Greetings to my Northwest Washington SWO Sisters in Christ!

This has been a busy time for our synod WELCA group these past three months! We finalized and executed our October convention after seven months of planning...and it was definitely worth the efforts of the board and other very helpful volunteers!

Some great comments and questions came from our guest speaker that need repeating. "Who helped you become a woman of faith?" "We all have a journey, a story, but it is not always linear." "What is God calling you to be and to do in your work? In your community? Through your faith life?" "How can we be the church in the world?" Hard questions...maybe...we can ask ourselves these questions and work through the answers at our pace. God will be right by our side as long as it takes.

Over twenty-five of our synod's women attended the twelfth Triennial in Phoenix in September...notice the front cover! It was three-and-a-half days of inspiration-filled guest speakers, bible study leaders, and workshops...so many that you had to make personal choices to fit your individual needs! One of my take-aways was writing your **Hope Recipe** and the possibility of rewriting it as you grew in your faith. I appreciated the following analogies that the speaker used:

- "When you're young, hope is like skittles—colorful, many choices and for many--fun to eat."
- "When you're older, hope is like kale—good for you, very chewy and green."
- "Authentic hope shows the work."
- "Real hope makes us sweat...gets us dirty."
- "Hope is about holding hands through all the hurst."
- "Hope is wearing your life preserver until you feel safe."

Know that you can rewrite your hope recipe...as you change, try a new recipe every now and then!

The **next triennial** is in Des Moines, IA in 2026. I hope to see more of you there with me!

I have appreciated working with "like-minded" women from our synod board these past two years;

I have learned that our NW WA Synod has an abundance of information to help any Lutheran church or organization within the church;

I have leaned on my own church and some of its people for help and inspiration; and I have been thankful for this opportunity that has allowed me to grow in my faith.

I was blessed to attend the 2023 Twelfth Triennial Convention in Phoenix Arizona as a first-time voting member. We spent 2 ½ days doing the business of WELCA, hearing reports, making business decisions, affirming the actions of the current Board, and voting for the new officers and board members that will serve WELCA for the next three years.

During our time together we worked through changes to the Constitution and Bylaws as recommended by the Executive Board. Five out of six Proposals passed and one failed. We also worked through eight memorials. A memorial is a request for action brought from one Synodical unit of WELCA for consideration by WELCA. I will encourage you to go to WELCA.org to find more details on these actions.

Following the closing of the business meeting, it was off to join 1000 other women from all over the country and start the Gathering! What a Party! In some ways this was like a family reunion for women that had been to other gatherings. For me, as a first timer, I was so busy looking around at all the displays and representatives from places and agencies I had heard of all my Lutheran life. Oh, and a few I had never heard of! What a perfect name for this room of displays, "The Lab". One of my favorites was of course the Lutheran World Relief space. Women from all around the country were busy sewing and tying quilts that when completed would be sent to places of deep need. Most of you will be familiar with this from your own Congregation. I could see the hands of my mother and grandmother working the fabric into warm blankets, ready to wrap those in need with love.

Our Keynote speakers and session leaders had so much to share. Something for everyone. We learned about how we can do a better job loving without limits, how to take care of ourselves and how important it is to learn about our Indigenous brothers and sisters and the rich history and stewardship of this place we call home. There was never a boring moment, please consider this opportunity and add it to your bucket list!

HIGHLIGHTS FROM OUR OCTOBER 2023 CONVENTION

Fifty women came together to listen, share, sing, worship and enjoy the fellowship of other Lutherans during the day's event held at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Everett, on October 21, 2023.

Our convention was partially funded by a \$1000 grant from Katie's Fund from our churchwide office that each WELCA synod received this year.

We chose this area of Living Theology and asked Beth Lewis to speak on the topic "Got Faith?" She elaborated on our individual faith journeys, being called to serve, and sharing our faith with others. Our speaker and board selected Faith Family Village (pallet housing for families in transition in Everett) as our non-project for both physical products and offering donations. More than \$900 was donated to this facility with the same amount sent to our churchwide organization. And we elected the 2023-2025 SWO board (with four returning members for additional terms as well as five new members starting their first terms!) I will say that our 2023 convention was a SUCCESS!

As a first-time attendee at the conference, I felt welcomed from the get-go. Beth Lewis is an engaging, enthusiastic speaker and her topic "Got Faith?" was thought provoking and well-timed. It was enlightening to listen and share our faith journey in a small group setting as well as hearing Beth's talk on the many ways we may be called to serve and how we can share our time and talents within our local and global communities.

Our NW WA Synodical Women's convention was great as expected. With the theme of "Got Faith?", I went away feeling very convicted about the sharing of my faith. From the Bishop:

We were in a car heading to the Sahara Desert. The weather was changing. I looked out the window and, seeing a dark mass in the distance, said to the driver, "Do you know what a tornado is?" He didn't respond. But in a few short moments, we skidded to a stop on the side of the road. There was no visibility, wind was swirling around us. Rain and sand and rocks were pelting the car. And then the car windows broke from the pressure of the storm. We were suddenly being blown around and all of us in the car were showered with rain and sand and rocks and glass. We huddled in our seats, shocked by the ferociousness of the weather around us and fearful of what was happening.

When I look at our world right now, I confess I feel much the same as I did on that day - like I'm huddling in my seat, shocked by the ferociousness of the wind and fearful of what is happening.

In our world, the climate continues to change and people and the very earth are suffering. We continue to harm this planet that God created for us and for all creatures and plants.

In our Holy Land, as I write this in the middle of November, we hear of Palestinian Christian families fleeing, children crying, hunger and desperation, churches being bombed and hospitals being attacked. In our Holy Land, we hear of violence against the Jewish people, kidnapping of children and old people, and the threat of death.

In our country, there are those who are conflating Christianity with patriotism, those who are moving against Democracy and towards authoritarianism, gun violence continues unabated, legislators refuse to do their work and instead look after their own best interests. There is continued racism in our institutions, polarization, refusal to listen to each other, and more.

In the ELCA, we forget that we are gathering for the sake of Jesus and for those desperate to hear God's Word of forgiveness, love, and grace. We try to prop up institutional ideas rather than living into the Spirit of Christ. We would rather live in the "what once was" rather than the advent of something beyond our imaginations (but not God's).

Truly, the storms seem strong and fierce. And yet ... and yet ...

In this time, when we not only are living in these swirling squalls, we are called, as people of faith, to remember and trust how God has worked, and continues to work, in this world. We are called to tell the stories of God's faithfulness again. For in the beginning, through God's Word, chaos became the heavens and the earth. Later, Moses saw God in fire. In the story of Job, when Job questioned God's faithfulness, God replied, referring to the stars, 'Can you bind the chains of the Pleiades, or loose the cords of Orion?' When Abraham fought the storm of sacrificing his son, God brought through the darkness a ram. When a country was occupied by Rome, power was held by a few, voices were silenced, and hope seemed fleeting, a young girl became pregnant and sang. A young couple sought shelter far from home.

In a night of storms, one star shone bright. In a world of desolation, a baby's cry was heard.

In this stormy time, in this time of deep shadows and unknowns, in this time of memory and hope, in this Advent and Christmas time, together we lift our voices in and sing:

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by. Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light; The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray; cast out our sin and enter in; be born in us today. We hear the Christmas angels, the great glad tidings tell; O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel!
