The scriptures help us to grow in our faith and to participate in God's good purpose. We also learn from what might be referred to as the book of Creation – where we meet God present in the world around us. In this Season of Creation, we are invited to consider how God is speaking to us and teaching us through Creation. I wonder how God meets you. Can you think of a time when God unexpectedly spoke to you in an encounter in nature? What did that experience teach you? How do these kinds of experiences inspire you to love God and our beloved world?

I may not be able to go back to my favourite rock anymore, but I have learned that there are many places in nature that awaken within me a

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deep sense of God's presence. I think I need to do this more often! How about you? Take off your sandals, you're standing on holy ground.

#### MEET THE NEW PARISH ADMINISTRATOR

Hi, I'm Gillian, your new Parish Administrator. I've passed my three month probation - yeah! - so I guess that means I'll be around St. Paul's for a while yet. I'm no spring chicken, and feel really privileged to find purpose after retirement and serve your church community. You could say my life has come full circle. You see, I was baptized into the Church of England. Or was I baptized...? My family came from good British stock (born under the Bow Bells in London, England) and I was told we were Church of England, but my parents had no time for church or Christianity. No worries though, the Baptists took care of that with full immersion many years later!

God must have had His hand on my shoulder though, since after immigration to Toronto and starting school, my best friend was part of a large Irish family who offered to take me to their United Church. On a Sunday morning, my parents would tell me to go back to bed and I would say "No - I'm going to church!". Many years later my journey crossed paths with the Minister from those early years. By then he was retired, writing books and leading an organization called Christian Discovery. As a young mom with two daughters, I had the privilege to work from home for him for eight years. Many moves over the years took our family in search of teachings which felt right with the God who touched our lives and we attended several Protestant denominations - reading many theologians along the way and worshipping most often through the gifts of music.

Our journey brought us to British Columbia and life on Protection Island, where you could say nature has been our church; again

feeling privileged to be surrounded by so much beauty of God's creation. And now my daily commute has me on the Protection Connection Ferry, taking me here to St. Paul's, where the love of God is reflected in the people, in the building and in your message to the community.

#### FROM THE WARDEN'S CORNER

My goodness, so much has happened since our last Contact. It is a pleasure to give you an update from the Warden's team. First, Deputy Rector's Warden Sandra Leigh recently resigned her position for health reasons and because she lives just outside Parksville and it's a huge commitment to be driving to Nanaimo on a regular basis. We were very fortunate Sandra remained as part of the Warden's team for as long as she did and we were truly blessed with having her as part of our leadership team at St. Paul. We are so happy she remains a member of our parish and one of the leaders of our morning prayer on Zoom.

And before I go any further, I would like to remind you about the role of the Wardens. Currently our Wardens are Joy Adams Bauer (Rector's Warden, appointed by the Incumbent); Sue Gueulette (People's Warden, elected by the parish); and Heather Lester (Deputy People's Warden, elected by the parish). Warden's act jointly at all times; no one can act without the consent of the other. They must also always function in concert with the incumbent. With the assistance of the Treasurer, they are responsible for the care and accounting of all money given to the congregation. They are responsible for the overall financial health of the parish. The Canons of our Diocese lay out 15 specific responsibilities. Being a Warden is not for the faint of heart!

The parish recently became a member of the Nanaimo Chamber of Commerce. This membership fits with the community and collaboration goals of our Ministry Plan. As Chamber members we raise our profile in the community and educate many organizations about our various ministries. We will be hosting Chamber members in our church hall at a "business after business" event in the spring of next year.

Parish Council held a day long planning session this past spring to spend some time fleshing out our Ministry Plan and determining some concrete actions we can take under each of our three goals. Do you remember what they are? Some examples of specific actions include our book study; our let's meet our neighbours event last month; our lunch and learn sessions that will begin this fall, and our stewardship campaign. Stay tuned!

The Wardens had to make a very difficult decision this spring when we eliminated the position of facilities/community engagement coordinator. We take our responsibility for the finances of the parish very seriously and made the decision because for the past almost two years we have been in a deficit position each and every month. When you spend thousands more dollars than you bring in in revenue, very challenging decisions have to

be made. We have gone from having a staff position at 32 hours a week to 15 hours a week with the hiring of our Parish Administrator, Gillian Bigl, in June.

While we received a substantial gift earlier this year, the Wardens and Rev Clara decided that in order to be good stewards of this gift, we would invest the donation for a minimum of one year and not rush to disburse any of the funds until we have had the opportunity to discern together our future needs. Parish Council passed the following motion at its January 19, 2023 meeting: "That because of the operating deficit, the parish not spend any of the new money for a period of at least one year, but invest it at the best possible rate of interest."

Your Wardens take their responsibilities very seriously. We are dedicated Christians and volunteers and appreciate your support.

