# **Associate Pastor**

Halloween is a big deal in our neighborhood. Many families must spend hundreds (maybe thousands??) of dollars on decorations, 10-foot-tall demons and other terrifying delights. One home in particular put together a haunted house that ran through their front yard, garage and entryway of their house. My 6 year-old son, Lincoln, has never experienced a haunted house so I was a bit nervous for him as I watched him timidly walk through the mummy and goblin guarded door. As I waited for him at the exit, I heard various screams, witnessed other frightened children, and began to worry about a tear-filled, terrified child reaching me upon escaping the haunted house. Instead, he came out with a look of pure joy, babbling and breathless about all he had encountered along the way. Lincoln barely slowed down as he ran back to the entrance while letting me know he was going to go through it again. He repeated this more times than I could count. And not only that, but he got his little friend, who was pretty terrified, to join him for those return visits.

Being one of your pastors felt the same as Lincoln's first encounter with a haunted house. This was my first year at Desert Cross where we could gather together for ministry. And there was some trepidation as to what ministry and the church looked like on this side of a once in a 100-year event. In spite of those fears, we moved ahead and accomplished a lot in the past year. While there is no way to encapsulate all that has happened in 2022, here are some of my highlights.

- \*Carolyn Perkins put together a children's Christmas pageant at our Gilbert campus that was delightful. The children and adults were hilarious and also showed wonderful acting and singing skills. We have many future entertainers/performers on our hands. In typical Desert Cross fashion, we also collected toys at the end of the pageant that went to families in need at Jose's closet.
- \*We hired Katelyn Williamson to be our Director of Youth and Family ministry. She brings incredible gifts and has already begun to share them in so many ways that enhance our lives together.
- \*The first annual spaghetti dinner/youth talent show was a wonderful success. Witnessing the incredible talent of so many of our youth while eating great spaghetti was a lot of fun. I'm excited to see the ways this event grows in 2023 and beyond.
- \*I got to experience VBS for the first time in-person at Desert Cross. It was so much fun to see how much fun all of the children and adults had throughout the week. My son Lincoln continues to ask when it will be VBS again.
- \*The women's tea was a wonderful event during Advent. I was honored to lead the devotion and amazed to see the fellowship hall in Gilbert turned into a generation to generation inspired high tea room.
- \*I co-led a grief class with our parish nurse, Denise Viker. It was a great opportunity to gather together with those who are grieving the death of a loved one. We laughed and cried and let one another know that this is what a church community looks like.

There is no doubt that this time as Church can be scary. We look around and don't see as many familiar faces as we saw before. We notice that once popular ministries look different than before. We wonder what comes next, what scary beast is around the corner, and how we will navigate all the fearful, future

unknowns. I don't have good answers to those questions and would be skeptical of anyone who thought they knew the answer for sure. But this year has been a reminder that we don't encounter 10-foot-tall demons alone. We continue to be a community that steps into scary spaces and comes out the other end and maybe even says, "Yes, let's do that again." I'm thankful to be on this journey with you.

Our Council Team had change as well, Glenn Tischaefer stepped down from his President role after our Annual Meeting in February and I moved into the role accordingly stepping up from Vice President. We elected and welcomed Adam Clark and Carolyn Perkins to Council roles this year and thanked Stan Fernandes, Patrick Jennett, and Anna Sion for completion of their terms. Finally, we thanked Anna Radermacher for her service as Council Secretary as she resigned her role and we welcomed Haley Perez to the team.

