

What is the synod?

The Southeastern Minnesota Synod is a faith community of over 117,000 baptized people in 165 congregations. It is one of the 65 synods that make up the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The synod includes two synod-authorized worshipping communities, two campus ministries, one camp, and many South Sudanese worshippers.

Synod means "to walk together." The three expressions of the ELCA are congregations and specialized ministries, synods, and the churchwide organization. Of the nine regions, the



Southeastern Minnesota Synod is part of region 3. The synod consists of congregations, groups, leaders, and members. Our domestic partner synod is the New England Synod. Our global partners include Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO), Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania - Central Diocese (ELCT-CD), and Evangelical Lutheran Church of Africa – Mission in South Sudan (ELCA-MSS).

The mission of our synod: To walk together proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Five Conferences:

This synod is divided into five conferences: Blue Earth River, Cannon River, Minnesota River, Root River, and Zumbro River. Each serves to cultivate relationships between congregations, provide a community for ministry leaders, select representatives to synod boards and **CANNON RIVER** committees, and create workgroups in alignment with the Goodhue Wabasha mission of the synod. Each holds monthly meetings and annual conference assemblies. Officers are also elected MINNESOTA RIVER **ZUMBRORIVER** to represent each conference. 



The Office of the Bishop is one part of the synod. It exists to accompany congregations and leaders, serve as a bridge between worshipping communities and the churchwide organization, and equip and empower the people in our communities as they proclaim the gospel of Jesus.

While she is likely the first person you will hear from about all things related to stewardship and generosity around the synod, she also happens to be the staff's leading expert on all things gardening. Whether tending her backyard garden, propagating succulents, or starting seedlings, she finds great joy in the practice.

A pastor in this synod since 2009 and a member of the synod office staff since 2014, Emily is currently an Assistant to the Bishop and also the Director of Evangelical Mission (or D-E-M), which is a deployed position with the ELCA churchwide office. Her work includes cultivating congregation vitality by working directly with church councils and staffs to support their stewardship efforts. She provides mission support education throughout the synod and leads the Power and Boundaries workshops. In the office, she

oversees day-to-day finances. Finally, she is the staff liaison to the synod Endowment Committee, Synod Leader Grant Team, and the Committee on Reference and Counsel.

Most weekdays she works from the synod office, and most weekends she is out accompanying congregations. As she discerns the movement of the Holy Spirit, her hope is to help others recognize where the Spirit is moving and learn how to respond—through curiosity, strategic thinking, and financial best practices.

Whether in the garden or on another adventure, Emily often spends time with her spouse, Justin, and their two dogs, Maeve and Finn. With a great passion for glocal (global + local) ministry, Kathy is the first person you want to connect with as you explore what ministry with neighbors could look like in your context. But as you piece together the interests and loves of her life outside of work, it creates greater depth to the leader she is for this synod. A textile artist who sews, weaves, and embroiders embodies her ability to weave in all the loose ends. A hiker of forests and mountains speaks to the adventurer willing to find a new path. Finally, the reader of historical and cultural works is evidence of her curiosity and interest in listening.

Her role on staff includes accompanying the synod's global companions in Tanzania, Colombia, and South Sudan; local and national partners and congregations in immigration ministry through AMMPARO; and local congregations with global companions and local partnerships. Kathy organizes synod- or congregation-wide visits to the U.S./Mexico border, Tanzania, and Colombia. She also stewards the funds received at the synod level designated to global/local ministry.

Work days are spent where needed—in the office, the home office, or on the road to people and communities. Finding daily inspiration in the life of Christ and knowing the relationships shared with people in this synod and across the globe keep her going in this work.

