Dear AUC Friends,

As we anticipate the tenth anniversary of our church fire, we marvel again at how far we have come in so many ways in this time.

Having recently launched the 'Rising From the Ashes' capital campaign in January 2024, we are seeing, with increasing clarity now, the view to our completed new church building.

Over this past year our return to in-person worship, as well as ministries and groups evolved as the year wore on. We are now mostly back to how we gathered in the past, but with changes and improvements to ensure that we are as inclusive as possible.

A highlight for the congregation in this year was most certainly our official certification as an Affirming Congregation by Affirm United. In October, after five years of preparation (inclusive of the pandemic) we were able to celebrate with friends and neighbours, including representation from the Shining Waters Regional Council (Rev. Dr. Todd McDonald) the Rev. Dan Graves (Trinity Anglican) and Aurora Town Mayor, Tom Mrakas; an event to remember and a ministry to support and encourage.

#### CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

#### 2023 AUC Council

During 2023, Council continued to meet on the second Monday of each month to discuss topics pertaining to the life and work of Aurora United Church ... much of that conversation being around our new build. We welcomed new member Louise Procter-Maio and bid farewell to Helena Barkla. After the 2023 Annual General Meeting, Nancy Kerswill was elected to the position of Council Chair. The remaining members of Council - many of whom have served since the fire - have stayed in place to continue the work required to get us back to our home on Yonge Street. Following are the decisions Council made in 2023:

#### **January 9, 2023**

Operating Budget:

Approval of the 2023 Financial Budget and recommendation to the Annual General Meeting.

#### February 13, 2023

Finance, Edge and Trustee Updates:

Approval to make Stephen Crawley, members of the EDGE Property Committee, and Trustees Corresponding Members of the Court.

AND

Approval that Council directs the EDGE Property Committee to continue its tendering process for the above ground portion of the church build.

Return to in-person worship and meetings:

Approval that the masking mandate be adjusted to make masking optional as of Sunday February 19, 2023.

Aurora Street Festival June 4, 2023:

Approval that two areas for booths, in front of the church site, be purchased from the Aurora Chamber of Commerce at a cost of \$75 each.

#### March 6, 2023

**AGM Format:** 

Approval that the 2023 AGM be changed from Zoom to a hybrid meeting to be held after church on Sunday, March 26, 2023.

#### **April 3, 2023**

Chair of Council:

Approval that Nancy Kerswill be elected as Chair of Council.

#### June 6, 2023

Search Process for new Ministry Personnel:

Approval that AUC moves forward with the Regular Change in Pastoral Relations Process - defined as the completion of the Community of Faith Profile and the Search and Selection Process.

#### Affirming Celebration:

Approval that funding for the Affirming Congregation Celebration Luncheon be provided out of the Council budget.

#### **September 11, 2023**

Legal Update:

Approval that the Board of Trustees be made corresponding members of Council.

#### Trinity Lease:

#### Finance Committee Presentation: Stephen Crawley

Overview:

- 2022 saw increased expenses versus 2021 due to 'back to church' costs such as rent and staffing.
- Insurance interest remained a crucial revenue source in 2022.
- Total Offerings and other 2022 revenue held up well, and because of that we balanced our budget with less insurance interest required than budgeted.
- 5-year cash flow projections done in 2022/23 have identified possible funding gaps in future years.
- Looking forward into 2023, we anticipate modest increases in both spending and revenue requirements.

#### 2022 Review-Revenue

- Total revenue from all sources in 2022 was \$476.4K, -7.4% vs 2021, reflecting an intentionally reduced draw on the insurance interest vs budget (we only required \$175K versus budget of \$283K).
- Total Offerings of \$241.1K were \$8K (3.4%) above 2021 and \$8.8K (3.8%) above our 2022 budget.
- The interest we received from Trustees on the Endowment was \$49.1K, more than double the budget and  $+\sim$ \$3.5K 2021.
- CERS/CEWS revenue of \$56K in 2021 was not repeated in 2022.
- In total, AUC ran an operating deficit of approx. \$172K in 2022, \$110K less than budget forecast. All of this operating deficit was covered by the interest on the insurance payout.

#### **2022 Review-Expenses**

- Total Operating Expenses in 2022 were \$473.7K, \$47.2K (11.1%) more than 2021 and \$72.3K (13.2%) below budget due to savings in M& P, lower than expected taxes and other savings.
- The majority of Committee expenses were also below budget in 2022, contributing to the reduced overall spend in 2022.

- Our saving in 2022 versus budget for our property taxes was \$10,953 for taxes expected but not invoiced to us by MPAC. It is not clear when or if we will receive this assessment in the future.
- All programs such as M & S, Welcoming Arms, Rise & Shine, etc continued to be fully funded to budgeted levels.

#### **2022 Year End Balances**

- AUC Future Fund \$8.6K (invested) (previous balance now included in building fund).
- Earmarked donations \$27.5K (invested)
- Insurance claim account \$28.1K (invested)
- Bank Balance Dec 31,2022 \$65.8K

#### **2023 Budget-Revenue**

- We are budgeting a decline in (non-insurance) revenue in 2023 of ~\$54K or -18%, driven by an anticipated decline in Endowment interest (-\$44K) and a small decline in Total Offerings in 2023 (-\$8K).
- This, plus increased Expense spending, will result in our Operating Deficit in 2023 being \$262K versus \$172K in 2022.
- This deficit is budgeted to be fully funded by the interest from the insurance payout. As building expenses will continue to be incurred in 2023, this may be the last year that the rebuild will not impact insurance interest availability.
- Insurance interest is expected to comprise about half our total revenue in 2023, versus an actual of 37% in 2022 and budget in 2022 of 52%.

