A Word from Pastor Jay

What did Jesus intend for the church to be? Over the years I have asked myself this question over and over again (a hazard of the job, I guess), and have come to focus my best answer to that question around “authentic community.” From experiences as a parish pastor and from grappling with the Scriptures and from living in swirling joy of congregational life over these many (almost 34) years, my best guess for what Jesus intended the church to be is a true community of people, in all their similarities and differences, gathered together to create and maintain authentic community with each other. I understand the Augsburg Confession’s definition that the church is the gathering of people in which the Word of God is preached in its purity and the Sacraments are administered according to that Word and find it helpful and important. I hear Jesus tell Peter that he is the rock, and upon this rock Jesus will build the church, and that whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven, and I appreciate the significance of that passage. However, I am swayed more in my understanding of the identity and mission of the church by the interactions of Jesus with the disciples, especially on that last evening he spends with them. He gives them a meal by

which to remember and feel the joy of his presence (Synoptic Gospels). He washes their feet to impress upon them the expectation that they remain above all committed to serving one another (John’s Gospel). Then, in the Gospel of John, Jesus gives the disciples a “new commandment,” that they love one another as Jesus has loved them. It is in this commandment, and the similar commandments in the Synoptic Gospels that we should love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength and love our neighbor as ourselves, that I see this desire that Jesus has for his followers to form community which is authentically tied to the good news God brings into the world through Jesus.

Living in *authentic* community is difficult. No individual person or congregation will fulfill this call perfectly all the time. Yet, I believe, this is the aspiration Jesus has for those who would follow him. Within this community we learn of God’s unending love for us as community and as individuals, we hear the Scriptures read and the Word of God proclaimed, we worship the one who created and who redeems us, we learn what it means to be a child of God, we live in fellowship with one another, we actively seek to serve the needs of our siblings in Christ and the needs of the world God has created. Authentic community does not diminish all the other ways the church has been described and defined over the years, including in the Scriptures, but rather, I believe, enables the church to best live

its mission to be the body of Christ in the world. Authentic community does not mean we have to be best friends with those who are part of our congregation, nor does it mean we must agree on everything and support every decision made within the congregation. It doesn't even mean that you must agree with everything the pastor says in the sermon. What it does mean, at least in my mind, is that we return again and again to God's graceful gift of life given through Jesus, in which we are able to live life in its fullest expression, which leads to our working to build authentic community in our congregation in this part of the world where God has placed us. The foundation for this is our understanding that we are called to love one another (each and every one another) as Christ has loved us. Personalities might get in the way, feelings might get hurt from time to time, we will make mistakes and miss this mark as individuals and as a congregation, but blessed by God's promises, we get up the next day, dust ourselves off, forgive and receive forgiveness, and go back to loving as Christ loved us for the sake of our congregation, the people who gather here for worship and fellowship, the community in which we live and the world with which God has blessed us.

"I saw the Risen Christ in a young mother caring for her autistic son."

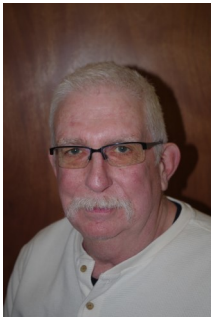
"God inspired me to pray for a friend that I did not even know was ill!!"

Thank you to everyone who shared their experiences!!



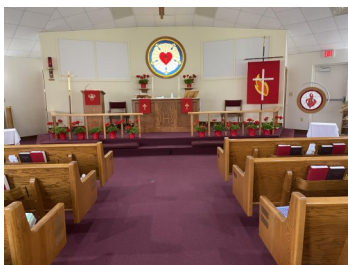
From Your Congregation Council President

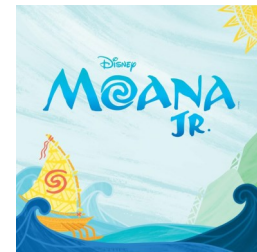
Pentecost at Apostles!

