

Report from the Board Chair

After selling the house, he will never again be able to visit it. And because his father is in ill health and 103 years old, it is unlikely that David will ever see his father alive again. (Although his dad has consistently beaten the odds in the past.) It was a difficult but necessary journey.

After achieving the first leg of our journey, David and I went to Quebec City for a short vacation before we began the long drive back home. We both lived in Quebec for many years and it was

where we first met. There we visited many of the places that were special to us. We took a break from the work and shared some precious memories.

Here at First Met, we are on a similar journey. We have just completed the first momentous step. This last Sunday, June 11, we, along with the congregants of Broad View United, voted overwhelmingly to amalgamate.

Ours is a journey with a purpose as well. Our intention is to serve the people of our congregation with love. We need to move; we can no longer afford the "house" we live in. We need to husband the limited time and resources available to us. We still want to serve, but many of us need to be served as well. This is a bitter-sweet reality.

The vote was only the first step in our journey and we still have a long way to go yet. Let's take a little break and enjoy what we have accomplished before we begin the long drive homeward. We may have to leave our house behind soon, but let us bring our memories with us as we go into an unknown future with hope and love.

Finance and Administration Report

First Quarter Financial Results

The Treasurer has reported at the May 17, 2023, Board meeting that First Met's financial results for the first quarter of 2023 are tracking very closely to the recently approved 2023 Budget. A comparison of our results for 2023 with the same period in 2022 is highlighted below.

- Operating revenue (including member contributions) is down approximately \$1,000 or 2%
- Letting revenue is down approximately \$31,000 or 46% (due to no lower level tenant in 2023 to replace first quarter ICA revenue in 2022)
- Program revenue is down approximately \$1,400 or 15%
- Letting expenses are down approximately \$855 or 66%
- Program expenses are up by approximately \$593 or 5%
- Staffing expenses are up by approximately \$15,225 or 13% (salary increases in 2023 plus there were several staff vacancies during the first quarter of 2022)
- Administrative expenses are up by approximately \$500 or 3%
- Building and Grounds expenses are up by approximately \$8,200 or 9%. (100% of this is due to the processing of a 2022 repair invoice.)

The First Met Board is concerned that due to the age of our buildings there will be an increasing demand for unplanned (unbudgeted) building maintenance and repair and has directed that any expenditures on building maintenance and repair must be sponsored by the Leads for Property Team and Property Management Task Group and authorized by the Board.

F&A Staffing Changes

During June 2023, First Met will be saying goodbye to two staff members, Katya Rumyantseva and Lauren Paterson. After Katya and Lauren declined an opportunity to apply for available positions with Broad View United Church they have accepted exciting new career opportunities with employers they will join in June.

Lauren resigned First Met on June 8, 2023, just about 10 months after joining us in August 2022. Lauren did a remarkable job during her time with First Met in her multi-faceted role as Office Administrator. Of note are her successes in securing many new tenants for our vacant space and her warm and welcoming presence in the front office.

Katya will be resigning her role as Bookkeeper on June 23, 2023. Katya has been with First Met since 2012 and has become the face of the finance office for the First Met family. Her role as Bookkeeper for First Met involved the preparation and posting of financial transactions and acting as the liaison with First Met's bookkeeping firm in the regular production of cheques and distribution of monthly financial statements to the Board and Teams. Katya was responsible for preparing and running the bi-weekly payroll for First Met staff, and she assisted our congregants with setting up and managing their PAR contributions. Every year Katya provided support for First Met's budgeting process and Stewardship campaigns. We have come to know Katya for her thoroughness and careful attention to detail (a real asset in any finance office) and as a helpful colleague and friend to one and to all. We will miss her presence among us and wish her the very best in her new job and future endeavours.

I am pleased to announce that Liane Clark has agreed to a contract to perform Finance Office work and Power church database maintenance. First Met has also contracted with Better Choice Staffing to bring on a new Office Administrator Linda Mack.

For much of the past year, our choir performed masked, making beautiful music despite the masks worn during practices and Sunday services. The hymns we sing are indeed embedded in our memories.

Following the service, two delicious cakes were served in the Doreene McLeod Rm where congregants could express their own appreciation for the gift of music.

Sharron Higgins: Community Changemaker and Volunteer

Sharron Higgins' roots at First Met run deep. In fact, they go right back to her grandfather David McCall, who came from Lethbridge Alberta in 1923 to settle in Victoria. He established the McCall Brothers Funeral Home. He served as a very active member of First United, as did his sons Graham and Torrey McCall. Sharron was baptized at First United and has many fond memories of attending Sunday school and participating in CGIT programs. As a young lady she met her husband, Glendon the Minister's Son, through First United Young People's group. And in 1964 they were married at First United. The church has always been a cornerstone in Sharron's life.


Sharron pursued an education in nursing and graduated from the Royal Jubilee Hospital School of Nursing in 1963. In 1978 she joined the Home Care Nursing Early Hospital Discharge program and enjoyed this specialized area of nursing. Sharron continued her nursing education by completing

her BScN in 1982 at the University of Victoria, with a keen interest in family health

development.

