## Dear faithful people of Christ the King Evangelical Lutheran Church:

They are all about baptism: its gift, remembrance, and renewal; and the life

baptism promises and gives. "They" in that sentence are the Sundays in Lent and the Easter Vigil, arguably the single most important liturgy – and among the most ancient – in the Christian Church.

Our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection and the new way of living it gives is at the core of every Sunday in Lent. That is never more true than it's been this past Lent. After the First Sunday in Lent, every Sunday's Gospel has been from the Gospel according to John. Those texts call us to see ourselves as inquiring Nicodemus; accepted and renewed as the Samaritan woman at the well; "blind but now we see" as the blind man healed by Jesus; and raised from death to life as Lazarus, the friend whom Jesus raised. Put simply (and a bit corny), Nicodemus, the woman, the blind man, and Lazarus are us! Even as Lent concludes, there's still an opportunity for each of us to read those Gospels and find ourselves in them.

Baptism and the life baptism promises and gives is the radiating core of the Easter Vigil. In the early Christian community, already by the mid-300s, this <u>exact</u> liturgy flowed from the lighting of the "new fire" and Paschal Candle, through the readings from the Hebrew scriptures (each prefiguring baptism) and gushed into the baptism of new Christians and from there flowed smoothly into the first of several gifts of baptism, participation by the newly baptized into the community meal, their first taste of the Body and Blood of Christ with their fellow Christians.

This liturgy is common to both eastern Orthodox and western Christian communions but was lost in the West for several hundred years. It was restored to most "catholic" church bodies beginning in the 1950s and became an official part of American Lutheran worship with the publication of the green <u>Lutheran</u> <u>Book of Worship in 1978</u>, using the same ancient order of service I've stated above, flowing to and from baptism (or affirmation of baptism when no one is available to be baptized) and flowing from baptism into the first communion of Easter was what we celebrated and used.

We are restoring that order to our Easter Vigil this year. You see, for the last several years, memorialized in <u>Evangelical Lutheran</u> <u>Worship</u>, that order with baptism at its core, was altered and that baptismal emphasis was, in my opinion, diluted. That change began as the Roman Catholic communion altered the liturgical order to be more like a typical Saturday vigil mass. Lutherans and a few others followed suit. I'm not really sure why. In my opinion, that adjusted order put more emphasis on each part and made the baptismal core more difficult to discern and experience.

Lent and the Easter Vigil, you see, is all about <u>all of us</u> as the risen Body of Christ and not, strictly speaking, about <u>one</u> truly human being, Jesus Christ – Passion (Palm) Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday are for the most part solely about Christ; almost a re-enacting of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection. We all should participate in these as we remember what God in Christ has done for us.

But the Lent we are now concluding, the Vigil we will shortly do together, and the Sundays of Easter to Pentecost are all about us, our life and our future. That's the purpose of this article because that's the purpose of these days. So come, beloved of God in Christ, celebrate the risen Christ and remember also to celebrate us! Because God for us is precisely what these days are all about and the chief reason for bringing our "alleluias" back!

On May 7th, Pastor Rodriguez and members of his cohort will be leading a discussion on immigration during the Sunday Forum hour.

#### Update from the Lutheran Church in Peru (IL-P)

Since the failed coup and arrest of former President Pedro Castillo in December 2022, supporters of Castillo have protested throughout major cities in Peru. In response, the government of the acting President Dina Boluarte has responded with force



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against the protestors. Jorge Aguilar-Pereda of Trujillo, Peru, acting lay pastor of our sister congregations in that city, has repeatedly assured Pastor Rodriguez of their safety and expressed his disgust with the lack of leadership at all levels of government. Though largely unaffected by the majority of the protests in the southern part of Peru,

Jorge recently shared the devasting effects of a recent storm on the city, loss of many homes, mud slides, disruption of services. (See photos). Below is a letter published by the Presiding Pastor of the Lutheran Church in Peru, expressing a similar frustration against a government disposed against its people. #### Letter from the Presiding Pastor Pedro Bullon (IL-P) urging the acting President of Peru to resign *Translation by Pastor Sergio Rodriguez*

## Time has run out! The loss of life must also come to an end!

#### President Dina Boluarte, Resign Now!

Approximately two months ago, we lauded the beginning of your presidency as one grounded in the promise to address corruption, and the stalemate in government. You promised to form a government that would truly be representative of Peruvians, everywhere. We too share a common desire for this new government to convoke a general election, ensuring the kinds of reforms that would strengthen our democratic institutions and protect the basic human rights, prioritizing the most urgent needs of the populace.

