Summer is upon us. PLC has a transition pastor. Now what? GROW!!

It seems most people consider the summer to begin on or shortly after Memorial Day. I would like to propose we might think of the season Pentecost as summer. Summer times

seems to slow things down when it comes to church life. It doesn't seem to slow down for other aspects of summer living. But the pace does seem to change.

During COVID, it seemed to be a continued never-ending Hiatus. It has been differently strange as the former norm disappears, and some kind of new

norm is settling in. It seems rather foreign and disconnected yet. We are growing into a different norm. As we try to understand what is changing, we also try to figure out how to respond to the changes. This is a time of growth- in the agricultural world, the business world, the post covid social world, and the world of spiritual well being.

Growing into a new paradigm can feel awkward, strange, threatening, frustrating and confusing. There can also be joy. I reflect on the disciples who left their former familiar environment and followed Jesus as they were looking for relief from the negatives that had also become the norms. When Jesus spoke about the new kingdom, He spoke

of God breaking into life as they knew it. It spoke of promised hope. Of a new life through death. Jesus had their attention. They followed.

What a strange journey that was. There were times Jesus was extremely popular. Thousands would turn out to listen, be healed, be fed, all because the Good News was proclaimed, and people needed to hear some good news. There were also times things didn't go as the disciples might have expected. NOT all responses to Jesus were overwhelmingly positive. Then there was Jesus himself. A Mystery Man/Son of God(?) that could calm storms with a word. He could miraculously heal the sick, resuscitate the dead, had this richly deep prayer life, could teach deep & wise lessons about living and spiritual life. He then

would talk about his going to die and be raised. On the road to Emmaus, the disciples didn't recognize him because it had been three days of death. The women reported the resurrection, but it was so weird, it was a hard story to believe.

NOW Pentecost- what a weird and other worldly experience! Wind, flames, earth trembling, languages...otherwise, it was a normal day(?). Maybe for a disciple, life never really slows down. It does change how we do living. What is the new paradigm of a disciple? Jesus calls his disciples into something completely new and different. Sharing the good news of the Gospel.

Jesus teaches much about discipleship by how he responds to the questions about who he spends time with. Jesus calls, claims, and sends. This sending is ongoing: discipleship ultimately necessitates a continual relationship initiating, building, and celebrating with thanks.

This 'ongoing' is accompanied by success, failure, and ability to adapt and overcome to do God's will. Jesus proclaims that by yourself, you are limited. Through God ALL things are possible. A cause for joyous celebration and hope.

Discipleship does take us in a different direction than what we first thought was impossible and improbable. The first disciples experienced it. Disciples of this time & place grow into it. It doesn't

always make sense and doesn't always feel warm and comfortable. God shapes and develops disciples in their faithfulness as they live.

The Good News grows faithfulness and sets into our hearts and minds as growing and learning disciples what God is up to. The Spirit directs us towards the cause and reason for celebration and thanksgiving. God has been with Peace Lutheran many faithful generations. There were and are times of learning and growing-challenging. There are also the peaks for joyous celebration with thanksgiving for what God has done through faithful disciples. Which time might Peace Lutheran be in now? ALL things are possible through God's grace, mercy, and power.

TRANSITION TEAM NOTES:

I would hope and pray that going forward here at Peace Lutheran, the council will shortly selected and approve at maximum, a seven-member team that will have specific tasks related to gathering information, facilitating meetings, surveying, communicating, and creating the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) document for Peace Lutheran.

I would encourage the Transition Team to keep the congregation informed as to what is happening in this process through Newsletter articles, Temple talks, Fireside chats, and Town Hall meetings. This column would be a concise way to communicate what is happening, what has happened and what will be the next step in completing the MSP.



God's Gifts Equip Us for Ministry

The purpose of the team is to mobilize, discover, and generate the capacity to thrive anew. Two major areas are 1) to discover a possible new, a deepened sense of identity and purpose of the congregation and 2) to establish a healthy relationship with the next pastoral leader who will walk with the congregation toward the renewed sense of purpose. The team activities gives the congregation council time and space to focus on continuing support of the ministries of the congregation.