We successfully reviewed and approved our 2023 budget thanks to the utilization of our new technology. # City of Tempe Landscaping Water Grant: Tom Rewolinski

- This is informational to keep the congregation informed
- Our irrigation system needs replacement and has major leaks that cannot be repaired. We are wasting a lot of water which is costly and not good stewardship
- City of Tempe is offering grants towards replacing irrigation
  - o Ranges from \$1,000- \$60,000
- Deadline to apply is May 31<sup>st</sup>
- We are unsure of the extent of our current irrigation issues or cost to replace- have a landscaper looking at it this week to give us a quote (will eventually have 3 quotes)
- Projected savings of \$800 monthly with properly working irrigation after the completion of project
- How to pay for repairs?
  - We have to pay total amount upfront
  - We will be reimbursed for it after if we receive grant
  - We do not have to accept the grant if we are offered one
- If we accept the grant we are obligated to finish all the work by June 2023
- We are spending well over \$2,000 a month right now in water
- Options to pay:
  - Borrowing funds/applying for grants
  - o Special Campaign
- We are going to proceed to look at options
  - We will then hold a special meeting once we know the total cost and grant amount has been determined

- John Christensen- who is the lead on this? Tom and Bill; John is chair of the Endowment Committee and says to apply for a grant
- Shelley- Are we getting an estimate?
   Yes; More than one? Yes, eventually over time
- Suze- Are we sure we do not have to have more than one bid for Tempe?
   Yes, we are sure; we have checked several times.
- Laura- Could Thrivent give us a loan or match our amount? We are not sure, but are looking into it
- Melanie- Is the fountain water connected to the landscape water? We do not feel so, but do not know for sure. However, that leaks as well
- Vince- What are some other options we are looking into, so we can avoid going into debt? His suggestion is to completely turn off the water and plant plants that do not need water or much of it to survive. As our church is 30 years old and we may have more expenses coming down the pipeline.
- Barb- says we can not just let the mature trees die and we would have to take the plants out. This could become more costly than watering.
- Melanie- She sees some wonderful community gardens around here, and would like to see us do this.
- Susan Maas- Do we have a grant writer?
  Because the deadline is May 31st. It is
  just an application and we are on the
  final step with getting a bid from a
  landscaper.
- Don Legacie- Are these grants
   competitive? Are we guaranteed the
   grant or an amount? No, we are not.
   This is just informational- we will hold a
   meeting once we know the result.
- Janet Langley- What are we getting a bid for? To see what we would need for the irrigation and to comply with the application for the grant.

- O Can we provide a bid for going all the way green? (water conservation) Something we could ask as a follow up. Regardless of the grant this just sounds like a catalyst to finally start addressing fixes for our irrigation system.
- Stan Fernandes- quick clarification- we submit the application and then in June a grant will be awarded. We get assurance from the grant before we start the project.
- Lola- Says there is more complication to this because we have to follow the city's master plan that needs fixing. Yes, we know. Again this is just an informational meeting.
- Barb K.- It is a replacement of the irrigation system, with very little repair due to the major issues.

### **RENEW: Tom Rewolinski**

- Project was suspended in December until this meeting
- Council recommendation is to re engage the RENEW Team

- Suze Scott- Feels that we should do lighting and safety first due to cost savings and for safety. Council agrees.
- There were two project proposals in December. Why is there only one now?
   We combined them to make one and changed replace pews/carpet in sanctuary to clean them.
- Don Pelley- You identified three projects, in using the entire money for these projects. Can you tell us the other projects that were taken off the table? Rebid before we know the costs. Yes there were other projects like replacing the water stations, new pews, cleaning the bricks in the narthex area, and cleaning the carpet in the sanctuary. Trying to go within the limits of the money we had and are trying to get as much of the projects as we can. Also identified 4 projects including the fountain.
- Shannon Burns- Could we use the money from RENEW money for the irrigation system? We talked as a council and did not feel it was right to use it for that because the initial intent was to use the money for the interior of our church.
- Adam Clark- So we do not have a bid for the RENEW stuff that is current and the irrigation? Correct.
- Mark Sanders- Do we still have all the people from the RENEW committee?
   What's the plan? First step is to re engage the team and everyone on the

- team said yes that they would continue. We are going to reach out to those who bid earlier and see where they are at now.
- Don Pelley- Item number 2 says that we would authorize the RENEW committee to spend \$94,000? We are giving them money to prioritize the projects that fit within that amount.
- Janet Langley- There will not be another meeting for us all to vote? Correct, we are asking the congregation to approve the amount and to give the committee the responsibility to fulfill the most important projects while staying within the budget.
- Mark Sanders- as we go through the process of voting that we sometimes miss the process. He trusts the council and the committee, but does not feel comfortable with us authorizing the expenditure of the money without coming back to the congregation. We will communicate electronically what is happening.




