"WHAT LANGUAGE SHALL I BORROW ...?"

Dear faithful People of Christ the King Church:

"What language shall I borrow ...?"

We sang that phrase from ELW hymn 351, stanza 3, "O sacred head, now wounded" at least once during this past Lent, although this particular stanza has an Easter theme running through it:

"Oh make me thine forever, and should I fainting be, Lord, let me never, never out live my love for thee."

Which makes it useful during these 50 days of Easter even to a confessed "liturgical snob" like me.

"What language shall we borrow ...?" is one of the more important questions Christ's Church in general and Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church in particular is wrestling with in these increasingly complex times. What is the most effective way for us to communicate the Gospel of Jesus Christ? What are the best words we can use today to describe God, God's Work and Christ's Church? How do we best describe who we are as Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church will two physical campuses, a large and growing "virtual" congregation, and growing mission outreach (and inreach!) to the Latine community and to the Rice University campus community? We know there are theological words for which we need new language. We know we have a current growing problem with and even an aversion to the word "evangelical" in our name. Even the designation "Christian" is derided, and for all the wrong reasons! Yet there also is a debate about the appropriate word for our Spanish-language ministry and there appears to also be something lacking with that word "virtual," as if "in-person" is its opposite. "What language shall we borrow ...?"

I can honestly say that this has been a major question for all of the nearly 50 years I've been in public ministry. I'm not certain I have ever been satisfied with any of my answers or the answers that I've read or heard about from my colleagues and from the wider Church. It also is apparent to me that as we move deeper into the 21st Century, this question – these questions -- is becoming more acute. Yet because the world, our nation, state, and communities so desperately need to experience the Gospel, not only in the words we use but in the actions we Christians take, this is an issue we need to face.

And we are attempting to face this as we work on our mission strategy. Who are we? How do we want to be known? These are as much issues of language as strategy; and we are wrestling with them.

Several years ago I received a distinguished alumni award from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago where "public church" is an organizing theological principle. In my response to the award I asked why: "How is any church not public?" This drew a laugh and then some serious commentary about local churches, Lutheran parishes, being "social and ethnic identity clubs." Having grown up in a now dying Slovak Lutheran Church, and after watching the demise of Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, German, and other ethnic congregations in New York which refused to adapt to their changing neighborhoods, I've seen the problem and at the same time have been sympathetic to the internal concern about identity each of these congregations faced. So we really need to wrestle with the questions of "Who are we?" and "How do we want to be known?"

I'm writing to invite you to join in this conversation seriously and carefully by engaging in it with one another, members of our congregation council, strategic planning committee members and staff, as well as with me. By faith and practice, we all know the answers! But "what language shall we borrow" to express them!

As we bask in the glow of Christ's resurrection and each Sunday's resurrection stories, I look forward to this conversation! I hope you do too!

Special Congregational Meeting Sunday, May 22

Vote to Approve Legal Merger **Documents**

Rice Village Campus: 9:30 a.m. in parish hall

West Campus: 11:30 a.m. in Sanctuary

Both Councils of Christ the King Lutheran Church and Memorial Drive Lutheran Church are calling a special congregational meeting on May 22 to vote on the plan and agreement of a legal merger, with its implementing resolutions. This vote to affirm will allow the certificate of merger to be filed with the state of Texas. The merger should be legally concluded sometime in June 2022.

Two points to emphasize:

- On March 13, we celebrated an ecclesial joining of the two congregations, but this is not considered legal in the eyes of Texas.
- · A discussion of constitutional revisions is expected to occur in summer 2022 with the goal of adopting a new CTK Constitution in late 2022.

Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunity

The AMMPARO ministry at Christ the King Church has taken a broad approach to fulfilling our responsibility to welcome new immigrant and refugee neighbors. The congregation's ongoing willingness to support these efforts with time, talent and treasure have had positive impacts in the Houston community and the church.

The May Mission Offering will support the CTK AMMPARO Committee's activities including

- The congregation's sponsorship of the Tagi Hussaini family who fled Afghanistan after the Taliban takeover. The family is among more than 4,000 Afghan refugees who have settled in Houston since the evacuation of people and families who had connections to the U.S. military and other institutions.
- Enhancing efforts by the Family Life Center at St. James Lutheran Church/Santiago Apòstol in northwest Houston to provide financial and other assistance to immigrants often excluded from government programs.

The Sunday Forums on May 8 and May 15 will present speakers who will provide new insights into the efforts at St. James and the refugee resettlement process through the work of Refugee Services of Texas, the Houston expression of Lutheran Immigration & Refugee Services.

The congregation, through volunteer activities, special appeals and the support of the Christ the King New Foundation, has responded generously to both the Afghan refugee surge and the compassionate work at St. James. In both areas, however, the continuing need is great.

Since the start of the pandemic, St. James Family Life Center has been a beacon of hope for Northwest Houston by providing food and emergency financial support to hundreds of families each month. St. James continues to receive requests; the need is much greater than their resources allow. Continued support from CTK members through the Mission Offering as well as the CTK New Foundation are essential to continuing this work.

With a recent grant from the CTK New Foundation, the AMMPARO Committee is exploring ways to assist additional Afghan refugees through another family sponsorship or other avenues.

