Minister's Message

Changing seasons: Outside and In - Mark Green

Leaves are changing colour and the morning air has a chill in it. Fall is a time of great transition. In so many ways this season is like a parable for what we are experiencing as a congregation. We are in a time of great transition as well. And as with any change, there are parts that are exhilarating and parts that are frightening.

I'm reminded of the Leo Buscaglia story "The Fall of Freddie the leaf". The story is a parable about life and death and the hope of rebirth. Freddie has spent his life learning about the world around him from the vantage point of a tree that is the only home and perspective he's known. He's enjoyed his life and the changing seasons but as fall comes and winter approaches, he

is less enthusiastic about winter and the unknown for him that lies ahead. But the wise leaf that has been his lifelong mentor says:

"We all fear what we don't know Freddie. It's natural. Yet, you were not afraid when spring became summer. You were not afraid when summer became fall. They were natural changes. Why then should you be afraid of the season of death?"

The wisdom in this story that I perceive is that some changes we adapt to easily. Other changes are more difficult and engender fear and apprehension. Those feelings are natural and they tend then to be expressed in a variety of ways: sadness, anger, resignation, frustration, anxiety. For everyone the process of moving to the place of acceptance and embracing the changes is different. Over the next few months, a number of folks will be experiencing many of these emotions related to the changes and the move to the newly renovated site. Loss of familiar places of worship and gathering, familiar faces of staff and congregants, familiar routines – these call all be very challenging. And yet there will also be things to look forward to: new spaces, new opportunities, shift in responsibilities and roles, new life and energy.

It is my hope that we will be patient, kind and generous spirited with one another as we make these transitions over the next few months. That as individuals we will stop and take a breath when we are feeling overwhelmed. That we will reach out to one another for support and to share our feelings. That we will move through these transitions with as much grace as we possibly can. As we leave the familiar places we have worshiped, I hope that we will be able to see that we were a part of a story that was much larger than our own self and that will continue to have a life of its own after we are gone. Our legacy will add to the legacy of those who have gone before us. It will be changed and transformed and find new life. We have and will continue to be a part of that in whatever shape the next season is for us all. God's grace is indeed good.

Amalgamation Updates

First Met Building: Responsibility and Management Shift, Starting Oct 1st

Starting Oct 1st, Pacific Mountain Region (PMR) will officially take over the responsibility for the First Met building, managing the building as a rental space. BVU and FM will become tenants for our office spaces, Sunday morning activities, and other meeting rooms as needed. Wayne will be the PMR custodian effective Oct. 1st.

Parking Success at First Met:

Despite initial concerns about limited parking at First Met, there has not been a problem thus far! Using angle parking on Sundays, the extra lot half-way down the block, and many choosing to park a short walk away have all helped. We hope these same strategies work just as well at our new site!

Sunday Morning Parking Map for New Site:

We are working on creating a parking map for the new site to help guide folks about where potential parking spots will be available onsite and around the building. We know some folks have expressed concerns about parking in a similar way those coming to the FM site did initially as well. We are confident that we can have the same success that we had previously by encouraging some folks to park further away and have a Sunday walk and leave the closer spaces for those with mobility challenges. We will also have some designated spots for families with young children so we can support ages at both ends of the spectrum and their parking needs. Additionally, there will be significant bike parking and carpooling has benefits of both community connecting and saving of parking spaces. Watch the November newsletter for updated information.

Wednesday ZOOM Meet and Greet (Oct 4 – Until we move to the new site):


Many have enjoyed Wednesday Meet and Greets at Horner Park, August-September. Starting Oct 4th, Wednesday Meet and Greet will continue on **ZOOM at 7pm and** will last until we transition to our new site in mid-November. We'll send a Zoom link every Wednesday morning via BVU email. Join us for community building and a Q&A session! Whether you have questions about the amalgamation, renovation, or any aspect of congregational life, this is a chance to get answers and get to know one another through conversation.