# Financial Review

On December 5, 2021, the congregation of Desert Cross Lutheran Church (DCLC) approved a 2022 Budget in the amount of \$1,148,000. This was a decrease from the prior year of \$160,000 with cuts being made to Benevolence and adjustments to staffing positions.

The restricted cash of \$92,536 is offsetting the General Fund which is currently (\$70,768) and is comprised of 32 designated funds such as, but not limited to, tenant security deposits, land sale proceeds, bequeathed gifts, grants, and specific ministry support.

The Mission Fund Account and Brokerages are current balances in accounts used for processing non-cash contributions such as stocks and certificates of deposits. Finally, the remaining cash asset of \$24,333 is that of the RENEW Campaign which saw some project completions in 2022 – see page 25.

General Fund contributions had been up following a few years of declines but were down 7% year-of-year in 2022. The increase in Other income includes the \$42,000 in non-cash prepaid rent in 2022 as compared to the \$21,000 (half year) in 2021. This non-cash income will be counted at \$42,000 again in 2023 and \$21,000 in 2024.

All information included in these accounting records is the responsibility of the management of Desert Cross Lutheran Church.

Our procedures were performed based on the recommendation of the Treasurer of the ELCA. The information subjected to a limited sampling of the general accounting within the church, including the process and procedures involved with cash receipts, accounts payable and vouchers, bank reconciliations, member contributions and pledges, payroll and withholding tax, and general insurance coverage.

The church audit committee members are pleased with the records we reviewed and the documentation that supported them. There are no significant findings to report to management.

# **Media Production**

2022 has truly flown by in an instant, and so I would like to take this opportunity to highlight a few things that have been accomplished.

### AVDC

- We built a team with a solid core of volunteers over the course of 2022 to help in and around the booth for worship services.
- I implemented Dante technology in the Sanctuary (audio over the network), which led to great
  improvements in livestream audio. The Sanctuary can now potentially be used as a recording
  studio, small concert venue, or podcast recording location. I am currently working on getting
  certification to be a Dante engineer, which will come in handy when we want to expand our
  broadcasting and recording capabilities in the future.
- We added a TV in the Narthex to show the Desert Cross news at all times.
- We added a tv in the Sanctuary so that whoever is up front can see what the people see on the big screens.
- Working closely with the Renew team, we now have 3 live stream cameras instead of 2. The lighting in the Sanctuary has been upgraded as well.

  work properly. So, I decided to install a new, much cheaper system that hasn't given us any
  trouble at all since installment.
- The Church App has had major improvements and improving it more will be an ongoing process throughout 2023. For example, the live stream is now accessible on the app.

# **Music Ministries**

Chancel Choir: A year ago after the Pandemic, we started up with only nine members and we have now grown to 15 members. We start each rehearsal with a devotion based on the Lectionary for the day (Sunday rehearsals) and a hymn then go on to work on sectionals and progress to full ensemble singing. We are doing much more complex music that the members enjoy singing and the congregation enjoys hearing for worship, especially recent feedback we have received. I have been updating our library with pieces that have a "fresh" sound for today's singers. We are excited to have been invited to sing the cantata with the Desert Cross Choir at Tempe on March 30<sup>th</sup> and April 2<sup>nd</sup>. We have been able to grow as a choir thanks to having a regular accompanist to play for us since September. Our choir never had someone to play until the day we performed an anthem, and only were able to go through it with them once or twice, all the credit going to these members who hung in there to make this work since 2016. So, having an accompanist every week has made a huge difference for us, allowed us to grow and made the experience more fulfilling for our members. We are honored to serve this congregation.

