ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING: Lent, 2024

What a wonderful way to do God's ministry here on earth; we can send God's message of love and hope to people around the world who are in crisis.

The theme for 2024 is **Share the Light** and is based on Matthew 5:14-15: "You are the light of the world – like a city on a hilltop that cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp and then puts it under a basket. Instead, a lamp is placed on a stand, where it gives light to everyone in the house."

Founded in 1946, OGHS is one of five special mission offerings of the United Church of Christ. It is a Lenten offering that supports the disaster, refugee, and development ministries of the UCC within the UCC's Wider Church Ministries.


Several Christian denominations participate in OGHS: UCC, American Baptist Church, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Church of the Brethren, and Church World Service, OGHS changes lives by providing clean water, food, medicines, shelter, healthcare, education, small business micro-credit advocacy, resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. For example, in Nicaragua, farmers are being taught how to raise stingless Melipona bees which produce medicinal honey. The farmers then sell the honey and pass their knowledge on to others in the area. They are taught how to raise chickens in order to sell the eggs and also to provide laying hens to other farmers. In Vietnam and Southeast Asia, many still use fields, bushes, and streams as bathrooms. Some children have no idea what a commode is. Providing latrines and improving water supply means clean water for drinking and sanitation. (Cont pg 2) (Cont from pg 1)

Nearly sixty percent of UCC churches participate annually. Let's have Ellington Congregational Church be one of them. Thanks be to God.



This study will take place by Zoom over a period of six weeks, at 7:00 pm:



ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 14: AN ANCIENT CEREMONY FOR SOME, YET SOMEWHAT NEW FOR OTHERS

Ash Wednesday is important in that it makes us aware of the end of Epiphany-tide and the beginning of the Lenten season. As I have been pointing out during Sunday worship services, Epiphany-tide, or the Sundays after the Epiphany, is a time when we learn about the ways in which Christ Jesus became visible and known to the world. We learn that "God Is Still Speaking" and focus on faith development before entering the Lenten season's time of deep penitence.

Transfiguration Sunday, February 11th, is the last Sunday of Epiphany-tide and the Sunday before Ash Wednesday when Lent begins. The story of Christ Jesus' Transfiguration is told in Matthew, Mark, and Luke and is referenced in John. Christ Jesus underwent a dramatic change in appearance on the mountaintop in order that Jesus' disciples could gain a greater understanding of who Jesus was. They saw Jesus in the glory that was to come with resurrection. Although it was still shocking for them, this gave the disciples the reassurance they needed after Jesus told them about his coming death.

On Ash Wednesday, ashes in the form of a cross are placed on the forehead or on the hand. This symbolizes the act of confession and is a sign of human mortality and apology to God through Christ Jesus. The ashes are made by burning palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday service. This is an ancient ceremony that originated in Gaul (modern day France, parts of Belgium, western Germany, and northern Italy) in the sixth century A.D. When the ashes are placed, these words from Genesis are said: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The imposition of ashes is relatively new in the United Church of Christ. However, the UCC has always done something similar by using confession, silence, and assurance, either during Holy Communion or Sunday services or both.

Lent is the forty-day period when we are asked to make time for an opportunity in each day to purposefully build a deeper relationship with God through Christ Jesus. We are able to reflect and prepare for the celebration of Easter. It gives us time to think about what Jesus went through on his ministry journeys and also on his journey to the cross when he sacrificed himself for us. During Lent we can sacrifice something that we like to do or eat (but not to the detriment of our health). However, we should set aside time to praise and worship God more often, to read Scripture more often, to pray more often, to share more often, and, most important, to listen for God. We are to think more about God's Righteousness or "God's Recipe for the Right Way for Living." We can acknowledge that, in our human condition, we don't always "get it right." That's okay because God cares that we are trying and that we continue to try. We know we will continue to try because we want to be close to God instead of feeling separated from God. God never leaves us; God's unconditional love surrounds each one of us, whether we want it or not, and is always there for the taking. One last thought: Sundays are not considered part of Lent. That is why we say Sundays are "in Lent," rather than saying "of Lent." On Sundays in Lent, because they are sacred and holy days, you may stop your fasting for the day. Yes, on Sundays "in Lent" you may eat chocolate, potato chips, and ice cream.

This year it is our plan to do exactly the same. Food banks are in greater demand than ever before. Lee Hay, Cornerstone Food Cupboard Volunteer director sent this message to missions last week. "The families coming to the cupboard continues to grow. This stressful economy has led to our having 615 households registered for that assistance, and that is 140 more than just a year ago."

When the church annual budget is created, a percentage of your pledged amounts is allocated to the Board of Missions. They work diligently all year to make wise and important use of that money. Dear Women of ECC,

Our 2024 Budget includes an \$1,800 yearly donation to the church budget. We also include two scholarships, Safe Grad parties, our own ministries such as Prayer Shawl and more. Women's Fellowship has provided financial support to our church for many years.

For the past couple of months, our Executive Board has been discussing the idea of the change of Women's Fellowship to just Fellowship. We already have many men involved and supporting our major fundraiser, the Farmhouse Fair, including chairing booths.

This would mean important changes to our Bylaws and Constitution. We invite all of the women of our congregation to come to a general meeting on Friday, February 23, 2024. It will be held in the Social Room at 7:00 p.m. for a business meeting about this change, a short program on trails in the area, and some light refreshments.

Currently, this would not be a merging of Women's Fellowship and Men's Fellowship, but rather just a change from Women's Fellowship to Fellowship open to all adults. Our current definition of members of Women's Fellowship is: All women of the community who have the interest of this Church at heart and desire to cooperate in its work may be members of this organization.

This would be a very big change to our organization, and we want to have as much conversation and discourse as is necessary to make a solid decision with a strong consensus. Please come, listen and share your opinion. Changes to the Bylaws and Constitution require sufficient notification at a prior meeting for a vote, so there will not be a vote taken to accept the changes on February 23, 2024.

Sacred Stitches meets on the third Thursday of each month from 9:00 a.m. to noon, and the next meeting is February 15, 2024.
