Leader: In darkness of our lives, we yearn for your light, O God. **All: Lord Jesus, come to us and bring us your light.**

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

As each candle is lit, a verse is read.

1. Arise; shine for your light has come. The glory of the Lord has risen for you. (Isaiah 60:1)

2. While you have the light, believe in the light, in order that you may

become children of the light. (John 12:16)

3. The Lord will be your eternal light; the Lord will be your glory. (Isaiah 60:19)

4. I am the light of the world, Jesus said; the one who follows me shall not walk in the darkness, but shall have the light of life. (John 8:12)



Did You Know?

Apparently the first mince pies were oblong shaped like a crib with a little representation of the Christ child on top. Mince pies were banned by the English government along with other Christmas festivities in 1649 and cooks began to disguise them in the shape we know today.

In 1223 St. Francis staged the manger and stable scene complete with live ox and ass.

Council of the North - Retired Clergy Fund

Last fall an article was written in the Anglican Journal of the hardship Rev. Jonas Alloloo had in finding accommodation after his retirement in Iqulait, Nunuavut.

The ACW Board discussed the possibility of offering financial assistance to Rev. Alloloo and after much discussion thought that there are probably others like him who would have difficulty finding accommodation after they retire, when they had been living in church accommodation while serving. We have contacted the chair of the Council of the North, Bishop David Lehmann, to discuss this and have learned that many of the clergy in the Council of the North are non-stipendiary and do not receive a pension from the Anglican church on retirement.

There are nine Dioceses in the Council of the North, three of which are in British Columbia. Salaries for clergy in the Council of the North are substantially less than in the rest of Canada while expenses for everyday living: ie: food, internet, hydro, etc, is much more costly than in lower Canada.

The Board feels that we could offer an amount of \$100,000. to the Council of the North to administer to retired clergy.

While \$100,000. sounds like a lot of money, when divided between the nine Dioceses of the Council of the North it is only \$11,000. per diocese. We would like to make a challenge to ACW's and others across Canada by calling it a matching grant, to increase the initial amount of the fund.



What A Guide Dog Means To Me

Since losing my sight, I still wanted to maintain a independent and active life. At the time my girls were three and seven. My girls were busy and had a very active schedule. Getting a guide dog helped me with this.

When I lost my vision I needed to learn to adapt to a new way of doing things.

Over the years I met many individuals with varying eye conditions. I saw how independent and happy they were. I gained strength and encouragement from them.

I also met some guide dogs along the way and saw how guide dogs enhanced the lives of people with vision loss. I am by nature a animal lover. It was not a certainty that my vision would decline, but I knew that if it did, I would get a guide dog.

It was a lot of hard work preparing myself for a guide dog.

I had to prove to the guide dog school that I could travel independently with a white mobility cane.

It meant me taking buses, crossing busy streets and going out of my comfort zone.

It was definitely worth it.

I also had to be apart from my family for one month to learn how to work with a guide dog.

Traveling with a guide dog is amazing. It's almost as good travelling as when I could see. My guide dog makes sure I walk straight, takes me around obstacles, and can find entrances for me. Working with a guide dog is team work. I don't pick up the harness and say let's go to the store.

I have to know my surroundings and know where I am going, I then tell my guide dog which way to

go.

Another great thing having a guide dog is that I'm never alone. They have such soft ears and it's therapeutic touching them if I feel stressed in my travels.

Another great thing is I'm always meeting new people. People are always amazed at how well my guide dog works and how well they are behaved.

Having a guide dog gives me more motivation to go out on my own independently.

It's definitely work and a huge commitment, but it's all worth it.

Guide dogs are so loyal and eager to please.

For myself as long as I have good health I will have a guide dog.

I unfortunately lost my guide dog suddenly in February due to cancer.

It has been a great loss to me. Sylvie, my last guide dog was so amazing. She was a great worker and had the best personality. She made me laugh each day.

The day she died was the day I lost my best friend.

Our house feels empty and my routine isn't the same.

The desire to go out on my own isn't there.

I'm waiting for a new guide dog, but due to the pandemic I'm not sure when this will be.

I wait each day for a call from the guide dog school.

A new guide dog will not replace Sylvie.

A new guide dog will be a lot of hard work. The training period has been shortened, so I will be away training for two weeks once I have a class date.

I know a puppy is being trained for me now.

I pray to God each day for patience and strength.

I can't wait until I have a harness handle in my hands again.

