Dear faithful people of Christ the King Church:

I began serving you as interim pastor by announcing "The beginning is coming." Today, with great joy, I announce "The beginning is here." God through Christ has put the chaotic season

is here!

Rise and keep

the feast.

of uncertainty behind us. God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, has worked among, in and through us to lay the

foundation for what will be - and even now is – one new mission and ministry: Christ the King Lutheran Church, Rice Village and West Campus.

Why lies behind us?

First, the two-year long Covid-19 pandemic nightmare. To be sure, Covid is not behind us. Yet its new season is not pandemic but

endemic. We know how to deal with endemics; we learned that from living with the flu. While there still may be surges and occasional impositions of some protocols, it appears that the necessary and seemingly draconian protective measures are behind us.

Second, the doubting and dejection about our parish life and our future together. The merger we overwhelmingly voted for in September and the ministries we magnificently remembered and celebrated on March 13 is now a reality and no longer a possibility. We are now a mission and ministry – a congregation – with two well-situated campuses.

The beginning is now.

While there is much work to do, all of that work is forward-, not backward-, looking. We are working for what the writer of Hebrews calls "the joy set before us." I expect April, May, and June to be joyfully productive months filled with a great deal of work.

Together, empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit, we will continue to shape our strategic plan. Facilitated by Daniel Zorn, the strategic plan steering committee is committed to presenting all the elements of that plan and, with the congregation council's recommendation, present it to the congregation in June. Please continue to follow this progress, reported weekly in each Thursday "Mailchimp," and respond to the steering committee's continuing request for your input.

Together, empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit, we will continue the "nuts and bolts" of merger. We have merged, to be sure, but there is much to be done to unify our work processes, governance, and legal identity. Led by Russell Post, the merger steering committee and its six subcommittees will also be working to complete that process by the beginning of 2023 because, while we are one congregation with two campuses, there is still much unifying work to be done.

Together, empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit, we will continue to be proactive on our already strong commitment to be a fully open, welcoming, and increasingly more diverse

> Christian communion of diverse individuals and communities. Our (and our synod's) Reconciling in Christ (RIC) process; our work through Pastor Rodriguez and others with campus ministry at Rice University, each well-begun, will continue to be fleshed-out and grow into something more by September of this year.

Together, empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit, we will call a new senior pastor. At this point, that timeline is fully in the hands of the Holy Spirit.

The beginning is here now! This beginning, thanks be to God, coincides (there are no coincidences!) with the center and the heart of our life and liturgical year: Holy Week and Easter. I fully expect the liturgies of these days to look, feel and be like those we reveled in before the pandemic, before the tumult, before the uncertainties of the previous two years. One of our great Easter hymns sums this up best:

"All the doubtings and dejections of our trembling hearts have ceased;

hail the day of resurrection, let us rise and keep the feast."

ELW 382, verse 4 "Christ is risen! Alleluia!"

I hope and pray to see and greet and worship with all you during these great and holy days. Unless events determine otherwise, we will no longer require masks. I hope and pray to see you and greet you and worship with you these days because it is these days, what we celebrate, Who we celebrate, and the way we celebrate that are the unchangeable and unshakeable foundation of our life together in Christ! It is precisely because of what God in Christ has done that I can confidently say: "The Beginning is here!" And invite you and urge you to "rise and keep the feast."





Christian Community Service Center

is a community-based nonprofit organization serving central and southwest Houston. With a coalition of 39 churches, volunteers and donors, they unite in a mission to serve the poor, hungry, disabled, and otherwise needy while respecting their religious, ethnic or cultural differences. CCSC was created out of faith, and founded in the belief that we are called to help all God's children heart to heart and hand in hand.

CCSC serves as our congregation's Food Pantry, Clothing Closet, and Emergency Services for members and neighbors in need.

BASIC NEEDS CCSC provides crisis relief for people struggling to make ends meet. The two locations at Emergency ServicesCentral and Emergency Services-Southwest offer food, hygiene items, and financial assistance for rent, utilities, and limited medical needs. In 2021:

25,211 Nutritious food packages were provided to families facing hunger and food insecurity.

