Dear Mr Champagne,

At our recent Diocesan Synod a presentation was made which delineated the many places around the world where Canadian mining companies are involved in exploration and extracting resources. A central concern was expressed that local communities and, in many cases, local indigenous communities are suffering the effects of this mining activity. These people have no place to make their case or have their concerns heard.

As a result the Synod passed the following resolution which calls upon the Government of Canada to create the position of a human rights ombudsperson for the international extractive sector. This office would necessarily have the power to investigate independently any complaints which are brought to the attention of the ombudsperson who would make public their findings and call upon the respective companies to comply.

RESOLVED that this Synod, through the Bishop to the International Trade Minister Francois -Philippe Champagne, calls upon the Government of Canada to institute a human rights ombudsperson for the international extractive sector with the power to independently investigate complaints.
