The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 14th. This seems very early, although it occurred also in 2018. It is certainly not the earliest that Ash Wednesday can occur. That date is February 4th. With that, Easter is on March 22nd. It is a pretty rare occurrence, as it has only occurred in 1598, 1693, 1761, 1818, and the next time it happens will be 2285! It is determined by the date of Easter, which is determined by the first Sunday after the paschal full moon occurring after the ecclesiastical equinox, set as March 21st. The actual equinox can be March 19th, 20th, or 21st. There are some seasons of the Christian year whose names are self-evident-Christmas (Christ's Mass) and Halloween (All Hallows Eve). Lent is not quite as evident. Lent is a shortened form of the Old or Middle English word *lencten*, which means spring season. This tells us which hemisphere originated the term. There is a term in Old High German, lenzo, or lengthening, a reference to the increasing length of the days. In Christian terms, it refers to the period dating from the 40th weekday before Easter. In both Greek and Latin there are related terms which translate as fortieth. The actual days of Lent vary by denomination. As Anglicans, along with the rest of Western Orthodoxy, we mark Lent lasting from Ash Wednesday to the evening of Holy Saturday. As Sundays are not considered part of the strict observance of Lent, this makes it 40 days. Since 1970 the Roman Rite has defined Lent as being from Ash Wednesday to the evening of Maundy Thursday. The Lenten fast, however, extends to the Easter Vigil, so again, excluding Sundays, this makes 40 days.

Lent has traditionally been a time for "giving something up", but I refer you to Tracey's *From the Deacon's Bench*, for a new way of looking at our observance.

From the Deacon's Bench



As I write this, I think of how quickly time has gone by. I look out the window at some Christmas remnants still in the yard. Yes, I know it is nearing the end of January. Yet I

like Christmas things, the season, the lights, the people, the light and faith, the promises held and given. Now as I plan ahead in my life, I note that Lent will soon be upon us, or at least if feels that way.

Lent is that intentional time of being more present with our faith and faith journey – with God, with the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, of the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. We walk our way with Jesus to the cross, noting our own humanity, frailty and disconnectedness from perhaps God, others and ourselves. There is a self-examination and humility that reminds us of who is God and who we are as God's people. For some, this Lenten time is set aside with extra study, perhaps daily readings and meditations. There might be a fasting from favourite foods or a fasting from selfishness. greed, gossip etc. This "fasting" I believe, is meant to be a way of turning ourselves away from distracting things and to towards God. Our Ash Wednesday liturgy (BAS pg 282) brings an invitation "to observe a holy Lent by self-examination, penitence, prayer, fasting and almsgiving, and by reading and meditating on the word of God." One of the ways I try to observe Lent is as an intentional place of serving/assisting others in addition to my daily readings and meditating. It is a commitment to make the life/experience of another easier or better. The yearly Lenten practice of going out of my way to help someone reinforces the servanthood and sacrifice that I see in Jesus throughout scripture. I commit to an act of service. This could be *committing* to being a snow angel for your neighbours - each and every time it snows, giving respite care to a family member/friend; this is doing something for someone else that takes time, energy, commitment and even sacrifice.

I encourage you to pray deeply about how you observe this Lent. Is it a deepening of prayer time and quality, intentional studying of scripture and/or theological writers, acts of service, inward honest examination of short comings as well as gifts to be used, a fasting from food/drink/gossip etc.

Whatever and wherever your Lenten prayerfulness takes you, I invite you into a holy and healing Lent. Peace, Tracey+

Almighty and ever living God, you invite us deeper into your world, your people, your Lent. May this time be one of outward focus; seeking you in those we often ignore. Help us live a Lent focused on freedom, generosity, and encounter. Give us hearts hungry to serve you and those who need what we have to give. Amen. (Author unknown)

As you can see, we have ended the year 2023 with a small positive balance. Where we had budgeted for a \$31,000 deficit, we have a \$7,000 surplus. This is in thanks, partly, because we took money from our ministry account with the Diocese, but it is primarily because of the generosity of all of you. This said, we give thanks for all who, in whatever way possible, contribute to the help cover the expenses of keeping the church building and all its programmes functioning. If you are interested in changing to pre-authorized giving, please contact Barb at the church office and she will provide you with the necessary form. We are also continuing to pick up donations weekly from the mailbox at the church and a number of parishioners are making donations via Interac e-transfer. If you would like to use this method, please enter offerings@oldchurchrd.com as the recipient email address. If you are usually an envelope user, you can enter your envelope number in the comments section or if it is for a specific use, such as Heat the Church or Flowers, you can mark that in the comments section. This is an automatic deposit so there is no security question.

