Reimagining Article II Reflection Circle Facilitated by Rev. Sara



Join Rev. Sara for a four-session deep dive into the proposed Article II revision.

Article II is the section of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Bylaws that contains the Seven Principles and Six Sources of Unitarian Universalism, as well as statements of inclusion, freedom of belief, and the UUA's purposes. It is the foundation for the work of our UUA and its member congregations. This summer, delegates to the Unitarian Universalist annual convention, General Assembly, will vote on significant changes to its language.

Gather with others at UUFN to reflect on the proposed updates to Article II. No prior knowledge of or familiarity with Article II is required. The session topics are:

- Covenant
- Purpose, Inspirations, Inclusion and Freedom of Belief
- Love at the Center
- Six Values: Interdependence, Justice, Equity, Generosity, Pluralism, and Transformation

Developed by <u>UU Wellspring</u>, these sessions will have a spiritual emphasis. Attendance at all four sessions is highly encouraged, though if you know you need to miss one of them you are still welcome to attend.

Church Management App will soon be operational!

Hi Folks,

Happy Holidays to All of you...even if it does not feel quite that way...yet!

We have a nice holiday present for all our Members: If not already, you will soon receive a message from Breeze/Thithely, UUFN's Church Mangagement software (ChMS), with a temporary username and password so you can login to Breeze. We will shortly install a link on our website to do so, but for now, you can go directly to Breeze from the link provided in the message Breeze sent you. Do look in your spam folder if you don't find it right away.

Committee and Team leaders will have administror rights on the site to add or edit members in their groups. You'll find all these groups in a tab called "TAGS".

Under the tab called "PEOPLE" you will be able to find your name, which we request you edit. You will be able to fill in information about yourself, and upload a photo of yourself so that those in our community who don't know you yet can find you. You also have control over what info is seen by the "public", meaning just UUFN Members. You can opt in to the UUFN Forum listserve here, if you'd like to participate in that.

There is another tab called "GIVING", which in future we will use to discreetly make pledges, donations and share the plate. That will become operational later in 2024.

Finally, a tab called "EVENTS" is where we will record all of our activities. There are separate calendars for committees, teams, sanctuary use, etc. Committee leaders or designees can start putting events into their designated calendar, and these will all show up in a master calendar. So we have a way to prevent double booking events and resources going forward. YAY!

In February I will have a zoom session or two to introduce any who want to how to use the Breeze features. I hope to record that session so others may watch it on their own time.

I expect it will be mildly confusing, frustrating and chaotic to begin, as most new things are. But this is a tool that will help to knit our community together in ways that took a lot of effort previously. I just ask that everyone for now use their login and update their personal info by the end of January. Let me know what your questions are, and I'll try to address them in batches on a frequent basis.

So, we need everybody's support by logging in to Breeze, update your login username and password, and fill in your personal data, select what you want to share (only Members will get to see what is public, and only you and a limited group will see what is marked private). And feel free to poke around and get familiar with what we will be using for the foreseeable future for planning, communicating, organizing and scheduling, and eventually giving within our community.

I am really excited that what many of us have talked about for a few years is finally coming into use. How well that serves us all is in all of our hands to use it, inform it with data, and keep it up to date. Thanks in advance for your support in this project/program.

What's all the buzz about Medical Aid in Dying (MAiD)?

Hello Northfielders and Surrounding Community Members:

What's all the buzz about **Medical Aid in Dying (MAiD)?** The 2023 MN Legislature passed bills about social issues: women's reproductive rights, LGBTQ rights, and the legalization of recreational marijuana. **Now it's 2024.** The MN Legislature has a leadership opportunity to legalize the remaining, compelling social issue that speaks to bodily autonomy: Medical Aid in Dying. **Are you aware of this compassionate choice surrounding end of life care?**

Join Barbara Krause and several other Northfield MAiD education volunteers for a casual gathering to demystify and understand specific criteria about Medical Aid in Dying. All questions welcomed! Briefly, MAiD is a medical practice where a terminally ill adult with a prognosis of six months or less to live, has the option to request, obtain, and take medication--should the person choose--to die peacefully during sleep if their suffering becomes unbearable.
