




SEWN WETH LOVE

St. Mary's Quilters is a group of members from both our congregation and the community working together to provide quilts locally across the world. We meet on Monday mornings from 8:30-11:30 in the gym. We WELCOME new members. You need not know how to sew. We have members who tie, cut, measure, iron, and those that participate by working at home. This industrious group has donated over 5100 hours of time to this project this year.

From Oct. 1, 2022 to Sept. 30, 2023 we have made over 350 quilts. Many have been donated to: The ELCA Urban Outreach Center (78), Grace Welcome Center (120), Lutherdale (6), and the local Afghan Resettlement (2) and to a member in Brookside. We also have boxed 131 Quilts to be sent to Lutheran World Relief.

Please know it is through your generosity of money and material donations that make this ministry possible. We use any funds provided to purchase batting, thread and some sheets for backings. Tops and some backs are made from fabrics donated to us.



Apple- Cinnamon Mini Doughnuts

1 tablespoon sugar plus 1/3 cup, divided

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon plus 3/4 teaspoon, divided

1 cup white whole-wheat flour

½ teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon ground nutmeg

½ teaspoon ground allspice

½ teaspoon ground ginger


1 large egg

2 tablespoons butter, melted

½ cup apple cider

1 cup finely chopped peeled apple





- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Coat two 12-cup nonstick or silicone mini doughnut pans (or two 6-cup regular-size nonstick or silicone doughnut pans) with cooking spray.
- 2. Combine 1 tablespoon sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon in a small bowl. Set aside.
- 3. Whisk the remaining 1/3 cup sugar and 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, with flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg, allspice and ginger in a large bowl. Whisk egg, butter and cider in a medium bowl. Mix the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients until just combined. Fold in apple. Fill each mini doughnut cup with a scant 1 tablespoon batter (or each regular cup with a scant 2 tablespoons).

Bake the doughnuts until a toothpick comes out clean, about 15 minutes. Let cool in the pan for 2 minutes, then tap out onto a wire rack. Dredge the warm doughnuts in the reserved cinnamon-sugar mixture to coat.

Store airtight for up to 2 days; if desired, coat with more cinnamon sugar before serving. For the best flavor, store airtight in the freezer.

NURSE SUE—ADVOCATE FAITH & HEALTH



Dear Friends,

The cool crisp mornings, pumpkins, and apples, all are enjoyed as fall approaches. Many of you are making visits to the local apple orchards and farmer markets. Apples are so enjoyable and not meant to be consumed only in the fall. Research confirms that your health would gain from consuming apples all year long! Go Apples!

If you are old enough, you have heard "an apple a day helps keep the doctor away." Is there any truth to this old-fashioned saying that's been passed down. Here's what the research is showing on the health benefits of apples:

- * Apples are very high in antioxidants called "flavonoids". In fact, apples have the second highest level of antioxidants of any U.S. fruit. Antioxidants help decrease inflammation and keep cells healthy. These same flavonoids have also been shown in studies to help reduce your risk for type 2 diabetes and heart disease. Make sure to consume the peel of apples. Two-thirds of the antioxidants in apples are found in the peel!
- Apples are high in heart-protective soluble fiber. Soluble fiber is gluey and gel-like. As it travels through your digestive system, it grabs onto cholesterol and prevents it from being absorbed back into the bloodstream. This helps to reduce cholesterol levels and decrease the risk for heart disease.
- The soluble fiber in apples also helps with portion control, blood glucose and weight management. When you eat something with fiber, water is attracted to it and fills up the stomach which provides a feeling of fullness. Soluble fiber helps food break down more slowly, leading to smaller peaks in blood glucose and feeling fuller for longer.
- Eating apples may lead to less hardening of the arteries. Research studies found that eating an apple a day for four weeks lowered LDL or "bad" cholesterol by 40%.

- Apples may also lower levels of C-reactive protein, a key marker of inflammation. In a six -month research study, eating an apple a day was found in research to decrease C-reactive protein by 32%.
- An Oxford study found that eating an apple a day may be just as beneficial as taking a statin to prevent death from heart attack, stroke, and vascular disease in people over 50 who don't previously have heart disease.

Enjoy the apples that are in our community and try the shared recipe Apple- Cinnamon Mini Doughnuts...just like making cupcakes! I am praying for your good health!

A Fresh Look at the Many Opportunities to CONNECT at St. Mary's! October, 2023

WORSHIP ON SATURDAYS, 5PM* & SUNDAYS, 9AM

Worship will be entirely inside the sanctuary. Both worship services' orders of worship will be the same, except when we celebrate a <u>Holden Evening Prayer</u> service at 5:00pm Saturdays and a Contemporary led service at 9:00am Sundays. Worship materials include using the ELW hymnal, printed bulletins, announcement sheets, etc. Printed material available online at our church's website under "uploaded documents".

Holy Communion at the railing or from your seat as needed; on Sundays that are Contemporary style (2nd Sunday each month) communion will be by intinction. Gluten-Free or regular wafer, wine or juice offered. Children who haven't received instruction yet, or anyone not receiving communion may come forward for a blessing instead. Simply fold your hands when approaching.

Sharing of Peace during worship will now be up to you: [the people] you may greet one another with a sign of Christ's peace, and may say, "Peace be with you" or similar words. You may consider a gesture without physical touch, perhaps a slight bow, or crossing arms over the chest, as a symbol of an embrace.

Offering: Passing the Plate Our ushers will once again enter the sanctuary space and pass the offering plates through the pews. You are welcome to give that way, online or mailing in your checks.

Worship Greeters: Worship greeters are the first impression of St. Mary's fellowship. They welcome parishioners and guests into the sanctuary. They also make sure bulletins and any announcements available are handed out. If informed that the people are visiting, they encourage them to sign our guest book. We ask greeters to be available 20-30 minutes before services. Usually greeters participate once or twice a month.
