MINISTER'S REPORT

I returned from Restorative Care Leave slowly in 2022, endeavoring to re-set my relationship with this vocation in a way that made it viable long term, in balance with managing my health. My gratitude to Rev. Randy Antle, our M and P team, and everyone who held pieces of my role in our community in my absence. Our summer 2022 was largely shaped around preparations for arriving in the new building; similarly, the fall was more of the same in an increasingly tangible way. The official, archived story might talk about December 18th, 2022 as a delightful first worship service back at the corner of Brechin and Estevan, which it was! The official, archived story will lift up our grand opening in spring of 2023 -- which will be delightful too. There were also the months of prayerful learning, yearning, stretching and work which so many were involved in to get us there. Our annual report is (among many things) a place to hold this with tender gratitude.

At Pentecost, we celebrated new members, and transfers of membership. It is exciting to think about how with every new person that comes or goes from here, we are a new community!

Every Monday morning, starting in the summer, we walked from 945 Waddington to 2020 Estevan; we walked the same route each time, and noticed the seasons' changes along the way. We watched the building's last details being completed, and physically experienced the long, slow, repetitive nature of arrival.

This fall we took time to reflect on what it means to emerge from the wilderness. How do we reflect when it's still so fresh, when the uncertainty and hopes and changes are all still present? How do we live in to those post-wilderness desires to see our dreams for 'arrivedness' blossom? How do we gain a sense of what those dreams are, collectively, when it's been so long since we've had a place to be 'spiritual roommates' as we are again now? When that long, slow, repetitive nature of arrival is wearing on us, where does our help come from? How do we claim space to simply be in awe of all that has taken place, and breathe the fresh air of these fresh times? I know these questions will continue. Spirits movements have been more-than-sufficient, and thoroughly amazing, in this past year. I know this will continue too.

On our last Sunday at Sands Funeral Chapel we gave thanks for that space, and processed out with all our belongings; we took them over to 2020 Estevan, and piled most of them at the back of the Birch room so they were easy enough to find as we settled in. In even this mundane task a sense of the holy, and a sense of all we are as a community was present... it's practically a theme of 2022, to know that even schlepping boxes might be sacred! Thanks be to God!

Wider church work:

Brechin connected with two ministry students in 2022: Brian Pankratz, who has been studying with Vancouver School of Theology as a candidate for ordination, and Allison Abuloc, who has been studying with the Centre for Christian Studies as a Diaconal candidate. Accompanying them in their journeys has been a delight.

Pacific Mountain Region meeting: The meeting was held in person in Prince George, and online, and featured Jeff Chu as their keynote speaker. Among those commissioned and ordained was Melanie Ihmels, who has done some pulpit supply for Brechin in recent years.

In 2022, I continued my role as a director on the board for Camp Pringle. Camp Pringle continues their own emergence from COVID's impacts, and 2022 was difficult for an organization that depends so much on people gathering. This year saw the sibling challenges of navigating basic operations, and a deep need for visioning and planning with their partners at Sylvan United and the community. Let's continue to hold camp ministries in our prayers.

This past year has been one of many ups and downs at home in Nanaimo and around the world. The Pandemic has loosened its grip on most, but still seems to follow us like a lingering shadow. The world economy has been shaken by Russia's invasion of Ukraine and we have all seen many examples of how these activities influence many aspects of our daily lives. All of us have seen shortages and price increases blamed on supply chains and climate change. The old proverb "may you live in interesting times" has never been more apt!

Last March, Kathy passed over the Council chair baton after a couple of challenging years dominated by Covid-19 and Brechin's redevelopment construction. While we continued to worship on Zoom and then in person again at Sands through the spring, summer and fall of 2022, construction completion dates at 2020 Estevan Road seemed to waiver in and out of focus. Unfortunately, we had to bid farewell to our music team of the last several years at the end of August as well, and the Ministry and Personnel team had to find a new musician for Brechin during the fall. We finally heard that our building was nearing completion and we could move in at the beginning of December! We packed in boxes and chairs during the first week and were able to hold Cookie Walk on Saturday, December 10 in the Cedar Room - our first fundraiser in the new space! December 18, 2022 was a huge day, with Rev. Tif leading our first ever service in the new Sanctuary and Dave Bodaly welcoming us to the new building as a knowledge keeper of the Snuneymuxw First Nation. We were in our own building and very excited to be here, despite some glitches with confusing equipment and electronics! Thanks to the many who have spent countless volunteer hours unpacking and organizing and troubleshooting on behalf of us all!