Heat the Church: Just as it is important to continue giving our regular donations to the church, those who wish to contribute to this fund can do so by putting an envelope marked Heat the Church in the offering plate on Sunday, under the donate button on the website or by e- transfer as outlined above. The suggested donation is \$25 for a day. It is not just in the winter we encourage this, as the daily rate is averaged over the year. In terms of the heat in the Hall, if you or your group have an event and you turn up the heat, please turn the thermostat back to 18 when you are finished.

Flower Donations:

Altar Flowers are given to the Glory of God. There are 42 Sundays plus Christmas in a year and there are no flowers during the 10 Sundays during Lent and Advent. Following the main Sunday service, the Altar Guild gives the flowers to someone in the parish, a gift saying we care for one another.

The cost for 2 bouquets is \$60, which is the same as the suggested donation when someone chooses to sponsor a Sunday. At the back of the church is a beautiful Flower Calendar with many Sundays available. The sponsor may choose to make a dedication and this will be noted in the leaflet that week. You will receive an email from the office prior to your Sunday to ask if you have a dedication. Payment is made to St. Luke's Church by e-transfer to offerings@oldchurchrd.com, with 'Flower Donation' in the comments section, or by cheque or cash in an envelope in the offering plate at church, again marking it as 'Flower Donation'. <u>Prayer Chain Ministry</u>: The Prayer Chain Ministry at St. Luke's Church has been initiated to provide a one-on-one connection to individuals with emergency situations through the gift of prayer. Prayer requests for yourself, or "consented to" prayers for others, are kept in strictest confidence and can be handwritten and placed in the prayer box at the back of the church, or submitted by contacting the Prayer Chain Coordinator at <u>prayerchain@oldchurchrd.com</u>. (email addresses are kept confidential and never shared with others) Prayers will be initiated within 24 hours following receipt of the request and continued on a daily basis for two weeks. After that time the Prayer Chain Coordinator will contact the requestor to determine whether further prayer is required, or if the prayer request needs to be updated. A Call to Something New?

We spent quite a bit of time throughout November focusing on stewardship—this multifaceted aspect of the Christian life in which we actively seek to be wise in our use of time, energy, resources, relationships, gifts, and whatever else we happen to find in our hands. The main focus during that month was on preparing ourselves for Giving Sunday by asking the Lord how he would have us use our financial resources to participate in what he's doing in and through our little community. Now, as we enter into a new year, I want to encourage you to apply the same skills we were practicing during November—setting aside time to listen to the Holy Spirit—to the ways that you are using your gifts, your connections, and your time to take part in how God is at work in and through St. Luke's.

Because God is already very much at work in and through this place. There's actually lots of stuff that goes on here through which we are caring for one another, making room for visitors to come through our doors, and serving the community of Red Deer

and Central Alberta. Groups like Altar Guild, the Intercessors, Servers, and Readers play an important role in making Sunday morning worship happen. Other groups like Men's Group, Ladies' Group, Pastoral Care, and the Greeters serve our people and the wider community by providing a feeling of welcome and connection, responding to difficulties faced in our lives, and taking on various projects to keep our building safe and looking great. Very soon it will be time for the Annual Meeting of Parishioners at which we will elect new members to bodies like the Parish Council and the Corporation who take care of and provide direction to the various bits and bobs that go on behind the scenes here. And that's just the start. There are small groups who meet in homes, folks who volunteer with different organizations in the community, people who put together and facilitate different outreaches, and all sorts of other ways that we, the people of St. Luke's, are responding to the Lord as he leads us to care for one another, invite people in, and offer his kindness to the City of Red Deer.

Here, at the start of a new year, seems like as good a time as any to check in and see whether the Lord is asking you to keep plugging away in the areas you are currently serving, or to make some shifts in how you serve. Maybe He would have you tap into one of your gifts that you're not currently using. Or maybe he's got something new for you to start up, or something old to bring to a close. Or maybe he would have you tap someone on the shoulder to see how the two of you could be in this together. As you spend some time thinking and praying through how God would have you participate in what he's doing in this community—and through it in our city—I wish you all the best. Would this be a time where you know that God delights in you as you offer yourself up to his service and direction.

And as you go, can I highlight one particular opportunity for you? Since at least before my time, Brenda has served as St. Luke's PWRDF representative, keeping us up to date on how the Anglican Church of Canada is active in both ongoing projects and crisis relief in Canada and around the world.
