

I played for a fundamental, Bible believing, King James Only Baptist Church in Cocoa, Florida...for the oldest black church in Colorado Springs...and for a Korean church, where the first service each Sunday was actually in Korean. That was a little nerve wracking. As a teenager I played Jesus music that came from the hippie movement in California. I've played some of it for you.

Having recently been asked to serve on the worship and music committee here, I've been considering the place of music in our church, and in the broader church.

"There are, without doubt, in the human heart many seed-grains of precious virtue which are stirred up by music," so says Martin Luther himself.

Many of our hymns and songs are chosen to remind us who we are as followers of Christ. Some of them are a celebration of our love relationship with the divine. It's good to feel those emotions.

We share connection with our church family as we sing a gathering hymn.

Listening to music during the offering can help us focus on gratitude, and our response to the goodness of God.

Communion music can connect our hearts to the sacred mysteries, leading us to choose repentance, and following in the footsteps of the Savior.

Times of reflection with a background of music create an atmosphere for us to listen and respond to the Holy Spirit.

We share joy with our faith family, and a challenge to do God's work with our hands as we sing the sending song.

This is the first liturgical church of which I've been a member. So it's more conservative and formal than some. More cerebral and reserved, perhaps. There is less leading from the top, and more responsibility for the congregation. It's not a show, it's a time for all of us to bond with our voices.

And yet I know this is not everyone's comfort zone.

So I ask you, what does music at Zion's mean to you? I'd like to know what is meaningful to you, and how we can better serve you through worship.

New Beginnings prison congregation is a Lutheran mission church holding regular inperson worship services for all who wish to join.

New Beginnings recently called Pastor Samm Melton-Hill, who is serving in a yoked call with Highlands Lutheran Church in North Denver.

Pastor Samm completed her Masters of Divinity (MDiv) at Harvard Divinity School in 2019 and now is working towards a Masters of Sacred Theology (STM) at United Lutheran Seminary.

Pastor Samm has served in a number of diverse roles throughout the years, including chaplaincy work at a medium-high security women's prison, a psychiatric hospital, and a number of large trauma centers. Prior to serving in a congregational setting, she was a Chaplain Resident and Palliative Care Chaplain Fellow at the University of Colorado Hospital.

According to Pastor Samm, New Beginnings wants to reinstate the card ministry with Zion's and is asking our members to bring blank greeting cards and stationary that the inmates can use to write cards and letters to those they love and miss. There is a container to collect them on the table in the Fellowship Hall.

Spotlight On:

Zion's 5-Loaves Offers Monthly Food Ministry

The last Saturday of each month, volunteers package and deliver lunches to people throughout the Trinidad community. The lunch program, dubbed 5-Loaves is based upon the Gospel tales of "Feeding of the 5,000". The story is simple; thousands of people gathered to hear Jesus teach and heal. However, at evening meal, there was nothing to feed the crowd until Jesus took the loaves and fishes and miraculously multiplied the food so all were fed.

As Biblical scholars explain, feeding the hungry is both an act of compassion and demonstrates the presence of God's kingdom. Zion's 5-Loaves program mirrors that lesson by providing weekend meals that supplement Meals on Wheels, Trinidad's Food Kitchen, and other primarily weekday feeding programs.



The Friday before each 5-Loaves delivery day, 2-7 people gather in the Fellowship Hall to pack non-perishable food items and to count the number of meals to be delivered on each of eight routes. On Saturday, volunteers place perishable food items such as chicken, breakfast food, sausage, etc., (depending upon the menu for the day) into each bag. Saturday meal preparation begins between 7 and 7:30 a.m. Delivery volunteers arrive between 9 and 10:30 a.m. to collect lunches for their respective routes.

On average the delivery teams provide a combined 200 meals as part of more than 100



stops. Each route usually has 10-20 stops with an average of 20-30 meals provided. Most stops provide 2-3 meals per household, with up to six meals delivered for unique situations. The delivered meals are designed to be large enough that people can have more than one meal from each delivery.

In addition, 5-Loaves coordinators **Norine Hazen** and **Peggy Gustafson** make special deliveries to areas frequented by the unhoused as well as for those who provide special services on weekends and cannot get meals. The two of them also pay special attention to people who have unique or temporary needs. Sometimes this means providing meals from 5-Loaves storage on days other than 5-Loaves weekends.

"Christians have followed the lead of Jesus in seeking to feed people, especially those with limited access to food," wrote Mark D. Roberts in *The High Calling*.

Indeed, Bible messages are inspirations to all of the people who volunteer to help the 5-Loaves program as they care for one another and offer hospitality and encouragement to others, which allows us to participate in the ministry of Jesus.

Centering Prayer Returns to Zion's

Prior to March 2020, Zion's had a Centering Prayer group that met weekly, and while we had hopes of restarting it when Covid-19 struck, that program was delayed until now. Rita Burton will be facilitating the Centering Prayer program beginning at 11:30 a.m. on Friday, May 12, in the Fellowship Hall. This workshop is open to our entire community, all are welcome!

Contemplative prayer is a key component of Centering Prayer and is centuries old, practiced by all of the world's principal religions.

It represents a desire to have God draw us closer into a relationship. As we grow closer to, and come to better know God, we gradually let go of who we think we are, to become who we truly are. It is both a relationship with God and a discipline to deepen that relationship. It requires only the intention to grow closer to God.

Centering Prayer proceeds from a Judeo-Christian tradition, but can be practiced by anyone. It is designed to be simple in its practice designed to help people develop a relationship with God, with one another and with their true self.

Centering Prayer is also beneficial as a means to spiritual healing from personal trauma, addiction, and the "slings and arrows" of daily life. The practice itself is very simple and requires only an individual's intention and commitment. If you have questions, please contact Rita Burton.

Zion's Campout-Picnic Set for May 18-20



Did you know? The Santa Fe Trail was traversed by a bevy of fortune seeking individuals. From 1821 to 1846, the Santa Fe Trail was a two-wav international commercial highway used by both Mexican and American traders. It was eventually supplanted by the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway which largely followed the trail. After World War I the trail was reborn, since in the 1920s it gradually became paved automobile roads. Pastor Shandrick Concludes 24-years of Service by Helping Zion's Prepare for 100th Anniversary

(This is the tenth in a series recounting the life of Zion's Lutheran, which has looked at church history through Zion's 90th birthday in 1978.)

In 1980, Zion's started planning for the church's centennial year. As part of preparations, in 1980 Pastor Shandrick led work to restore the exterior of the church. That same year, Zion's began using the Lutheran Book of Worship and published its first pictorial directory, a practice that continues to this day.

In 1981, saw creation of both the Shandrick Endowment Fund and the Makloski Youth Fund. Then, in 1982, refurbishing moved from the sanctuary exterior to its interior with all of the wood revarnished and new carpet installed throughout the building. In 1983, a carillon (bell) system was installed in the sanctuary and dedicated to the memory of Maxine Michaelowski.

Pastor Shandrick retired in 1985, having served Zion's Lutheran for almost 24 years, the longest pastoral tenure in Zion's History.