As you will note when you read all the reports of teams and groups from the past year, much has been accomplished in 2022, and we are all looking forward to our future together as we explore possibilities in 2023. If you haven't put your name forward to be on a team or committee and would like to contribute, please contact a team chairperson - we could certainly use your talents and ideas! If you are still hesitant about in-person worship, we will continue to livestream or Zoom our Sunday services, but feel free to drop by to see our new building in person some time, to see what we have all been working toward for so long!

BRECHIN ON SOCIAL MEDIA REPORT - 2022

Not surprisingly the demographics of our public Facebook page (www.facebook.com/100064565806758) closely matches the makeup of our congregation (mostly seniors, mostly women), but shows signs of reaching some of the younger folk.

Understandably our posts reached far more people around the time we began to worship in our new building, with one post that was shared on the popular "A Better Nanaimo" page reaching 2,457 people. By contrast most of our posts reach only about 100 people. Much more could be done to extend our average reach, especially if there were regular posts.

Interestingly, some of the more popular posts are not about us, per se, but about how Christians can be loving/accepting/broad minded. There is a real hunger out there for this Christian dimension.

I used the new building updates as a way to draw positive attention to Brechin, and as a result quite a few more people in Nanaimo know about us and see us in a favourable light.

We also have a private Brechin Discussion page (www.facebook.com/groups/583678995687124) that is seldom used. It has the potential to be useful for the Library (say, new or featured books), Stewardship ("How can we Brechinites better use our gifts?"), Brechin 4 Action ("How could we Brechin folk touch the lives of others?") and Christian Development as a possible way to involve more of our people.

<u>Communicable Disease Prevention Plan for Brechin United Church</u> – <u>2020 Estevan Road – December 15, 2022</u>

The BC Center for Disease Control no longer has any restrictions on mask wearing, group size or immunization requirements for Communities of Faith.

The focus is no longer on the prevention of COVID19, but on the prevention of all communicable diseases.

Good health practices are encouraged at all times. These include individuals taking responsibility for their own health and only attending group gatherings when they are in good health.

Good health practices also include frequent hand washing, thorough cleaning of premises and diligent food safe practices.

Because the new building at 2020 Estevan has high ceilings and good air circulation, we feel we no longer need to be as restrictive as we were when worshipping at Sands. Therefore, the safety policy at Brechin will be as follows:

- All those attending must take responsibility for their own good health, including vaccination status, mask wearing and physical distancing as they feel appropriate.
- Good health practices also include frequent handwashing, sneezing/coughing into your sleeve, and safe food handling practices.

MINISTRY & PERSONNEL REPORT – 2022

To admit that 2022 was a challenging and busy year for the Ministry & Personnel team is an understatement! Thanks to the hard working efforts of my team, Leah Caitlin, Chris & Eileen Carolan, and Kathy Torhjelm, along with the support of Brechin Council, our members, and retired clergy, the team ended the year on a positive note.

Rev. Tif began her six months of Restorative Care leave on November 24, 2021 and returned, full time, on May 23, 2022. During her absence, we were very grateful for the support from several retired ministers, especially Rev. Randy Antle. We were delighted to have Tif back with us in May. Since returning, her fulltime schedule has included Sunday worships, team and Council meetings, Pastoral Care visits and telephone calls, Continuing Education study programs, supporting a ministry student through his 200 hours of field placement with Brechin and weekly walks, with members from Brechin House, to our new church site. Thanks for your enthusiasm, compassion, and energy, Tif!

The Music team (Lonnie Moddle and Ron Klusmeier) signed short term contracts for July and August. Following this, they were presented with a six-month legal contract on August 10, 2022. As an agreement couldn't be reached with them, Lonnie and Ron chose not to sign their contracts, thus ending their professional relationship with Brechin United at the end of August. A letter of thanks and appreciation, along with a monetary gift, was sent to each musician.

M+P was very thankful for the music provided by Joanna Hibberd, Sonya Parkin and Tim Weger during September and October while the team advertised for and interviewed candidates for our Music Director and Choir Leader duties. Tim Weger was selected for both positions. To date, the congregation and choir members are very pleased with Tim's enthusiasm and talent. He has proven himself to be a good team player.

