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

With the incumbency of Stephanie Wood, this need has passed.



As we read our book, we flip the pages, looking forward to what is next – a new chapter. So now it is with us all at St. Peter – with the arrival of Stephanie, a new chapter has begun. Welcome Stephanie!



We have already seen new faces and welcomed familiar faces back to our services. Since we have started passing around the collection plate, we have also seen an increase in our open offerings. While we do not have any collection envelopes left (wow!), we would still be happy to provide you with some blank envelopes so that you can get a tax receipt for your Sunday offerings. We also have an Electronic Collection Plate program as well as a link on our website to Tithe.ly, which is an on-line donation site.

Our Revenues to the end of May are \$63,311.78 Our Expenses to the end of May are \$66,637.26 Loss to date (\$2,042.43)

My biggest concern is, as usual, our General Revenue (from ECP and envelopes). We are about \$17,000 short of our budgeted amount to date. It is from that revenue that we keep the lights and heat on, get the snow removed and the lawn mown and watered, etc., etc. As we move ahead, maybe it is time to rethink your weekly promise.

I want to thank those of you who organized, planted, replanted, and worked at the Plant Sale. You are amazing!

As we gather each week, we thank God for all our blessings. A new pastor with a wonderful smile, our well-kept building and grounds, our enthusiastic congregation, music to fill our souls and most of all, the love of God our Father.





Building Maintenance

Bill had a dream about grass! Grasses have symbolism. They stand for generosity, health and togetherness - great qualities of the maintenance team!

Since the Fall Spirit the following has been done to maintain and enhance the Church, hall and outside grounds:

- 1. The Labyrinth bench was purchased and installed at a final cost of \$2457 including the bronze plaque. This project was funded by designated donations from the people of St. Peter. It should also be noted that Uplands Ready Mix donated the concrete for the slab that the bench sits on.
- 2. Irrigation system repairs were made this spring with the replacement of the sprinklers and control valve for the west lawn system.
- **3.** An automatic irrigation system consisting of nine water-efficient sprinklers was installed in the Celebration Garden. This is controlled by our existing irrigation controller and should reduce the need for the hand watering that was necessary and done nightly by 'Garden Fran' and others. It should be noted that this project was funded by the ACW.
- 4. A security camera system covering the back areas of the church was also installed this spring as well as a video doorbell on the main church entrance door. The system includes a recorder that allows us the ability to go back and review situations that arise. Again, the ACW stepped up and funded the \$1136 cost of this project. Our thanks to the ACW for investing in this property security project and to our in-house consultant, Roger, who specified the equipment and spearheaded the installation.



6. This is a heads-up on an upcoming project which we will start fundraising for in the fall; the replacement of the hall floor. Notice of this project was given at the Annual Meeting in February. When it was quoted in December 2022, the cost was \$36,000. With materials escalating the way they are it is estimated that it will be closer to \$40,000 by the time we raise the funds to commit to a purchase. You will hear more about this project in the coming months. Mary Cook has kindly volunteered to spearhead the fundraising part of the project so thanks Mary for stepping up and taking this project fundraising on.






New Irrigation in the Celebration Garden - thank you to 'Garden Fran' for all the watering done pre-irrigation!

2023 Diosesan Synod Report

The Diocese of BC held its 101st synod on May 12 and 13. On May 12, the synod began with a service at the cathedral in Victoria which was live streamed. The business meeting was held, via Zoom, on the morning of May 13.

Bishop Anna presented her charge as part of her homily at the eucharist service on May 12. The bishop spoke about change and the need for the diocese to change. She drew the comparison between the first synod back in the mid-19th century with our present-day synod held electronically via Zoom. She also noted that according to the most recent government census, the people living in our diocese self-identify as the most secular in all of Canada. Despite this, Bishop Anna expressed optimism that the Anglican church in this diocese would change and adapt to these circumstances.



This led into the business part of the synod on May 13. Much of the business was related to modifying and updating the Canons which were originally written in 1875. Over time, additions and changes have been made to the point that they are also internally inconsistent as well as outdated. The Chancellor commented that Canons are like guard rails on a highway and are intended to provide guidance. However, our present Canons which were written for a very different time are becoming more like roadblocks. The Chancellor hopes that a completely new set of Canons will be ready for the 2025 Synod and that these Canons will be written to guide the Church in the 21st century. The updates adopted at this year's Synod

should be seen as necessary stop gap measures until a new set of Canons comes into existence. The remaining business of the synod dealt with adopting the budget and election of clergy and lay to several positions. All the details of this will be in the minutes which will be on the Diocesan website. However, we should congratulate our new rector, Stephanie, for her election as a clergy delegate to Provincial Synod.

The Synod concluded with three video reports. The first dealt with Indigenous ministry on the north Island, the second dealt with the Diocesan participation in the privately sponsored refugee program, and the third dealt with property management of Diocesan assets. The videos will also be found on the Diocesan website.

Synod concluded its business by noon on Saturday with a feeling of, in my opinion, a cautious optimism as we move ahead in these very different times.