#### **2023 Budget-Expenses**

- Total Operating Expenses are projected to increase +7.4% in 2023 to \$509.0 from \$473.7K in 2022.
- With the physical return to worship and offices, main spending increases are on rent and M&P in 2023.
- Rental at Trinity (plus storage) is our largest non-staff cost at \$84.8K in 2023 (up from \$77.3K in 2022).
- Now that we are back in person and more programs are running in 2023 than in 2022, many Committees have small increases in their 2023 budgets.
- All 2022 AUC programs continue to be fully supported in 2023: M&S, Welcoming Arms, Music, Worship, Rise & Shine, UCC Assessment, and Youth events are among the many programs our AUC congregation continues to generously support.

#### **Summary**

- 2022 was a relatively stable year for AUC. We came through it in good financial shape.
- Thanks to our amazing congregation, our revenue from Offerings has held up remarkably well.
- We will balance our budget again in 2023, and work to reduce our overall reliance on the insurance interest to fill our Operating Deficit.
- As capital spending on the new building increases, this reduces the amount of insurance interest available. We will continue to update our 5-year financial forecast and work with Council to ensure AUC's ongoing operational needs are met.

We have overcome many challenges as we moved toward building a new church:

- -moving the Bell lines
- -taken to the OMB by neighbours of the church and through many meetings with the community, town council and lawyers, we were successful in the outcome.
- -demolishing the five houses on the property
- -removing over 180 remains found on the property
- -a three-vear pandemic
- -increases in building costs over 50%

With that, we understand the challenges before us, and imagine we will be faced with many more unexpected obstacles before we are finished. We will continue to deal with them as they arise. We are at a point where there is no turning back, and we will complete the task at hand, with altered expectations.

At a Feb. 13/23 joint meeting of Trustees, AUC Council, and the EDGE Property Committee it was decided to move ahead and put out a Tender Package for the upper-level construction.

The Tender Package is currently being completed.

The retirement home hopes to be fully operational by April/25.

We may need to ask for help from the community and the United Church of Canada at various levels.

There were concerns expressed by members of the congregation:

- -Explain the \$1M and \$7M discussed as a settlement with Aviva.
- -There is a large differential between the money we have available and the expected cost of the new church. How can we manage this debt? Is it worthwhile?
- -Can we make adjustments to the interior of the church to reflect the changing needs of the Congregation and the community?

**Board of Trustees:** Rev. Andy Comar

Rev. Andy addressed the concerns expressed.

-We received a \$7M settlement from the roofing companies for the destruction caused by the fire. Aviva wants to claw back all of that money, saying we can build a church for the original settlement made nine years ago. We have offered \$1M to settle this out of court and receive the money which is currently being held in trust. Aviva has not replied to our offer. If it goes to court, we will have to get a court date in Newmarket which is currently backlogged. Even if we win the court case, Aviva can appeal. The appeal could take up to a year.

Rev. Andy has contacted the following people at various levels of the United Church, and has been assured of assistance if necessary:

**Jody Maltby:** Jody is the Regional Staff lead and Communities of Faith minister, staff support to the Communities of Faith Commission.

**Kris Tavella:** Kris is the director of real estate development for Kindred Works, the new name for the United Church Property Resource Corporation.

**Katja Brittain:** Katja works for Toronto United Church Council – TUCC. TUCC works with church communities to connect them with resources for ministry. They offer access to professional advice, financial support, and leadership development.

Rev. Andy noted that the Trustees will be suggesting to AUC Council that fund-raising should be started.

MOTION: that the Congregation direct AUC Council to undertake an assessment and devise a proposal to complete a minimum viable church and community space for \$9m.

Nancy Kerswill spoke on behalf of AUC Council. She explained that Council had spent a very long time discussing all the points that were brought up today and had passed a motion to move forward with sending out tenders for the building of the church as it has been designed. Brian North reiterated that the tenders were being created in layers so that we can make adjustments when and if necessary.

#### EDGE PROPERTY COMMITTEE

2023 was again a year of challenges for the EDGE Property Committee (EPC) with our biggest concern being the increase in costs due to Covid. We started by meeting with the Council and Trustees to discuss our concerns over the financial challenges we face and to get some direction on moving forward. The EPC committee was created to fulfill the dreams of our congregation under the direction and recommendations of Council. We strive to meet their mandate regardless of the many hurdles we have faced over the years. After many stressful discussions, it was decided that we are to continue moving forward with the understanding of our cost restrictions. We had legal contracts already in place and we were too far along to suspend the project. Our plan to move forward is to continue with our building in stages. We would concentrate on the structure and may need to leave some of the finishes for future work. Our main focus is to get the building up with the sanctuary and main floor being the priority to worship and work in our new building.

In order to prepare and search for a contractor for the above grade portion of our build, we engaged with Pearson Consulting to prepare a Bid Document to include Supplementary Conditions of Contract and Division 1 of the specification in order to protect the church from

risk emanating from the adjoining third party construction. We also engaged a safety company to prepare safety documents (Occupational Health and Safety Management Systems).

Throughout the spring, we concentrated on value engineering and to search for the right partner to manage the trades for us. We also continued with our lawsuits while finishing the below grade portion of our building. We welcomed Bill Newman, past chair of Council to our committee. Bill was chair of Council and attended EPC through the most crucial part of our planning. He brings with him insight and expertise.

