Update - Afghan Refugees sponsored by the extended Mangold Family

In 2021, President Biden placed an Executive Order to enhance programs to resettle refugees. American citizens could become part of the solution. On Thanksgiving in November 2021, Matt and Tammie Mangold's extended family prayed about and discussed what they could do to support a refugee family from Afghanistan. Tammie said that they were hearing about the Afghan refugees at military bases waiting for placement. Once the U.S.-supported regime collapsed in Afghanistan, those who fought in the military against the Taliban were at risk for persecution.

The extended Mangold family joined a new program called Sponsor Circles, and named their circle Open Arms Sponsor Circle. They welcomed a nephew and uncle (father's brother) and helped provide initial support as the refugees began a new chapter in their lives in the US. Both the nephew and uncle had served in the military as did the nephew's own father. There are 12 family members still in Afghanistan who also wish to come over to the United States, but have been unable to do so. It is a terribly slow, bureaucratic process. The father of the nephew who also served in the military is still in Afghanistan with his family. He is in hiding. The Taliban has searched their home multiple times.

Initially, the Mangold family was sponsoring the two men, but a third family member (uncle on the nephew's mother's side) has since joined them. Two of the three of them have jobs. The uncle who is not working is taking English classes through the Vernon Adult Ed program. The nephew also took the English classes to gain confidence with his English skills, but has already tested out of the program. They have worked very hard to become proficient English speakers.

They share a small apartment and hope to save up for a larger space. They have become selfsufficient, but have had challenges. For example, in order to pay in-state tuition at a community college in CT, a one year's residence is required. Otherwise, the tuition is charged at out-of-state rates which is three times higher than the in-state tuition. So, taking a class required a one-year wait to avoid paying the out-of-state residents' rate. Tammie has already started to affect changing this policy by bringing it to the attention of our State Rep. Jamie Foster, who is working on it.

ECC donated \$2,000 to the Open Arms Sponsor Circle in 2022. This was a direct contribution to help with the financial requirements to assist their refugee family in relocating. The money was contributed through our Missions Committee, which is funded by a percentage of our pledges. Our pledges have helped to support this beautiful mission.

The refugees from Afghanistan have since become friends of the Mangold family. They attended the Memorial Day parade together, and celebrated Memorial Day with the Mangolds. They expect to work hard as they carve out their place in the United States, and do not need additional financial support at this time. The Sponsors Circle provided the framework, and the extended Mangold family modeled loving and serving others as we are called to do as Christians. Hebrews 10:24 encourages us, stating: And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds.

MEET THE COMMITTEE – GROWTH and NURTURE COMMITTEE

Our Bylaws enumerate three primary duties for the Growth and Nurture Committee. These are to attract people to the church, to welcome those who come, and to assimilate new members into the life of our church.

Some of the ways that Growth and Nurture has fulfilled these duties is by administering our mentor program for new members, preparing and attending new member orientation sessions, and welcoming new members during Sunday services. They also work with the Outreach and Media Coordinator to arrange church advertising and develop programs to nurture our church members and to strengthen church community ties.

The committee has created some intergenerational programs that were open to the community and to members and friends, such as new member dinners, Fall Family Fun Night, a town-wide scavenger hunt, a Zoom drawing class, a November gratitude challenge, weekly walks in Arbor Park, and creating baskets for ECC's high school seniors. During Winterfest, the Growth and Nurture Committee has sponsored very successful Gingerbread House competitions which is planned again for this year.

The Welcoming Ministry that they administer along with the Diaconate is a structured process for recognizing visitors and helping them to get acquainted with ECC at the visitor's pace, making them comfortable and providing them with information to help them learn and become involved.

The gift of administration with skills like planning, organizing and completing tasks within deadlines is a spiritual gift that would be a good fit with Growth and Nurture. Many of the projects undertaken by Growth and Nurture include some organizing, planning, and following through. The spiritual gift of exhortation which is defined as offering comfort and encouragement to others is a beautiful gift that Growth and Nurture members may have. As members of our faith community are comforted and encouraged, especially new members or those needing additional care, exhortation is another great fit for a member of the Growth and Nurture Committee. Serving is another spiritual gift that is very beneficial to the Growth and Nurture Committee. Hospitality is a form of service, and welcoming visitors, new members and the community is a very core part of our Growth and Nurture mission. Finally, the spiritual gift of leadership, including motivating the church body to achieve church goals is a wonderful gift for a Growth and Nurture member.

