Centering Stillness

Presider: Let us hold this moment open to the Spirit of God.

Presider: Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?

All: Do we not know him in the breaking of bread?

The Christ Candle is Lit (this dialogue to be sung 3x)

One: The Light of Christ (sung)

All: Thanks be to God! (sung)

Presider: The grace of Christ Jesus, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

All: And also with you

Luke 24:13-35

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared!

Reflection: Seeing Anew

Fortunate are those who have stood in front of the mid 16th Century Joachim Bueckalaer painting "Kitchen Scene with Christ at Emmaus", which resides at the Maurithaus in The Hague, Netherlands. (Or, if you wish, it is on the Internet in full, brilliant and detailed colour). Looking closely you would see, in the great tradition of Flemish paintings of food, there is cauliflower, pheasant, apples, grouse, pears, pidgeon, onions, grapes, parsnips, cucumbers, and all the requisite plates, goblets, and napkins, jugs of wine, and loaves of bread ready for a feast. Up in the top right hand corner of the painting are three small figures at the door of the inn which houses this sumptuous kitchen scene. For those who are on alert, a feast awaits. For those on alert, resurrection shows up.

Today, Sunday, in all corners of the world, for all of us willing to be on alert, a feast awaits. The feast that awaits is for all who walk discouraged and downhearted on the dusty (or are they, on the Wet Coast, the "muddy" roads of life? just as the two disciples did on the road to Emmaus, sketched today for us by Rembrandt – who preferred sketching and painting the ordinary folk of the day (and we are all the richer for this artistic mirror). Today, in this Easter Season, we are invited to be on alert for resurrection. As we walk along the muddy roads of life, we, like the disciples, are so inclined to pour out our hearts in exhaustive detail all about the woes of the current world to any who will listen. Where do we come across that stranger who calls a halt to this line of complaint, and reminds us of the larger picture – painted for us by the Prophets, the saints, Jesus? Who among us is that stranger who re-minds us of our heritage and our hope?

And then the disciples, just about to reach a place of shelter, nourishment and rest, invites the stranger (the stranger who is poised to go on) "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." Nothing happens quite yet; the moment is almost at hand. That moment when the stranger, seated at table with them, performs the usual Jewish table ritual and "took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them." That was the very moment when their eyes were opened, and they recognized him.". They saw ANEW!...That he vanished from their sight tells us clearly, this is a resurrection moment.

Then the afterthoughts. "Weren't our hearts burning?" Next?..... the return to Jerusalem to find their friends. "The Lord has risen indeed". Then the later reflection "Jesus had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread". Seeing Jesus anew!

All these many years later, all these thousands of miles away, across time and space, mountains and seas, cultures and languages, it is still the same. These moments of breaking bread, whether picnic or park, table or altar....these moments are all connected; are all ONE. For those of us willing to let our eyes be opened anew. For all of us who help to carry each other and share the burdens of others. For all of us who walk the roads of life, and come to this place, this very place, where we hear the ancient holy stories, and who come to know Jesus. Today as always...we are invited, whenever we celebrate Communion or Eucharist, to open the eyes of our soul as we feel the lightness of that tiny wafer (or piece of bread) in our hands, on our tongues. For that is the feast; the bread that has been broken, bread that has been blessed, bread of life that is being shared with you and for you. And so we say things like "The body of our Lord Jesus Christ" "The body of Christ, Bread of Heaven". "The body of Christ, blessed for you". And thus we are invited to respond "Amen, So be it, Make it So, Amen."
