This evening's Eucharist begins the Sacred Triduum or Three Sacred Days of our redemption. This is a celebration: a celebration of our Lord's institution of the Sacrament of his Body and Blood and the Mandatum, the New Commandment, that we love one another as Christ loved us. This is a celebration; but it is overshadowed by the Cross.





Collect of the Day

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And also with you

Celebrant Let us pray.

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

After each reading, the Lector says "The Word of the Lord" and the People respond: Thanks be to God.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

After each reading, the Lector says "The Word of the Lord" and the People respond: Thanks be to God.

Sequence Anthem

A New Command I Give You

All remain standing for the procession and proclamation of the Holy Gospel.

Gospeller: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. John.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Gospel John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

At the end of the Gospel reading, the Gospeller and people say the following responsory:

Gospeller: The Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

Silence may be kept.

we confess that we have sinned against you

in thought, word, and deed,

by what we have done,

and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart;

we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,

have mercy on us and forgive us;

that we may delight in your will,

and walk in your ways,

to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Bishop, when present, or the Priest, stands and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen*.

The Peace

All stand. The Celebrant says to the people

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And also with you.

The ministers and people share the peace of Christ as a sign of reconciliation and with the hope of continuing this work in the world.



The people remain standing. The Celebrant, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings or says




Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

Christ is risen.


Christ will come again.

The appointed person reads the account of the Agony in the Garden (Matthew 26:30-46) before processing out with the sanctuary candle to the place of the Night Watch vigil.


Then, all depart in silence.

- MY GÖD, my God, why have *you* for-sak-en me? * and are so far from my cry and from the words of my *dis*-tress?
- O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you *do* not an-swer; * by night as well, but I find *no* rest.
- Yet you *are* the Ho-ly One, * enthroned upon the praises of Is-*ra*-el.
- 4 Our forefathers *put* their trust in you; * they trusted, and you deliv-*ered* them.
- 5 They cried out to you and *were* de-liv-ered; * they trusted in you and were not put *to* shame.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm *and* no man, * scorned by all and despised by the *peo*-ple.
- All who see me laugh *me* to scorn; * they curl their lips and wag their heads, *säy*-ing,
- 8 "He trusted in the Lord; let *him* de-liv-er him; * let him rescue him, if he delights *in* him."
- Yet you are he who took me out of the womb, * and kept me safe upon my moth-er's breast.