# HAPPENINGS AROUND THE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

There has been lots of activity over the summer around the building, both inside and out! Thanks and congratulations to the Garden Party (Julia Roberts, Gwen Ingham and Brian Humber) for the installation of the "solid rock garden" under the St. Matthew Room window. Nothing seemed to grow there successfully, and now it looks great! The team has also noted areas of the lawn that are not being reached by the current sprinkler system layout. Once the sprinkling restrictions are lifted, this will be addressed, hopefully in the Fall. We are so grateful to all our Garden Party helpers for keeping our grounds looking so fresh and inviting. Our hardy handyman, Brian Humber, has been kept busy. In July, he refinished the Gates bench in the garden, and a new plaque was installed with both Reg and Blanche's names on it. Shortly after the refurbishment, someone carved a piece out of the seat, but Brian has that already repaired. The front doors of the church are being removed for refinishing at Hartmann's, as they were damaged over the winter. They will be taken away on September 11, and returned in a week or two, depending on the extent of the damage. Brian, ably assisted by Brian Clarke, will be boarding up the entrance way for the duration.

Brian does a myriad of small repairs around the building on an ongoing basis - leaky taps, plugged toilets, paint touch -ups, crumbling steps, etc. We are very blessed to have him in this ministry.

## FROM THE ORGAN BENCH—CRIMOND and CWM RHONDDA

I like to compare hymnals to a smorgasbord — lots to enjoy but not everyone wants the anchovies, or ripe olives, or mushrooms.

The Lord's My Shepherd dates back to the Scottish Psalter of 1650 but it was only in 1930 that the tune CRIMOND appeared in a Canadian hymnal and only with the publication of the ubiquitous Red Peril (properly titled The Hymn Book) in 1972 that it was finally officially available to Canadian Anglicans, albeit in a copyright dodging arrangement, although many parishes had been singing from pirated 4-part copies of CRIMOND for decades.

An amusing incident occurred during Lent of 1960 when the organist of historic St. Paul's Halifax [1749] had gone off to Barbados on holiday and left a bunch of organ students to fill in. As we sat in judgement on one of our fellows presiding at one of the largest organs in the city, Hymn 547-1 was announced and the student began the first verse — not a peep from the congregation. Tune #1 (Evan) was obviously not familiar so she launched into Tune #2, then #3 eliciting the same congregational silence. In desperation she began Tune #4. Knowing that the result would be identical, I slithered up the side aisle, eased her off the bench and began playing CRIMOND by ear. Success! The hymn finally got underway — perhaps badly played but familiar. We discovered, much too late, the titular's personal copy of The Hymn Book (1930) with CRIMOND pasted in over the unfamiliar tunes. The explanation was that the owners of copyright had balked at the compilers' compensation amount and withdrew permission. J.Edmund Jones, the secretary of the 1930 Hymn Book Committee offered an alternate tune and it became Tune #4 — although likely never sung anywhere.

Another favourite hymn, *Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah* [or Redeemer, depending on editorial whim] really only became associated with CWM RHONDDA [koom rrontha] with the publication of The English Hymnal in 1906. Some American churches didn't discover CWM RHONDDA until the second half of the 20th century — some still haven't! A perusal of hymnals published since 1900 produces at least a dozen tunes and the exclusion of CWM RHONDDA [as in The Hymn Book 1930-2] and its first appearance in Canada was in the United Church's HYMNARY - 1920. Again, many Anglican parishes found ways to sing that catchy tune before it finally appeared in the 1972 hymnal.

While we all enjoy our familiar tunes, many fine, singable, arguably beautiful tunes, many being much improved replacements for the old, remain out of reach because editorial committees haven't been able to come to agreement with copyright owners. Our current hymnal COMMON PRAISE, despite a plethora of new hymns and tunes, missed the boat in some cases. Occasionally you may hear some of these beautiful new tunes (and texts) sung as anthems by the choir. Meanwhile, we continue to explore the many yet unsung new and beautiful hymns and tunes in COMMON PRAISE which, TWENTY-FIVE YEARS after its publication, still await our tasting.

Most Sunday mornings the organ (or piano) prelude music is based on some of these new tunes — usually ones that will appear as anthems or hymns in the following weeks. If you like what you hear, I'm always ready to reveal the sources.

## **NOTES FROM THE TREASURER**

Fellow parishioners, several weeks ago I published the Treasurer's reports for June and July in the Sunday morning insert. Some of you may have been shocked to realize that our Operating funds were already over \$103,000.00 in the hole, and it was only July. If you had not seen it, here it is again.

The final figures for August are not available yet, but I can assure you that the Operating deficit is only continuing to grow. Without additional income the parish will easily blow past the \$115,000.00 deficit budget within the next month or so. We have already used up all the gift we received in 2021, which was the cushion with which we were covering the deficit budget. It will not be long before we need to start drawing funds from the \$1M gift we received earlier this year. This financial bleeding cannot continue and is not sustainable going into the future.

There are opportunities between now and the end of the year to increase our income. The first opportunity is with the Thanksgiving offering envelope which will be mailed out to all parishioners within the month. The other opportunities will be to support the Christmas Marketplace and use the Christmas offering envelopes in December.

In my opinion, as a parish we need to find ourselves a responsible business partner to lease our building or portion thereof on a consistent basis; along with increased personal giving to make us financially sustainable going forward into 2024.


