Welcome to the Cathedral Church of the Anglican Diocese of British Columbia. Here we respectfully acknowledge that we gather to worship on the ancestral lands of the Esquimalt and Songhees Nations, with whom we are in relationship to seek reconciliation.

As an Anglican centre for spirituality, learning, culture, heritage and community, this cathedral upholds a daily rhythm of worship in the heart of Victoria. From daily spoken and sung services to the weekly celebration of the Eucharist and Choral Evensong, we mark the important events of the Christian calendar and in the life of our diocese and the wider community.

Liturgical Note for Today's Service

Lent is one of the two penitential seasons in the liturgical calendar. The other one, being Advent, is also a time of great anticipation, and so Lent remains our main extended time of penitential reflection. In keeping with this, we restructure the beginning of our services to place the components related to repentance, confession and absolution up front to temper and frame the entire liturgy suitably for our shared Lenten journey. In that same spirit, there is no organ prelude and the community notices will be delivered before the blessing, enabling more space for silent reflection and a contemplative spirit.

Voluntaries during Lent

This year as part of our Lent observances, the cathedral will present a performance of J.S. Bach's *St John Passion* on Palm Sunday (March 24, 2.30 p.m.) in collaboration with Victoria Baroque, the Church of St John the Divine, and Early Music Vancouver. Bach's Passion features several Lutheran choral melodies which punctuate the Passion narrative and reflect on its themes. Chorales form the basis for Lutheran musical worship and the chorales from the Passion would have been well known to the listeners of the time. Much organ music has been written based on these Lutheran chorale melodies; typically known as Chorale Preludes, they are often used as voluntaries or reflections.

Throughout the Lenten season, the concluding organ voluntaries at the ends of the services are based on some of the chorale melodies found in the Bach *St John Passion* as set by various composers including Bach himself. This week's voluntary is based on the chorale "Herzlich lieb hab ich, o Herr," Bach uses the chorale's final verse as the closing movement in the *St John Passion*. The verse opens with the text: "Ah, Lord, let your dear little angel, at my final end, take my soul to Abraham's bosom." The setting today is by 17th century composer Heinrich Scheidemann.

We are trying something different during Lent. We are using **Common Praise**, the hymn book of the Anglican Church of Canada, rather than printing the hymns in the leaflet. There are two reasons for this change; it will cut down on the amount of paper we use, which will realize financial savings and it will also reduce the amount of paper (trees!) we end up sending to recycling every week. This six-week trial period gives us the opportunity to measure how much we save and consider whether we want to continue this practice.