½ c. shortening (butter or margarine)

3 T. pure cocoa powder

2 eggs

½ c. flour

1 c. chopped walnuts

Mix well in a bowl. Pour in a greased pan. 8×8 – cake like, 9×9 – fudge like. Bake at 350° for 25 mins. Ice with icing or dust with icing sugar. Freezes well.

Marshmallow Recipe by Albert Rudolph

1/2 cup cold water 3 Pkgs. Knox unflavoured gelatin Combine both ingredients in a large bowl.

In saucepan: 1/4 cup water

2 cups white sugar 2/3 cup corn syrup

Bring to a boil

Add the hot mixture to the gelatin mixture. Add a few grains salt.

Beat for 11 minutes with electric beaters. Add 1 Tablespoon vanilla. Beat another minute.

Oil an 8x8 pan. Oil spatula. Remove the mixture to the pan. Press evenly with oiled handiwrap (very sticky and difficult to handle).

Let sit at room temperature for 2 hours.

Remove the marshmallow block to a piece of plastic wrap coated with icing sugar. With scissors cut into small squares. Coat the edges with the icing sugar. Cover. They keep at room temperature indefinitely.





Our ACW Board made a contribution of \$1,000. earlier in the year to the Anglican Foundation in support of the **Say Yes! To Kids**.

These funds were being raised in order to support post pandemic projects designed to help children, youth and young adults in Canada who are facing setbacks due to school disruptions, absence of recreational activities, and loss of the depth and variety of in-person relationships with peers, extended family, and caring adults in the community.

A request for proposals numbered 80 across Canada for a total of more than \$500,000.

There are seven applicants from the Diocese of New Westminster, requesting \$45,000. in funding. After reviewing the applications, we have decided that we could send additional funds to assist with "Drawing a circle of love" applicant on your behalf. This applicant most closely aligns with our mandate for assistance.

We Give Thanks to the Lord for our ability to assist.

Women's Personal Safety Team

For eight years now, a group of Vancouver Police Department female officers have been increasing women's safety and giving back to the community, as part of the VPD Women's Personal Safety Team. Their goal is to educate, inspire, and empower women to take ownership of their personal safety.

Their workshops teach tactics designed to be easily learned and remembered by women with no prior training in case they are ever faced with a situation of unavoidable violence.

ARTHUR TURNER TRAINING SCHOOL

The ACW have been collecting used postage stamps for many years which are faithfully trimmed and sorted by Grace Turner and then sold with the monies going to the Arthur Turner Training School. Grace is the niece of Arthur Turner. The school was established as the Arthur Turner Training School in Pangnirtun, Baffin Island for the training for Inuit Cathechists, Lay Leaders and Deacons from around the Artic. In 2016 the school was moved to Iqaluit, Nunuvut at St. Jude's Cathedral with the first class starting in 2018 with a two-year diploma program being offered.

Grace has been involved in this ministry since around 2005 and it was her mother that handled it prior to that.

"The school, named after an Anglican priest and missionary who served the Baffin Island community of Pangnirtung from 1928 until his death in 1953, was established exclusively for Indigenous people by Bishop D.B. Marsh, the second bishop of the diocese of the Arctic. It has seen a number of ups and downs over the years.

ATTS first opened in Pangnirtung in 1970. It was housed in a group of buildings that had previously been home to St. Luke's Anglican Hospital. For more than 35 years, the school trained Anglican clergy and lay people for ministry in the North, and Rev Joseph Royal, Current Director, estimates that about 50 people passed through its programs during that period, including three future bishops.

But with each passing year, the harsh Arctic climate took its toll on the buildings and they were eventually rendered unusable." (Anglican Journal June 13, 2016)

Grace works with Glenn Howell and here is a report from him:

As you know Pauline Jones has stepped back from the Stamp Club (as we call it) and I have taken over from Robert (Bob) Jones as Treasurer for this Stamp Club after his passing and it has been an overwhelming job at times (just the sheer volume that we process, and send to companies), but the time to sell in auction or consignment can be over a year.

For whatever reason, and COVID has stopped a lot of Stamp Dealers from their previous dealings with companies and charities. People have been weary of investing in stamps, but the business may be picking up. We are trying to find new ways of selling bulk stamps, including sending to the USA and Europe. We will pursue this avenue for the next year and see where it takes us (even used in scrapbooking and decoupage for the lesser valued stamps).

BUT here is an update of the funds that have been sent by us since 2014:







I hope that before the end of this year I can raise more funds from stamp sales for the Arthur Turner Training School. Grace and I will start meeting up soon once a month to trim the stamps on envelopes and sort together (we have been doing it alone because of COVID for a year and a half.
