Christmas Letter 2023

I am always moved by the fact that each Advent week has its own theme. The movement toward Christmas gives us the Sundays of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. These words for me express the monumental importance of the celebration of Christmas. When God thought we needed it most, God sent Jesus to be born to a poor, young, unmarried couple in a dusty cold barn. God was finally living amongst us and living as we do. This child would grow up to teach that the least among us are valued children of God and humanity. This child would grow up to teach that forgiveness is the way of God and that we should, as best we can, live a life forgiving others. This child would grow up to teach that love is the way, the life and the truth and that to love each other unconditionally is our calling as Christians, and the means by which we involve ourselves in personal growth and help build a better world for all.

Our world and our community have certainly faced challenges this year. The terrible war in Ukraine carries on. As well, the tragic war in the Holy Land deeply saddens the soul of us all. We pray for peace and the end to all human hostilities. In our community we have carried the grief of the deaths of a number of parishioners. We fondly cherish their memory in our hearts and hold on to their vision of a world of love. As we move our way through Advent, we get the time to dream once again of exactly that vision – a world of love. When we light the Christ Candle on Christmas Eve, we see it as a symbol that once more opens us to the idea that all things are new again, that anything is possible with the love of God.

At Christmas God sends us a message, as he did to the poor shepherds, that our saviour is born. Two thousand years ago abiding in their fields an angel told them this good news of great joy. Imagine knowing and feeling and living a life of impoverishment, and fear and hunger and prejudice and injustice. Then imagine a host of heavenly

angels coming to you, to you specifically, and announcing the Son of God has been born for you. It would be inspiring. It would be fulfilling. It would be life changing, and it still is today for all of us.

My wish for you and your family and loved ones this Advent and Christmas season is that the peace, joy, hope and love of the Christ child be with you and guide you and inspire you. As you share wonderful moments with family and friends in this blessed time of year, please also put aside the time pray for those less fortunate than us and those in hardship. The Christ child came for all of us and let us rejoice and sing and be not afraid to say aloud the dreams that we dream, because it was a miracle, and it still is today for all of us. Joy to the world!

First Voice

The Advent time of waiting and preparing is over! We have lit four candles that remind us about longing and peace and joy and love.

(The four Advent candles are lit)

Second Voice

These candles remind us that God promises to be with us, to comfort us, to help us rejoice, and to teach us to love.

Today we celebrate that God has come to be with us in the baby called Jesus.

Today we light one more candle, and we call it the Christ candle.

(The white Christ candle is lit)

First Voice

This candle reminds us of all God has done for us. God fills us with good things, like hope and peace and joy and love. God is faithful to us. God is with us, now and always.


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O God, come, travel with us through our lives. Give us courage to spread your light in the world. Amen. **Part One.** This night is like no other night. It is a time to dream and sing our way to Bethlehem. The children will show us how to go. The little town we seek sits in the hill country some ten miles south of Jerusalem. For thousands of years the houses have gathered there on the hilltop like a family breaking bread. "Bethlehem" means "House of Bread." In the centre of the village is a small inn. On this night it is overflowing with people seeking sleep and a place to eat. Behind the inn is a dark stable. A gray donkey chews his barley and broken straw while a weary cow leans and rests after the day's plowing in the valley. A sheep nearby is nearly asleep.


All is still and quiet in the little town.

Part Two. As night gathers, the last two travellers come slowly up the road. Look, there is a young woman about to be a mother. She is walking with her husband. They are Joseph and Mary from Nazareth! They have walked for six days to come to this city where King David was born, so long ago.

They have come, like so many others, because the Roman emperor wants to count each one, so he can take their money as a tax. But it is late, and Mary is so weary. Where will they sleep? There is no room in the inn. They decide to sleep with the animals.

Hymn During the singing of the hymn, the children bring forward Mary and Joseph.

Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing by, we shall see him, but in heaven, set at God's right hand on high, when, like stars, his children crowned all in white shall gather round.

Part Three. Stars brighten slowly in the sky. All creation holds its breath. Suddenly, from the stable, comes the cry of a newborn child! Mary gently wraps the baby in a blanket and lays him in the feed box that his father has filled with straw.

Part Four. In the hills outside Bethlehem, shepherds watch their shadowy sheep. All at once, the dark is lost in light, and in the midst of the light is something even brighter: the faces of angels. The fearful shepherds then hear music in the sky, and a voice says clearly, "Do not be afraid. Listen, I bring you news of great joy, a joy to be shared by all people. Today in the City of David a Savior is born! He is Christ, the Lord."

Then more angels appear, a whole heavenly host of them, praising God and singing: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill to all people, everywhere."

The shepherds run with joy across the fields to Bethlehem to the barn behind the inn. There they find the Holy Family and creep forward, overwhelmed with mystery, to find Nativity itself in the centre of all that love.

Hymn During the singing of the hymn, the children bring forward the shepherds and the angel.


