- (1) **Jan 14** delivered to Beth Fortin in Delta for the A.C.W. at St. Cuthbert's, the Batik Bags from Kolkata
- (2) **Jan. 22** Keith and Sheila spoke to the Men's Breakfast Club at St. Mary's Kerrisdale
- (3) **Jan 30**. Cdn. Friends/CCRS's AGM in Vancouver
- (4) **Feb. 6** in Surrey Sheila met with Dr. Andrea Mann, Director of Global Affairs for the Anglican Church of Canada
- (5) **March 1 –** speaking engagement at St. Christopher's in West Vancouver at the invitation of the PWRDF* representative (*Primate's World Relief and Development Fund)

In October, CCRS launched "Nari Dana".

Nari Dana means "women's wings" and is an exciting new social enterprise that has been established in Kolkata with the support of the UK Friends of CCRS. CCRS's women's empowerment program provides skills training for women and girls in the slums. Nari Dana takes the emancipation of women a stage further by providing a business to develop and sell products made by the women to enable them to earn a decent and secure living.

Ritu Ghosh is the Quality and Production Manager of the new business, and has been working for over a year with an initial cohort of about 30 women, developing high quality products to be sold both locally and on overseas western markets, primarily in the UK.

A production centre has been established next to the CCRS offices, and a number of Juki industrial sewing machines have been bought and are housed there. A limited company (Nari Dana Home Accessories Private Ltd.) has been incorporated in Kolkata,

and will be the vehicle through which the new business will be run. It will employ the women and market the products.

The project was inspired by teaming up with Veronica, a former product manager from the UK textile industry, who has started a web-based business called **Tabitha Living** to sell Freedom Products, including items which she has designed to be made by women from the CCRS slums. Veronica has been working closely with Ritu to develop a range of good quality sewn and hand-embroidered household products.

Ritu has also developed a range of products which are being made by the women and sold on the local market. It is hoped that, in time, *Nari Dana* will be recognised as a distinctive brand of quality goods. A website has been established for *Nari Dana* and, in due course, it is intended to sell online to the local market.

In November 2014, Veronica joined two of the UK Friends of CCRS trustees on a trip to Kolkata. About 140 women from the slums came to meet her, all of whom were eager to take part in the project. *Nari Dana* was then born, and we believe that it will provide a large step beyond the existing self-help groups, and provide a regular and sustained income for women trapped by poverty, prostitution and other social ills. In Ritu's words: "Nari Dana believes that women are the largest untapped source of talent in the world".

Constitution of the Canadian Friends of the Calcutta Cathedral Relief Service Society

- (a) To further the work of the Calcutta Cathedral Relief Service (CCRS) among the destitute population of the City of Kolkata, as well as residents of impoverished rural villages surrounding Kolkata, in West Bengal, India;
- (b) To support the development programs in the areas of education, employment, and health, created and delivered by CCRS, a secular, non-governmental organization, registered since 1974 in the Province of West Bengal, Kolkata, India; and
- (c) <u>To disburse 100% of donations received by the Canadian Friends of the Calcutta Cathedral Relief Service to CCRS in Kolkata, India,</u> so that CCRS's Executive Director, and his Board of Trustees, may apply these funds, as they see fit, to their development programs, in the belief that: education programs, empowerment initiatives and health services provide hope, and are directly associated with breaking the cycle of poverty.

Annual School Supplies for a CCRS student at one of their schools is 102 Indian Rupees...\$2/Cdn.

Annual Salary for a CCRS school teacher is 35,979 Indian Rupees...\$706/Cdn.

A year's education for a CCRS student is 2,621 Indian Rupees...\$51/Cdn.

The annual budget to run a CCRS school for 25 students is 55,311 Indian Rupees...\$1,086/Cdn.



In a typical year CCRS spends 11,750 Indian Rupees on Doctors Honorariums in order to provide child labourers with free medical care...\$230/Cdn.

CCRS invests approximately 168,000 Indian Rupees per year to purchase materials needed for its Empowerment Projects...\$3,299/Cdn.

It costs 20,000 Indian Rupees annually to train an Empowerment Program teacher ...\$392/Cdn.

Per day Nutritional Support for a CCRS student is 6 Indian Rupees ...\$0.11/Cdn.

Five CCRS motivational and orientation workshops for parents of child labourers is 1,000...\$19.63 Cdn.

Mitzi called and advised that during the set up of the annual Spring Tea at the Church of the Holy Trinity in White Rock, a ceramic piggy bank had been found among the donated items. A decision was made by the conveners and volunteers of the Tea that the piggy - and its mystery contents - would be donated to the Cdn. Friends/CCRS. Upon extricating the coins, without having to break the piggy bank, the donation amounted to \$4.11 or 209 Rupees. THANK YOU!
