strategic Plan:

In January there will be two important parts of our strategic planning process needing each of our full participation. The first of these will be a brief, on-line survey sent to each of us and asking for our response to three specific questions. Please prayerfully and fully respond. Second will be the Congregation Summit on Saturday morning, January 29 from 9:30 until noon in the Fellowship Hall of First Christian Church, 1601 Sunset Boulevard, Houston, Texas 77005. Again, your in-person participation will be critical. We will not waste your time. We will have distilled a large amount of information from you; from our affiliated partners and from and about our community, including 2020 Census data. We will present that information to you in a way that we can respond to it. All this information, your responses and the results of this summit will be presented to the Strategic Planning Team to develop a strategic plan that will be presented to the congregation for action as soon as it's ready but no later than mid-June. This information will also be used to create the Ministry Site Profile for the bishop and Call Committee.

3. Merger Work:

The Council has already approved the mandated merger committees which will begin meeting this month; and designated a (temporary?) working name, Christ the King Lutheran Church, West Campus for the former Memorial Drive Lutheran Church location. We've also deliberately not intruded in any of that former congregation's regular Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany celebrations. At some mutually agreed upon date before the beginning of Lent (Ash Wednesday is March 2), we are planning a liturgy for all of us at the west campus site to celebrate and conclude the MDLC ministry and to inaugurate the new. The merger committees will regularly report to our congregation council, which also includes representatives from the west campus, and to you through The King's Banner. Of course, all this work will also be informed and shaped by our strategic planning process.

Congregation Council and staff development:


As all this moves forward, it seems increasingly important that both the council and the staff take time to completely understand their duties and responsibilities as well as have a clear vision of their individual and communal roles in the mission of Christ the King Lutheran Church. We'll spend some time, including a couple of retreats, working on all of this.

"Lived between the manger and the cross."

All of the above is chiefly administrative and not "pastoral" in the purest sense, but I believe these matters will be the best use of my time during these next two months and I want you to know that these will have higher priority for me. After six months serving among you, I believe it's time for me to focus here. I hope you agree.

We've come quite far over these past six months, and we must plan that 2022 be our year for shaping and forming what we will be and do for the next few years. While that will be our challenging work, in the end it will be the Holy Spirit working in and through us who will be shaping and forming us and our ministry. To that end, I invite you to continue to pray:

O God, where hearts are fearful and constricted, grant courage and hope. Where anxiety is infectious and widening, grant peace and reassurance. Where impossibilities close every door and window, grant imagination and resistance. Where distrust twists our thinking, grant healing and illumination. Where spirits are daunted and weakened, grant soaring wings and strengthened dreams; in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

On any given day, approximately 3,400 individuals in Houston are experiencing homelessness.

Many of these men and women are immobilized by physical or mental health impairments and the lack of a support network. For many, it is virtually impossible to exit homelessness without some assistance. SEARCH is there to provide that help.

SEARCH's Mobile Outreach Team travels to common gathering areas for those who are homeless and provides on-the-spot assistance, assessments, intervention, and referrals. Armed with food, water, clothing, and blankets, they offer an important lifeline to people who are living on the street.

Once connected with SEARCH, they help clients obtain permanent housing and qualify for benefits and other resources that they need to stabilize their lives and exit homelessness.

The only way to cure homelessness is through housing.

Providing a home is just the first step on the path toward stability and selfsufficiency. Even after receiving a roof over their heads, many of the SEARCH clients need ongoing help in order to stabilize their lives and maintain their housing.

Once the clients have a safe place to call home, they are able to focus turning their lives around. Under the Housing First approach, SEARCH first places their clients in a stable home and then provide extensive case management and wraparound support services to help them increase their income, improve their health, rebuild their lives, and maintain their stability over the long-term.

SEARCH's case managers are located at the housing sites where clients reside to work with the formerly homeless residents and support them as they work to regain their independence.

Families with children represent the fastest growing segment of the homeless population.

The House of Tiny Treasures (HTT) provides a high-quality early childhood education for children, ages 2 to 5 years of age, who are either homeless or living in deep poverty. SEARCH's goal is to break the cycle of deep poverty and homelessness, and they know that breaking the cycle begins with the children.

Soon after SEARCH opened, it became apparent that their adult clients needed quality care for their children so that they could go back to work or school. Thus, SEARCH opened HTT in 1992. What began as a traditional day care has evolved into a nationally accredited early childhood education center preparing our young students for success in school and in life.

HTT offers a full-day, year-round program for our families. While the children are being cared for, their parents are able to focus on getting back on their feet and regaining a stable, self-sufficient life for their family.

CLIENT SUCCESS STORIES - HOUSING



George S. had been homeless and living on the streets for three years. During that time, George tried to get housing but was never able to complete the process on his own. Several months ago, George heard about the city's Coordinated Access system, got assessed for housing, and was assigned to a case manager at SEARCH. Earlier this month, George was elated to move into his very own apartment.

After being homeless for so long, it was an adjustment just sleeping in his own bed. George laughed about the first nights in his apartment. "It wasn't easy getting used to sleeping in my own bed again. I was used to sleeping on the ground and people waking me up all the time. This is new for me!" George is also enjoying something that he hasn't been able to do for a very long time – cooking his own food. "My family taught me how to cook, and I missed so much the food I had growing up. Now, I can make all that again." When speaking about SEARCH, George couldn't hold back the tears. "God is good, and God bless all SEARCH has done for me. They believed in me. Thank you so much."

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

January 18-25



We saw the star in the East, and we came to worship Him.

The theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2022 was selected by the Middle East Council of Churches and originates from the churches in Lebanon. Present times in Lebanon are extremely difficult and economically disastrous. All this combined with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have made the situation guite stressful. The power of prayer in solidarity with those who suffer is a demonstration of Christian unity and a sign of communion.