Early in the summer, the below grade portion of our building was completed to a point where it was turned over to us to continue with the above grade portion. We engaged the services of The Dalton Company to act as our project management team and contractor for the remainder of our building. By this time, we were thrilled that the settlement with Aviva had been completed by the Board of Trustees and Council.

We are presently meeting weekly with the Dalton team and our architect, Bob Murphy, to keep things moving forward. As sections of our build are costed, they are given to the Board of Trustees for their approval. By the end of 2023, all concrete was completed, and the steel structure was ordered. The steel was scheduled to be erected by years end, but due to delays, we now hope to see it completed this spring.

# **AUC 2023 Annual Report Oakwil Non-Profit Homes Corporation**

#### **Background**

Oakwil Non-Profit Homes Corporation, a non-profit Ontario corporation and an incorporated ministry of Aurora United Church, is an extension of AUC's community outreach and partnership programmes. Operating as Oakwil Seniors Homes, the non-profit owns and operates a twenty-eight unit townhouse complex in Oakridges with a mandate to provide rent geared-to-income housing for seniors. Originally founded in 1988 by the members of St. Paul's United Church, oversight responsibility for Oakwil was assumed by AUC when the two church congregations amalgamated in 2008.

#### Governance

By the provisions of Oakwil's corporate bylaws, the members of AUC Council constitute the "membership" of the corporation. Council appoints a Board of Directors to exercise direction and fiduciary responsibility over the operations of the corporation. The Board of Directors in turn

contracts with a professional property management firm, currently Richmond Community Management Services (RCMS), to manage and maintain the complex on a day-to-day basis, including tenant relations.

#### **Financial Structure**

Oakwil is financed through a housing services agreement with York Region under which Oakwil receives an annual operating subsidy and capital funding to maintain and improve the complex. The rents charged to Oakwil tenants are based on a rent geared-to-income formula determined by York Region. The income from rents, combined with the funding received from York Region, is applied to the ongoing maintenance of the complex, the undertaking of capital improvements, the repayment of debt and the building of a capital reserve fund. Oakwil paid off the remaining balance of its mortgage in June, 2023. The Corporation also has a non-interest bearing loan from York Region with an outstanding balance of \$171,573.00 which is being repaid on a graduated basis. The Board is grateful to York Region for its continued funding support.

#### **2023 Financial Results**

**Operating & Maintenance** – The Oakwil Board is required to submit an annual budget to York Region covering the operation and maintenance of the complex. The 2023 budget was based on total forecasted income of \$340,469.00 and total forecasted expenses of \$339,731.00 resulting in a forecasted operating surplus of \$738.00. Actual year-end income totaled \$340,565.00 and expenses equaled \$402,715.00 producing a deficit of \$62,150.00. The unanticipated operating deficit was caused by unplanned expenditures for repair and cleaning costs resulting from a basement flood in one of the townhouse units, higher than anticipated water consumption costs and an accounting transfer to move York Region's continued reimbursement of mortgage costs into capital reserves pending the negotiation of a new housing services agreement.

**Capital** – Through its community housing Innovation Fund, York Region approved funding totaling \$42,896.00 for several capital projects relating to accessibility and recreation and leisure space:

- Modification of the bathrooms in 3 units to accessible standards
- Restoration of the complex's garden shed
- Purchase of metal picnic tables for outdoor events
- Procurement of a new television and stand for the community centre
- Conversion of the community centre washroom to accessible standards

With York Region's support, Oakwil was awarded special funding in the amount of \$75,000.00 for the replacement of the front entrance doors on all townhouse units through the Ontario Priorities Housing Initiative (OPHI) and Canada-Ontario Community Housing Initiative (COCHI),

a joint provincial/federal programme to fund housing priorities. The replacement of the entrance doors will occur in 2024.

#### 2023 Highlights

- **Board Meetings** The Board met on January 26, April 27, July 27, September 28, and November 27. The meetings were a combination of in-person and via Zoom.
- **Annual General Meeting** The Oakwil Annual General Meeting was held on June 12 at Trinity Anglican with several members attending by Zoom. The members approved the appointment of Suzanne Whitehurst to the Board of Directors along with the 2022 audited financial statements. The Board was also authorized to invite competitive proposals for the provision of audit services to Oakwil for the 2023 fiscal year.
- New Director In July, the Board welcomed Susan Sue-Ling to the Oakwil Board of Directors. Susan is actively involved as a member of the AUC congregation. Her background in finance will enhance the Board's skill set. Susan's appointment will be officially confirmed at the 2024 Annual General Meeting.
- **Summer Event** On September 8, the Board sponsored a barbeque for the residents which provided an ideal opportunity to enjoy food and conversation in a social setting.
- **Audit Services** Following the receipt of proposals from three firms, the Board accepted the proposal of Andrew T. Vahrmeyer Professional Corporation of Richmond Hill to prepare the annual audited financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2023.
- End of Mortgage Coincidental with the full discharge of Oakwil's mortgage indebtedness in June, the current housing services agreement between York Region and Oakwil came to an end. Discussions commenced in October on the terms and conditions of a new housing services agreement, including the continued provision of an operating subsidy and capital funding based on a multi-year financial plan. Until a new agreement has been finalized, York Region has agreed to maintain the current level of operating subsidy. It has also agreed to continue reimbursing the equivalent of the mortgage subsidy payment which Oakwil must deposit to its capital reserves.
- **Christmas Luncheon** On December 2, a Christmas luncheon was held for the residents to celebrate the holiday season.

