Prince of Peace Mission Statement

A congregation's mission statement is meant to express how a particular community of faith lives out their baptismal call to follow Jesus. There are as many ways to be disciples as there are Christians, but a mission statement guides and focuses a community's journey of faith as they strive to worship, learn, serve, and grow together in a particular time and place.

After COVID kept us apart for so many months, individuals and smaller groups within the congregation felt isolated. Many of us wondered when and how we could fully come back together since so much had changed during those difficult months. We also knew things wouldn't be exactly the same and we'd need to re-evaluate how to be in community with one another.

To further this process, our congregation council asked each of the congregational committees to consider how the ministry area they lead is part of the larger whole - the entire ministry of the congregation. To do this, we asked the committee members to consider the congregation's mission statement and then craft a mission statement for their committee that expresses how their committee's work supports the overall mission of the congregation.

God's Work Our Hands Day is September 10!



Bedlam: An Intimate Journey Into America's Mental Health Crisis by Kenneth Paul Rosenberg

A psychiatrist and award-winning documentarian sheds light on the mental health care crisis in the U.S. There has never been a more important time for this conversation, as one in five adults — 40 million Americans — experiences mental illness each year. Today, the largest mental institution in the U.S. is the LA County Jail, and the last refuge for many of the 20,000 mentally ill people living on the streets of Los Angeles is LA County Hospital. There, Dr. Rosenberg begins his chronicle of what it means to be mentally ill in America today, integrating his own moving story of how the system failed his sister, Merle, who had schizophrenia.

Caste, The Origins of Our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson The Pulitzer Prize-winning, bestselling author of *The Warmth of Other Suns* examines the unspoken caste system that has shaped America and shows how our lives today are still defined by a hierarchy of human divisions.

House in the Cerulean Sea by T J Klune
TJ Klune is a Lambda Literary Award-winning author (Into This River I Drown). Being queer himself, TJ believes it's important—now more than ever—to have accurate, positive, queer representation in stories.

An enchanting story, masterfully told, The House in the Cerulean Sea is about the profound experience of discovering an unlikely family in an unexpected place—and realizing that family is yours.

The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We Can Prosper Together by Heather McGhee
One of today's most insightful and influential thinkers offers a powerful exploration of inequality and the lesson that generations of Americans have failed to learn: Racism has a cost for everyone—not just for people of color.

See No Stranger by Valarie Kaur

Kaur takes readers through her own riveting journey as a brown girl growing up in California farmland finding her place in the world; as a young adult galvanized by the murders of Sikhs after 9/11; as a law student fighting injustices in American prisons and on Guantánamo Bay; as an activist working with communities recovering from xenophobic attacks; and as a woman trying to heal from her own experiences with police violence and sexual assault. Drawing from the wisdom of sages, scientists, and activists, Kaur reclaims love as an active, public, and revolutionary force that creates new possibilities for ourselves, our communities, and our world. See No Stranger helps us imagine new ways of being with each other—and with ourselves—so that together we can begin to build the world we want to see.

The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness by Michelle Alexander

Seldom does a book have the impact of Michelle Alexander's, *The New Jim Crow*. Since it was first published in 2010, it has been cited in judicial decisions and has been adopted in campus-wide and community-wide reads; it helped inspire the creation of the Marshall Project and the new \$100 million Art for Justice Fund; it has been the winner of numerous prizes, including the prestigious NAACP Image Award; and it has spent nearly 250 weeks on the New York Times bestseller list.

Transforming: The Bible & the Lives of Transgender Christians by Austen Hartke

In 2014, Time magazine announced that America had reached "the transgender tipping point," suggesting that transgender issues would become the next civil rights frontier. Years later, many people—even many LGBTQ allies—still lack understanding of gender identity and the transgender experience. Into this void, Austen Hartke offers a biblically based, educational, and affirming resource to shed light and wisdom on this modern gender landscape.

Unclobbered: Rethinking our Misuse of the Bible on Homosexuality by Colby Martin

Armed with only six passages in the Bible—often known as the "Clobber Passages"—the conservative Christian position has been one that stands against the full inclusion of our LGBTQ siblings. *UnClobbered* reexamines each of those frequently quoted passages of Scripture, alternating with author Colby Martin's own story of being fired from an evangelical megachurch when they discovered his stance on sexuality.

Understanding Mental Illness by Carlin Barnes and Marketa Wills

Get the straight facts about mental illness from two Harvard trained psychiatrists. More than 40 million people in the US suffer from mental health problems — yet less than half receive adequate care and treatment. This book is a practical guide to educate and help everyone better understand mental health.