While the congregation's financial support is essential to refugees' successful integration in the community, volunteer efforts provide another avenue of support that can be rewarding for volunteers as well as the family.

Christ the King volunteers continue to visit the Hussaini family to help them practice their English. During those visits, there are many inevitable moments of cultural exchange whereby the volunteers help give guidance for the ways of our world here in the United States. Their efforts continue to grow; the family has happily been reunited with extended family members who have arrived in Houston from temporary housing on military bases.

Volunteers are always needed to help the adults with employment readiness, identifying potential job opportunities and working on resumes. Also, taking the family to a park or showing them an interesting Houston experience would be a welcome experience for the children.





From Pastor Shelli's Easter Sermon

Have you ever noticed how guietly Easter arrives? There are no angelic choirs making announcements of Jesus' coming. There are no foreign visitors bringing gifts. There are not even any ordinary folks that come in from the Shepherds Fields to see what has happened. There is no voice thundering from heaven or Old Testament characters showing up on queue. There is no drama of parting waters or chariots of fire or burning bushes or mountains shrouded in cloud. The sounds of the Resurrection are guiet, almost fearful. They seem uncertain what will happen next, a little reticent at going forward in a new way. And yet, there is a certain peace to Easter, a peace that begins in the quiet of the darkness and then allows the Light to begin to peek into the scene. It's as if Jesus rises just for Mary and calls her by name. Maybe that is what Jesus does for each of us. In the quiet darkness, Jesus comes and rises before we get there and then when we are listening, says our name. And we begin to follow wherever Jesus goes. We just have to pay attention.

HGO Trustees Drs. Ian and Patricia Butler have been coming to HGO since the '70s, but their story goes back further than that. The two met at medical school in Melbourne and have now been married for more than 50 years. Along the way, they've raised children on three continents, had full medical careers, and always shared their passion for teaching, mentorship, and music.

"Ian came from a musical family," Patricia shares. He grew up in Adelaide, Australia, where his mother took him to concerts, and he sang and played piano. Patricia grew-up in a farming community in Aberdeen, Scotland and discovered music on her own, buying her first opera recording of Madame Butterfly, "when I was 12 or 13."

The Butlers' careers took them to London, Cardiff, Wales, and Baltimore before they finally landed in Houston in 1976, when lan was recruited to direct the division of child and adolescent neurology at the McGovern Medical School. It was then that the couple saw their first opera at HGO. "David Gockley was the general director," says lan, "and he was, as everybody knows, interested in new productions. And that was intriguing."

Over time, the Butlers' relationship with HGO has become a partnership, fueled by their interest in education and, says lan, "encouraging young people to fulfill their potential." They love to watch young artists flourish at the HGO Studio. "We've seen graduates of that program who've gone on to major accomplishments," he says. "I think HGO should be both commended for that." In 2019 they-brought a group of students to see Rigoletto. "For them it was just a real treat," says Patricia, who recently retired as Vice Dean of Education at the McGovern Medical School.

The Butlers also recently became sponsors of HGO's new resident conductor, Benjamin Manis (pictured above between Ian and Patricia), once again supporting HGO with their mentorship and their generosity. We're so thankful this amazing couple landed and stayed in Houston!

Healthcare

Augusta Victoria Hospital (AVH), operated by the Lutheran World Federation in Jerusalem, is the only hospital to provide radiation therapy for cancer patients in the Palestinian territories and the only medical facility in the West Bank offering pediatric kidney dialysis. AVH finished 2021 with millions owed to suppliers, but tens of millions owed the hospital by the Palestianian Authority. To avoid any interruption of treatment, Congress must ensure that the U.S. government releases a large payment for the East Jerusalem hospitals through USAID as soon as possible. Urge your Congresspersons to support transfer of \$120 million to meet humanitarian needs, which would cover the Palestinian Authority's debt to Augusta Victoria and other hospitals: https://support.elca.org/site/Advocacy?cmd=display&page=UserAction&id=1487

How Long Will Our Aquifers Last? Sunday, May 22, 6:00 p.m., online

Groundwater is, as famously quoted by the Texas Supreme Court in 1904, "secret, occult, and concealed." Sometimes referred to as "hidden water," it is out of sight and, therefore, unfortunately, out of mind. However, groundwater comprises 98.7 percent of all the fresh, unfrozen water on Earth. About 40 percent of all surface-water flows in the United States are sourced from innumerable seeps and springs that discharge groundwater into streams and rivers. Groundwater supports 26 percent of the human use of water with 70 percent of it watering crops. As drier areas become drier and droughts increase everywhere, groundwater is expected to make up the difference. Unfortunately, much of the groundwater used across the planet is produced unsustainably. This unsustainable use affects flows to springs, streams, rivers, wetlands, and estuaries that support ecologies as well as human needs. In some cases, such as in the Houston area, groundwater production has caused the land to sink, increasing flooding. In this presentation, Professor Mace will present what he has learned about groundwater sustainability through a report he published late last year title "Five Gallons in a Ten-Gallon Hat: Groundwater Sustainability in Texas" and in a forthcoming book titled "Groundwater Sustainability: Its

Birth, Development, and Application." Listeners will have a better understanding of what groundwater sustainability is, how Texas and the greater Houston area is doing with sustainable groundwater management, and what people can do to achieve groundwater sustainability. 