#### **Looking Ahead to 2024**

The Board's prime focus for 2024 will be the completion of a new housing services agreement with York Region to ensure Oakwil's longer term viability as a desirable and affordable place for seniors to live.

As part of ongoing succession planning, the Board will be looking to recruit an additional director to complete the full complement of board members. If you have experience in property management, finance, social housing or the non-profit sector and an interest in supporting seniors housing, we would welcome your expression of interest in joining the Board.

The Board is deeply appreciative to AUC for its continuing sponsorship of Oakwil. We also thank RCMS for its capable management of the complex, and particularly Maninder Kalirai, Senior Property Manager, and Sandra Izurieta, Junior Administration Manager, for managing day-to-day functions at the site and building effective and respectful relations with the residents.

## 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scouting Report

2023 was a year that saw 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora continue to grow with new and exciting opportunities and experiences for our youth membership, a continued increase in number of youth and Scouter participants and a return to hosting a Scouting Troop Section.

#### 2022/2023 Scouting Year

Scouts Canada continues to operate member registration on a January to December calendar year (2023). Operation wise, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scout Group chooses to continue to maintain the traditional "school year" programming schedule of September (2022) to May (2023), with children who age out of Beavers in the Spring of the year they turn 8, being provided the opportunity to join Cubs that Fall. Active youth members of 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora who had been registered for 2022 were provided an extended 4-week "early bird" window to re-register during August of 2022 to retain their place in the Group. The registration window for the 2023 calendar year opened in September 2022 for new members, on a first come first serve basis. Those children who did not register for 2023 retained their place with the Group until the end of December 2022. Those children who registered to start with the Group in January 2023 were provided the opportunity to start early in the Fall where space availability permitted.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scout Group continues to report directly to the Shinning Waters Council, following Scouts Canada dissolution of the South Lake Simcoe Area level of administration.

#### **Programming**

Starting in the Fall of 2022, schools were again available for community rentals and 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora was able to secure the use of the gymnasium St. Joseph's Catholic Elementary School in Aurora on Thursday nights for back-to-back Beavers and Cubs meetings through From October 2022 to mid-May 2023.

In January 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Cubs hosted a winter camp at Camp Samac in Oshawa, staying in a cabin with

scouting friends from Groups in Newmarket, Orangeville, and Innisfil. In April 2023 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora hosted 2 separate area events at the Aurora Legion, a badge trading Day and an Area Rally for Beaver Buggy, Cub Car, Scout Trucks and Adult Racers that had approximately 130 participants.

In June 2023 the 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Beavers and Cubs joined the Newmarket Scout Group for an all sections "2-Kingdoms" themed camp, tenting at Woodland Trails Scout Camp in Whitchurch-Stouffville.

3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora did offer not programming between June and mid-September 2023, but a small number of Group members participated in the annual South Lake Simcoe week-long Cub Camp in Algonquin Park in August and the Fort George Brigade Camp reenactment the War of 1812 in Niagara-on-the-lake with Scouting youth form across Canada and New York State.

The 2023/2024 Scouting program started saw 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora re-opening our Scout Troop Section with 6 youth moving up from our Cub Pack. On the last weekend of September 2023 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora's annual "kick off" event took place at the Richmond Hill Live Steamers scale railway. In October 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora participated in the Annual Apple Day fundraiser at the Aurora Farmer's Market and November 2023 saw members of all sections participate in the Aurora Remembrance Day and Aurora Santa Under the Stars Parades.

Starting October 2023 through mid-May 2024, 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora holds Beaver meetings (Mondays) and Scout meetings (Wednesdays) in the gymnasium at Regency Acres Public School, and Cub meetings (Thursday) in the gymnasium at St. Joseph's Catholic Elementary School.

2023 ended with 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora's group population increasing to 8 youths in the Beaver Section (boys, aged 5 to 7, including 6 new members) and 13 Cubs, (boys and girls, aged 8 to 10, including 1 new member and 6 "moved up" member from 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Beavers) and 6 Scouts (boys aged 11, all "moved" up from 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Cubs).

In 2023 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora had two youth receive top section awards, with Beaver Mason Blassnig, completing the requirements for his North Star Award and Cub Henry Munro completing the requirements for his Seeonee Award. Congratulations to both these young men for their efforts!

#### **Volunteers**

3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scouters in 2023 included Scouters: Ken Kosowan (Beavers), Kevin Krille (Beavers), Janice Chong (switched from Beavers to Cubs mid-year), Dan Johnson (Beavers ending June 2023), Liz Layton (Cubs), Krista Miller (Cubs), Kyle Munro (Cubs and Scouts), Greg Scott (Cubs and Scouts), Dan Vink (Cubs ended June 2023) and Tiffany Zhu (Beavers Started October 2023)

Kyle Munro continued to act in the roles of Group Commissioner/Contact Scouter Cubs and Scouts/Registrar, Ken Kosowan took over as Contact Scouter Beavers mid-2023 and Kelsie Vink continues as the Group's Treasurer.

Any adults wishing to join the group are invited to contact Scouter Kyle Munro to discuss their interests. While the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts sections are currently closed to new member enrollment at this time, new Scouters are guaranteed spaces for their youth family members to join immediately as a result of the adult completing Scouts Canada Training and joining the Group. We are forecasting a particular need for new Scouters to join the Beavers Section before the Fall of 2024 to ensure that the Section will be able to continue operating.

It remains a goal of the group to recruit additional Scouters and Group Committee representatives in order to move forward with expanding the size and programming capabilities of 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scout Group for years to come. The continuing physical, financial and spiritual support of Aurora United Church for 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scouting Group remains very much appreciated.