The team will endeavor to (1) gather feelings and ideas of both members of the congregation and people living in the community regarding Peace Lutheran. (2) To provide a forum for sharing and focusing hopes and aspirations for the future. (3) Create the data to complete the MSP for council and congregation review.



If you're a thrift saler, this is the time to start looking for those baby items. Stores will soon be offering deals on school supplies too.

We will be collecting items for the <u>School Kits & Baby Care Kits</u> throughout the summer months into September! So, be on the lookout for items needed. Collection Bins will be located under the table by Kate's window. Below are the items needed for each kit:

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF BABY CARE KIT - 2023

- Two lightweight cotton T-shirts (no Onesies)
- Two long or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)
- Two swaddling blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel or crocheted or knitted
- with lightweight yarn, 36" to 52" square
- Four cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- One jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap
- ♦ Two pairs of socks
- One hand towel, dark color recommended
- ♦ Two or three bath-size bars of gentle soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand,
- in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars
- Two diaper pins or large safety pins

<u>Most needed items:</u> Long or short sleeved gowns or sleepers without feet; Jackets, Sweaters or Sweatshirts, Swaddling blankets, <u>Hand towels</u>, Soap

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF SCHOOL KIT - 2023

- Four 70-80 sheet notebooks (280-300 sheets total) of wide- or college-ruled paper
- approximately 8 x 10 ½ inches. No loose-leaf paper.
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One pencil sharpener
- One pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- Five black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16-24 crayons
- ♦ One 2 ½ inch eraser
- *One sturdy drawstring style, cloth backpack approximately 14 x 17 inches with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks); recommended fabrics include sturdy cotton, canvas, denim, and twill. *drawstring bags will be provided

Summer 2023 Bible study: Salvation Now by the Rev. Dr. Anna Madsen

Session One: Promised Salvation Now – Jesus Brings Wellness

Of all the gospel writers, John is uniquely concerned about the effectiveness of Jesus' immediate presence. One clue is his regular use of the word "now," a tiny but powerful word which appears more here than the other gospels combined. Together, we'll note a few instances of the "Now," and delve into John's observations about the way John focuses not so much on the "hereafter," but more on sharing the difference that Jesus makes in people's lives, straight away.

Session Two: Tangible Salvation Now – Christians Bringing Wellness

Following Jesus means expressing our solidarity with Jesus and his mission, in all we do. Because Jesus is the bringer of salvation, in his name, so, too, are we. Where there are wounds and brokenness, we are called to bring Jesus and the salvation he embodied. Together we'll examine the biblical and theological reasons for not waiting for it to all come out in the wash later, but for us to become faithful ambassadors of Jesus' salvation now.

Session Three: Needed Salvation Now - A World Wanting Wellness

Anyone who's been to a sports game knows John 3:15 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." Lesser known is John 3:17, which states: "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him." In this session, we'll explore John's commitment to service, how we as Christians see the needs of a hurting world, and how because Jesus is the bringer of salvation, we are compelled to follow Jesus into the need now.

SPRING FLING 2023 A GREAT SUCCESS!

Over 40 attendees came to hear the story of the Kuzniestsovas, a family of four, who fled Ukraine after the Russian invasion, and are now living here in Menomonie. Yuliia and her 18 year old son, Nikita, were present and told about their life in Ukraine and their harrowing experience of leaving their home with no more than the clothes on their backs and a backpack for each of them. The free will offering taken at the program raised \$1000.00! which will go to the family. A hand-made sunflower quilt (made & donated by Cheryl Johnson), and two fleece blankets (donated by our Fleece Fairies) were given to the family following the program. A delicious luncheon was served by the Board members.

Did You Know..

The women of Peace Lutheran Church voted to send \$1000.00 to "Unbreakable" an organization for wounded children. It brings Ukrainian children who have lost limbs to the U.S to undergo treatment and get fitted for prosthetics.