Junior Choir: Junior Choir started up again a year ago to sing for Easter with 5 members. In the Fall 2022, we learned several anthems and also produced a Christmas play called "Room for Christmas" on December 18th and they did a fantastic job plus they conducted a successful toy drive to benefit Jose's Closet, a charity for Foster children supported by Desert Cross. This year the toys collected went straight to the Navaho Reservation, making a lot of kids very happy, many of whom had never received a gift at Christmas at all. We start each rehearsal with a devotion in "God's Gift Box" based on the Lectionary for the next day. They are fun too. For Reformation, we did the "Martin Luther Game Show" so they could learn about who Martin Luther was and all he did for believers the world over. We work on 3 songs per rehearsal using the outstanding Choristers Guild anthems, specifically composed for children with worthy text and melody. Choristers Guild is a publisher of choral music for churches with some of the best composers known today for children's, youth and adult, and handbell choirs. Dr. Anton Armstrong of St Olaf College is among the founders and past Board member, as well as many well known composers of Lutheran hymnody, such as Ronald Nelson whose hymns are in the ELW. I myself, earned a 3 year Certificate in Children's Worship and Choir Methods from Choristers Guild in 2012. Junior Choir exists to allow our children to take an active role in church worship leadership and to prepare to be "tomorrow's worshippers". This year, they have learned to read the Gospel for services, sing with inflection and beauty and to be an example to others their age. They have learned several hymns of the church as well as anthems. They are a delightful part of Gilbert worship! We are grateful for this opportunity to serve the congregation. I am also grateful to Pastor Thadd who has been an invaluable resource of help for special things the Jr Choir presents at services.

Instrumental Ensemble: This is a new group that started up in May 2022 with 5 members: Flutes: Laura Book and Liz Rewolinski, Violins: Ariane Nannenga, Leanna Ihlefeld, Carolyn Perkins and Alice Pfau, Cello: Gabriel Ihlefeld. This group as a start-up, rehearsed all summer and provided special music to the congregation about once a month. Since that time, this group accompanied the Joint Choirs of Gilbert and SOJ for Reformation Sunday, provided several numbers for fall, Advent and Christmas services, and now are able to play music specifically for ensembles and accompany hymns about twice a month for preludes and special music. We are hoping to grow and are pleased that this group is open to players of all abilities, as well as seeing so many of our talented young persons being able to play for services.

# Youth Ministry Report

The year has come to an end, and that means it's time for the youth ministry report. I am the new director of the youth ministry at Desert Cross Lutheran Church, and I have been here for about eight months. It has been a great experience so far. Desert Cross is more than just a place of worship; it is also a place where people go to find answers to their problems and salvation. Desert Cross is a home for the hearts of God's children. It is a place where teen believers can grow in their faith and have fellowship with each other. Each year, many young people join the church as children and teenagers. Youth and their families join the church to find happiness in its environment and to have Christ's presence in their lives. I aim for DCLC to be a chief outpost for the Gospel of Christ among our youth. We have created an environment in which: students feel safe, the individual students and their relationships experience the restorative work of the Gospel, students can reach out to friends and family members with the love and grace they have received from Christ, and students are equipped to live faithfully in the Body of Christ, their family, and their community. Here is a small snip of what has been happening in the youth ministry world.

### Sr. and Jr. High Nights:

Each week, we have a new theme that we do fun activities, games, questions, and bible study around. Here are a few ideas of the themes we have used in the past few months. I want to thank Mark, Laurie, Josh, and Allen for the fantastic job that they do each Sunday providing a safe place for students to grow their relationship with the Lord.

# **Children's Ministry**

Faith Formation: DCLC is committed to nurturing our children, youth, and the adults who love them as we discover and experience God and community throughout life's journey. Faith Formation allows us to worship, serve, and learn together! We LOVE having the kids in worship and an education time for all ages. Education is at both sites and consists of an opening time with music, and then kids explore the gospel and theme of the month through fun and interactive ways. Parents can attend the adult forum offered at the same time. Those with children under the age of 3 can attend Littlest Lutherans. We continue to update our Faith Formation website which includes playlists for children, youth, and adults to engage in faith from home or on the go! Each month we have a new theme and new activities. The faith formation website also has monthly resources that we post that relate to faith. We offer "DCLC Serves" events and fellowship events in the fall and spring. We love having the opportunity for the congregation to serve and have fun together. I am so thankful for the amazing teachers at Desert Cross who share their hearts and time. They do God's work beautifully! Thanks to Natalie Smith for her partnership in children's ministry. Also, thanks to our amazing families for their commitment and participation!