927 Households received rent or utility assistance, helping clients avoid homelessness and substandard living conditions.

138 People received assistance for eyeglasses, dental services or prescription medications.

7,176 Pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables were havested for clients from the CCSC Garden.

YOUTH SERVICES CCSC supports the needs of vulnerable children and their families. Back To School promotes academic readiness and Jingle Bell Express addresses play, literacy and hunger. The Louise J. Moran Vision Care Program* serves underprivileged students with vision screenings and glasses.

6,802 Students started the academic year with new school supplies and clothing.

1,741 Children received new toys and books for Christmas;

498 Families received a grocery gift card to address hunger.

178 Students received professional eye exams.

161 Students received new prescription glasses. (Offered only during fall semester in 2021 due to the pandemic.)



EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS CCSC equips job seekers to build financial stability and brighter futures. JobNet prepares motivated job seekers through classes and coaching. Martha's Way and the Professional Home Caregiver Training Program cultivate talented entrepreneurs through hands-on vocational training and business skills development.

270 Job seekers gained valuable skills through workshops, computer training, computer lab access, and personalized job search assistance.

177 Entrepreneurs participated in a 42-hour residential housekeeping training program and 90% graduated; 134 job leads were shared with graduates.

20 Aspiring home caregivers completed a 45+ hour training covering technical and communication skills and business development.

76 lients pursued personalized strategies for success with CCSC's Success Coach or Financial Coach.

Jessica Locheed and Tom Frank (pictured left) along with other CTK volunteers, deliver bread from Kraftsmen Bakery in the Heights to CCSC who then distributes it to those in need. If you can help deliver bread once or twice a month, please contact Jessica at jlocheed@outlook.com.



It underscores that people of faith are encouraged to understand the world God has given us, so better to care for the creation.

Space Race: The Epic Battle Between America and the Soviet Union for Dominion of Space

Cadbury, D., Harper Perennial, New York, NY, 2007.

One of the most exhilarating true adventures in history, the race into

space was marked by courage, duplicity, political paranoia, astonishing technological feats, and unbelievable triumphs in the face of overwhelming adversity. It is the story of an unparalleled rivalry between superpowers and of the two remarkable men at the center of the conflict. On the American side was Wernher von Braun, the camera-friendly former Nazi scientist, who was granted hero status and almost unlimited resources by a government panicked at the thought of the Cold War enemy taking the lead. The Soviet program was headed by Sergei Korolev, a former political prisoner whose identity was a closely guarded state secret. Korolev was expected to—and did—work miracles on a shoestring budget, his cooperation assured through intimidation and threats of possible disgrace or death. These rivals were opposite in every way, save for one: each was obsessed with the idea of launching a man to the Moon.



Be Prepared – Part 1

As we are able to resume more activities and be physically present at our church facilities it is time to review safety and preparedness.



Consider the following:

- 1. Do you know where fire extinguishers and fire pulls are located?
- 2. Where can you find the Automated External Defibrillator (AED)?
- 3. Would you be able to locate a safety kit to assist with first aid?
- 4. Where do we evacuate in case of a fire?
- 5. Do you have a current CPR card?
- 6. What are steps toward preventing childhood emergencies?

- 1. Extinguishers and pulls are located throughout the building. Look out for them the next time you are on the property.
- 2. The AED is located to the left of the kitchen serving window.
- 3. Safety kits are located in the kitchen, nursery, sacristy, narthex, Sunday School office on second floor and third floor bathroom.
- 4. Evacuate to the Chaucer property.
- 5. If you would like a current CPR card two classes are coming up on May 14 and June 4. Time frame is 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Cost is \$45. Space is limited to 10 participants per class.

A Messsage from Leipzig

Britta Taddiken, Senior Pastor of St. Thomas Leipzig, Leipzig, in March 2022 Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ the

I greet you warmly from Leipzig! We have not heard from each other for a long time and it was not possible to visit each other in Houston or Leipzig. I hope very much that it will soon be possible again for a group from the USA to come to Germany and vice versa. Corona took a lot out of all of us. Life in the congregation had to be reduced to a minimum at times. Like you, we worked with new worship formats on YouTube.