However, in these past sixty days, you have done and permitted the contrary. According to the report of the

Department for the Defense of the Populace, since 5 February 2023, 47 civilians have died in civil protests, 11 have died as a result of events relating to the protests, and 1 member of law enforcement. Similarly, there have been 1229 cases of bodily injury, and 700 arrests by law enforcement officers, many of whom relate inhumane and degrading treatment.

Madam President, urging your resignation ought not to define us as terrorists or accomplices to the acts of vandalism unrelated to the protests at hand. We reject violence in all forms, and in particular those acts which, as the Nuncio, Paolo Rocco declares, "hide more insidious forms of violence, and which devalue difference, especially when such difference seems to threaten special interests. As a result, Madam President, in the name of God and the pain of the families and communities deeply damaged by the loss of their loved ones, we urge you: "End this repression! Resign now!"

# SOCIAL STATEMENTS of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA)

We continue this ongoing series highlighting the ELCA's **SOCIAL STATEMENTS** shared as summaries by Rev. George Brookover.

**SUFFICIENT, SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD FOR ALL** (Adopted by the 1999 Churchwide Assembly in Denver, Colorado by a two-thirds vote).

Economic life pervades our lives—the work we do, the income we receive, how much we consume and save, what we value, and how we view one another. An economy (*oikonomia* or "management of the household") is meant to meet people's material needs. The current market-based economy does that to an amazing degree; many are prospering as never before. At the same time, others continue to lack what they need for basic subsistence. Out of deep concern for those affected adversely, we of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America here assess economic life today in light of the moral imperative to seek *sufficient, sustainable livelihood for all*.

Pursuing policies and practices that will lead to "sufficient, sustainable livelihood for all" is such a formidable challenge that to many it seems unrealistic or not worth the effort. The Church as an employer, property owner, consumer, investor, and community of believers can be as caught up in the reigning economic assumptions as the rest of society. But despite the Church's failings, through the Word and the sacraments, we are forgiven, renewed, and nourished. At the Table, we together receive the same bread and drink of the same cup. What we receive is sufficient; it does sustain us. We are strengthened to persist in the struggle for justice as we look forward to the coming of God's kingdom in all its fullness.

We are sent forth into the world to bear witness to God's promised reign. The world is the whole household of God that economic life is intended to serve. The Spirit of God expands our vision and transforms our priorities. We realize that we do not eat alone; everyone needs to eat. The multitudes present around God's global table become our neighbors rather than competitors or strangers. Empowered by God, we continue to act, pray, and hope that through economic life there truly will be sufficient, sustainable livelihood for all. The following are the implementing resolutions. To adopt "Sufficient, Sustainable Livelihood for All" as a social statement of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, in accordance with "Policies and Procedures of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America for Addressing Social Concerns" (1997). *The following items are the Implementing Resolutions:* 

- To call upon members of this church to pray, work, and advocate that all might have a sufficient, sustainable livelihood, and to draw upon this statement in forming their own judgments and actions in their ministries in daily life;
- To call upon our bishops, pastors, and other rostered leaders to give renewed attention to how Scripture, liturgy, preaching, hymnody, and prayers may express God's will for economic life and empower a faith active for justice, and to provide leadership in seeking economic justice in their communities;
- To challenge all congregations, synods, and churchwide units to carry out the substance and spirit of this statement and intensify their work with various ecumenical, interfaith, and secular groups in pursuit of its commitments;
- To encourage the education, service, and outreach ministries of this church in their work for economic justice;
- To urge churchwide units and affiliated organizations (social ministry organizations, schools, colleges/ universities, and seminaries) to review and adjust their programs and practices in light of this social statement;
- To direct the Division for Church in Society, in cooperation with other churchwide units, to provide leadership, consultation, and educational and worship resources on the basis of this statement, particularly through the development of resources that interpret this statement and develop its implications for different arenas of responsibility;
- To direct the Division for Church in Society to expand its work in advocating for corporate social responsibility, in assisting with community economic development, and in public policy advocacy that furthers the various commitments made in this statement;

## SUFFICIENT, SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD FOR ALL continues...

 To call upon the members of this church to give generously to the World Hunger Appeal of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, so that the Lutheran World Federation, Lutheran World Relief, domestic hunger grants, and our partner ecumenical agencies might do more in helping to alleviate the causes and consequences of hunger, poverty, and injustice; and to call upon the members of this church to participate actively in supporting these and similar ministries; and

 To call upon the educational institutions of this church schools, colleges, universities, seminaries, continuing education centers, camps, and retreat centers to develop programs and educational resources in light of this statement so people can be better prepared to respond to the challenges of economic life.

Mature trees store and continue to absorb large amounts of carbon in addition to providing the public with clean drinking water, habitat for imperiled wildlife, and world-class recreational opportunities. Larger, older trees are also more fire resistant. **Support a Better Farm Bill** – The Farm Bill is up for reauthorization.