<u>Faith Milestones:</u> Our 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4th graders received instruction for *Holy Communion* at a workshop during Lent and received their First Communion on Maundy Thursday.

We did Blessing of the Backpacks in August. The 1st graders received Bibles in September. Moms with new babies receive a new mom devotion book and kids that are baptized receive a card and invitations to our programs.

<u>Family Night:</u> January-May we were in the midst of our Parenting for Faith course with our family nights. Adults did the Parenting for Faith course which entails some engaging videos and group discussions. The youth and kids did a service project, and then the youth had a confirmation lesson while the kids did fun games and activities. Then this school year, August-December we went back to everyone being together and enjoying a night of fun. We had a game night in September, but the movie night in November had to be cancelled. It was a busy time of year. A huge thank you to the amazing dinner team for the yummy dinners! Thank you to the volunteers who help make these nights possible and the families that join us for the fun!

<u>Joyful Noises-Parent-Tot:</u> This outreach program is rewarding for all. It is fun to watch the children learn the routines, songs, and prayers. It has also been a great fellowship time for the caregivers! It is truly a joy to work with these kids and families. We had some graduate out over the summer, but we had new ones join with the new school year.

<u>Kids Connect/Parents Connect:</u> Natalie continues to meet with the kids once a month for games, crafts, planned activities and lots of fun. Laura Book had a great idea for the parents to meet at a restaurant nearby while the kids are having fun. That way the parents get fellowship time too!

<u>Vacation Bible School:</u> : Vacation Bible School this past summer (June 2022) was back in person. Hip-hip-hooray! We had about 45 kids attend, 15 of which were from other churches and 12 who do not have a home church. We had about 55 awesome volunteers! It is a lot of work and preparation, but the result is worth it...an amazing faith-filled week where volunteers and kids are learning about our Awesome God! The focus was on how God is with us everywhere, God loves us no matter what, God is in charge, God is stronger than anything, and God is surprising! For the service project the kids brought

in change to help children on the reservation get much needed school supplies. The proceeds went to a local ELCA affiliated school on the Navajo reservation called Navajo Mission Preparatory School in Rock Point, AZ. The kids raised \$125.94 and with a Hunger Jar donation and a matching grant we were able to send \$1,582.74 to this school. They were so appreciative! We look forward to 2023's VBS where we will head to space!

Service Sundays/Fellowship Events: Service Sundays are a time for ALL generations to gather and work together to serve others! In January we packed hygiene packs for those in need and in March we had a Donut Day at both campuses. In October we had a Sundae Sunday, and a Service Sunday where we gathered all generations to make snack bags for those in need. The Crop Walk was in Ahwatukee this year and we had a great team of volunteers who participated. Gilbert hosted their annual Trunk or Treat event, and the youth and council hosted a spaghetti dinner/talent show in December. We have such wonderful families here at Desert Cross and we value the opportunity and time to gather for fun, service, and fellowship!

I want to thank the Desert Cross staff, council, congregation, families, and children for making this another year full of blessings at Desert Cross. I look forward to this upcoming year!

# Parish Nurse

"Nurses are trusted with the most precious things on earth: the life, health, and happiness of other human beings" -Isabel Hampton Robb-Founder of Nursing Theory.

I worked reduced hours in 2022 due to budget constraints for Desert Cross. This led to a decrease in the programming and support I was able to offer to the community. For example, we maintained services from the Stephen Ministry program, but did not offer any new growth opportunities. We had a few of our Stephen Ministers leave the program but Ron Diegle, Dave Lanstrom, Heidi Maxson, Kathy Whiting, and Cindy Wilkinson continue to serve the program. I offered grief support classes in spring and fall.

