The Rector's Corner

Today marks the feast of the Holy Trinity, which is also known as Trinity Sunday. It is widely accepted by historians that this feast has been celebrated by the western liturgical churches as far back as the tenth century on the first Sunday after the feast of Pentecost. The Anglican and Lutheran Churches designates each of the proceeding 26 weeks in the liturgical church calendar as the "Sundays after Trinity".

As I was reflecting on the significance of this day in the church calendar, I thought back to a question that my wife asked me a number of years ago about the nature of the Trinity. She asked me how it is possible that God can be both one and three distinct entities at the same point in time. Naturally I found it difficult to provide an answer to the question that Theologians have been struggling with for centuries. The only response I could muster with my limited human intellect was to answer her question with a question. I asked her how she could be a loving mother, wife, and daughter all at the same time and within the same person. She thought about my question in silence for a moment, and then with an approving smile she said that I should remember that illustration for the next time someone asked me to explain the Holy Trinity.

Some theologians have attempted to answer this same question through other illustrations like, for example, comparing the Trinity to water. Water can take on any of the three different physical properties of being a solid, gas, or liquid. Although these examples seem to provide an understandable and relatable illustration for us, they are in reality inadequate in conveying the true nature of the Trinity. Yes, water can be a solid, gas, or liquid but water can only be in the form of one of these physical properties at any given point in time. Water can not be a gas, solid, and a liquid simultaneously. However, God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit are One Being while being unique in their own nature. God the Creator, Jesus the Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit the Sanctifier.

As humans with our limited intellect, we are incapable of fully understanding the how and why this is possible. It may appear on the surface for some people that something we can not explain is highly unlikely to be within the realm of possibility; however, one only needs to consider the vastness of our universe to see that something so much greater than our understanding can be very real indeed.

Although the word Trinity does not appear in Scriptures, there are a number of passages that point to it (see Isaiah 48:16, Matt. 3: 16-17 or Matt. 28: 19 to list a few). I think that Charles Gore puts it best in his book "The Religion of the Church: A Manual of Membership" when he wrote that "God is the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Three persons in one God". He used "person" because that was what was considered the best possible descriptive word to describe what is in essence indescribable. He continues "the Father is God, the Son is God, and the Holy Ghost is God, and yet they are not three Gods but one God. In the Trinity there is no before and after or greater or lesser. The three are co-eternal and co-equal."

This unity of the Holy Trinity is important for us because it makes our being in Communion with God real and alive. By being in relationship with the Father through Jesus Christ and experiencing this relationship through the Holy Spirit we are able to gain a deeper understanding of how God is by very nature love. The Three that make up the One are in perfect fellowship together. By being in fellowship with other Christians within the Church we are drawn into closer and greater understanding of the Love that is the Holy Trinity.

Theology Glossary

Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost, what is called Whitsunday in the Book of Common Prayer. It was not until the Middle Ages that this Sunday was observed in commemoration to the Trinity. This day also marks the conclusion of holy days that commemorate the life and ministry of Christ. This feast became particularly popular in England as it is associated to Saint Thomas Beckett who was consecrated bishop on that day in the year 1162.