Emphasis for June:
World Refugee Day,
June 20th**

World Refugee Day is organized every year by the United Nations. It is designed to celebrate and honor refugees from around the world. The day was first established in 2001 to recognize the 50th anniversary of the 1951 Status of Refugees Convention. This day recognizes the strength of the refugees who have fled conflict and persecution in their countries in hope of finding sanctuary and living a better life. Refugees often flee countries which suffer from famine and hunger. They seek food, shelter, and opportunity for their families. World Refugee Day tries to educate others in understanding their plight. Leaving everything behind in search of sanctuary and food security illustrates their resilience and courage to rebuild their future. On this day we should experience, understand, and celebrate the diversity of the refugee communities.

Refugee Facts:

- + A refugee is an individual who leaves their country due to hunger, war, persecution, or violence in order to find safety in a different country.
- + Most refugees come from backgrounds where they have been employed and are eager to work.
- + Refugees create a more diverse culture in the host community providing an opportunity to learn from each other.

Heavenly Protector, as you protected your son when his family fled to Egypt, protect, and bless all who seek refuge. May their needs for safety and for home be met. Move our hearts to welcome them. We pray for the cessation of war and to bring justice to nations that no one will need to flee again.

Welcome to The Spring Edition of Seasons of Stewardship The Worship Ministry Team

The Worship Ministry Team is responsible for encouraging and supporting the growth of members' worship of our Triune God and focus on the Word. Members of the team are Pastor Jay, Sue Turner (chair), David Leunig, Irene Albert, Janet Gomez, and Jennie Hawkins. There are four major aspects of the Worship Ministry Team:



- + Worship Assistants
- + Music
- + Altar
- + Worship Team Ministry

Worship assistants include the **acolyte** (lights the candles at the beginning and at the end of worship and assists with Holy Communion), the **assisting minister** (helps Pastor Jay lead the worship service), the **crucifer** (carries the cross at the beginning and at the end of worship), the **lector** (reads the readings for the day) and the **usher/greeter** (greet people as they come to worship, hands out bulletins, collects the offering and guides people for Holy Communion), **technology** (oversees the live broadcasting of the service)

Music includes **playing the piano and organ** (for the weekly and special worship services), **providing special music** (with different instruments like guitar and flute), **choir director** and **being a member of the choir and/or cantor and soloist**, **choir librarian** (takes care of filing choir music).

Altar includes **changing the paraments** (for the different seasons of the church year), **setting up and cleaning up Holy Communion** (set up the bread and wine for communion and then cleaning up after the worship service), **baking bread** (baking the bread for the weekly worship service), **providing flowers** (to adorn the altar

and sanctuary for the weekly worship services and special services during the year; e.g., lilies for Easter, palms for Palm Sunday, etc.), **making banners** (designing and making banners for the different seasons of the church year), **keeping the altar and Paschal candles full of oil**, **polishing the brass and cleaning the altar linens**.

Worship Team Ministry includes **chairing the team** (responsible for preparing the agenda for meeting and conducting the meeting), **planning the weekly and special worship services** (the team meets monthly), **preparing the weekly bulletin**, **Xeroxing the weekly and special services bulletins**, and **sponsoring the bulletin** (sign up to sponsor the weekly bulletin for a small fee). Please remember that training is provided for ALL positions on this team.

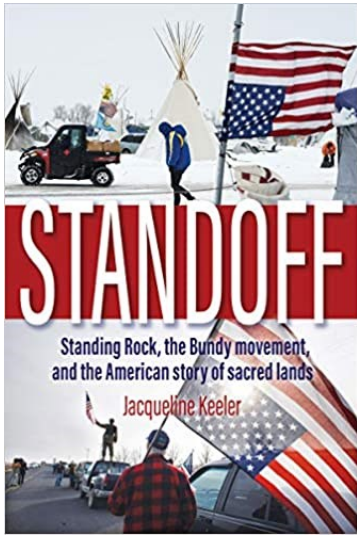
