



## **The Rector's Corner**

As you can see, the bulletin has been re-formatted. The Order of Service has been taken out and, in its place, you will see the heading: 'The Proper of the Day' with this morning's hymns. 'The Proper of the Day' is short for 'The Proper Readings of the Day': the Introit Psalm, the Epistle, the Gradual Psalm and the Holy Gospel. Why change the format? For two reasons: first, most people know the Order of Service; however, page numbers are announced for those who may not. Second, taking out the Order of Service creates space for other things.

For example, one area that we will begin to focus on is our Bible knowledge. It is an area that requires our daily attention, not only to increase our knowledge, but also to grow in faith. In the Bible, we have God's own inspired Word to humans. So, the Bible is not just a collection of literature; it is the very Word which "contains all things necessary to salvation." In fact, as Article VI goes on to say, "whatsoever is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby, is not to be required of any man, that it should be believed as an article of the Faith, or be thought requisite or necessary to salvation." (page 700, BCP)

That is an important point: because the Bible is God's Word, it brings us Hope and the offer of salvation. It is a Word of Life – everlasting Life. It is a hopeful Word, and it is a Word with authority. It is the Christian's standard or measure for living – for our thoughts, words and behaviour.

The Catechism puts this all in a helpful, straight-forward way (p. 554)

**Question:** Why ought you to read God's holy Word, the Bible? **Answer:** Because it tells how God has made Himself known to man; and how we may come to know Him, and find salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ in the fellowship of His Church.

**Question:** What does the Church teach about the Bible? **Answer:** The Bible records the Word of God as it was given to Israel, and to His Church, at sundry times and in divers manners; and nothing may be taught in the Church as necessary to man's salvation unless it be concluded or proved therefrom.

**Question**: Where then is the Word of God to be found in all its fullness? **Answer**: In Jesus Christ, His only Son, Who was made man for us and for our salvation.

A final thought -- as someone recently told me: "In prayer, we speak to God. In the Bible, God speaks to us." How blessed we are to have access to His Voice! In thinking about this, Archbishop Thomas Cranmer's words in the Preface to the Great Bible of 1540 may be useful:

"Here may all manner of persons, men, women, young, old, learned, unlearned, rich, poor, priests, laymen, lords, ladies, officers, tenants, and mean men, virgins, wives, widows, lawyers, merchants, artificers, husbandmen, and all manner of persons of what estate or condition soever they be, may in this book learn all things what they ought to believe, what they ought to do, and what they should not do, as well concerning almighty God, as also concerning themselves and all other. Briefly, to the reading of the scripture none can be enemy, but that either be so sick that they love not to hear of any medicine, or else that be so ignorant that they know not scripture to be the most healthful medicine."

Together, let us renew our commitment to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest God's Word.