Renovation Updates

- Timeline: Currently the contractor is aiming to have the city signed off on the project and for us to be able to start moving out things into the building for Nov 10th. There will be a few items that will not be completed when we move in, but they will all be completed before the end of November. The items are small in nature and won't affect our ability to starting living and worshiping in the building. However, until we get to the end of Oct and have more certainty about the dates, we will not be announcing a date and time for our opening worship in the new building. - Outstanding items: At this point, millwork is still being constructed and will be installed toward the end of
 October and at which point the sinks, and such will also be able to be installed. Toilets and flooring are being
 installed in the next two weeks and the final cement pour for the benches around the labyrinth, the bike
 racks.
- Transitions: as we move toward our occupancy date, there is lots to be arranged for moving and unpacking. We are just starting to get our head around what needs to happen and by whom. There will be lots of learnings about the new building as move into it and adjust to new spaces and new configurations. We appreciate your flexibility and patience as we navigate these changes. Change is hard and extra grace will be required as we navigate it together.

RECONCILIATION ARTWORK – Fundraiser

Participation in the work of Reconciliation is a key value for BVU and FM. Early in 2023, the Reconciliation team, some members of the redesign group and some staff met with local indigenous artist Rande Cook to commission an art piece that would be located in a central part of the renovated church site and be an invitation to continue the conversation and work of Reconciliation. Rande was excited to work on this project and feels a deep calling to the bridging work of reconciliation, healing communities and relationship and reconnection with the earth. Here are the words of Rande about his design for the 5x7ft. carving:



Story:

When I think of reconciliation I think of humanity as a whole and our relationships we hold with each other. As an Indigenous person from these lands I hold a place of compassion and empathy, not just for the land but for all that have come here from afar fleeing from their own traumas and displacement. One of the questions I ask myself is: What is healing? and how can I contribute to the betterment of all humanity while addressing my own personal trauma and displacement?

The answer that keeps coming up for me is in the creator, and to believe in the divine guidance that comes through prayer and believing. I know we'll never solve every problem at hand, but with community we'll never feel alone while doing our best. Over the past couple hundred years we have invited settlers to come ashore, and share in the resources that have provided for us, and over the past 150 years that relationship was set on seeing our resources as commodity and monetary value- capitalism. This perspective led to the building of a government who only saw our country as of monetary value, which then led to the mistreatment of Indigenous Peoples and the removal of people from their traditional lands into residential schools. It is unfortunate how religion was used as a weapon to support these schools, because we all know faith runs deeper than religion, and its faith that has always brought people together. Faith to me is the belief in myself, to be free from the constraints that have held me back by the physical, and the belief that there is something greater and beyond our own knowledge that is there to guide our existence here on this planet.

The Art:

From the material, to the finish, to the design, and the team that it takes to make an art piece like this is all based around a community of creative minds working together to finish something unique and amazing. I started the design off with a narrative that focuses on connection (sketch 1), there are four faces in the design that represent people from the four corners of the world, between the people is a flowing design of elements symbolizing mother earth and all living things from plants to animals, oceans to air. The finish I am imagining is a red hugh. Red for me represents our unity through blood, the high gloss finish brings the viewer in to see their reflection making it interactive and inclusive, while leaving the viewer feeling included and unified.

Production:

An art piece of this scale requires a team. I first set up time with my sandblaster in his booth and then it goes to the automotive paint shop. the process begins in my studio, I start with 1" thick high-density fiberboard and i hand draw out the design, after the design is finished i transfer the design on to a rubber stencil that is then applied to the high-density fiberboard, after that i hand cut the stencil revealing the negative space that will be sandblasted. Then the art piece leaves my studio to the sandblaster where that process takes some time, after that it is brought back to my studio to be sanded and refined, then it's brought to the automotive shop where they prep it for paint in multiple stages from priming and applying each layer of colour.

Final Installation:

The day of unveiling will be important. This will be a day about bringing the community together, some traditional singing and speeches from our elders about healing, unity and working towards building a strong community for future generations. I am very excited about this project. ~ Rande Cook

The reconciliation team and the board for BVU would like the whole congregation to feel some ownership and investment in this significant artwork and central symbol of our ongoing commitment to the work of Reconciliation. And so, we are initiating a FUNDRASING campaign to raise \$45,000 to cover the cost of the artwork, the artist and the installation of the amazing piece. Our goal is to raise this money as a part of our support and commitment to Reconciliation and the calls to the church of the TRC.. Junior Youth Group



Halloween Evening at Galey Farms (Oct. 13th)



Andrew Boyd ponders:

We're in for a catastrophe, I said to myself that summer. I can't give up hope, I said back to myself that summer.