Later Sharron worked as a School Nurse at Victoria High School in Fernwood serving youth. During this time, she encountered many young moms who needed daycare for their infants in order to complete their high school education. She helped lead an initiative from 1990-2000, with grant funding from the BC Ministry of Health and the City of Victoria to establish a full-time day-care program to support these young parents. This work marks a significant highlight of Sharron's career.

In retirement from Public Health Nursing, Sharron led a Healthy Schools Initiative for School District #61, that matched the health promotion and education principles of the district. It was during this period that Sharron also had more time to explore volunteer options at First Met. She became interested in what was then called



In 2018 Sharron stepped into the role of Team Leader, along with her co-chair Vreny Mathis. Together they worked for a period leading the group of dedicated volunteers through developing a new strategic plan. A highlight from this period is the workshop offerings led by Dr. Wally Lazaruk the SC&W team sponsored, featuring Mindfulness and Self-Compassion. Sharron went on to lead the Team on her own and continues to present day. Sharron is dedicated, she brings warmth, a smile and faith to every meeting. She has been steadfast in her commitment to the task of administering the Margret Cameron Trust, in accordance with the principles and values held by Mrs. Cameron to uphold the most vulnerable in our community. Sharron's contributions to the community and the church through her work and her volunteerism, have made an undeniable impact. We are truly blessed to have Sharron as part of our First Met church family!

Visitation Ministry: Expressing Our Gratitude

The first Cuban mission exposure trip was planned for senior high youth at First Met. One day, a congregation member approached me. "Megumi, we wonder if we can sponsor a youth who might need financial support." They pointed out the person they had in mind. I was surprised and moved by their Christian love and compassion.

This anonymous gift made a difference. Years later, the donor husband was dying. I couldn't maintain his anonymity anymore. I told the recipient who had been given the chance to make this trip possible. He and I hurried to the house of the donors. There, he could say "Thank you". Both men were in tears hugging: a now grown young

man and a very vulnerable fragile old gentleman. The young man will never forget this generosity.

Visitation ministry reminds me that all those visited were once very active in the life of the church: A great healing touch practitioner, who was so gentle helping people. A social justice advocate who helped Balmoral Garden residents. A very dedicated Sunday School teacher and caregiver to children whenever that was needed. A wonderful pianist/ organist who could play both by ear or sheet music for many church occasions. An engineer, involved in church property maintenance, choir, Bible study, and as a confirmation sponsor. A very gifted and artistic leader for musical events and pageants. A compassionate UCW leader and great craft person for children's and camp ministry. A retired minister, who shared her talent of pottery making. An advocate for youth and young adults, who supported this ministry and even offered her house for a young adults' retreat. A retired lawyer, who used all his talents of music, philanthropy, and faith for stewardship campaigns with his deep theological conviction. A trusted retired minister, who was willing to help and support anything. A beautiful soprano soloist: her solo was a high-light of Easter worship. A cheerful Sunday school piano player. A remarkable church supporter who was always encouraging and donated to the children's ministry. A faithful Sunday worshiper, who enjoyed study groups. A social activist who has amazing spirit and still leads the new way. An agent of God, along with her minister husband, who dedicated her entire life for a ministry of caring, helping and supporting churches. A remarkable centurion educator, who never stops reading.

Their situations have changed and now they are homebound. We cannot remember all their contribution to the church, but God remembers. How can we express our gratitude? That is the reason our visitation ministry thrives. We can visit in person or by phone, bringing prayers, communion and church news along with our gratitude. Our gratitude to the homebound congregation is also gratitude to our generous God, evident in these persons' lives and leading us to our next way, our future. Thanks, God, for leading us to our unknown future holding our hands tightly.



Children and Youth Ministry Update







So much change, but so much we can still count on! Each Sunday the children gather upstairs in their beautiful new classroom for candlelighting, scripture, prayer and a story. Then science experiments, art, learning, and running and playing in their church home follow.

In February we learned about friendship, anger and loyalty, and what Matthew 5 teaches us. We made hearts for the Lunch Club, and were joined by youth from the Evolving Church service. Later we climbed "mountains" and built tents on Transfiguration Sunday.

In March we walked a purple silk path lined with stones which turned into bread (and rice crackers!), and talked about what it means to let go of fears and worries during Lent, with scripture including Matthew 4. We read What is God Like, by Rachel Held Evans, and explored the teachings of the Seven Sacred Laws-as the Tenebrae candles were extinguished, the children lit a new candle as part of a community that encourages the spiritual teachings, based on the Seven Grandfather teachings of First Nations elders. Youth Group met twice-for laser tag then pizza at the church, and later for a games day in the church and garden.

April and May brought a return of our lovely flowering Easter cross, and a party in the garden. We were thrilled to receive a generous financial gift from the UCW-many thanks for this support. We provided Children and Youth programming and childminding for the Resurrect Event, along with Sarah Prestwich, Children, Youth and Families coordinator at Duncan United, and Margaret Krawciw, one of our longtime members, now a young adult! Youth Group was indoors and outdoors at the church, with mystery games and yummy food. Scripture exploration included Luke 14 along with a messy science experiment, and we learned about safety at church including a fire drill.