I led fewer wellness classes and did fewer visits with individuals. However, I was able to work with Victoria English during Lent to offer a *Sugar Fast* book group. We began a new structured way to look at wellness through our FAN-Faith, Activity, Nutrition program. The FAN committee consisting of Dawn Collins, Jackie Jones, Susan Tischaffer joined with Parish Nurse ministry to offer a few opportunities this year. We made a healthy granola recipe which we shared with both fellowship offerings on Sunday morning in January and had a butternut squash soup shared by a student nurse in November. In between time, we encouraged the congregation to move their bodies, drink more water and focus on whole-person wellness. We have a small presence on the website and on bulletin boards at each site.

I implemented a new documentation and reporting system for 2022. This system allows me to keep required health records but also allows confidentiality in reporting Parish Nurse activities. I logged over 180 individual visits with 10% of those being with non-members. A total of 164 were women, 16 were men. I provided support for many things including for those coping with cancer, caregiving issues, chronic disease management and mental health challenges. I offered prayer, presence, advocacy, health information, and referrals to community resources. Outcomes for the people included increased understanding of available resources and options, improved participation in health care decision making and stronger coping strategies.

Thanks to the generous donations from the congregation, we were able to reopen the nursery during worship services at both sites in September. We have hired and trained teens to be nursery attendants for our youngest members. The nursery staff, consisting of Josh and Ryan Fossett, Brooklyn and Alexy Wisch, and Sydney Kennedy, is trained in CPR, First Aid, Childcare and Behavior management.

I stay current in my knowledge by working with other Faith Community/Parish Nurses through a local network. I am the President of the national Health Ministry Association where I share with others the knowledge I've acquired from my many years of service at Desert Cross. We continue to work with student nurses from local universities. Our investment in Parish Nurse Ministry has a far-reaching impact.

I appreciate the continued opportunity to serve Desert Cross as your Parish Nurse.

# <u>I-Help — Desert Cross invites the stranger to the table</u>

Do you remember being the new kid at school and walking into the cafeteria for the first time? I remember the screaming, the yelling and kids doing just about everything except eating. I remember surveying the room wondering where to sit. I wanted a safe place. A place where people wouldn't make fun of me. A place where people wouldn't judge me. A place where someone might be friendly and ask me about my day. I wanted a place where I would be accepted for who I was and not to be forced to be someone I'm not.

In some ways the Desert Cross I-Help program is like a cafeteria where the new kid walks in. What he/she sees are strangers, volunteers who know the lay of land. I still recall a female guest sobbing as she came through the door. It was her first night of I-Help and she was scared. She felt vulnerable. She was unsure of what the night would bring. She came with no money, no job, poor health, no friends or family. She felt alone and frozen in her fear. Desert Cross volunteers sat with her and listened. It wasn't long before she relaxed and even started joking. I believe this is the heart of I-Help, caring and loving the stranger. I believe this is exactly what Christ calls us to be, mirrors of God's love.

I would like to invite you into Desert Cross' I-Help ministry. I still need coverage for three months in 2023. You can create your own group, 2 or 3 families can do this. We just started a Breakfast Buddies ministry on Wednesday morning (serving a simple breakfast - like bagels & coffee). This takes 2 people to serve one hour on Wednesday morning starting at 6:00 am.

# **Tempe Community Outreach**

The Community Outreach Ministry is a group that reached out to serve the needs of others with emphasis on the local community. The ministry achieves it's goals through the efforts of volunteers who give of their time and talent along with the generosity of the Congregation.

Those we supported during 2022:

### Kyrene School District Family Resource Center

This facility collects needed items for the 700 families in the Kyrene District who are underprivileged with some living out of their cars, hotels or with other family members or are otherwise considered homeless. They have available for these families clothing, food, school supplies and assistance in finding the social services they need. It is located at 1330 E. Dava Drive in south Tempe adjacent to Kyrene de los Niños School.

### Blood Drives - Vitalant (formerly United Blood Services)

Our blood drives have been very successful. We have five per year. The bloodmobile comes to our Tempe facility on a specific Saturday.