(cf. Mathew 2:2) The theme, taken from the second chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew, is the Epiphany. Each year in January, the Church recalls the visit of the Magi to Bethlehem, highlighting God's invitation to all of humanity to a new covenant in the Incarnation of Christ. In the Eastern Churches, Epiphany is joined to the mystery of the Baptism of Christ, a baptism all Christians hold in common as testimony to their faith in the Son of God.


"Driving the Future: **Combating Climate Change** with Cleaner, Smarter Cars," Arcade Publishing, New York, NY: 2016.

As promised, here is a description of the aging resources available through the Hope and Healing Center here in Houston. Community Bioethics and Aging Center (CBAC) - Hope and Healing Center and Institute. The three areas of information include:



- Aging Specific Resources Online videos and classes are offered during the year and focus on aging issues like health care, legal issues, how to down size, alternative living options, advanced care planning and mental decline.
- Care for the Caregiver There are a variety of support options for those who are caregivers. Options include support groups and personal coaching to help manage grief and caregiving concerns, especially the concerns of those caring for a person living with dementia.
- Guidance and Support Sometimes health care plans and decision making can present stressors for families as well as individuals as they try to determine what is best for those they care for. The health care ethics committee provides guidance to families dealing with chronic illness issues, complex treatment options and dementia.

The congregation has embraced this new ministry project, by volunteering and by donating more than \$12,000 to support the family in its resettlement in Houston. 
CTK Welcome Team members are the Hossaini family's sponsors, focused on helping them become self-sufficient within three months after their arrival and giving team members an opportunity to develop relationships as we accompany them. It is our response to Jesus' direction in Matthew 25:35 to welcome the stranger.

Members of the Welcome Team will help the family by addressing English-language difficulties and their lack of computer skills and access to transportation. We will advise our new friends on the importance of work for self-sufficiency; how to apply for and interview for jobs; how to access adequate health care; the importance of working toward getting a car and driver's license, and other everyday tasks such as budgeting.

RST, a nonprofit resettlement agency, is the Welcome Team's partner. By design, RST and the Welcome Team will taper their support gradually throughout the initial resettlement period for an emphasis on early self-sufficiency.

Thank You From Our DACA Recipients

Through a partnership with BakerRipley's Immigration and Citizenship program, the AMMPARO Ministry at Christ the King Church provided 10 young people with money to pay fees for their applications to renew their protected immigration status under Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA).

DACA status is available for some immigrants who were brought to the United States as children. They are widely known as "Dreamers" after proposed legislation to grant them permanent status—the "DREAM Act."

Funding was provided through a grant by the Christ the King Lutheran Church Foundation. The renewal fee scholarships—\$495 for each person—were granted in October during a DACA Renewal Workshop.

Churchwide Assembly Justice Look-Back: Augusta Victoria Hospital

At churchwide assembly in August 2019, a memorial was passed that requested the presiding bishop, ELCA synods, and congregations to petition the U.S. president and all relevant legislators to (1) release funding intended by Congress to support the East Jerusalem hospitals, and continue funding at previous levels until the Israeli/Palestinian conflict is resolved, (2) restore funding to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) and beyond, and continue funding at previous levels until the Israeli/Palestinian conflict is resolved and (3) to amend the Anti-Terrorism Clarification Act to remove legislative barriers to future funding of humanitarian aid to the Palestinian Authority. Smorgasbord

There are a number of active justice advocacy requests from a variety of organizations. Speak up for justice today!

Climate Justice – Methane Pollution Rules New rules that reduce methane pollution, a very potent greenhouse gas, are open for public comment thru Jan. 14. Let the EPA know that you support strong safeguards on methane pollution. Tender a public comment on the proposed methane rules.

Healthcare and Racial/Gender Justice – HIV/AIDS Despite medical advances to address HIV and AIDS, lack of access to healthcare, stigma, inequality and other factors have led to increased disparities between groups of people, worsening racial and gender justice inequities in our communities. Urge the U.S. government to enhance health programs, both in the U.S. and globally, as well as housing programs, in recognition of the large impact of housing stability on health outcomes. Urge Congress to take action to bolster U.S. response to HIV/AIDS.

Human Rights - Palestine Israel continues to flout international law and conventions by forcibly removing Palestinians from their homes and allowing massive violence against them, including against Palestinian children, to go unpunished. The United States, which annually sends \$3.8 billion in military aid to Israel, has great leverage to uphold international principles and enforce international laws. Urge the U.S. government to hold Israel accountable for human rights violations.

Religious Freedom - Hate-Free Campaigns Religious bigotry is on the rise in Texas. This bigotry is amplified when candidates for public office engage in hate speech, or even when they make no comments as others do so. Call on these candidates in Texas to condemn religious bigotry.

Voting Rights – Freedom to Vote Act For the first time, the International Institute for Democracy & Electoral Assistance deemed the U.S. a "backsliding democracy", due in large part to attacks on free and fair elections. One counter to this trend is the Freedom to Vote Act, which would protect the right to vote, end partisan gerrymandering & decrease the influence of money in U.S. political life. Ask Congress and President Biden to support the Freedom to Vote Act.

Immigration – Afghan Adjustment Act While the U.S. has welcomed tens of thousands of Afghan immigrants to our country, they have no pathway to permanent residency other than asylum, which requires paperwork that they were advised to destroy in order to elude the Taliban during evacuation. To ensure that Afghans find lasting safety in the U.S., Congress must pass the Afghan Adjustment Act, which would allow them to seek legal permanent residence. Ask Congress to support this act.

After another year of record-breaking climate disasters, environmental injustices are degrading our communities, God's Creation, and democracy. This year, we're changing the script.