Synod: Upcoming Dates Barb Henshall, Lay Delegate

Synod elected delegates to General Synod which will meet in Calgary, at the University of Calgary, June 27th to July 3rd, 2023, with the assembly of Evangelical Lutherans (ELCIC). Elected Provincial delegates will meet at Sorrento, September 2024. Congratulations to Stephanie Wood for being elected to Provincial Synod, an experience that is very spiritual and enriching, while learning about all the programs that Provincial Synod oversees.

On the bottom of the Convening Circular, it was noted that the next regular meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of British Columbia will be held in the Spring of 2025 or October of 2025 (as the goal is that the Canons will all be reviewed, updated and in plain English by then).

Lastly, the June edition of "Faith Tides" has much coverage of the 101st Synod with more detail.

What a celebration on Friday! It was a joy to attend the installation of our new incumbent, The Reverend Stephanie Wood.

As Stephanie stood before Archdeacon Elizabeth Northcott and Bishop Anna Greenwood-Lee, the congregation was informed that Stephanie has made the required Oaths and Declarations and has acknowledged receipt of the Letters of Appointment and that the Bishop's Licence has been issued.

Bishop Anna asked her, "Stephanie you have accepted appointment to this ministry. Now in the presence of this congregation, do you commit yourself to this responsibility and trust?" to which Stephanie enthusiastically replied, "I do, trusting in Christ's grace and love!"

We, the congregation, were asked, "Do you, people of the Parish of St. Peter, Campbell River commit to share with Stephanie in the ministry of Christ in and through this Parish?" We proclaimed, "We do, trusting in Christ's grace and love!" We have been asked to support Stephanie in her ministry, to bring who we are as people with strengths and weaknesses; hopes and concerns; gifts and talents. Thanks be to God!

Bishop Anna presented Stephanie with the licence; the Wardens presented her with the keys to the church. Lastly, Bishop Anna presented Stephanie to us as incumbent and leader in mission and ministry, in the parish of St. Peter and then invited us to welcome her. The congregation responded with resounding applause!

But, before the Installation of Stephanie, we listened to the Word of God; from Numbers 11, Romans 12, and the Good News of Jesus Christ according to John; and the sermon.

The sermon given by Bishop Anna was sparked with humour, but her points were not to be taken lightly. She began by complimenting us on being the first church in the diocese to use the new hymn book, "Sing a New Creation". Of the eight hymns sung in the service, six were from the new hymnal. Well done, musicians! Bishop Anna was impressed by our moving forward! She also recognized the work of Cathie Hall who wanted so much to see us through to our new incumbent. Thanks were given for the many parishioners who kept St. Peter running throughout COVID. And, the Bishop thanked David for his work that went beyond, and was infinitely more than he could have asked or imagined!

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Bishop Anna enjoys looking at statistics and particularly, census data. During her sermon, she gave us some details from the 2021 census about the demographics of Campbell River. "You are getting bigger and older; 'them's the breaks'! Seventy percent of the households in Campbell River have one to two members. People are living longer. There are many single-family households; they are seniors! That's huge! God is sending you old people. Take care of the widows! So, suck it up, buttercup!" God is not sending you young families, and families with children who account for only eight percent of the population of Campbell River. She went on to say that single people should not feel left out; you are the fastest growing demographic.

Bishop Anna also spoke of the pandemic, of social isolation and the mental health crisis in our midst. She encouraged us to "Call each other. We don't 'live alone'. The church knows how to help those who are alone. Stephanie who has many gifts having been a nurse, knows the struggles of those who have been in hospital with no ride home. Pay attention to who God is sending you: retirees!"

It was an uplifting sermon which was followed by the installation and communion. The service ended with the hymn, "Let Us Build a New House" and the blessing; "Go in Peace to Love and serve the living God."

And of course, there was Tea! The service was followed by a sumptuous tea, with special thanks to Sue Vickery who organized it and to all who helped to set up, decorate, provide food, and clean up.














Outreach



MINDFULNESS - MEDITATION PRACTICE WEDNESDAYS AT 3:30 PM

Ongoing - Mindfulness Meditation Practice Jane Jennings

The following meditation is about reducing our anxiety, whether it is worry about our loved ones, ourselves, or the world.

We know that low level anxiety can so easily become high level stress. We need to be kind to ourselves, to respect our limits; to not get caught up in the hype, the what if's, the useless worry that confronts us everyday.

When we are mindful, we are able to let go of the things we cannot control. We decide to let go of useless thoughts, let go of emotions that cause upset and negativity, to let go of pain and tensions in our body that are a reaction to stress.

Breathe deeply, concentrating on the inhale and the exhale of the breath. As you become more settled, allow your breathing to find its natural rhythm, knowing that this action will help calm body, mind, and spirit.

We have come far, we have been through over three years of this pandemic, during which the world has also changed. Now, it is time to accept that we are living at a new threshold, one of the unknown, the threshold of today.

To find peace, let the known and unknown worries and dangers float away, as on a cloud, and turn your attention to accepting peace in this moment. Allow yourself to rest in the present moment, emptying your mind of all anxious thoughts and feelings.

We know that the Universe, God, will hold us up. We let go of our worries, so that we can inhabit the unknown, mindfully aware that the present moment is all there is. We are alive and thankful for this present moment.

All things seem sublime!


But there is another world just beyond...