We look forward to Trinity Sunday and Pride Sunday in June, walking in the Pride parade July 9th, and Camp Pringle Family Camp, June 30th to July 2^{nd.}

We see it as a Healing Service, open to the community. So far, Adam Olsen has agreed to be a speaker, and we hope to have special music and candle lighting. As the end of school year is on the horizon, we have purchased healthy packages of "Freezies" for the children of families in the Hamper program. Jacquie Henderson, one of our team, has been helping pack the hampers on Thursday mornings, and Penny Bond is part of the delivery team. We thank those who have donated money for these purchases, including congregation members and the Spiritual Care and Wellness Team through the Margaret Cameron Fund.

This Summer 2022 Newsletter is one of the last newsletters that will be sent out from First

Metropolitan United Church. It will be mailed out in late June to all of those who do not have email along with a summer reflection guide and a prayer card.

The reflection guide was originally developed to accompany the "Emerge: A Metamorphosis Moment" worship series on which we, at First Met, based our worship from April 23 to June 11, 2023. However, we continue to go through transformations throughout our lives. Some of them we initiate ourselves, such as leaving home for the first time to go to college and embarking on a new career or vocation. Others result from external events such as the death of a beloved spouse or parent. Some we undergo with relative ease, while other transformations are hard won after much struggle and heart ache. Some of our transformations are individual, while others, such as the transformation we are undergoing as a congregation, are done as a group. As we embark on the process of amalgamation with Broad View United Church, this guide may help us find our way at this critical juncture.

The prayer card, adapted from "A Prayer for Autumn Days" by Joyce Rupp, also focuses on change and growth and of preparation for seasons that lie beyond.

For those with computers, the newsletter, prayer card, and reflection guide can be downloaded from our website or copies can be picked up at the church on Sundays.

God of the seasons, there is a time for everything; there is a time for birth, a time for dying and a time for rising. We need your grace and courage to enter into the conversion process.

In Summer, the trees are bearing fruit, fulfilling the promise of Spring. We, too, have our moments of fruition.

Like fallen leaves that lay in colored patterns upon the ground in Autumn, our lives have their own particular pattern of growth and surrender, with all their insecurity and risk-taking. Help us to let go.

God of graciousness, you believe in us, you enrich us, you entrust us with the freedom to choose life. For all this we are grateful.

As we experience this season, may we allow it to speak to us of necessary change and growth and of preparation for seasons that lie beyond. Grant us an openness to the continuous process of letting go and moving on, which is part of our human condition. We know that you are our faithful companion on this journey. Your presence is blessing enough. Amen.

A Letter from Rwanda



PLEASE DO NOT STEP OR SIT ON GRAVES WITHERANDAGINE MUNIVA Linda Hallet, a long-time member of our congregation now living in Nova Scotia, wrote this letter to friends at First Met. Linda was a member of Grandmothers for Africa and organized the collection of nursing supplies for a hospital in Uganda where she has frequently volunteered.

Here at last. What a beautiful country Rwanda is. It was a long and challenging journey with three flights and no sleep for 26 hours. Once I had a good nights sleep, the exploring began.

Today I visited the Kigali Genocide Memorial. Even though I have been told the history many times over the last 28+ years, nothing prepares you. The genocide occurred in April 1994. Over one million Tutsi were massacred in 100 days.

At this beautiful memorial they have buried 250.000 victims. So many others were never found.

I implore you to read the history and to know how the colonizers planted hate where neighbours lived once in harmony. They created two groups. They said if you had 10 cows you were Tutsi; if not, then you were Hutu. Tutsis were believed to be smarter and better. This created such hatred and helped create unthinkable horror, beyond my comprehension. Sadly, this is happening even today in other parts of the world.

What Rwanda has done is remarkable. Together with the international Criminal Court Tribunal, they vowed to prosecute high level organizers of the genocide, bringing the leaders to justice. Many of the leaders who committed the atrocities were arrested and sent to prison. Then the labels of Tutsi and Hutu were removed, so now everyone is Rwandan.

They have created a country of forgiveness, where children are taught at school to be proud to be Rwandan and never forget the reasons for what caused the horrors of 1994.

Prisoners who caused unforgivable horror asked those they caused so much pain to for forgiveness and were made to rebuild the country, one house and one road at a time.

Once a month on a Saturday, every Rwandan works side-byside with their neighbours to make their community clean and help build a better place. Sometimes they volunteer alongside someone who destroyed their family. This is Umuganda day.

Three million orphans were left behind. Some families were completely wiped out. This impacted the surrounding countries with over two million refugees fleeing to Uganda, Tanzania and Congo. Burundi, which had it's own genocide in 1993 of over half a million Tutsis sadly never dealt with this atrocity to bring justice through the international courts.

Every year in the month of April the whole country remembers and honours those gone. Rwanda is now a beautiful oasis.

We live in a world so full of anger and hate right now. Send out loving thoughts, hug your family. Smile at a stranger. Bring kindness into that void. We can change things one act of kindness at a time.

As I shed tears at the memorial, a woman next to me cried too. She lost family in the Holocaust. We hugged and wept together.