#### Program Highlights for January to December 2022 include:

- Participation in the 2023 Scout Seeds fundraiser (February March 2023).
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora hosting the 2023 South Lake Simcoe Beaver Buggy, Cub Car, and Scout Truck Rally and Badgefest Badge trading event (April 2023), with the assistance of Alumni Scouter Trevor Stevens and the Aurora Legion
- Group Scout Camp (June 2023)
- SLS Algonquin Cub Camp (August 2023
- Fort George Scout Camp (September 2023)
- Re-establishment of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Aurora Scout Troop
- All Sections attending a train day at Richmond Hill Live Steamers outdoor scale model railway (September 2023)
- Remembrance Day Parade (November 2023)
- Aurora Santa Claus Parade (November 2023)

#### MINISTRY OF CONGREGATIONAL RESOURCES

#### Finance Committee

In 2023, the AUC Finance Committee consisted of Stephen Crawley (Chair), Brian Walters (Ministry Advocate), Lloyd Kerswill, Susan Sue-Ling, and Rev. Andy Comar. Nancy Kerswill, Chair of Council, was also a valuable regular attendee at the Finance team meetings. Our key role of Treasurer/Bookkeeper was occupied by Carmen Harany for the first few months of 2023, at which time she departed the role and was replaced by Trevor Gibbs.

The Finance Committee meets every month (except July & August) to ensure that AUC's finances are being managed and monitored in the most effective way possible, and the team does significant work outside of these monthly meetings to ensure the smooth management and

planning of AUC's resources. This includes the Annual Operating Budget process as well as updating our 5-year projections to identify any issues for the Operating budget due to spending on the rebuild of our church.

Our congregation was fully meeting in person at the start of 2023, with regular collection taking place at our Sunday services. This was a positive event not only for our congregation, but also for our financial performance. While our **Total Revenue in 2023** was up 5.9% versus 2022, that reflected our increased requirement to draw on funds from the interest on our insurance payout from Trustees. In 2022 we required \$175,000 from insurance interest, and in 2023 we required \$250,000. If you remove this variable revenue source of insurance interest, our Total Revenue was actually down -15.5% versus 2022 (approx. \$46K). This is the second consecutive year of a similar revenue decline when not including the insurance interest. In 2023, this was due exclusively because revenue from the interest on the Endowment fund from Trustees was only about \$1,100. In 2022, Endowment funding to the Operating budget was \$49,100 (approx. \$48K decline). But the important story on the revenue side came from our amazing congregation, which continued its tradition of remarkable generosity throughout the year. Despite the challenges that we face as a congregation, Total Offerings from the congregation (including online donations) finished 2023 roughly flat versus 2022 (which was up versus 2021!) with a decline of only 0.9% or approx. \$2.1K and just slightly above our budget. We should all be proud of the financial commitment our congregation continues to make to the ongoing operation of AUC. Our AUC congregation is making a difference!

**Total Expenses** in 2023 rose as expected versus 2022 and was slightly higher than budget (\$516.8 versus budget of \$509.0). Spending in 2023 was up 9.1% versus 2022, driven by increased staff costs and also by increased costs in rent with Trinity. The first monthly investment in the external fundraising cost also appeared in 2023. Payroll, benefits, and pension payments historically account for approximately 60% of our annual operating budget, and 2023 was consistent with that. See the full budget in this Annual Report for detailed information.

AUC's General Operating Fund continues to rely on interest from the insurance capital to balance our budget. In 2023 the net funding requirement from insurance interest was \$250,000, \$12,000 less than the budgeted amount of \$262,000. Insurance interest continues to be a significant percentage of our overall revenue. In 2021, 22.6% of our Total Revenue was insurance interest, in 2022 it was 36.8% and in 2023 49% of our revenue came from there. Aside from this 49% interest revenue in 2023, 44% came from Total (congregational) Offerings, and 7% from all other sources. We are blessed to have the insurance interest at our disposal to cover our short-term requirements as we go through this period of transition in our history. We have never used any of the principal capital Trustees have received from the insurance payout to fund our operating deficits. We only draw from the investment income generated by the principal to cover our operating revenue shortfalls. As we are now well into drawing on the principal to pay for construction costs, we will need to be vigilant in ensuring no short-term funding gaps appear that could impact our Operating Fund. The AUC Finance committee will continue to watch revenue requirements carefully, project out 5 years, and pre-emptively work with Council and the Board of Trustees to ensure no financial issues arise in 2024 and all the way through the rebuilding of our church.

All of AUC's financial obligations were met in 2023, including United Church of Canada assessment dues, Mission & Service, Welcoming Arms, Rise & Shine, and many others. Other than our M&P expenses, our required rent with Trinity (plus external storage) is still our biggest

expense, at \$88,420 in 2023. Expense management is a key area of responsibility and emphasis for Finance, and we successfully achieved that goal in 2023 with the support of the many ministries and committees at AUC. Our thanks go out everyone who helped with the careful cost management at AUC!

Donations for the rebuild have largely been reinvested by Trustees until the time comes that we require them. We currently have separate accounts for this purpose:

- first, our Future Fund, which on December 31, 2023, held \$44,380 in the account
- our Earmarked donations account (donations made for specifically designated purchases) has \$29,138 in the bank

The Finance Committee is also charged with creating the Annual Operating Budget of AUC for input and approval from AUC Church Council, as well as input from the many committees that run programs at AUC. This year we have again been able to complete the task and approval process in time for the 2024 Budget to be included in this Annual Report, subject to the congregation's approval at the Annual General Meeting. Trevor Gibbs and Carmen Harany worked closely with Finance in 2023 to provide the necessary reports for informed decision making. They both deserve our gratitude for their considerable work and support of AUC's financial health. Carmen departed the Treasurer role at AUC in 2023, and our sincere thanks go out to her for 15 years of unwavering, professional management of the day-to-day financial affairs of the church.