#### Step Up Charter School

Is a K-8, Title 1, nonprofit, charter school established in 2012. The school is housed in Mesa's Washington Park Activity Center. The school serves a population of about 90 students. The breakdown of this population being 19% African American, 11% Caucasian, 65% Hispanic, and 5% American Indian students and families.

#### **Community Baby Shower**

Lutheran Social Services of the SW - This program provides needed supplies and diaper bags to Mesa and Phoenix Resource centers. They need many items, such as socks, bottles, caps, small hygiene products, nasal aspirators, diapers, wipes etc. for diaper bags.

#### Women 4 Women

Women4Women is an all-volunteer, non-profit organization which distributes much needed feminine hygiene products to women in our communities who are either experiencing homelessness, or who are financially unable to afford these items.

#### Shoe Box Ministries

We collect new and like new purses and personal items for women living in shelters to make their Mother's Day special.

#### Grace Lutheran in Phoenix

We provide bottled water and cool room respite, through the Hunger Jar collections, for the homeless that Grace serves in Phoenix. We also provide toiletries.

We have two food drives per year. The Souper Bowl collects cans of soup and crackers and canned foods and other non-perishable food. The second drive it the Be Thankful Drive that collects food items more related to Thanksgiving. We also have a Turkey Sunday where we collect frozen turkeys. These drives will support Kyrene Resource Center, Matthew's Crossing, Chandler Salvation Army and others.

#### ANGEL TREE

At Christmas time, we have an Angel tree in the Narthex. Kyrene Resource Center provides us with the names and wishes of children, ages of 15 and under, for about 20 families. Each child gets one item of warm clothing and one toy or special item of their request. We also provide gift cards for food for each family for a Christmas dinner.

A big thank you to June Bowman for her assistance and liaison with different agencies involved. Thank you also, to Doug Bjotvedt for assisting with the logistics of the financial aspects involved. A big thank you to the Committee members for their willingness to take on projects and follow up and assist in various ways as necessary.

It isn't sufficient enough to say "thank you" to the Congregation for the contributions of gift cards, money, food, clothing and various items during the year. I'll say it anyway- THANK YOU!

# **Boy Scout Troop 379**

Thank you, Desert Cross Lutheran Church, for sponsoring Boy Scout Troop 379 and allowing us to meet at the church. The Troop was chartered in 1980 by the Church and we have been active ever since.

The Boy Scout program provides the opportunity for youth (11-18 Years) to build better character and life values through the Scouting program in a Religious based environment. They do this by having fun participating in weekly troop meetings and the monthly outdoor programs. The Troop meeting are varied based on a monthly theme offered by the Boy Scout organization. Meetings are organized and run by the scout leadership which consists of the Senior Patrol Leader and each Patrol leader. Monthly Patrol Leader Council meetings are held where the youth scout leaders plan the specific activities for the meetings and outings.

The Troop meets on most Monday evenings at 7 PM in the Community Center. Outings occur at least once a month and involve a balance of activities. These include Backpacking, Camping, Bicycle Trips, Canoeing Trips and then a yearly week-long Summer Camp normally held out of state. In July 2022, the troop traveled to Connecticut to attend the JN Webster Scout Reservation for a week of summer camp. Troop 379 has a long tradition of attending out of council summer camps. This offers our scouts the unique experience of camping and earning merit badges at some of the best scout camps in the United States. Going out of state offers scouts the opportunity to visit a part of the country that they might not otherwise could see. Attending camps out of council also provides scouts an increased growth experience that is unique to our troop and helps to retain older youth.

The scout year begins in August when units recharter with the National Scouts BSA organization in Texas and the local council. The troop currently has 23 registered scouts in the unit. Of these 23 scouts, 4 has reached the highest rank of Eagle Scout. We currently have 2 other scouts scheduled for their Board of Review in the coming weeks. Since the beginning of Troop 379, we have had a total of 116 Eagle scouts.

Troop 379 is trying to recruit new youth to join scouting. Boy Scouts has a fabulous program where all boys learn leadership skills, have a lot of fun in a safe environment and perhaps take a small break from Video games. We will welcome families from Desert Cross Lutheran Church to join us and learn more.
