We are finite. We can't make the most of every opportunity. There are simply too many options available to us. No amount of time management or life hacking will make it possible for any one of us to do everything. We have to make choices. In order to say an enthusiastic "YES!" to something and commit with our whole hearts, we must also be prepared to say a faithful "No" to something else.

Figuring out when it is faithful to say yes and when it is faithful to say no is a process. We call it discernment. Here are some questions that have helped me when I've been in this process:

Does saying yes (or no) to this opportunity feel life-giving? When did I last feel joy in this group/activity/opportunity? What would change if I started (or stopped) this activity? Is this something I feel *called* to do or *pressured* to do? Which voices am I trusting to help me with this decision?

Listening for trustworthy voices has often been the most helpful part of the discernment process for me. In the Gospel of John, Jesus says that his sheep hear his voice and follow him (10:27). Later, when he is before Pilate, he says that everyone who belongs to the truth listens to his voice (18:37). Listening for Jesus' voice is the key.

In my life, Jesus' voice has often come through the voices of other people asking me questions that made me think about my decision in new ways or offering stories of their own encounters with joy. Reading scripture and participating in worship has helped me "tune in" to God's voice so I recognize it when I hear it. Learning to ask for time to think and pray about decisions has also allowed me space to listen carefully for Jesus.

If you would like a partner in your own discernment process, you can always make an appointment with me to talk things through. There are also many wise and faithful members of this congregation who I'm sure would be happy to journey with you.





RECORD BREAKING God's Work. Our Hands, Day, held at Prince of Peace Sunday September 10-

Lutheran World Relief donations were out done in every category of projects this year.

Here are the numbers.

LWR Quilts - 130

LWR Backpack/School Kits - 218 LWR Health/Personal Care Kits - 408

Those items were (or will soon be) packed in 120 boxes, delivered to the truck pick up site at St. Michael's on October 13 and then transported to LWR warehouses in Minneapolis Minnesota. From there, they will be combined with hundreds of thousands of similar items and shipped all over the world in Lutheran relief efforts.

Quilts will serve as bedding, tent tops, hospital gurneys, packing bundles and sometimes even burial shrouds.

Backpacks will be sent to refugee tent schools and schools that have endured natural disasters and wars. Health kits will be sent to refugee camps, natural disasters and war sites. Anywhere that immediate personal necessities are needed.

Plyarn mats were also made on GWOH day and have been used for the homeless, in hospice, and are currently being sent to Ethiopia.

PoP Prayer Shawl Ministry worked on GWOH day knitting and crocheting. This group sends prayers and comforting blankets to our PoP community and many others in the area to help heal in body and spirit.

The Jubilee Garden was weeded, harvested and planted. Delivery to Mothers of Hope and Kalamazoo Loaves and Fishes was done later in the week by the devoted Gardeners.







Council and Committees



Church Council enjoyed a hybrid meeting on September 20, meeting both in person and online.

City of Portage Grant Program: Guest, Don Jones,

shared that there has been a group from POP working with City of Portage on a funding opportunity: Pastor Rachel, Tamara P, Mike W, Marilyn S, Don J, Dave R, Sue S, and Claudia L. The City of Portage has a grant program that allocates \$250K on an annual basis. It is an open grant process. Applications get screened by the grant board. Don listed several past recipients, including other faith-based organizations. The city is focused on housing stability and acknowledges that there are many things that impact housing stability. The POP working group has reviewed the application, asked questions of the city, and are asking for council's endorsement to submit an application. The funds, if granted, would be used to support food distribution, free store, and the Good Samaritan Fund. The timeline is as follows: 1) application due the end of November; 2) grant committee review in February/ March; 3) allocation decisions made in April; and 4) funds distributed on a reimbursement basis at a 6 month check-in and again in July the following year. The working group is asking for support of the council to continue to work on this and towards submitting a grant application. Lee Banitt moved to support and Lisa Creed seconded. Motion passed.

Finance Committee Recommendation: Funds in our accounts over \$250,000 are not insured and are not gaining interest. The Finance Committee recommended to council that \$100K be placed in a Certificate of Deposit for a one-year term with a fixed interest rate of 4.8%. Secondly, they recommended that \$100K go to a Flourish cash account. Money is completely liquid, so it can be withdrawn anytime. The interest rate for this account is variable and is currently at 5%. All interest garnered from these two accounts would go to support the Good Samaritan Fund. Dave Reinhold moved and Carol Christianson seconded that we approve and move forward with these recommendations. Motion carried.

Property Updates:

Outdoor Security Cameras: Thanks to Jeremy Zimmerman and Mike Whately, the cameras are installed and functional.

<u>Sanctuary Exit Doors</u>: The outside doors in the sanctuary are rotting at the bottom. New doors have been ordered. <u>Social Hall Blinds</u>: New blinds have been selected. Property is looking for volunteers to paint the window trim prior to installation. If you can help, please contact Pete Eldridge, Property Chair, or Paul Swodzinski, Council Liaison.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, October 18, at 7 p.m.

Honey Extraction

On **Sunday, September 17th,** the church kitchen became a honey house as about a dozen people helped extract the first honey crop from the Jubilee Garden Apiary.

A few days prior, two boxes (called "supers") were removed from the U of M hive after being cleared of bees using an escape board (sort of a one-way valve that let the bees leave but doesn't let them back in). The supers were stacked on a warming box to keep the honey warm (75°-80°F) to make it easier to extract.

Once the supers were removed, the honey extraction process involved multiple steps, including uncapping, extracting, and straining, with most of the steps all happening at the same time as everyone pitched in and got their hands sticky. Frames of capped honey (each super has 10 frames) were removed one at a time and uncapped using a heated uncapping tool.

The sticky cappings were collected in a large tank and allowed to drain overnight (that is, except for the honey and cappings that people sampled, one of the perks of the job!); the honey collected from the cappings in this way was added to the total harvest.



Once both sides of the frame were uncapped, the frame was placed in a basket in the extractor - basically a large centrifuge that holds three frames at a time. When three frames had been loaded into the extractor, they were spun rapidly using an electric drill. As the frames spun, the honey was thrown from the comb onto the wall of the extractor, where it ran down and collected in the bottom. Because only one side of the frame can be extracted at a time, the frames had to be turned over and spun a second time to get all the honey.

Periodically, the honey that collected in the bottom of the extractor was drained into a large pot, and was then transferred to a storage bucket by pouring it through a strainer to remove bits of wax that inevitably end up in the extracted honey.

The honey (30 to 40 pounds) will be allowed to remain in the bucket for at least a few days to allow bubbles to float to the top before being drawn from the bucket into smaller containers - Mason jars, squeeze bears, honey jars, etc.

At this point, the job was still not quite done, though. All the sticky equipment, including the now-empty-but-still-sticky combs and gooey cappings, was placed outside near the bee hives for the bees to clean up. Within about 24 hours, there wasn't a trace of honey left anywhere, the bees having lapped it up and taken it back to their hives!

The equipment was then washed and put away, the empty combs stored for reuse next spring, and the cappings collected to be rendered to make all kinds of things - candles, soap, lip balm, hand cream, and so on.

Hopefully, this is just the first of many honey harvests from the Jubilee Garden Apiary!