All people are called to love the Lord God with all of your heart, mind, and strength and to love your neighbor as you love yourself. Kathy shows us that embracing our gifts—like hiking, stitching, and reading—allows us to live fully into God's call. The husband of a pastor, and father of two kids and two dogs, Pastor Matt always has something fun or interesting to teach you. (Did you know he has a word that rhymes with orange?) As an assistant to the bishop, he is frequently teaching and learning alongside ministry leaders in this synod. (Probably things more relevant than what rhymes with orange.) Focusing on candidacy, leadership development, and congregation care drives his work.

In the kitchen, when Pastor Matt puts his chef's hat on, he is a firm believer in cooking without a recipe. In the synod's ministry, Matt is doing significant work with what he calls Holy Experiments, where congregations explore what new partnerships might look like. And some of those experiments yield new ministry partnerships. He works closely with pastors and deacons who are in their first call and their congregations. You may even have seen him during a visit to your congregation or assisting with worship on a Sunday.

You will find Matt in the synod office about half of the working hours, but most of the other half is spent out and about with congregations and leaders as needed. Matt believes that together is better, and his work reflects that. Because God loves us, we love each other, no matter what. That is the kind of together Matt is always working for.

While all (or perhaps most?) of his cooking experiments don't work out, and all of the Holy Experiments don't end as imagined, something is learned every time. And that something(s) becomes part of us, and the new creation we are keeps moving forward. Pastor Matt will keep trying, doing, learning, and teaching. She is present with congregations during pastoral transitions and constitution updates. As a part of the Minimum Compensation/Benefits Guidelines Task Force, she is passionate about representing and advocating for congregations and rostered leaders through the decision-making process.

On the weekends, she values being with congregations and is often found in the pulpit and leading worship. During the week, she usually works from the office by day and is off to different congregations several nights a week. If you have the chance to spend time with her, you will understand how deeply she believes that in all times, God is faithful—from the darkest of times to the lightest. Each workday, she can be found in the synod office engaging folks who have questions about mission support or call process, supporting other staff in their work. and sustaining everyone chocolate.

I have been learning a lot about trees. Maybe these are things you already know, but just in case, I will share them with you.

Oak trees develop their taproots first. The taproot grows deep into the soil so that the sapling can access water even in a season of drought. Once the taproot is established, the oak grows lateral roots. Lateral roots are not as deep, but they reach outwards, sometimes up to 90 feet, and create a wide support base. The oak tree needs both types of roots to thrive.

Forests create networks of connection and support underground. Through their underground networks, the oldest trees in a forest provide nourishment and stability for the youngest trees. The whole forest flourishes only when the trees are connected and equally invested in both their health and the health of the whole.

I have been learning a lot about trees and how the ecosystem of a forest might have lessons to teach. It is essential for an oak tree to first establish its taproot's depth, and once that is done, it is just as crucial for its roots to extend out. Young trees depend on the strength and gifts of "mother trees" for their own nourishment and life. In Psalm 1, the psalmist writes,

Happy are those who do not follow the advice of the wicked, or take the path that sinners tread, but their delight is in the law of the Lord, and on God's law they meditate day and night. They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper.

About a year ago, as I approached the midpoint mark in this first term as bishop, a mentor asked me, "What do you hope to focus on in this season?" I told him I wanted to remind our congregations (you!) that you are part of a whole network of congregations (a synod). And that this connection to one another makes us all better. We are made better not for ourselves but for the sake of the gospel in the world.

As we make our way out of a season of intense isolation, it is important to remember we are not alone as individuals or congregations. Each and every one of us has been called to share

in the ministry of Christ Jesus our Lord. iii Each and every one of us is a member of the *one* body of Christ.

We each have a role in the ministry of the whole synod as individuals and congregations. Each congregation's ministry can be fortified and strengthened by the ministry and presence of the congregations around it.

That's why I've been thinking so much about trees. Trees, it seems, know this. Trees know their livelihoods depend on deep *and* wide roots.

We each need a deep taproot, something solid and solitary, rooted in Christ and our communities. We each need a lateral root system, too. This fibrous outreach to other individuals, communities, and congregations connects us to one another.

