This version of the Lord's Prayer is a translation by Dr. Neil Douglas-Klotz.

as the rays of a beacon show the way. Create your reign of unity now through our fiery hearts and willing hands. Your one desire then acts with ours. as in all light, so in all forms. Truth and Reconciliation Report 2015 Call to Action # 68

This week we consider the second of four Calls to Action which pertains to **Museums and Archives**.

We call upon the federal government, in collaboration with Aboriginal peoples, and the Canadian Museums Association to mark the 150th anniversary of Canadian Confederation in 2017 by establishing a dedicated national funding program for commemoration projects on the theme of reconciliation.

According to the website <u>Indigenous Watchdog</u>, this Call to Action is considered to be "Complete." The website states:

"The government did not establish dedicated funding for Indigenous groups but allocated a percentage of over-all spending to indigenous projects that consisted of:

- Signature Projects: \$3,603,300 for 5 projects out of 38 (13% of total) including 2 dedicated to Reconciliation
- Community Projects: \$28.6M for 248 projects out of 636 (39% of total)

March has been a busy month so far! This week, we have a chance to catch our breath before we begin Holy Week on Palm Sunday.

On March 3rd, we spoke about Remit 1. This is a Remit regarding the creation of an autonomous Indigenous church within the United Church of Canada. The members of the Official Board will vote on this Remit during the Board meeting on March 26th. In order to prepare for the vote, I strongly encourage you to familiarize yourselves with:

- The Doctrine of Discovery
- The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP)
- The background to this Remit

It all began with the Doctrine of Discovery. There is an excellent video on YouTube titled: Doctrine of Discovery:

Stolen Lands, Strong Hearts, created by the Anglican Church of Canada. Just open YouTube on your computer or device and type the title in the search bar. It will appear. It is an hour long.

For background information on the Remit: open the Horseshoe Falls Regional Council website. You will see a black box on the right-hand side which contains the word "Remit." When you click on that you will find yourself looking at a page of numerous available documents and three videos. The third video is titled "Remit Foundations Video." This video, in my opinion, provides the best overview of the background and the issues of the Remit. It is 31 minutes long.

If you have questions, I am happy to speak with you about them.

On March 10th, a Congregational Meeting took place following worship. Thank you to everyone who stayed for the meeting. Thank you to Morgan Perigo, Karen Maerz, Mary Willard, and Frank Barretto, who made up the committee tasked with updating East Plains' Governance model. They worked for a couple of years to research and revise and bring EPUC's Governance Model into a format that will fit the needs of the church today.

The next step is to implement this model and work through the growing pains and the adjustment period as we bring it into practice. This will require both flexibility and patience!

Easter is rapidly approaching!! As we did last year, we will darken the sanctuary for our entry into worship on Easter Sunday morning. If you have a black sheet or tablecloth that you would be willing to lend to me for 24 hours,

please let me know. Your assistance is very much appreciated!!