In addition to her regular office administrator duties, Cindy Gillespie, was a valuable staff member who provided support to several substitute ministers, while Tif was on leave. She prepared guidelines and trained a Brechin member to replace her during her summer leave. Cindy updated Historical and Adherent digital records. In preparation for the Friends of Brechin Wall in our new building, Cindy created the mail out list, organized a record of donations and a sent a letter of acknowledgement to each donor. M + P appreciated Cindy's flexibility and calm demeanor as she readied herself for a move into our new building.

In November, the team prepared a six-month contract for Allison Abuloc, an Ontario student with the Centre for Christian Studies and a candidate for diaconal ministry. As she moved to Vancouver Island in the summer, Allison expressed an interest in completing her field placement with Brechin. She has begun to assist with weekly PowerPoint preparation for Sunday worship.

After a fifteen-year association with Brechin United, our cleaning contractors, Tonnie and Bill Leatherdale, chose to retire in December, 2022. A card of thanks and a monetary gift were sent to them, along with our best wishes.

<u>Expenses</u>: The Ministry & Personnel team spent approximately \$60 this year for staff and contractors' Christmas gifts.

BRECHIN 4 ACTION (FORMERLY MISSION & OUTREACH) REPORT - 2022

This has been an exciting year for our Brechin 4 ACTION team. Throughout 2022, we were again kept busy with 3 main interests – Reconciliation, Social Justice & Climate Action

- Team name change: In order to move away from the negative connotations of using the word "mission", and with Brechin Council's approval, we changed our team's name from Mission & Outreach to Brechin 4 ACTION. The "4" stands for the following points of action: Social, Racial, Environmental and Economic.
- Climate Action:
- <u>Core Values</u>: In 2022, we added the following phrase to our team mission statement core values and, at the 2022 AGM, to Brechin UC's Core Values: "to care for Creation and work as a community of faith to address climate change through education and action".
- Team members (John Bullas, Julia Roberts & Shelley Serebrin) designed our **Brechin Climate Action Plan** which was approved at Brechin's 2022 AGM. We moved forward with action in 2022 including an excellent Heat Pump webinar (still available on our website archives) and developed plans for 2023.
- Our team developed the April 24th Earth Sunday service high-lighted by John Bullas' thoughtful Reflection.
- The Nanaimo Green Faith Circle: In 2021, our team member, Julia Roberts, initiated The Nanaimo Green Faith Circle, part of a worldwide multi-faith climate and environmental movement whose vision is to grow a supportive community caring for our earth through impactful spiritual connections and stewardship activities. Our team continued participating in local actions throughout 2022.
- <u>Theme time</u>: During 2022 we continued presenting a monthly UC "<u>Minute for Mission</u>" as part of the 3rd Sunday service.
- Reconciliation: We held 3 successful Reconciliation workshops facilitated again by Kathi Camilleri. These were financed by grant dollars from the UC Justice & Reconciliation Fund. The spring Building Bridges workshop (held at Beban Park) had 20 participants and evaluations were highly positive. The follow-up Paddling Together workshop was cancelled due to insufficient registration. This was disappointing but it meant that we had sufficient Grant funds to cover our 2 fall workshops, our best workshops since Fall 2018. Indigenous elders from Tsow-Tun Le Lum Society continued to provide great support.
- **Grant funding:** In 2022, we decided to focus on grant application for only a Fall series of Reconciliation workshops facilitated again by Kathi Camilleri. We also explored other ways to connect with, and learn from, Indigenous people.
- In early Fall 2022, we unsuccessfully applied for a **City of Nanaimo Social Planning grant** to assist with 2023 Fall Reconciliation workshops.
- <u>Team treasurer</u>: Many thanks to John Oh for taking on the role of our team treasurer for 2022.
- <u>New members</u>: Anne Nesbitt joined our Team. The Labyrinth Zoom gatherings, facilitated by Anne are now part of our B4A group due to their community outreach. We would still benefit from having 2 or 3 new team members.

BRECHIN LOAVES AND FISHES AT NANAIMO ALLIANCE CHURCH - 2022

<u>Highlights of the year</u>: In 2022 we returned to our pre-pandemic method of distributing food – clients registered outside, shopped for produce and bread and then came into the church foyer to shop for their staples, dairy and meat.

