

DISCIPLESHIP

WISWO Discipleship Report

The last Scribe article gave a definition of what discipleship is. It was stated that discipleship is a lifelong journey of living out and spreading the good news of Jesus Christ, and we who are baptized are to carry the Great Commission: that of making disciples of all nations. Several resources were listed as ways to work on the results of that command.

Below are seven faith practices that provide a roadmap for the disciples as we comprehend the basic moves or activities that comprise the life of discipleship.

- 1. PRAY ... Prayer ... Prayer Frequently
 - Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you (I Thessalonians 5:16-18).
- 2. <u>Study</u>...Christian Education...Study Scripture Diligently Your words are a lamp to my feet and a light to my path (Psalm 119:150).
- 3. Worship...Worship Regularly
 - I will bless the LORD at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul makes its boast in the LORD; let the humble hear and be glad. O magnify the Lord with me and let us exalt his name together (Psalm 34:1-3).
- 4. Invite...Evangelism...Invite Others Often
 - But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent out? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news?" (Romans 10:14-15).
- 5. <u>Encourage</u>...Teaching/Mentoring...Pass on the Faith
 Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action (I John 3:18).
- 6. <u>Serve</u>...Social and Justice Ministry...Serve for the Sake of Others

 For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many (Mark 10:45).
- 7. **Give**...Stewardship...Give Freely

...give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back (Luke6:38).

Which of these activities do you practice? Which of these activities are provided by your church community? Remember the journey of discipleship is a lifelong journey for all who follow Jesus. It takes time to learn how to be a disciple, to learn new information, and to practice new skills and habits. Pray for results. Be persistent. JUSTICE

Scribe Nov. 2023 Mission Justice

"Just Love" has been a recurring theme of our Women of the ELCA conventions, programs, and Bible studies. Justice is all about LOVE. If you explore the Women of the ELCA website, you will see the following descriptions of Justice:

- Justice is faith in action; it addresses inequities in political, economic, and social systems.
- Justice is equity and impartiality, mercy, and compassion.
- justice includes serving God in ways that bring healing and wholeness to the church, the society, and the world.

Tackling the subject of Justice/" Just Love" can seem overwhelming to many of us in rural lowa. But simply turn on the news- it is impossible to avoid the need for "Just Love" in our broken society. Violence against women and girls remains the most pervasive human rights violation around the world and that includes the US and Iowa. The US statistics are staggering:

1 in 3

More than 1 in 3 women experience gender-based violence during their lifetime.

5

More than 5 women or girls are killed every hour by someone in their own family.

40%

Less than 40 per cent of women who experience violence seek help of any sort.

I was at a Women's Retreat at Okoboji a few years ago and we discussed this issue. In my small group of 10 women, four of them opened up and shared their story of gender-based violence, some as a child and others as adults. Those were the few women who felt safe enough to talk about that trauma. My guess is that there were others holding back their stories. These are women that share our pews on Sunday morning. No one would have any idea!

In every country, gender-based violence is a tragic reality. This violence is frequently hidden, and victims are often silent, fearing stigma and further violence. It is an uncomfortable topic, but a very present violation of justice on all levels of society. We as Christian women should ask ourselves "Is there anything our congregational units can do to bring attention to the local and global issue of gender-based violence?" The answer is "YES!"

The "16 Days of Activism against Gender Based Violence" is an international campaign which works alongside the United Nations and World Council of Churches. It takes place every year from November 25 (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) to December 10 (International Human Rights Day). The period includes Universal Children's Day and World AIDS Day. The Lutheran World Federation and the ELCA are participants in this campaign. Bishops from our churches write devotions and encourage prayer during the sixteen days.

This year WIS through the Companion Synod Network (CSN) of Global Mission is suggesting that our congregations "speak" against violence in two visible ways:

- 1. Participate with others during these16 days by wearing "Black on Thursdays"- wear a ribbon or a pin (oldlutheran.com has several options) or dress in black to declare you are part of the global movement resisting attitudes and practices that permit rape and violence. In this campaign, black is used as a color of resistance and resilience. Show your respect for women who are resilient in the face of injustice and violence. Encourage others to join you. We all have a responsibility to speak out against violence, to ensure that women and girls, men and boys are safe from rape and violence in homes, schools, work, streets—in all places in our societies.
- 2. WIS-CSN is also encouraging you to participate in **UNITE** "**Orange the World**" **Day** which calls upon activists, governments, and UN partners to mobilize people and highlight issues relevant to preventing and ending violence

against women and girls on November 25, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. As a bright and optimistic color, orange represents a future free from violence against women and girls. Perhaps hand out orange ribbons. We encourage your entire congregation to wear orange on Sunday, Nov. 26.

Let's put our faith into action, with mercy and compassion, in ways that bring healing and wholeness to the church, society and the world. Even something as simple as wearing a special color can raise awareness of our responsibility to make the globe a safer place for the human family and begin a conversation to empower our members to make this world a more just place to live- "Just Love!"

I appreciated those of you who engaged further in conversation about Caring for Creation after my presentation. I have learned so much by going through the Lutheran Restoring Creation ambassador training and look forward to future conversations.

I also spoke about the negative impact of plastic on the environment. I strongly believe we need to dramatically reduce our plastic usage. Each article I write will contain information on the negative impact of plastic on God's creation and simple ways to reduce plastic. The first step is educating yourself about plastic. The next step would be to take note of how you use plastic in your home, at work, and at church. Then you can

start looking for plastic alternatives that fit your lifestyle. Below are some of the simple first steps I have taken to help reduce my plastic usage. Many of you might already do these.

- 1. Buy butter in stick form. Stop buying butter in plastic containers.
- 2. Find alternatives to zip lock plastic bags.
- 3. When shopping, ask for paper bags or bring your own reusable bag.
- 4. Find alternatives for plastic garbage bags. I have not bought a plastic garbage bag in 2 years. I reuse my livestock feed bags, dog food bags, and cat food bags. You could also use birdseed bags or softener salt bags. I understand this will not work for everyone.
