What we have been doing since I joined you in January 2021 has been a "labor of love." It is a labor of love to honor the memory of those who have blazed a path before us; it is a labor of love for those to whom we now minister; it is a labor of love for those to whom we will minister in the future. As Christians, we do this hard work of reviewing who we have been, who we are, and who we will become in the name of God through Christ Jesus.

In 1 Corinthians 13, the Apostle Paul wrote this well-known and respected passage: "Love is patient, love is kind. Love is not boastful or proud or rude. It does not demand its own way. It is not irritable, and it keeps no record of being wronged. It does not rejoice about injustice but rejoices whenever the truth wins out. Love never gives up, never loses faith, is always hopeful, and endures through every circumstance. These three things will last forever – faith, hope, and love – and the greatest of these is love. Love will surely last forever!"



This must be our hymn-song as we continue to move forward. And we are moving forward. It will be a good thing to have everything in place before searching for a new pastor. This process takes time and I ask for your continuing patience. We cannot and should not rush this process. Our small groups have met and now it is time to hear the resulting information from those discussions. I will also have information that all of you need to hear.

I need to remind you that COVID definitely made the Intentional Interim Ministry work difficult. My first steps were to learn to know the faith community, learn to know the dynamics of the Sunday service, and then talk with as many people in the faith community as possible to learn about any problems. I knew from Chuck Erickson (then, Interim Regional Minister before his retirement) that there was division concerning the vote for a new pastor. The congregational meeting was held by Zoom which was certainly not ideal, but necessary. Again, COVID and the required isolation made certain steps necessary. The vote was 58 in favor of calling The Rev. Dr. Jay Terbush as ECC's settled pastor, and 42 not in favor of calling him. When Chuck shared that news with me, I knew something was amiss. Votes like that just don't usually happen; that is outside the norm and immediately a red flag goes up in an IIM's mind. Also, per ECC, an 85% positive vote is needed to call a settled pastor. The Search team had done much work and prayed constantly in the work that they did. Needless to say, they were devastated and some still are feeling emotional and confused about that time. The Search team was formed right after the Visioning team completed their work. Again, the Visioning team did much work and prayed constantly. There is no easy way to say this but it must be said: Some on both the Visioning team and the Search team felt, and still feel, that they were disrespected and unappreciated. We will speak about this and hopefully do something about it at the meeting on June 4th.

Please encourage those who have left us to come back for the June 4th meeting. It will be a very important gathering; actually more important than meetings about the present and future. We cannot properly move on without "clearing the air." Some of you may not think this is important, but the process has proven to be successful over and over again. We need to remember that Ellington Congregational Church was not established and has not continued without problems in the past. It is likely that the ECC congregation of the future will also have problems. It takes all of us, even if we are unhappy with the process or what has been, to be disciples and do God's work. Those of us in faith communities represent a microcosm of the world. We have all the problems and disagreements that plague the world. However, we are different in that we have chosen, <u>as</u> <u>Christians in a binding covenant with God, to respect one another and each other's opinions and do the work God intends</u>. We are all on our own spiritual journey, and concerning that spiritual journey, one thing that has been made clear by Christ Jesus is that we are commanded to love one another and our neighbor as we love ourselves. As I have said from the pulpit many times, we do not have to agree, we do not have to like someone's behavior, but we are called (by the covenant with God) to love one another as children of God no matter what else occurs.

Since COVID, our mainline churches will not be the same. They were declining before COVID. We all need to embrace change whether we want to or not. Look around, the world is forcing change. One more statement: I am, every day, performing the duties of a settled pastor as well as those of an Intentional Interim Minister. I do all the things that a pastor does; I have experience with every age and many situations. I have much education and training. We have been moving forward and doing exciting things while I have been with you. We do not have to wait for a settled pastor to move on. We can move on while still doing the work needed to attract many candidates to lead you into the future.

What supplies the faith community and the Intentional Interim Minister with the courage and hope needed for this ministry is the promise that God's Spirit is at work in all things. Please know that I am blessed and honored to be with the ECC faith community. I have grown to love and respect all of you and the work you do in God's name. I give thanks for all of you every day.

Eastertide

This sacred season of Eastertide extends for fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. It is suggested that these days be celebrated as one great Sunday. On the fortieth day after Easter, Christians celebrate Christ's ascension into heaven where Christ sits at the right hand of God. This year, Ascension Day is on Thursday, May 18th.