Some of the highlights of the year include:

- We provided 5,586 food hampers to 3,145 households. There were 6,575 clients served (a significant increase from the previous years). We continue to observe that many people are unable to meet their food needs without making use of Loaves and Fishes, and that every week there were new clients registering for food.
- The grocery stores are exceedingly generous in providing us with food. There is an abundance of bread, meat and vegetables, as well as staples. The clients are, without exception, extremely grateful for all that is provided to them.
- At Christmas, Hamperville returned to the Alliance Church where clients, by appointment, received a varied and generous selection of foods.

Goals for the coming year: The Brechin co-ordinators, Linda Braid, Kathy Torhjelm and Doug Cochrane, will continue to work with Loaves and Fishes to provide food and hospitality for those in need in Nanaimo. The exciting news is that as of January 2023, we are distributing from our new church and the Alliance folk are operating a depot on Wednesday afternoons.

Report of financial activity: Brechin members generously donated \$5,830.00 to Loaves and Fishes in 2022.

<u>Members</u>: The number of willing volunteers is very heart-warming. Currently we have 32 dedicated volunteers who ensure that clients receive a wide and generous selection of nutritious foods in the Birch Room and hospitality in the form of a warm welcome, coffee and a sweet in the Arbutus Room. We would happily welcome anyone who would like to help. Training is provided.

Special thanks go the people of Nanaimo Alliance Church who so willingly opened their space and their hearts to us in the past 4½ years so that without interruption we continued this important outreach work.

In summary, I would like to commend all the volunteers for their kindness to everyone who comes, and thanks to all the clients, whose cheerful presence adds so much to every

Tuesday afternoon. I have so appreciated the resilience and patience of everyone involved as we live in these times of extraordinary change. It is such a pleasure to be there!

REACHING 'OUT', BRECHIN UNITED LGBT2Q+ AND ALLIES REPORT - 2022

Reaching Out, is well into its 7th year of operation. It continues to be a social group of LGBTQ2S+ people, and our allies, who gather every first Wednesday evening of the month for discussion, guest speakers, 'coming-out' stories, etc. We have been anxiously awaiting the availability of the new church facility so that we can meet together again, in-person. That being said, we have had a few, 'Picnics in the Park' at Mansfield Park — which is a great, central location with facilities nearby, and trees to sit under. These were fairly well attended, some more-so than others. We also, had a bowling night with about 16 people showing up, and others sending their regrets because they really wanted to come, but had other commitments. We will be doing that again. We enjoyed a 'pot-luck' Christmas dinner using the Nanaimo Unitarian Facility in December with about 20 people participating on that wet and windy night.

Our meetings have been via Zoom, we still get people attending from Victoria, Duncan, Ladysmith and Port Alberni, so even when we do get into the new building we need to figure out a way to include those who find RO to be a real life-line.

Our attendance varies from month to month – anywhere from a dozen or so people up to 25 attending. We continue to have guest speakers, some able to join us via Zoom from elsewhere throughout the Country. We, enjoy discussions, ice-breakers, where everyone has an opportunity to tell a bit of their stories, and/or experiences, usually centered around a theme for the month/meeting.

We lost a dear ally, and member of our Planning Committee this year, when Pat Stewart passed away. She is terribly missed, as she was such a sweet person, and dedicated to Reaching Out and our community.

Our Planning Committee (Tim Weger-facilitator, Blaine Wilkins, Jane Osbourne, Pat Newton, Holly Smith, Evangelina Schultz, Daniel Collins) meet every second Wednesday of the month to plan the next meeting, and discuss the workings of RO. We are so very grateful for their commitment to working together to make Reaching Out the vibrant community that it is.

We continue to try to remain a 'social group', purposely staying away from 'religious' topics. Many in the LGBTQ2S+ community have been severely hurt by 'Church', in the past, and it is our intent to bridge the gap that exists. We are so very grateful for the commitment of the allies who faithfully, 'show-up', and become 'one of us'. I was so very blessed when at our first service in the New Building, on December 18th, one of our

Indigenous members, Dave Bodaly offered a 'welcome', and requested that anyone that considered themselves a part of Reaching Out, join him at the front. So many of our LGBTQ2S+ members, along with dedicated allies – showed up!

We look forward to meeting in-person, and via-Zoom (hybrid) starting in March '23, and we are planning more of the same, as well as some social get-togethers, for just fun and fellowship.

REFUGEE REPORT – 2022

Brechin United Church continues to be involved in sponsoring LGBTQ refugees through our affiliation with ROAR (Reaching Out Assisting Refugees). Blaine Wilkins continues to serve as Chairperson and Anne Manikel as Brechin Refugee Coordinator liaising with the SAH (Sponsorship Agreement Holder), The United Church of Canada.