<u>Lutheran World Relief quilts</u>, school backpacks, health kits and sewing kits in significant numbers are made here and sent all over the world to help war torn countries, third world populations, climate affected areas, natural disaster events and people in crisis anywhere in Gods name.

<u>Many Others</u>: Local marginalized populations are helped daily through monetary donations, food distribution, project connect, clothing collections, free store, shelter meals, Christmas food and gift baskets, foster children, and domestic violence shelter support in Gods name.

Youth/Christian Ed

CYF Ministry shares the congregational mission statement of Touched by the Gospel, we seek to be instruments of God's peace for the sake of the world. In their classes and events, they learn scripture stories, wrestle with what faith and the Bible mean to them, and engage in ways that blend our Christian teaching with life in the world.

While CYF Ministry isn't fully SILOED, it is still different. Its especially important that we give extra focus and care to our young people in the congregation because they are in their formative years. They need to learn, see, and hear for themselves just as much as they need to observe the adults around them living these values out in their lives. They need to see and hear within their faith community and

be invited to work alongside those adults.

It isn't impossible for an adult who was raised without a faith connection to seek one out, but its rare! Nurturing the faith in our children and youth is, and should remain, a priority for the whole community.



I hope reading through these statements gave you a clearer sense of who we are and how we worship, learn, serve, and grow together here at POP. I hope you also got to sense the immense love and care of the many leaders who spend hundreds of hours each year leading each of these areas of ministry. We are blessed with an incredibly gifted community!

Like most statements about who we are and how we live together in community, these mission statements are living, breathing, changeable documents that can be edited to reflect the truth of our current circumstances as necessary. But they are also reminders of who we've said we are and how we want to live our faith and they can help us re-focus on what's most important when that is necessary, too. Finally, these statements can help us remember that our work isn't just about the details of planning events or providing resources its about sharing the good news of Gods love and grace with our neighbors and working for justice and peace in all the world. And that's work we never have to do alone!

Council and Committees



Council met via Zoom on Wednesday, July 19, 2023.

God Moments:

Dick shared that the children from our adopted Congolese family were cold during worship. Dianne H got each of them a prayer shawl. As they were giving them back after the service, Dick told them that they could keep them. The children were thrilled with the gift.

Pastor Rachel met recently with Dean and Jane K. Dean is a charter member of Prince of Peace, joining with his family at the age of 7. When Pastor asked them, "When were you most proud to be part of this community?" Neither person hesitated before responding, "Right now."

Faith Formation Survey/Schedule for Fall:

At the time council met, 55 households had responded. The majority of responses lean toward moving worship to 10:30 in the fall and having Faith Formation (formerly Sunday School) activities at 9:15. This new schedule does bring up some potential scheduling issues for choir, handbells and worship team. The Faith Formation team will be working to mitigate these issues. There also appears to be a preference for weekly programming instead of biweekly. People are looking for different programming for different generations, with occasional intergenerational events. Some people have expressed interest/ willingness to assist. The team's next meeting was Sunday, July 23, to plan next steps. A curriculum has been tentatively identified for Pre-K to 6th grade and the team is hoping to firm that up soon.

Lord of Life Lutheran Church, Portage, MI:

Lord of Life's pastor, Joan Herbon, is on permanent medical leave. The Lord of Life (LoL) leadership told Bishop Satterlee they could only afford a half-time rostered clergy. At synod assembly in May, the bishop asked PoP and LoL to consider if there is an opportunity for shared ministry in some way. Dick Hewitt, Lisa Creed and Pastor Rachel met with some members of the Lord of Life (LoL) leadership recently. Pastor Rachel led the discussion at the joint meeting and was quick to dispel any concern about "PoP taking over LoL" or "merging LoL into PoP."

Lord of Life needs continuity and consistency and now they have a "regular" supply pastor in place. At the meeting they talked about the ministries and mission for each of the congregations, including areas where we may be able to benefit from shared ministries, such as Prayer Shawl ministry, Advent or Lenten worship, etc. LoL was to take the results of the conversation back to their congregation and determine what they really want moving forward. Prince of Peace will continue with the current process for calling a deacon.

12 New Sanctuary Chairs with Arms!

Thank you to the Property Committee for covering the cost to purchase 12 chairs with arms for our sanctuary. Council approved the expenditure at the July meeting. These chairs are especially helpful to some of our members with mobility issues. Not sure when they'll arrive, but watch for them.

Council Liaison Changes

Paula Kana'an is now the liaison to the Congregational Care Team. Gail MacNellis will serve as the liaison to the Fellowship Committee.

Property Committee Updates: The security cameras for our parking lot have arrived. Property is working to get them installed and functioning. Also the replacement LED bulbs for the sanctuary have arrived and will be installed soon.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, August 16.