When we are deeply rooted in Christ and connected in community, we have all that we need to flourish, like trees planted by streams of water.





Committee on Reference and Counsel

In addition, they provide follow up reports to the Synod Council and Synod Assembly on the result of any resolution approved by the Assembly. Endowment Committee

The existence of an Endowment Committee is constitutionally mandated by the synod's constitution. They enjoy working together and collaborating and are honored to be tasked with uplifting the ministry accomplished through the synod's endowed and restricted funds.

Faith Formation Table

The synod's Faith Formation Network is led by the Faith Formation Table. The table consists of representatives from the five synod conferences. chairperson, а and representative from Good Earth Village. The network is open to all who minister with and care about children, youth, and family ministry in their congregation. The network meets monthly, from August through May, and uses this time to share questions, support, and the ups and downs of ministry. All are welcome! (Rostered leaders, lay staff, volunteers, parents, grandparents, family, and godparents!)

In the past year, the network was able to meet in person again! Which was a tremendous change from the Zoom meetings. One of the challenges the table has faced is that many have had life changes that impacted their participation, so they are looking for some new representatives! You can find them on Facebook or join them for monthly meetings.

If you have ministry leaders working with families in your congregation, you might have already experienced the impacts of their work. If your leaders are unfamiliar, point them to the website or contact the table and let them know. The table exists to serve ministry leaders, but they can only do that if they know the leaders are there.

The network is a supportive place where anyone can feel welcomed, heard, and equipped. And the friendships and support that grow in this space are what keep many people going. "We are better when we work together!"

Synod Leader **Grant Team**

The Synod Leader Grant Team meets four times per year to allocate grants through an application process for synod leaders and future leaders of the church. They focus on four areas of clergy/church life: Seminary Scholarships, First Call Debt Reduction, Continuing Education, and Sabbaticals. Generally upporting the health and wellness of church leaders through grants and scholarships is a top priority.

In the last year, they received a generous \$15,000 grant from the Carl and Verna Schmidt Foundation making it possible to relaunch sabbatical grants for the first time in years! Six leaders and four congregations received funds through this grant.

They were also able to provide two debtrelief grants to leaders in their first calls, 10 continuing education grants, one rural ministry scholarship, and three Synod Fund for Leaders scholarships to seminarians!

It is important to this team to continue to find ways that expand access to sabbaticals, especially among our smaller, rural and multipoint congregations. They are striving to get a deeper understanding of the barriers in order to better support leaders congregations.

They look forward to continuing to build awareness of the various granting pathways that exist for seminarians and actively serving rostered ministers. There are also dreams of identifying a long-term funding stream to support the ministry of sabbaticals in the life of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod.

- the vision of the global (international and local) ministries of the SEMN Synod
- accompaniment connections between synod congregations and global companions (Colombia, Central Diocese of Tanzania, South Sudan) and global/local ministries (AMMPARO, Hunger)
- coordination of the five global teams: AMMPARO, Colombia Accompaniment, Hunger, Medical Ministry, Tanzania Accompaniment
- oversight of GM Table budget
- communication with synod congregations and individuals on ministry opportunities, including upcoming synod border immersion experiences and visits to global companions. Watch for these in RC Weekly, the SEMN Synod's weekly digital newsletter!

Individuals and congregations throughout the synod have been impacted by the work of this dynamic Table! Perhaps you participated in an adult education presentation about the synod's global ministries. Your congregation may have received one of nine SEMN Synod Food Ministry Grants. Your congregation might have recently welcomed a new immigrant to your community. Or someone came to your church and shared about their synod-sponsored visit to the U.S./ Mexico borderlands. Perhaps Pastor Deborah Lyanga preached or presented on a Sunday morning. If you used any of the 40 Together Lenten materials, provided or accessed food donations at a local food shelf, engaged in The God Who Sees book study, or experienced A Migrant Journey, you have seen what this table is up to!