There is a backlog of refugee arrivals due to Covid having halted the work of the UNHCR (The United Nations High Commission for Refugees) and the IRCC (Immigration, Refugees, Citizenship Canada) over the last two years. The couple (#4 and #5) with whom we were matched in late 2019 continue to suffer abuse in a refugee camp in Africa, in part due to the homophobic attitude of the local government. We are more hopeful that their arrival papers will go through in the spring.

Refugees #6 and #7 from Africa and Afghanistan will also hopefully arrive in 2023. We are desperately trying to build a sponsorship for an 8th refugee and would appreciate everyone's help with recruitment of five or six people from Brechin and the wider community.

Financially, ROAR is in a very good position with funds largely being held in the Brechin Refugee account. Its use is restricted for that particular purpose. The balance in the Refugee account at year-end is \$68,893.89. In addition, the amount of \$27,752.00 was sent this year to The Inter-cultural Association of Greater Victoria who will be handling the disbursements for refugees #6 & #7. These funds were mostly raised through three major fundraisers in 2022; the On-line Auction, the Picnic en Blanc and the ROAR Matching Grant Campaign.

On behalf of ROAR, we wish to extend our utmost gratitude to the people of Brechin United Church and the wider community who faithfully contributed to our fundraisers and supported these newcomers through their prayers.

Then we were so excited to be able to facilitate the annual Cookie Walk in our own NEW building, when it had to be postponed at Hope Lutheran because of ice and snow! Once we moved back to Estevan Road, the need for more greeters, then coffee servers became a reality again. Trust Funds held separately from Brechin operating funds

Restricted Funds:

Donations made for specific purposes which are collected and regularly forwarded to other charitable organizations.

1) The Mission & Service Fund.

Donations received are forwarded monthly to the United Church of Canada.

2) Loaves & Fishes Fund.

Donations received are forwarded monthly to the Loaves & Fishes Community Food Bank (Nanaimo).

3) Nanaimo Community Refugee Fund.

Donations received must be held in trust and are currently used exclusively for the support of LBGTQ refugees through Brechin's affiliation with ROAR (Reaching Out Assisting Refugees).

Unrestricted Funds:

These are funds which have been received by donations, grants, gifts or bequests that are held for use as directed by the Council and Trustees of Brechin United Church:

1) The Building Fund:

This fund originated many years ago as a way to finance repairs to our old church building. The Council designated a budget of \$35,000 from this fund to be used for the purchase of furniture and equipment, and moving costs into our new space. In 2022, a total of \$28,939.38 was spent for sanctuary seating, sanctuary furniture, library equipment and communication equipment. Going forward, there will be additional purchases to be made from this fund. Any unspent money in this fund can be used for operating expenses in the future.

- 2) The Legacy Fund: Originally established as a permanent trust that envisaged the principal being held in perpetuity and upon reaching a pre-established amount that interest earned could be used for directed purposes. Following a vote of the congregation at the 2022 AGM, this restriction was removed as a result of our congregation's need to address significant annual deficits. In 2022, this fund received a large bequest from the estate of a former member.
 - In order to fund the 2022 deficit, an amount of \$17,016.53 was taken as operating Revenue.
- 3) **Transitional Expense Fund:** The agreement between Brechin United Church and the Pacific Mountain Region Property Development Council provided for a transitional expense payment of \$167,500 received in 2018. The purpose of this payment was to provide financial assistance to the congregation during the construction of our new church space.
 - In 2022, an amount of \$27,222.65 was also taken as operating revenue.
 - This fund is now completely depleted.
- 4) **The Memorial Fund:** This fund was established to receive gifts in memory of departed members that could be used primarily for the purchase of permanent items in our church.
- 5) **The Spiritual Growth Fund**: This fund was formed by a family gift to be used to allow congregation members to study or attend special events pertaining to spiritual growth.

Note 3 – Restorative Care Plan (RCP)

The RCP is a United Church of Canada program which supports individuals during an illness or injury while they recover and prepare to return to their work safely. If an employee cannot work due to illness or injury, the church continues to pay them while they recover however using the RCP, the church is reimbursed 85% after the first 2 weeks for a period of up to 6 months while the employee recovers or gradually returns to work. Brechin used this to help defray the costs of employing a temporary part-time minister.