During the coming Sundays, we will share how Jesus appeared to the apostles at different times and places during those forty days. After Jesus came out of the grave or arose from death (the Resurrection), he appeared to the disciples (minus Judas Iscariot who had been killed) and perhaps other apostles to let them know he had truly risen from death. In order to send them out to teach about God and God's "Right Way for Living," Jesus breathed the Holy Spirit into them. Pentecost Sunday falls on May 28th this year and commemorates the giving of the Holy Spirit by God to all the other apostles who would be spreading the word of God. It also commemorates the beginning of what would become the Christian church, and its mission to everyone in every nation.

Please keep Easter singing in your heart as you go about your daily life. It will certainly make life better.

The Maternity Care and Family Planning Center has been a mainstay at Rockville General Hospital for more than thirty vears. The Center provides prenatal and postpartum care for women who are uninsured or under-insured. Women who receive prenatal care through the Center have access to ultrasounds, laboratory services and the option of attending Group Prenatal Care through "Family Circles", which promotes the health of the mother and baby.

Our total number of enrolled families is over 600 representing over 1,500 individuals. Of course, they do not all come for food each week. However, one year ago, we were preparing 120 bags of nonperishable foods for distribution each week. Currently, we are preparing 180 bags."

The Stewardship Talents Project from now on to be known as ECC'S SEASON OF THE TALENTS, THE BAGS OF GOLD

In Matthew 25, Jesus told the Parable of the Talents. In this parable, the wealthy man gave money (talents) to his three servants. A talent as described in the New Testament weighed 129 lbs., 14 oz. This could be gold, silver, other precious metals, ivory, or frankincense. Two of the faithful servants put the money to good use and multiplied the master's money. The one who got five traded it into ten. From this example, the Talents Project asks volunteers to take a \$10 investment (in the form of a bag of ten gold pieces) and, using their "talents," see how far they can multiply this money as a fundraiser for the church. Pastor Joanne previously spoke about the Talents Project and had those who already had their project in mind go forward and get their bag of ten gold pieces. Seven "bags of gold" were given out.

A faith community like ours remains united when the people in that community know they are learning and doing worthwhile and important things according to God's teaching through Christ Jesus. The parable isn't really about financial investments. It's about each one of us exploring the creativity and the wide variety of gifts we have been given by God. This is something that helps us to believe in God without being able to see God. Each one of us is uniquely created and creative. God wants us to use ourselves to further God's ministry and mission in the world.

Whatever we've been given we are encouraged, through Jesus' teachings, to use for God's purpose. We are to invest our lives, our skills, our faith, our abilities, and our creativity to further God's work in the world.

So, use your creativity and your God-given gifts to turn our bags of gold into more funds for ministry and mission here at ECC. We have a whole season until the end of September to think and do – plenty of time to be creative. There are many places to sign-up and soon there will be a list featuring the projects from our faith community participants.

Happy May! We are very happy to report that Women's Fellowship held a special meeting on Sunday, April 16 to approve a one-time donation to TELOS of \$1,500 to help defray the costs of their mission trip this year. Those who oversee TELOS are already planning new approaches to future trips for reducing costs and fundraising to increase receipts. As you may recall, TELOS reported needing an additional \$10,000 for this year's trip and requested financial help in the appeal letter sent off on April 4, 2023 to the congregation. MEET THE COMMITTEE – MEMORIAL

This month we are highlighting the Memorial Committee, who works behind the scenes to oversee the administration of our memorial gifts.

Memorial gifts sent to the church to honor past friends and members, fall to the Memorial Committee who track the gifts, consult with the families about using the gifts, and send acknowledgements to the families and contributors.



They also keep our Book of Remembrance updated.

The Memorial Committee meets as required, but usually not more often than monthly. They consider suggestions for the use of the funds, present projects and costs to the Trustees for financial authorization, and carry out projects authorized by the Board of Trustees.

The Memorial Committee also oversees our Memorial Garden and Labyrinth which is on the north side of the Education Wing and Sanctuary. The garden and labyrinth were established in 2008 to commemorate the 275th anniversary of the Ellington Congregational Church. It was funded by contributions to the Memorial Fund and sale of engraved Memorial River Rocks forming the outer circle of the labyrinth. They are beautiful spaces for mediation and reflection. The spiritual gifts of the members of the Memorial Committee include service to others and offering encouragement, comfort and hope to those dealing with a loss.