Growth and Nurture is a fun, creative committee that works to bind our church community closer together. The variety of spiritual gifts that would enhance the work of the committee include, but are certainly not limited to what is listed above. If you enjoy welcoming newcomers and helping engage and include people into our faith community, Growth and Nurture may be the perfect place for you.

Thank You to Our Many Volunteers

The number of hours that our volunteers provide to keep our church running is surprising and even amazing. There are so many places where members and friends step up, and we would not have an active, working church without them. And we simply could not afford to pay for the many positions and service that our church volunteers provide.

On any given month, there are at least 63 volunteer hours that happen for Sunday worship-service. That includes ushers, deacons (more than one on a communion Sunday), at least one teacher, a videographer, a lay reader, and about 9 choir members. On Sundays with our Senior Bell Choir, you can add another 12 hours per worship service. One estimate of the total number of volunteer hours on a "regular" month is about 930 hours. (This would not be during a Farmhouse Fair month, for example.) Our agreements with paid staff total about 530 hours per month. It is very clear that volunteers are essential to the smooth running of our church and all of our programs and ministries.

Just the bylaw positions alone (officers, and permanent boards & committees) number 97 positions. During our nominating/recruitment in the fall, we are rightly focused on filling these positions from Moderator to Clerk to Historians, to Trustees, to Diaconate and more. However, there is so much more that goes on at our church, and people are stepping up in many ways to enhance our church activities.

We have Ad Hoc committees, such as HR, the Worship Visioning Team, and Ad Hoc Interim Assistants, as well as ministries such as Prayer Shawl, Sacred Stitches, Prayer Group, Friendship Class and Caritas. The Senior Choir, the Senior Bells and our talented musicians are an integral part of our worship service. Don't forget our lay readers who are not part of a committee, but serve during worship every week. Then there are teachers, youth leaders, confirmation mentors, and confirmation assistants. We have our videographer and backups for streaming, a computer person, some Zoom volunteers, a sound system person for outdoor services, a whole group of people who set up and take down the creche for every Advent season and so many more behind-the-scenes people, many of whom are not in the spotlight but still critical to our success.

We have garden & labyrinth caretakers, buyers for kitchen supplies, decorators for seasonal, outdoor décor, a clock/time volunteer, another for our carillon, a volunteer who assembles the bulletins and straightens the materials in the pews every week and a photographer. We also benefit from professional services donated such as attorney's fees and advice. Our Fellowship Hour is amazing and again, all done by volunteer hours. This is all in addition to our "official" positions such as our Treasurers, Financial Secretaries, Auditor, Board of Christian Education, Growth & Nurture Committee, Stewardship Committee, Ushers and more. Of the 14+ people who spend a couple of hours each month at the Prudential Committee meeting, most are also volunteers. Over 60 people participated in the small group meetings as volunteers and 8 also acted as facilitators of those small groups. Finally, we have auxiliary groups such as Women's Fellowship, and the Winterfest Committee who not only provide community outreach, but real financial benefits to the church for their work. There are also special projects like Blood Drives and other events. There are many people who provide Christian service to our church.

Let us take a moment to reflect and offer deep gratitude on the many who offer their time and talents to our church and its ministry, or who have done so in the past. Volunteer hours are not "free" hours. The time/cost is paid for by the person rather than the church, but there is still a cost. Everyone's time, staff or volunteer is valuable and not unlimited. Our church is so blessed to have many collaborative hands doing God's work. Thank you so very much to all of our church volunteers past and present!

The project of bringing the fire doors up to code continues. Most of the actual door replacements have happened, and installation continues as materials become available. The installed doors are gray in color, and are coming directly from the factory. There will be some painting or touching up as needed.

There are also two wooden-panels that need to be replaced with fireproof panels in the ceiling, which are also required to bring the church up to code per the Fire Marshal. One panel is above the steps to the choir loft outside of the pastor's office. The other is at the top of the stairs at the front of the church where the ladder is that goes up into the steeple.

The air conditioning units in the Sanctuary and Social Room have been serviced for the summer. Window units have been installed in the offices and room 201.

The final toilet-seat has been installed in our church, thank you to Chris Pettigrew! There will be new, toilet-paper holders installed as well.

Finally, the Trustees are looking at the options for replacing our office safe. There will be a drop-in feature just like the current safe offers.