The Finance team monitors the revenue and spending of the General Operating Fund on an ongoing basis. Our goal is to ensure that the financial continuity and strong financial foundation of the church be maintained during this unique period in AUC's history. This will allow us to do our best in fulfilling our Ministry and Mission statement and build a strong future for AUC.

#### Bookkeeper's Report

I started as Bookkeeper on April 19 after Carmen Harany left the position, the effects of COVID had settled down and we were back to in-person worship. Trends in 2023 were increasing expenses for payroll of \$40,929 over 2022; rent increase in our contract with Trinity, and a slight decline in PAR remittances. Towards the end of the year, our monthly fee of \$4,746 began for the new *Rising From The Ashes* Capital Campaign that will continue throughout 2024.

Gross income for the year excluding Insurance transfers was \$261,001 with income from offering envelopes/e-transfers and PAR remittances each accounting for about 50% of the total donations. Expenses were \$514,516.29 necessitating the need for more funding from the interest on the Insurance funds from Trustees for a transfer of \$250,000 versus \$175,000 the previous year.

Looking forward to 2024, we expect income to be stable, but expenses will likely increase with the Capital Campaign investment and increasing operating costs.

During the year Ed Griffith left his important position helping with counting and tracking of our donations and he was replaced by Bill Newman. Thanks Bill!

I would like to thank Stephen Crawley and members of the Finance Committee for their support during the year, particularly Susan Sue -Ling and Lloyd Kerswill for providing signatures on cheques, and the various church elders particularly Denyse Slack, Anne Ella-Arnold, Rev. #### Cash Cards

When you purchase gift cards for everyday items you are buying anyway - like groceries, gas, coffee, etc. - the church benefits because the vendor offers the cards to us at a discount. For example, if you purchase a \$100 Loblaw's gift card, Aurora United Church makes \$4.00.

The Cash Card program at AUC raised \$1,800 for the General Operating Fund in 2023 against a budget of \$1,500. Our partnership with Welcoming Arms, and their use of the program as part of their community outreach, assisted us in surpassing our goal while sharing in the savings from the vendor.

Typically, cash card orders are taken on the second Sunday of each month, for delivery the following Sunday. A core group of regulars continued to order cards every month - some providing us with standing monthly orders and postdated cheques for their card purchases.

Thanks to everyone who participated in this effective way to raise funds to assist the life and work of AUC. It is our hope that you will consider doing so again in 2024.

#### Archives

The AUC Archives contains a wide variety of items and articles which can be divided into several categories. The document section contains much of the printed (now often digital) record of the church's yearly functions. Annual Reports, financial records, Council & Trustee minutes plus reports & minutes from standing committees make up the bulk of these records. There is also a large collection of historical documents such as Sunday bulletins, newspaper articles, plans & details of the various construction projects undertaken by AUC, information about the stained-glass windows, the organ, and other furnishings. There are articles about ministers, past & present, missionaries & the history of the construction of the 1878 building. There is a large collection from the music department – bulletins of past performances, posters, photographs and even some tapes & videos.

And we have photographs although not as many as previously —most of the albums were destroyed in the fire and, unfortunately, some that remain are not dated or identified. And finally, the historic artifacts. Some of these were also lost in the fire but we still have many items preserved from the past such as an assortment of pins, buttons, charms, and spoons celebrating various anniversaries and events; CGIT memorabilia; the choir gown recovered from the fire and the Trustees 1878 Account book.

All the above (and much more) is currently in safe storage awaiting its home in the new Aurora United Church building.

Many thanks once again to Dave Hanna for storing AUC grass equipment/ladders.

Bob Kyriakides, our outstanding IT expert, continued his strong support for AUC in 2023 as follows:

- The physical phone PBX was reviewed, and it was determined that it's time to migrate to a fully-cloud based VOIP system. The original PBX was created just after the fire and has been operating for the past 10 years but is now at the point major updates would be required to maintain it. That's just not cost-effective given the choices available for a fully cloud based VOIP system. The actual migration to the new phone system will take place in early 2024 and will be a system that will follow us to the new build.
- The big project in 2023 was the migration of the data from the physical server in the church office to the Microsoft 365 cloud. This included migrating each user's data to their respective OneDrive cloud accounts and training them on the changes on how to access their AUC data. The migration took several days to complete.
- Various AUC staff were successfully supported through a number of IT support issues. This included the ability to remotely access their AUC computers.
- With the departure of Carmen, Trevor was onboarded to the Bookkeeper role. Training was provided on Microsoft 365, Barracuda, and security.
- The HDMI cable for Camera 1, used in live streaming, had to be replaced after troubleshooting identified it as the issue behind Camera 1 and the Yololiv not communicating.
- The new Epson printer / copier was installed onto the AUC private network so staff could access it. This replaced the Xerox we used to have.
- Margaret's laptop was replaced.
- Two factor authentication was activated on all AUC emails addresses.
- Onboarded Bill Newman with using the Givings computer and the software needed for that role following Ed Griffith's departure.
- Onboarded Laurie Torno with using Microsoft 365 as she replaced Peter Drost as the M&P Chair.