In 2022, visits to our global companions resumed with Bishop Hassanally and Kathy Chatelaine (Assistant to the Bishop for Global Ministry) participating in the installation of the new bishop of the Central Diocese of Tanzania – and then visited education and health care ministries throughout the diocese. In early 2023, 24 people representing 12 congregations

throughout the synod engaged in a border immersion visit hosted by a borderland ministry partner. In August, the Table hosted Rev. Wal Reat, an ELCA missionary to South Sudan.

The Global Ministry Table consists of rostered and lay leaders who are passionate about forming accompaniment relationships with all people. They strive to live out the idea that each person is created in the image of God and is a child of God and, following Jesus' command to love your neighbor, i.e. each child of God, as you love yourself. As awareness grows about the unique relationships we share with local and international communities, the hope is that more and more people will become a part of this transformational ministry! The exponential growth in the ministries called "global," including the growing relationships between synods, congregations, and individuals, and the new relationships created as awareness spreads inspire this table to continue to flesh out Jesus' words of "Feed the hungry. Welcome the stranger." (Matthew 25)

Continuous Growth Pathway (CGP) is a unique partnership of the Southeastern and Southwestern Minnesota ELCA Synods and Gustavus Adolphus College. 

Its purpose is to collect, organize, and make available the permanently valuable records of the synods and ministries of Region 3 (the synods of Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota). Ultimately, they exist to collect and tell the stories of ministry relevant to the ELCA. Additionally, they will work with congregations to create their own archives, teach how to celebrate anniversaries, write an effective history, and more.

Located on the Luther Seminary campus in Gullixson Hall, the office is where you might find Paul Daniels, the archivist for Region 3. In the last year, they have handled over 840 individual, congregation, and synod reference requests. Over 150 congregation historical and 410 biographical items were added last year. Once processed and organized, these items are available for research. Daniels hopes to have more articles for his "Ask the Archivist" column soon, which started in this synod's newsletter.

Benevolence funds from all nine synods keep the work going. And the collection only grows when people like you send helpful materials their way. The more pieces of the puzzle they have, the clearer the picture of the church becomes. Daniels hopes that this archives ministry will help inform, challenge, and build the body of Christ in Region 3 and beyond.

The LCC is an ELCA-based campus ministry serving Winona State and Saint Mary's Universities in Winona. They accompany students during the pivotal crossroads moments of their life as they transition into and out of college. Campus ministry also serves faculty and staff, as well as community members, especially young adults. They exist for more than just Lutherans, while remaining rooted in Lutheran theology. They are also part of the Winona Interfaith Council. The mission statement is: "Working Together. Living Through Faith. Taking Action in Our World."

The stories of the Holy Spirit working through this ministry are deep and many. There are students who have no connection to Christianity that find welcome and nourishment through this space and community. Alumni return to share gifts and messages for students they have never met, because they understand the power of what happens here. The board members who drop in with packages of yogurt and fresh-baked scones, ready to respond to additional needs, find joy there, too. The pandemic effects continue. When a whole class of students doesn't get to experience college life in person, valuable connection points are lost. Giving from institutions was down, but individuals came through. Through the challenges, the stories continue to flow and the Spirit continues. And the stories of how LCC is carried into the world through alumni are deep. New growth is already visible, as some pre-pandemic pieces fade away. LCC is an amazing example of how church is about

trying new things, listening, pivoting, and then trying again.

You can support this ministry! Prayers for Lutheran campus ministry across the nation is coveted. During the school year weekly meals are provided for students, and you could be part of that. Finally, financial support is how LCC can exist, and currently half of their budget is coming from individuals.

When asked why the LCC should continue to exist, one student said, "The LCC is a place where God's abundant love is not just talked about, but felt. And, it's a community where faith is at your own pace."

In the words of a former student: "You did not seek to change me, or control me. You accepted and loved me for who I was at every moment."