But it's too late.

But it still matters.

No, nothing matters.

Yes, all the particulars matter.

What particulars?

How soon it comes, how bad it is, how we treat each other when it


Dude, it's a catastrophe!

I know, I know, but there are better catastrophes and worse catastrophes.



Bayo Akomolafe teaches:

Hope as presented within modernity is this shiny thing, it's shorn of its prickly edges. But in my tradition, hope is a trickster. There isn't a binary between hope and hopelessness. To hold hope well is to hold hopelessness, is to embrace it, is to know that things may not go our way.





Meg Wheatley insists: Something different is being asked of us at this time. The regular frantic reactions won't solve our situation. We must move beyond hope and fear to something deeper. It's not just resilience, but something deeper still.



Gopal Dayaneni reflects: I seek out daily reminders that we not only have the capacity to transform the world towards greater equity, justice, diversity and integrity, but that, if you look around, you'll see that we are actually exercising that capacity everywhere. We're all going to travel the same shocks and slides; the question is who gets to decide how it lands.



Rebecca Solnit explains: Hope locates itself in the premises that we don't know what will happen and that in the spaciousness of uncertainty is room to act. When you

recognize uncertainty, you recognize that you may be able to influence the outcomes — you alone or you in concert with a few dozen or several million others.

Hope just means another world might be possible, not promised, not guaranteed. The planet will heat up, species will die out, but how many, how hot, and what survives depends on whether we act.

Robin Wall Kimmerer believes:

It is not enough to weep for our lost landscapes: we have to put our hands in the earth to make ourselves whole again. Even a wounded world is feeding us. Even a wounded world holds us, giving us moments of wonder and joy. I choose joy over despair. Not because I have my head in the sand, but because joy is what Earth gives me daily and I must return the gift.



Joanna Macy concludes: Hope is to be of service not knowing whether you're a hospice worker, or a midwife. Life is a beautiful gift so let's honour it by doing all we can.






Reflection: International Overdose Awareness Day

On August 31st, 2023, (International Overdose Day) First Met United held a vigil in remembrance of the lives lost to the toxic drug poisoning crisis in our province. The event was organized by the Evolving Church Team which serves our neighbours in our North Park neighbourhood and hosts progressive Christian alternative services at First Met. The sanctuary was decorated in the colours of overdose awareness, purple and white, with a purple painted lone chair that symbolizes the loss of a loved one.

The toxic drug poisoning crisis has significantly impacted our own community and province. In 2023, there are approximately six deaths a day due to fentanyl poisoning in BC. Since the Provincial Health Emergency was declared in BC since 2016, over 16,000 people have died.



The loss of life in the First Nations community has been staggering. First Nations persons represent 20 % of total deaths in BC from toxic drug poisoning. Women are approximately 35% of total deaths within First Nation community and die 9.8 times the rate of other women in BC. Marginalization, colonization and poverty is believed to play a significant role in the higher portion of deaths in First Nations communities.

I am a member of Moms Stop the Harm and volunteer as an advocate for drug policy reform, increased harm reduction and access to a safe drug supply. I also volunteer as a peer support counsellor to those who have lost a loved one as I've lost a beloved family member to fentanyl poisoning. My loved one was not street entrenched but rather a fully employed member of the community. I believe his death was accidental and preventable. He will be forever grieved by our family.

The service included contributions and stories from La Vatta Frank and her son-in-law, William Pierre from the Songhees nation. La Vatta and William have been directed impacted deaths due to the fentanyl crisis in their community. La Vatta herself has lost her son in the last year. Her welcome to our territory and William's drumming and singing in the sanctuary set the somber tone for the evening.

Mayor Marianne Alto and Adam Olson (MLA) both spoke of political and social aspects needing to be addressed to solve this challenge and Leslie, a bereaved mother, who shared the loss of her son, her personal reflection and concluded with a powerful blessing. The vigil concluded with candle lighting and a memory board were families could post the name of their loved ones

There were approximately 140 people in attendance. Our team received deep appreciation from loved ones and mourners for the opportunity to gather together in remembrance. If you wish to view the event, it is available on the First Met youtube channel. – *Marilyn Banfield from Evolving Church Team*