Bob provided his professional IT services for this extensive list, free of charge to AUC. Many, many thanks Bob for your valuable time and effort for AUC!

#### Worship Committee

Aurora United Church continued to worship as a hybrid congregation throughout 2023, with services held weekly both in person AND recorded and live streamed for viewing by our members at home.

I would like to express heartfelt thanks to the AV folks for making this possible - - Noah Comar, Bob Kyriakides, Brian Elliott, Vic Metcalfe, Grant Hilliard, and Bill Newman. Without you, our committee would not be able to offer an enriched worship experience year after year. Also working hard behind the scenes - and in front of the camera - are our Music Director Margaret Heeney, our Handbell Director Lisa Kyriakides, and our Church Secretary Suzanne Whitehurst.

And, of course, where would we be without the wonderful leadership of Reverends Lorraine and Andy!

As has been our long-standing practice, the members of the Worship Committee met on the last Monday of every month; working to ensure that the congregation is provided with worship that is inspiring, uplifting, and inclusive. Those members were:

- representing <u>Worship</u> - Rev. Lorraine Newton-Comar, Holly Williamson and Nancy Kerswill; and
- representing **Decorating** - Debra Hilliard and Lori North

Throughout Lent 2023, the congregation was invited to walk the Lenten pathway observing the theme: 'Like a Rock- Becoming Living Stones' a reflection of the scripture from First Peter...'come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house.' To that end, stones of various sizes and textures were available at the welcome table, with the invitation to carry a stone for the season of Lent, or placing it somewhere where you can see or feel it ... and using it as a prayer or meditational focus - a reminder of our foundations. On Good Friday, we will return our stones as part of the liturgy of the Passion, creating a cairn as offering.

For Advent in 2023, our theme was 'A Thrill of Hope - The Weary World Rejoices' taken from the beloved carol, 'O Holy Night'. Jesus was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people. As Advent came again to a weary world, we asked 'how does a weary world rejoice?' From the opening chapters of Luke's gospel, we can find a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness.

And - with great joy - we were able to be in the sanctuary for Christmas Eve services for the first time since the fire! These services, as you can image, were very well attended.

As we embark on a new year, I leave you with the prayer we say together at the close of our meetings ...

May we feel God's love like a gentle breeze when we need inspiration ... may our faith remain strong through all of life's challenges ... and may hope be the light that guides our way.

#### Chancel Choir

This vital ministry, a subgroup of the Serving Ministry, has continued to thrive in 2023—the eighteenth year of our ministry.

The following are some points of note about our ministry in 2023.




This example of Three-Fold Blessing Pattern creatively demonstrates how small quantities of different yarns can be composed to produce a beautiful shawl.

- Number of shawls on hand on January 1, 2023, = 34
- Number of shawls on hand on December 31, 2023 = 46
- Number of shawls crafted and donated for distribution from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023 = 98
- Number of shawls distributed from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023 = 86
- Twelve of these shawls were donated to Southlake Regional Health Centre.
- Number of chemo caps crafted and donated to Southlake Regional Health Centre from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023 = 2
- Number of toques for infants crafted and donated to Southlake Regional Health Centre from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023 = 28
- Kits were moved back into the storage space at T.A.C. after being housed off-site since the beginning of COVID. Crafters were able to make their selections at the new location.
- We were able to resume distribution of shawls as we did pre-COVID. Distribution took place on most Sundays following worship. If shawls were needed during the week, requests were made at the church's office.

#### **Outreach Committee**

In 2023, Outreach supported four programs. Each of the programs continued to shift again as the church began to open to in-person events. I want to offer my gratitude to the coordinators and volunteers for three of these programs for their faithfulness, commitment, and care as they continued to maintain and provide these needed services to our community.

Rise and Shine Breakfast Program: Thank you Suzanne Whitehurst for your unwavering dedication to the Rise and Shine Breakfast program as our coordinator for this ministry which now completes its 14<sup>th</sup> year of service. Please see Suzanne's Rise & Shine Breakfast report below.

AUC is one of seven churches in Aurora that partners together as *Welcoming Arms*. Thank you to our Welcoming Arms volunteers, Heather Boorn, Linda Longhurst, Nellie Lopez, Kevah Safari, and Denyse Slack. Rev. Andy and Denyse Slack are members of the Welcoming Arms Executive Council. Throughout 2023 the three main programs provided by Welcoming Arms – Welcome Table (WT) on Wednesday evening, Martha's Table (MT) on Thursday lunch and Bridging the Gap continued to serve the community. WT returned to Binions Hall at Trinity Anglican for their in-person meals in May with approximately 50-60 people attending. Each of the ministers of the seven churches is part of the WT schedule, providing the grace before meal and support to guests. Martha's Table continued to serve in-person meals in 2023 at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church with about 30-40 people attending.

The Aurora Community Café (ACC) continued their program in 2023. The ACC meets every Wednesday from 10 am to 2 pm at St Andrew's Presbyterian Church. in the fall of 2022. The café is a social enterprise partnership, involving local churches and volunteers from non-profit coffee catering and community members. Our purpose is to offer work skill opportunity for adults with differing abilities. This community-based program offers a place for many to gather. We have several school and community groups that attend the café on a regular basis. We are still in need of volunteers for this program. Please speak to Rev. This year the Outreach Committee decided that the *Call to Awareness* for Advent 2023 would support the United Church of Canada's, Gifts With Vision program – The Basics of Kindness, an outreach ministry program serving young mothers ages 13 to 24, with very low or no income, from the Abiona Centre (formerly Massey Centre and Humewood House) in Toronto. Together we raised \$1,335!