But all this does not replace the human, brotherly contact. We are glad that now more and more is possible and people can come together again. The St. Thomas Choir with its new Thomaskantor Andreas Reize sings wonderfully even with only a few singers and we hope that it will soon be possible to hear the whole choir again. Many other things have changed for us as well. We have a wonderful young St. Thomas organist in Johannes Lang. Our church music office is also new and well staffed with Maren Glockner and Carolyn Rau. Youth work is also going well, we have many confirmands and interested young people. Our church council has a lot to do with getting the finances in order. Unfortunately, we had to cope with many losses - but we can do it!

It is all almost secondary when you consider that a criminal war is claiming its victims in the immediate vicinity. Many people from Ukraine live in Leipzig and we try to stand by them and the people in our twin city Kyiv. Nobody knows how it will develop further. It is therefore all the more important that people stand together, for whom democracy, law and partnership are important values. Fortunately, we are also experiencing this right now, which gives us hope! And so I hope and we as the congregation of St. Thomas Church hope that our contact and friendship will also remain and grow. I hope to see you all again soon. God bless you and your congregation Christ the King!

Just go to your PayPal account to "make payment" or "send money," and in the recipient's link paste paypal@leipzig.de. For the allocation of the payments, please specify: Sistercities help Kiew/Ukraine.

Payments are transferred daily to Leipzig's bank account at Deutsche Bank. When you send a payment, PayPal will automatically convert the funds to Euros. You can send the funds from a personal or a business PayPal account, and your name as donor will appear in the PayPal reports to the City of Leipzig.

And of course, you may also contribute through Christ the King Church by check or online designated for "Ukraine response."

Fighting has displaced more than 10 million people and forced nearly 4 million to flee Ukraine in Europe's biggest refugee crisis since the end of World War Two, according to the U.N. refugee agency. Most have arrived in Poland, which says it has welcomed 2.3 million people so far.

With a train of refugees arriving from Poland every day in Leipzig, everything is needed: food, clothing, medications, even places to sleep. The famous Messe Leipzig - the huge exhibit halls in Leipzig – have been converted to accommodate refugees. The city is also pleading with private citizen to offer empty apartments, houses, etc. for refugees.

Our sister city, the City of Leipzig, and its sister city Kiyv, our step sister city, urgently need your help. Thank you to all of you from all of us for donating to help refugees from Ukraine.

Immigration – Ukraine

Russia's recent invasion of Ukraine has already led to more than 10 million Ukrainians being displaced. While the Biden administration has announced that the U.S. will admit 100,000 Ukrainian refugees, and provide \$1 billion in humanitarian assistance, there is still need for advocacy urging (a) quick implementation of the plan to admit 100,000 Ukrainians, (b) immediate disbursal of the \$1 billion in aid, (c) immediate implementation of temporary protected status for Ukrainians already in the U.S. (d) granting special student relief to permit Ukrainian students in the U.S. to remain, and (e) rebuilding a robust refugee program to process refugees effectively. Human Rights & International Law

Since the invasion of Ukraine, the international community has shown robust resolve in holding Russia accountable and supporting Ukrainians. But not every military activity bringing devastation and violating international law has been opposed so vigorously. The ongoing war in Yemen has become the world's worst humanitarian crisis, instigated by Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates and supported by the United States. During the 11-year civil war in Syria, supported by various outside partners, almost 7 million Syrians have become refugees in neighboring countries and more than half the Syrian population has been displaced overall. And, Israel's illegal and decades-long acquisition, occupation and annexation of Palestinian land continues without any real action to counter it by the international community. Gender-Based Violence

Gender-based violence increases during conflict and humanitarian crises. The United Nations reports that 1 in 5 refugees or internally displaced women living in humanitarian crisis have experienced sexual abuse. In conflict situations, gender-based violence is sometimes used as a weapon of war. The Keeping Women and Girls Safe from the Start Act, a bill seeking to expand the ability of the U.S. government to prevent gender-based violence and provide early interventions at the onset of humanitarian emergencies, has been introduced in Congress.