## Rise & Shine Community Breakfast

Our Rise & Shine Community Breakfast has continued faithfully throughout 2023, taking a break in July and August, mostly for lack of volunteers. The program was a "take-away" meal, handed out in the Trinity parking lot until October when it was moved back indoors. Throughout the take-away period the breakfast items were prepared by York Region Food Network, and included a protein breakfast, a vegetarian breakfast, and an addition protein element in the protein breakfast to replace the soup, for those that could not have the soup. There were on average 45 meals handed out including the 16 meals delivered again this year by a ROUTES volunteer. We benefitted greatly from our partnership with Kate Greavette and the York Region Food Network, and the arrangement with ROUTES.

When we moved back indoors to a sit in breakfast the teams cooked hot food, varying per team. The breakfasts always included a protein portion, potatoes, oatmeal, some bread items, juice, and coffee. On average there are 18 sit-in guests, and 16 deliveries to those that cannot make it in. ROUTES continues to make these deliveries to about 8 households.

The last breakfast before Christmas, December 23<sup>rd</sup>, Aurora United Church received two very large turkeys from Wimpy's Aurora, Pan the owner. We served the guest turkey, in a turkey succotash, and offered sliced turkey to take with them. The guest also received a gift package from the University Women's Association of York Region. The gifts were packed in little makeup bags and purses.

Thank you to our team leaders (Carmen Harany, Carol Lever, Rosanne Rose, Suzanne Whitehurst), and all the volunteers who make this outreach ministry a success.

## **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Trustees holds all property and investments in trust on behalf of the congregation and the United Church of Canada. Our assets include the church land, all items in storage retrieved after the fire including the five stained glass windows, insurance payments received for the building and contents, the Endowment Fund and Flower Fund. The AUC congregation elects members of the Board of Trustees. The 2023 Board of Trustees members included: Blair Boyd, Karen Boyd, Reverend Andrew Comar (chair), Bill Dies, Pat Innes (secretary), Denyse Slack (treasurer), Dave Snelgrove and Jamie Thompson.

#### **Endowment Fund:**

Endowment Fund interest (less inflation) is returned to AUC for use in the General Fund. Interest earned in any year is forwarded to the church treasurer early in January of the following year. The Flower Fund generates interest income for the purchase of flowers for worship and special events. We know that this fund will have to be used for the rebuild. It is only the congregation that can decide on the use of the monies invested in the Endowment Fund. This motion will be presented to the AGM on March 17, 2024.

#### **Insurance Funds:**

After the fire, the Board of Trustees received insurance payments of \$8,575,000. These funds have been invested for the preparation (including reports, architectural fees, consulting fees, legal fees etc.) and rebuilding of the new church. In 2023, \$250,000 from the interest on insurance investments was transferred to the General Fund to help offset losses due to the shortfall of income from not having a church building.

## Legal:

Following the fire, The Trustees engaged Thomas Gold Pettingill LLP (TGP) to work on our behalf in our litigation with those responsible for the fire. The mediation process happened on April 2, 2019. The final settlement of \$7,000,000.00 was reached at the end of 2019. These funds were transferred into an interest-bearing account with TGP in January 2020. They were held by TGP until the fall of 2023 when an out of court settlement was arrived at with Aviva. In September, the Board of Trustees on direction of Council, settled with Aviva. Aviva received a payment of \$1,800,000.00. AUC received the balance of \$5,506,598.91.

#### In 2023 the Board of Trustees...

- a. signed lease with Trinity Anglican Church which extends from November 1, 2023, to October 31, 2024.
- b. signed a CCDC 5B contract with Dalton Company Limited on November 13, 2023. (*A CCDC-5B Construction Management Contract for Services and Construction is a standard contract used in Canada for the provision of construction management services by a construction manager to an owner.*)

We were all deeply saddened by the loss of our dear friend, and board member, Bill Dies. Bill's knowledge, wisdom and support of AUC and the rebuilding process in this last decade was unwavering. We will miss him around the Trustees circle.

Thank you to the members of the Board of Trustees for their support and dedication for everything that we had to do in 2023. We serve the congregation through the Church Council and in response to what is needed for our rebuilding project. It continued to be a challenging year, but with the assistance of the EDGE Property Committee and the Church Council we continue to move forward in realizing our new church building. We look forward to seeing our new building emerge in 2024.

In 2023, the Endowment Fund, consisting of investments including the Future Fund, Earmarked Donations, Flower Fund as well as Endowment Fund account generated a return of 8.02%, a significant increase fro m 2022's return of -5.19%. Approximately 57% of investments are in mutual funds mostily based in Canada, with 42% in fixed income investments and holding funds with the balance in cash. The endowment fund requires that earnings be retained in the fund to cover the annual rate of inflation with any balance left over to be paid to the General Fund. This year \$20,475 will go to the general fund. The investment approach is unlikely to change this year.

In the building fund, we received a settlement of nearly \$5.6MM from the litigation with Aviva and also achieved a return of 5.3% versus a negative return of 6.55% in 2022. Although we can't say for sure, we anticipate that the Church will be completed by the end of 2025 and therefore our investment approach will remain quite conservative with 50% equity mainly in Canada and 48% fixed income. We are reviewing proposals for construction with the building committee to ensure that we do not exceed our available financial capacity. It is expected that fundraising activities will generate additional resources to fully complete the new church construction over time. We also provided \$250K in revenues for the Church compared to \$175.000 in 2022.
